Borden County ISD Selected High-Performance Reward School for 2013-2014 School Year

The Borden County Independent School District was recently named as a distinguished High-Performing Reward School for the 2013-2014 school year. A high-performing school is a school that receives distinction designations based on math and reading performance at the high school level along with the highest graduation rates (at least 90%). A reward school has met all federally required annual measurable objectives on each of the system safeguards evaluated for all students and subgroups in both math and reading.

There are 63 school districts in the Education Service Center Region, and most of those districts have multiple campuses. The Borden County Independent School District is one of only three K-12 schools in the region and only twenty K-12 districts out of approximately one thousand school districts in Texas met all of the criteria to be recognized as a High-Performing School and a High-Progress School. This is an outstanding honor and accomplishment. We commend our students, faculty, and the Borden County School Community for this accomplishment.

Quick Start Propels Coyotes to Victory Over #7 Ropes Eagles

The Borden County Coyotes returned to the field Friday after taking a week off and showed no signs of being rusty early in this match-up with state Ranked Ropes Eagles. The Eagles came into this contest with a 4-1 record and their only blemish was at the hands of the then #1 Ranked Ira Bulldogs 56 to 28. In fact in that contest the Eagles had the ball inside the Bulldog 5 yard line 3 times without scoring so that score could be even closer. With that being said, the Coyotes knew that their week off would be needed as they prepared for one of the top football teams in the state.

The Coyote defense came out of the gates playing well and gave the ball back to the home town Coyotes in good field position. They wasted little time in getting on the board as Corbin Sumners followed the blocks of center Frank Banman, guard Sean Tucker, end Korbin Martinez, fullback Trace Richey and quarterback Hunter Jones and rumbled 11 yards to the endzone and a quick 6-0 lead with 6:13 left in the first. Riley Herridge booted the extra point kick out of the hold of Mason Coor to push the lead to 8-0. The Borden County defense of Banman, Tucker, Richey, Sumners, Jones, Martinez, Jayton Lewis and Ryan Willborn again forced a quick turnover on downs and the Coyotes began their march to another score. This drive proved to be one of the longest of the year but in the end Jones connected with Sean Tucker on a 2 yard scoring strike to increase the Coyote lead to 14-0.

The Eagles used a couple of Coyote penalties to continue their next drive which culminated with a score to cut the lead to 14 to 8. The home team would answer moments later as Sumners reached the endzone again, this time from 2 yards out and with another Herridge kick the Coyotes had a 22 to 8 lead. With yet another great effort by the kick-off coverage team the Eagles would start deep in their own

territory. This group consists of Herridge, Coor, Lewis, Noah Morales, Colby Pennell, Cayden Vaughn and Willborn. After another defensive stop the Coyotes wasted no time increasing their lead as Jones hit Banman with a 23 yards scoring strike and with the Herridge kick the Coyotes were up 30-8. But, on the next Eagles offensive possession a busted assignment resulted in a long touchdown run for the visitors and the momentum for the visitors cutting the lead to 30 to 16. The Borden County offense however would answer immediately as Corbin Sumners squirted free on a nice 55 yard run to regain the momentum. Herridge hit Colby Pennell for the extra point and a 37 to 16 lead.

After forcing the ball over on downs the Coyotes would take possession of the ball with just a little over a minute left in the half. The Coyotes showed great composure in driving the ball down the field and in the end came away with a score on the final play of the first half as Sumners took a pitch from Jones to scamper in for the score. The Riley Herridge kick made the half-time score 45 to 16 and the home team would get the ball to start the second half.

The Coyotes would again waste little time in getting on the board again as Hunter Jones would move to tailback as Sumners would sit the rest of the second half with a bruised thigh suffered on the first play of the second half. Later on that drive senior Ricky Torres would re-injure his shoulder and he would miss the majority of the second half as well. Already missing this contest was senior Nathan Ham. Jones meanwhile sprinted 37 yards to the endzone to give the Coyotes a commanding 51 to 16 lead and with the Herridge extra point kick, Borden County would be a stop and score away from ending this game early with their 53 to 16 lead.

The Eagles however had different plans as they found the home team making a few

mistakes defensively that would result in the visitors hanging around getting scores on their first 4 possessions of the second half. Meanwhile the Coyotes would fall short offensively on their next possession as a dropped pass would turn the ball over on downs giving the Eagles a quick 16-0 run to make this game a lot closer than it actually was at 53 to 32. The Coyotes would regain the momentum on their next offensive possession as Jones hooked up with Frank Banman with a 50 yard scoring pass. Herridge would again connect with Pennell for the point after and the Coyotes were up 60 to 32. Another Eagle score would make it 60 to 40 but again Borden County would answer as Jones hit Colby Pennell with a 30 yard scoring pass, and Herridge would add the point after kick to make it 68 to 40. The Eagles would answer one more time due to a coverage bust making the score 68 to 48, but that is all the defense would allow the rest of the way.

