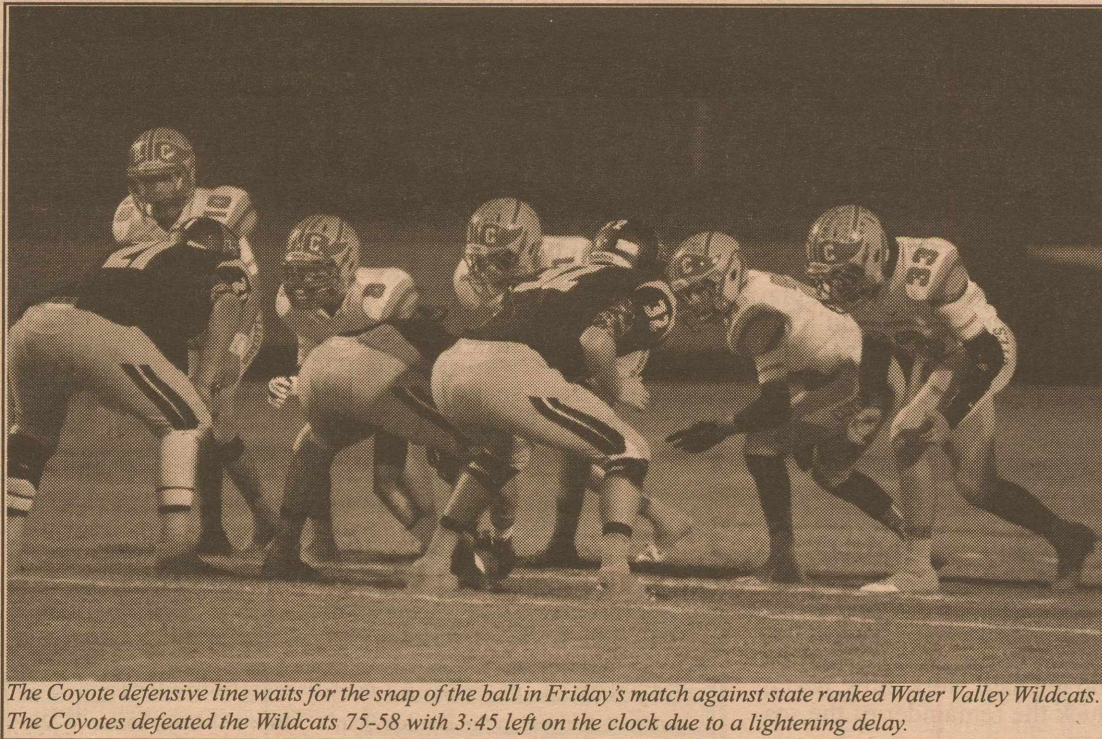

# Coyotes Defeat Wildcats First Time in Six-Man Football...

pay dirt on their first offensive play of the game as Corbin Summers followed blocks by Frank Banman, guard Riley Herridge, fullback Korbin Martinez, end Sean Tucker and quarterback Hunter Jones for a 78 yard touchdown run. Herridge split the uprights with the extra point into a very stiff wind to make the score 8-0. The visitors looked to be stopped on their first drive, but a missed tackle followed by a huge hit by Jones came just a yard late and allowed the Wildcats to continue their drive resulting in a touchdown tying the game at 8. Borden County methodically moved the ball down the field using a rotating offensive group that included the aforementioned first 6 and added Mason Coor, Trace Richey, Jayton Lews, Ryan Willborn, Colby Pennell, Cayden Vaughn, Noah Morales using their fast paced offense and rotating players to march the ball down the field. Summers took a pitch that followed sticking it into the belly of fullback Richey and the quarterback Jones pitched to Summers for a 2 yard score and a 14 to 8 lead. The Wildcats would get the second and final touchdown of the first half to grab the lead at 16 to 14 after one period of play. That is when the Coyotes took complete control of this game using a 38-0 second quarter outburst to take complete control. In fact the only blemish on the half was the final extra point being missed that would have put the game to a score and a stop away from ending early.

