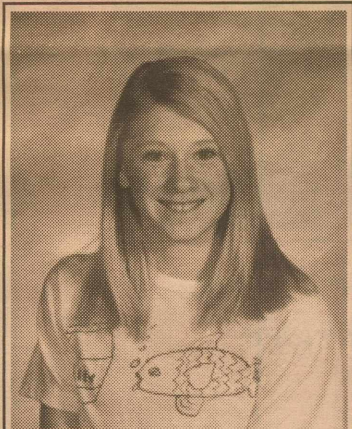

Dare to Live Without Limits

It's Who You Are, Not What You Have

It's common for people to measure what they've accomplished by what they have accumulated. Often a person is eager to show off how much they make, what they are worth, or what they own. They erroneously believe their financial status is impressive.

Although it's true money comes as a result of service to others, how much you accumulate is not a measure of who you are. Who you are is determined by how you treat others, regardless of your fi-

ancial standing.

When you pass on, your legacy is not the assets you leave behind but rather how many lives you have positively impacted. Many a millionaire has been despised. Conversely, those of modest means have been admired by all who knew them.

This is not to say that money is bad or lack of it is good. The fundamental issue is how you live. Who you are isn't related to what you have. You don't need a lot of possessions to be a great person.

Being Prepared for a Tornado

We are all quite aware of what a tornado can do to an area. Many of us are learning more about them after the recent tragedies that have occurred. Here is some basic information to help you and your family be prepared if we are ever faced with a tornado in our area. Please take time to go over these with your family and make a plan. When we are better prepared for disasters, we have a better chance of surviving.

Tornadoes are violent wind-storm characterized by a twisting, funnel-shaped cloud. These naturally occurring phenomena can form as spin-offs of a hurricane or accompany a thunderstorm. While many tornadoes never touch ground or do not affect populated areas, those that do can cause significant property damage in a short time.

How to Spot a Tornado

Tornadoes are most common between March and June in Texas, although they may occur anytime of the year. Hurricanes may also spawn tornadoes.

Learn to recognize weather signs. Tornado weather is usually hot, humid, and oppressive, with southerly winds. An hour or two before the storm, the clouds may have a greenish-black color, and may seem to bulge down instead of up. Rapidly moving lower clouds may be shot with lace-like lightning.

Know what a tornado looks and sounds like. The funnel of a tornado looks like a spinning, twisting rope at its bottom, and fans out into a rotating funnel-shaped cloud extending down from the base of a thundercloud. It is usually gray or black. A nearby tornado usually sounds like the roar of a jet plane or a freight train.

Tornadoes usually move from southwest to northeast. They may form in a series of two or more, with a large pri-

mary tornado and one or more secondary or lesser storms. Heavy rain and hail may add to the damage of the tornado itself.

Some tornado funnels never touch ground. Some touchdown, rise again, and touchdown in another place.

Where to Go During a Tornado

Knowing what to do during a tornado may mean the difference between life and death. If you hear a tornado warning, seek shelter immediately. Stay away from windows.

In office buildings—Go to an interior hallway on a lower floor, preferably in the basement, or designated shelter area.

In factories—Go to the section of the plant offering the greatest protection. Someone should be responsible for disconnecting fuel lines and electric circuits. Keep a lookout posted.

In homes—Get to the lowest level of your home in an interior room as far away from exterior walls and windows as possible. If you have no basement, choose an inside wall away from windows and sit flat against it. Central halls, bathrooms, and closets are good choices. Get under heavy furniture, if possible, to protect yourself from flying glass and debris. Then, stay away from windows. Keep tuned to a battery-powered radio for latest weather information.

In mobile homes—Go to the nearest community shelter or other sturdy building. Mobile homes are especially dangerous during high winds and may be over turned. If you cannot get to a shelter or sturdy building, lie flat in the nearest ditch, ravine, or culvert, and cover your head with your hands.

In schools—Go to an interior hallway on the lowest floor. Avoid gymnasiums and

Public Notice

Property Owner Protest Hearings Are Set for July 12, 2013

Property owners who disagree with the Borden County Appraisal District's appraisal of their property for local taxes or for any other action that adversely affects them may protest their property value to the appraisal district's Appraisal Review Board (ARB). The ARB will begin hearing taxpayer protests on July 12, 2013 in the Borden County Courthouse.

After the ARB completes its hearings and approves final property tax appraisals, local governments will use these appraisals to set 2013 property tax rates.