Meanwhile the offense continued to score as Trace Richey finished off a drive that he started with a nice interception. Richey rumbled in from 8 yards out to make the score 74 to 48. The defense stopped the Eagles again and then the offense would put the game away as Mason Coor juke his way to pay dirt from 10 yard out. The final Herridge kick made the score 82 to 48. Another defensive stop would bring a close to this tough contest and improve the Coyotes to 5-0 on the season and set up a match with Water Valley next week. The Coyotes look forward to this challenge as they have never come away with a victory in Water Valley.

Statistically for the Coyotes: Ryan Willborn had 4 tackles and 2 carries for 24 yards, Noah Morales had 3 tackles. Frank Banman had 11 tackles and 3 catches for 82 yards and 2 scores. Cayden Vaughn had 5 tackles including a sack. Mason Coor had 3 tackles and

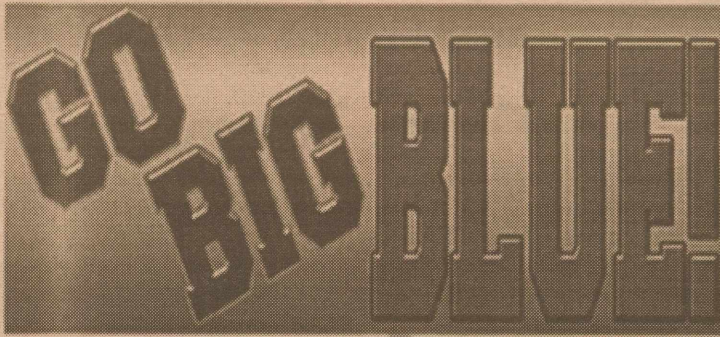

Coyote JV Defeat the Eagles in Third Quarter

The Borden County JV got back to their winning ways after losing a tough game last week to the Lubbock Homeschool Titans. Borden County only needed 3 quarters to win this game as it was ended due to the mercy rule for the third time for the 2014 Coyotes who have been playing some amazing games this season. The Coyotes had to deal with adversity this week as starting center Braxton Barnes continues to battle an illness and the Coyotes also had a member of their team decide to go a different direction, so they would have to make due and use the adage that has been our battle cry all year, "Next Man Up". That's just what this group did and boy did they put on a show.

Nick Proulx would get things started for the Coyotes as he rumbled 15 yards to the endzone and a quick 6-0 lead for Borden County. Paving the way most of the evening were linemen Braxton Coor, Diego Bernal, Steven Carrillo, Dylan Murphy and fullback Brian Torres along with signal caller Morgan Wilson. The other two key members of the Coyotes success on this cool October evening were Thomas Nix and Josh Murphy.

Dylan Murphy made a heads up play on the Coyotes next defensive possession as he batted down a 4th down pass to give them possession of the ball closer to the endzone. Dylan would be credited with an interception for this heads up play. Moments later, Nick Proulx had Borden County back on the scoreboard with another run. Proulx then found his extra point combination with Braxton Coor for the point after and a 13-0 lead in the first quarter. After a Proulx interception, Proulx and the Coyote offense reached pay dirt again, this time from 35 yards out and with another hookup with Coor they had a commanding 20-0 lead after one period of play. The Coyotes got another defensive stop in the second quarter and Brian Torres wasted little time adding to their lead, as he sprinted 56 yards to the endzone and with a Proulx to Steven

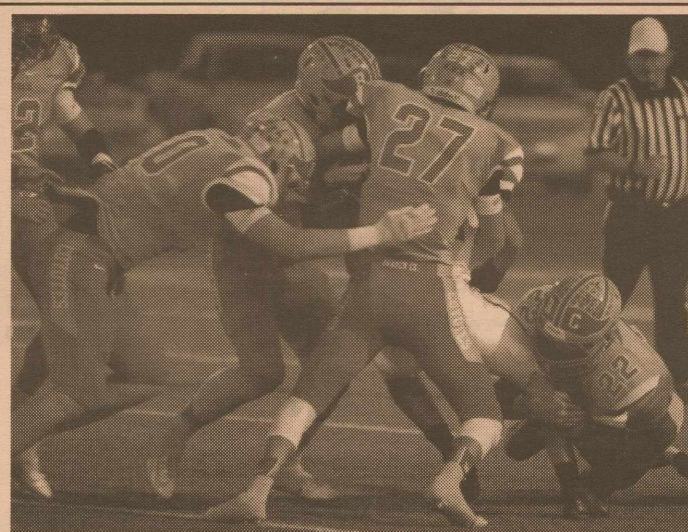
Carrillo extra point the Borden County had a 27 to 0 lead.

The Coyotes got a sweet interception and return from Thomas Nix on their next defensive possession. In fact Thomas made a sweet spin move and looked like he was going to score only to get tangled up with a teammate. But on the first play after his pick, Morgan Wilson hit Thomas with a nice 17 yard pass and catch play. Proulx ran in the point after and a comfortable 34 to 0 lead. On the next defensive possession Nick Proulx had his second interception and the coyotes 4th as a team, this time however, Proulx took the pick all the way to the endzone and another Coyote score. They would now be one stop away from ending this contest at half leading 40-0. The Eagles however had a different play as they scored to make the game 40 to 8 at half.