The second quarter started with Borden County finally getting the brisk wind to their back and Coyotes answered by air immediately as Jones hit Banman with a beautiful 40 yard scoring strike. Herridge's kick gave the visiting team the lead they would not give back at 22 to 16. The defense of Banman, Jones, Sean Tucker, Jayton Lewis, Korbin Martinez, Trace Richey and rotated in Cayden Vaughn, Colby Pennell and Ryan Willborn completely shut down the Wildcats in the quarter. After

a stop they used another big pass and several nice runs by Mason Coor and Summers to set the Coyotes up deep in Wildcat territory and Richey answered with a 1 yard run and with the kick a 30 to 16 lead. The defense again stopped the home team and with the Coyotes having several penalties put a kink in their next drive Borden County was faced with a 4<sup>th</sup> and 37. The Coyotes did the opposite of what you might expect, they ran the ball and they got the blocks from every player that could block from center Banman, end Tucker, Guard Herridge, fullback Richey and Quarterback Jones. This meant that Summers would only have to outrun the unblocked man and that is just what he did sprinting 40 yards to the improbable touchdown and with the kick a 38 to 16 lead. Another defensive stop would give the Coyotes the ball and again some nice runs by Coor and passing as well set up another Summers 2 yard touchdown run and with the Herridge kick a commanding 46 to 16 lead with 1:14 left in the quarter.

On the ensuing kick the Wildcats looked to get on the board again, but a hustling Mason Coor chased down the Wildcat runner and saved the score. On the very next play pressure by Martinez forced an errant pass and Tucker snagged it out of the air to give the Coyotes the ball with less than a minute left in the half. Again, using a dominating ground game and timely passing moved Borden County deep into Wildcat territory and with 7 seconds left tight QB Riley Herridge hit Sean Tucker for a 2 yard score. The PAT was missed and the score at half would be 52 to 16.

The Coyotes needed two stops and a score after the missed PAT. It appeared that they were about to get that first stop as they had the Wildcats in a 3<sup>rd</sup> and long situation. With the Coyotes expecting pass the Wildcats took to the ground and got a long touchdown run to get a little momentum at 56 to 24. The Borden County of-

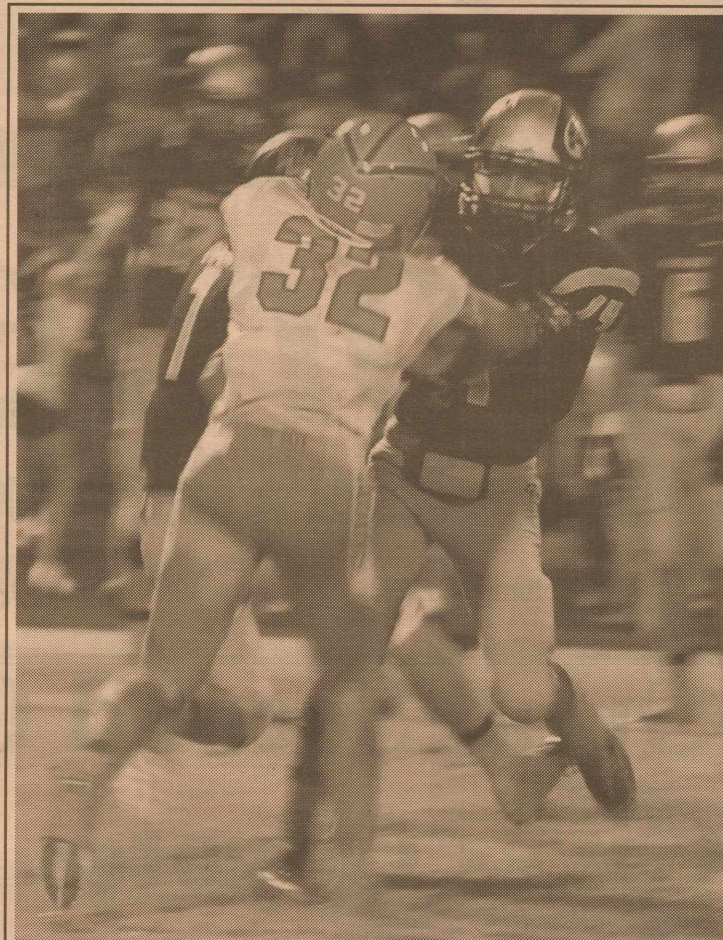
fense would commit their first and only turnover on their next possession to give the Wildcats more life and then with a converted 4<sup>th</sup> down touchdown the Wildcats got more momentum. On the ensuing kick-off the Wildcats recovered a Coyote fumble and the momentum continued to build for the home team. Water Valley added another score and all of the sudden the game that appeared to be over was now 52 to 36. The two teams then trade scores the rest of the evening until Mother Nature which already had a hand in the game with the wind completely took the game over just after another Wildcat score with 3:45 left in the game, the game was called due to lightning.