The ARB is a group of citizens who live in the appraisal district and are appointed by the appraisal district's board of directors, except in Harris and Fort Bend Counties where a local administrative judge makes the appointments. Property owners may protest any of the following issues to the ARB:

- the appraised or market value of the property;
- unequal appraisal of the taxpayer's property compared to similar property in the district;
- inclusion of the property on the appraisal records;
- denial of a partial exemption, such as a homestead exemption;
- denial of special appraisals, such as agricultural or timber productivity appraisal;
- determination that agricultural or timber land has had a change of use and is subject to a rollback tax;
- identification of the taxing unit or units in which the property is located;
- determination that the taxpayer is the owner of the property; or
- any other action of the appraisal district that adversely affects the owner.

A property owner must file a written notice of protest before June 1, 2013 or within 30 days after the appraisal district mails the taxpayer a notice of appraised value, whichever is later. The ARB schedules a hearing and sends the protesting property owner written notice of the date, time and place of the hearing. The law contains specific timelines and procedures for the owner and the ARB throughout the appraisal protest process. These are detailed in the state Comptroller's publication *Property Taxpayer Remedies*. Copies are available from the BORDEN COUNTY APPRAISAL DISTRICT at 120 E. Notice of Application for Commercial Oil & Gas Waste Disposal Well Permit

Black Mountain SWD, LP, 500 Main Street, Suite 1000, Fort Worth, TX 76102 is applying to the Railroad Commission of Texas for a permit to dispose of produced salt water or other oil and gas waste by well injection into a porous formation not productive of oil or gas.

The applicant proposes to dispose of oil and gas waste into the Clearfork formation in the Borden 1013 SWD Lease, Well No. 1. The proposed disposal well is located 2.37 miles SW of Gail, TX in the Clayton Ranch (Strawn) Field, in Borden County. The waste water will be injected into strata in the subsurface depth interval from 4,800 feet to 6,000 feet.

LEGAL AUTHORITY: Chapter 27 of the Texas Water Code, as amended, Title 3 of the Texas Natural Resources Code, as amended, and the Statewide Rules of the Oil and Gas Division of the Railroad Commission of Texas.

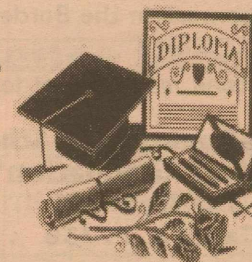

buildings with large, free-span roofs.

· In shopping centers—Go to a designated shelter area, or lie flat outside in a ditch or a low protected ground. Do not stay in your car. A tornado can pick it up and toss it.

· In a car—If you are in the open country, lie flat in the nearest ditch, ravine, or culvert, but not where you could be trapped by floodwaters.

Tornado Watch and Warning— What They Mean

Tornado Watch

A tornado watch indicates that weather conditions may cause tornadoes to develop in your area. A watch does not mean that a tornado has been sighted. The watch may last up to 8 hours. You should be prepared for a possible tornado. You don't need to move to a shelter, but keep a radio or TV on and be alert for threatening weather conditions.

Tornado Warning

Local weather bureau offices issue a tornado warning when a tornado funnel has actually been sighted or indicated by radar. The warning covers a short period of time and specific small areas. The warning will indicate where the tornado was detected and the area through which it is expected to move. If you are in the expected path of the storm, take shelter immediately.

Tornado Survival Rules

Know the difference between a tornado watch and a tornado warning:

· A tornado watch means that tornado conditions exist in an area.

· A tornado warning means that a tornado has actually been sighted and you should take shelter.

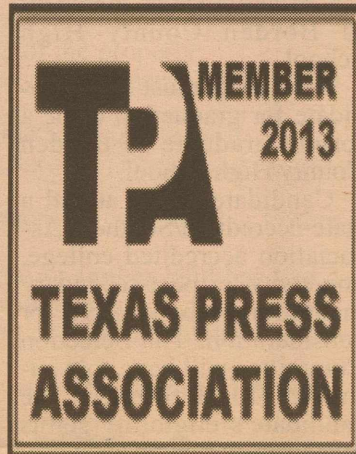
· Do not go outside to look for the tornado. Go to a below-ground location, if possible. If not, stay on the lowest level of your house. A storm cellar, root cellar, center laundry room, bathroom with no exterior walls, or to a center hallway in your house are possible choices. Stay away from windows. Do not run out into the street or turn into the path of the tornado. Protect yourself against the sandblasting effect of flying glass and bits of sharp metal. Cover yourself

with an old rug and crouch under heavy furniture.

· Listen to instructions on a battery-powered radio.

· Beware of possible dangers: Flying objects, Falling trees, Breaking windows, Collapsing buildings

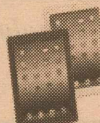

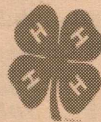