Borden County would answer on their first possession of the second half as Brian Torres found the endzone from 11 yards out. Proulx hit Coor again for the point after and the Coyotes had a 47 to 8 lead. After a nice defensive stop the Coyotes managed another march to the endzone as Torres brought the game to a close as the combination of his long run and a proulx extra point gave the Coyotes a dominating 54 to 8 victory, ending the game after 3 quarters of play.

The Coyotes now 3-1 on the season will next play a very tough Water Valley Wildcat football team. Thank you all for your support and we encourage you all to come support the Coyotes Thursday in this home game.

When It Comes to Managing Mealtimes-What kind of a parent are you?

Managing what food to put on the table is challenging enough without having to manage who is around the table. There are three approaches to parenting that influence children's eating behavior: parent centered, child centered and balanced.

If you take the parent centered approach, or authoritarian, then you may restrict the type and/or amount of food your child can eat. For example, you might have a no junk food policy at your house. Another clue you may have a parent centered approach is if you stick to strict meal and snack times. Also you may expect your child to eat all of the food on their plate - a clean plate rule. One problem with this approach is that children often desire the foods they cannot have and will often overeat when offered restricted foods. Children who are required to finish all of the food on their plate may develop a habit of overeating which could lead to unwanted weight gain over time.

The child centered approach (also known as permissive) to mealtime is very unstructured. Children decide what they want to eat and when they want to eat. They will often forage

in the kitchen for food. This approach to parenting can be a problem when children pick foods that are not very healthy resulting in overall decrease in nutritional intake. Also children may not learn proper table manners and how to make dinner conversation.

The balanced approach to managing mealtimes is also called authoritative. It can be thought of as a happy median between the parent and the child approaches. Parents with a balanced approach:

- * Offer meals and snacks regularly throughout the day thereby allowing children to feel secure

- * Provide a variety of healthful foods from which children are allowed to select

- * Introduce new foods 11 to 12 times to allow children ample time to warm up to unfamiliar foods

- * Create a positive mealtime atmosphere by not commenting about food not eaten or making negative statements about the child

- * Are good role models.

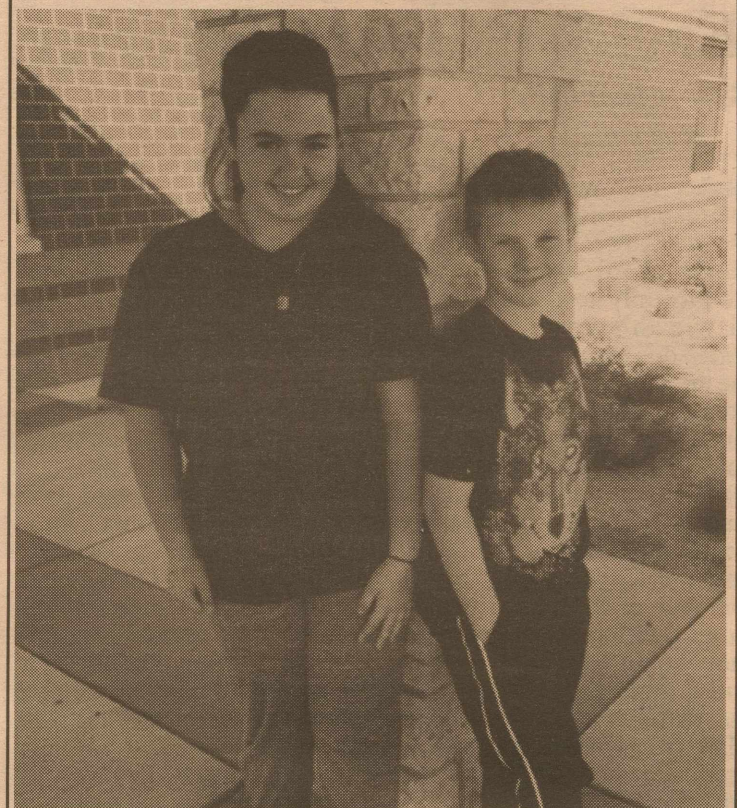

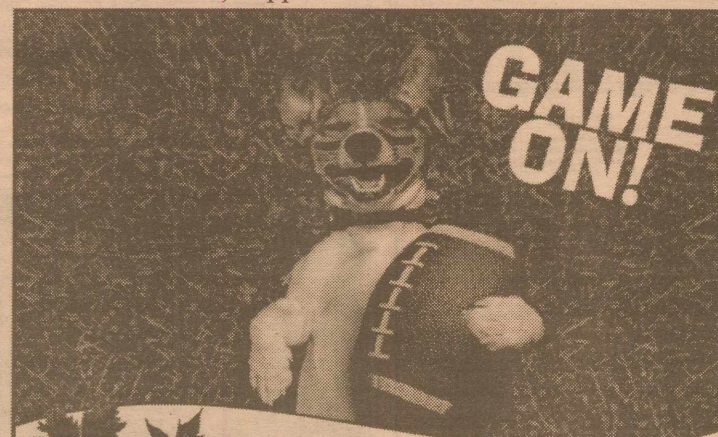