Before that, the Coyotes got three more scores of their own in their 3 possessions as Summers reached the endzone again from 9 yards out. Herridge hit Tucker for the point after and a 59 to 36 lead. Herridge hit Tucker again on the next drive but this time for a touchdown from 12 yards out. The Herridge kick made the score 67 to 44. Another Summers run and Herridge kick made the score 75 to 50 and then the Wildcats would get their final score to give us the final tally of 75 to 58 and the first ever win on the varsity level for the Coyotes over Water Valley.

The Coyotes were missing Ricky Torres who will be back next week and Nathan Ham who appears to be about 2-3 weeks away from a possible return.

The Coyotes will next play host to the Amherst Bulldogs in what will be the final tune-up for district play and will also be the 2014 homecoming game.

Thank you all for traveling out to Water Valley, thank you all for your support and patience with all the weather issues this 2014 season has encountered but thru it all, the Coyotes stand 6-0, a mark they haven't seen since 2009. Keep up the hard work guys, best of luck the remainder of the season.

The most impressive part of the game was the smaller Coyotes won not only the game but won the physical battle against the larger Wildcats. Nick Proulx followed some nice blocks from center Braxton Coor who is replacing Braxton Barnes who is still recovering from some health issues, guard Diego Bernal, and end Kale Yarbrow playing for the first time this season after a hip and back injury had him sidelined since the first day of pads. Also blocking was fullback/end Steven

Carrillo and quarterback Morgan Wilson, for a 45 yards touchdown run. Proulx hit Carrillo for the point after to make the score 7-0 only minutes into the contest. With 3:32 left in the first Brian Torres set sail on a 60 yard run to push the lead to 13-6. Then after yet another stop by the defense of Carrillo, Bernal, Yarbrow, Coor, Proulx, Wilson, Thomas Nix and Dylan Murphy the Coyotes kept the visitors out of the endzone. In fact on the next defensive possession Borden County got their own score as Nick Proulx intercepted a pass and returned it 25 yards for the score. Proulx followed that with a PAT run to push the lead to 20-0. The Wildcats managed to get on the board on their next possession to cut the lead to 20-

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# Pups Stay Perfect Taming the Wildcats

The Borden County Pups played host to the Water Valley Wildcats hoping to stay perfect on the season and keep a 25 game winning streak going. That is just what the Pups did with a convincing 58 to 20 victory.

The Pup starters of 8<sup>th</sup> graders Payton Merket, Riley Lewis, JW Nix, Ben Justice, Jeremy Souder and 7<sup>th</sup> grader Will Yarbrow completely dominated on the offensive side of the ball. Take out Souder and add 8<sup>th</sup> grader Lukas Grantham and this group dominated on the defensive side, who in fact did not give up a score building a very comfortable 26 to 0 lead. The second unit of 7<sup>th</sup> graders Conner Wagner, Jake Avey, Junior Gray, Jason Robinson, Olivia Reyes, Ryan Rathbun and Colbin Briley got to play most of the extra point attempts and also played several downs offensively during the course of the contest. This group also played some defense and with a 26-0 lead came in and looked to have a stop of their own, only to see a Wildcat fumble only to have it picked up by another Water Valley player and returned 65 yards to get the Wildcats on the board. This defense would get more chances throughout the game.

Now back to how it all happened. The Pups got off to a great start as Payton Merket hit Riley Lewis on the very first offensive play hooking up for a 30 yard score. Merket hit JW Nix on the point after to give the home team a quick 7-0 lead. After a quick defensive stop Merket and the pups stayed airborne as he connected with Lewis again this time for a 49 yard score. Ben Justice added the point after run and a 14-0. When the Pups got the ball back Merket took to the ground to give the Pups a 20-0 lead after one period of play.

Borden County continued their air attack in the second quarter as Merket hit Justice with a 15 yard touchdown. The second unit ran the next PAT but came up short. The Pups offense hit a rut in the road the rest of the way as an apparent

touchdown by Lukas Grantham was called back for a penalty and then could not get into the endzone and with the Wildcat score that happened with :06 left in the half the first half would end with the Pups up 26-7.

Borden County came right out to start the second half with Merket sprinting 41 yards to paydirt and with a Lukas Grantham run, the home team again seized complete control with a 33 to 7 lead. After a defensive stop Merket and Justice again connected for a 10 yard scoring strike and a commanding 33-7 lead. The defense got into the act as Conner Wagner and JW Nix sacked the Wildcat quarterback and just as he was going to the ground he flipped the ball up and Jeremy Souder intercepted the ball and sprinted 40 yards to the end zone and his first ever score in junior high, a very exciting moment. This score gave Borden County a 45 to 7 lead. The Pups added another score moments later as Ben Justice sprinted 25 yards to make the score 51 to 13 as the Wildcats got on the board again moments before. After another Wildcat touchdown the lead was cut to 51 to 20. The Pups used a group of Souder, Olivia Reyes, Conner Wagner, Lukas Grantham, Riley Lewis at quarterback and Jake Avey at tailback and this group got a touchdown to end the game as Avey rumbled 63 yards for a score. Lukas Grantham added the point after and this would give us our final score with a 58 to 20 score.

Congrats to the guys for the big win and keeping the streak alive. Thank you all for your support. The Pups will next face the Amherst Bulldogs in Amherst.

6, but the Coyotes, who saw the return of Nathan Souder were glad to see him as he set sail on a 40 yard reverse to make the score 26 to 6 with 2:47 left in the second quarter. After another defensive stop Torres and the home team added another score, this time from 20 yards. Proulx added the PAT run to make the score 33 to 6 at half.

The Wildcats were determined to stay in the contest and as a result they added a score on their first drive of the half to cut the lead to 33-13. The Coyotes answered right back after a nice 25 yard run. Proulx again added the point after and a 40-13 lead. The Coyotes defense got yet another stop on their next chance and another Torres 8 yard run pushed the lead to a commanding 46-13 lead. 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## Fall is Time to "Bob" for Apples!

Remember as a kid when you went to the carnival or harvest festival and got to bob for apples with all your friends? It is one of my fondest memories of being a child. Every year at the church's fall festival, we would get a chance to see who was the best "bobber." I'll admit, I was never the best bobber, but I sure had fun trying! Even though we don't go bobbing for apples anymore, we can still "bob" for them at the market. Watching a TV show last week I saw a group of young children bobbing for apples and it reminded me of how fall is the peak of apple season. My new personal favorite is the Honeycrisp apple, mmmm!

There are so many different apples out there these days - 28 American varieties to be exact! The apple has such versatile characteristics. Round, rosy, sometimes tart, often sweet and definitely saucy, the apple can be cooked, baked, chopped into salads, served alongside cheese and, of course, enjoyed straight from the tree, au naturel. But there's more to apples than good looks and good taste. They're one of the healthiest foods around. More and more studies are demonstrating just how beneficial apples can be for us, from our hearts to our memory. They're even great for polishing our teeth and improving our breath.

It's easy to add apples to your family's diet. Applesauce, apple cider and apple juice are great for a quick, tasty and nutritional boost. Try substituting apple juice or cider in place of oil in recipes, and use applesauce instead of shortening when baking cookies or fruitcakes, for a splash of flavor and a dose of antioxidants. And sliced apples bring crunch and zest to almost any salad.

Apples make the perfect grab-on-the-run snack as well, with their 80 vitamin-packed and portable calories. Two-

thirds of an apple's fiber and many of its beneficial antioxidants are found in the peel, making biting into a fresh apple a healthy as well as taste-gratifying experience.

**Red Delicious** America's favorite. Juicy, crunchy and mildly sweet, it's great for snacking.

**Golden Delicious** With skin so tender it doesn't need peeling. Mellow and flavorful for baking or cooking; great for applesauce, cider, pies and desserts.

**Granny Smith** Tart and tangy; good for cooking, salads, snacking.

**Gala** Full, rich and sweet, with a crunchy texture. Great for snacking, cooking or adding to salads.

**Fuji** Crisp and juicy, with a spicy sweet flavor; for snacks or salads.

**McIntosh** A great all-purpose apple. Sweetly tart, juicy, for snacking or baking, for making applesauce, cider and baking pies.

**Rome Beauty** The perfect baking apple. Mildly tart, with a flavor that grows richer when baked or sautéed.

**Jonagold** Has a tangy-sweet flavor, deliciously juicy, good for snacking or cooking.

**Jonathan** A small- to medium-size all-purpose apple that's a blend of tart and sweet. Good for snacking; firm enough for cooking.

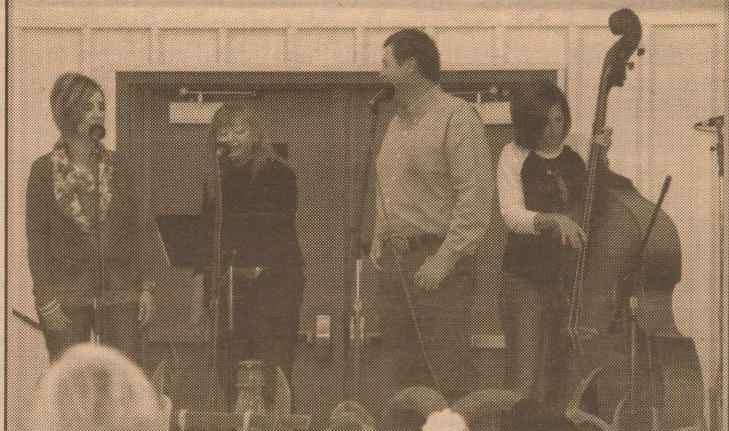

# Borden County 4-H Members Soar at NASA Space Center

The NASA Johnson Space Center hosted the annual 4-H National Youth Science Day October 8 in Houston, and among the attendees were Borden County's own Kelby Kleck and her brother Klancey. The two junior high students were among only 30 chosen from across the state.

School Counselor Tracye Spencer and 6<sup>th</sup> Grade Science teacher Cindy Herridge first alerted Klancey of the opportunity. Klancey then convinced his sister to also enter. In order to be considered for the honor, students had to answer three essay questions.

"Most ironic thing is that I don't even like essays," Klancey said.

Hoping for a chance to spend a day at the Space Center, Kelby and Klancey completed online essays about helping with the Orion project (NASA's efforts to go to Mars), describing how a Mars mission would benefit the country and the world, and suggesting experiments that could be conducted on a Mars mission.

Beginning at 8 a.m. Wednesday morning, both Klecks registered and passed through a security check before entering the space center. They were given t-shirts, ID lanyards, stickers while having to show their most recent report card for student verification.

"Briefings" were conducted first as Kelby and Klancey listened to NASA officials talk about the "Rockets to the Rescue" mission that is currently in the works. This is NASA's attempt to use rockets and their payloads to distribute supplies/medicine to areas affected by hurricanes or other natural disasters.

Kelby's favorite moment came when her group made their model rocket and shot it up, all while spending time with "really cool people."

"It was fun to work together to see how it [rocket launching] would work," she said.

While Klancey enjoyed the rocket launching also, he was a bit more specific about which part of the process he remembered most.

"When we were building the rocket, I just had a crazy idea,

and that idea as curving the fins," Klancey said. "Earlier, the rocket had been skimming the ground. We curved the fins, and it worked much better since the point of the fins was to add spin to the rocket."

Groups earned points by determining where the nose of the rocket landed.

Another exciting moment for both Kelby and Klancey came when they met Astronaut Bill McArthur, who spoke to the group, gave each student an autographed photo, and then posed with each for a personal souvenir photo.

McArthur, a veteran of three space shuttle flights, was on board the Space Shuttle *Columbia* in 1993, the *Atlantis* in 1995, and the *Discovery* in 2000. He also made one trip about the *Expedition 12*, which involved a six-month tour of duty about the International Space Station.

Also included in the day's events was a tram tour of the Johnson Space Center facilities. This included stops at the astronaut training building, the

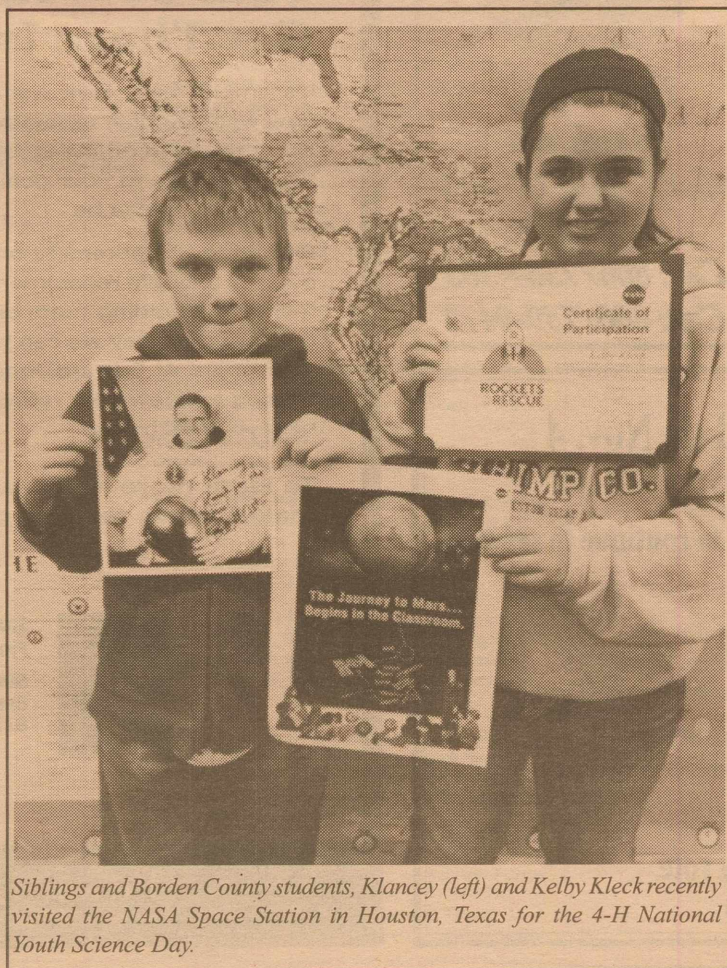
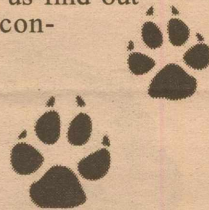
original mission control center, ship simulation, and the food lab.

Kelby recalled how one of the stops provided a weight simulation lesson for the 4-H students.

"You could weight lift in different planets to see what gravity is like there," said Kelby, who tried the experiment while "on" Mars and Mercury.

At the end of the day, the brother and sister had their photo taken on NASA's simulated Mars surface: a fitting end to an experience that was simply out of this world.

"Thank you very much to the Borden County community for helping us fund this trip with the bake sale proceeds and donations," Kelby and Klancey said. "And to Mrs. Spencer and Mrs. Herridge, a special thanks for helping us find out about the contest."

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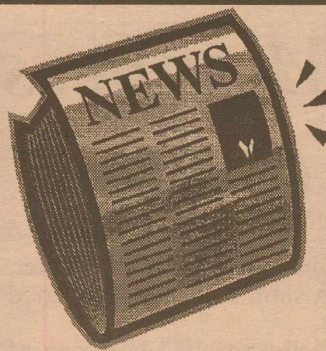
