## Elementary, Jr. High UIL Academics Shine at District Meet Competition

Despite the unknowns of moving to a new district, the one thing that stayed the same was the result: Borden County students shined. Jr. High participants claimed their division championship while the elementary finished a close second to Highland. Westbrook hosted the two-day meet on November 10 and November 13.

In the Jr. High division, Borden County's nearest competition was almost 700 points behind. BC finished with 1,208 points to only 520 for runner-up Highland.

Young Coyote contestants in elementary stayed in a battle with Highland throughout the meet and finished just 76 points behind the Hornets, who scored 687 points to Borden County's 611 (the next closest team was Ira with 414 points).

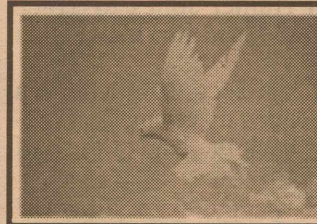

### Sympathy

Do you know anyone you feel sorry for? It may be someone who encountered some misfortune. Perhaps they have made bad decisions or poor choices. It may be a person who is in a bad relationship. It's too common for people to have difficulty with a spouse or significant other, parents, children, relatives, friends or coworkers.

You may be doing well and feel sympathy for those you know who have not been as fortunate. You can feel sympathy for either those you know or complete strangers. When you care about others, feeling sympathy is not abnormal.

# Borden County Sees Patriots End Year Again

On a night when opportunity knocked time and time again for Borden County, Valley ended up continuing its stranglehold on Coach Trey Richey's Coyotes on Friday night at Ralls.

Another highly successful football season at Gail came to an end on Friday night after these Valley Patriots held on in this thriller, 66-64, in the second round of the Division I state six-man playoffs.

A late penalty in this game's closing moments wiped out an apparent 40-yard touchdown pass, which would have been just enough for the Coyotes who instead are finished at 11-1.

"PAT's were huge again tonight with us missing four big ones that made a big difference, but even then we should have never put ourselves in that position," Borden County Coach Richey said, following Friday night's heartbreaker.

"Once, when it looked like we were going in, we ended up fumbling at the two. We also had dropped balls here or missed tackles there. It's hard to play assignment football when you don't carry out your assignments, but bottom line is we just got out-played tonight."

Valley scored this area play-off game's first touchdown in the opening quarter.

Borden County answered back moments later in that opening stanza after a 40-yard touchdown pass from Corbin Sumners to Korbin Martinez. Riley Herridge kicked that PAT to put the District 4 champs up 8-6 at that point.

After seeing these Patriots score their second touchdown, Borden County tied this game up at 14-all after Sumners connected with Riley Herridge on an 18-yard touchdown pass.

Borden County re-gained

the lead at 7:32 left in the second quarter after Sumners scored from 20 yards out.

Valley answered back with this battle's next two touchdowns to go up 28-20 with 1:45 left in the second quarter.

Borden County tied this contest back up at 28-all with 1:19 left in that first half after a 25-yard touchdown pass from Hunter Jones to Trace Richey. Jones also kicked that PAT.

A last-second touchdown pass ended up giving these Patriots back the lead at the half at 36-28.

Valley started pulling away in the third quarter, including the second half's first touchdown that increased these Patriots' lead to 44-28.

Borden County did not score its first touchdown of the second half until 6:24 remaining in the third quarter on a 25-yard pass from Sumners to Herridge.

Another Patriot touchdown with 4:26 left in that third quarter made this a 52-34 ball game.

Borden County cut Valley's lead to 10 at 52-42 after three quarters after freshman Trace Richey scored from a yard out with 2:15 left in that frame. Herridge kicked that PAT.

Valley scored the first touchdown of the fourth quarter to build its lead up to 18 at 60-42 with 9:55 remaining the hard-fought battle.

Just 24 seconds later, Borden County's Corbin Sumners busted loose on a 48-yard burst.

The Coyotes got the pigskin right back after pulling off the onside kick, which Borden County's Jayton Lewis recovered. The Coyotes took advantage with 7:45 left in the fourth quarter on a two-yard plunge by Sumners. Again, Herridge kicked that PAT, which cut

Valley's lead to four at 60-56.

Borden County re-gained the lead with 3:23 remaining in that fourth quarter after Sumners threw an eight-yard touchdown pass to Sean Tucker. The Coyotes kicked that PAT to take the 64-60 edge at that point.

It looked like that might be enough this might for the No. 3 ranked team in the state. Valley did not score what turned out being its game-winning touchdown until with just 32 seconds left on the game clock as these Patriots now have ended Borden County's high school football each of the last three seasons.

With 319 yards rushing and only 61 passing, Valley finished this game with 380 yards total offense, just 16 more than the Coyotes who rolled up 364 yards offense. Borden County ran for 165 yards and threw for 189 yards.

"We only had two penalties tonight allies, but one of them ended our first drive and our other penalty came in our last

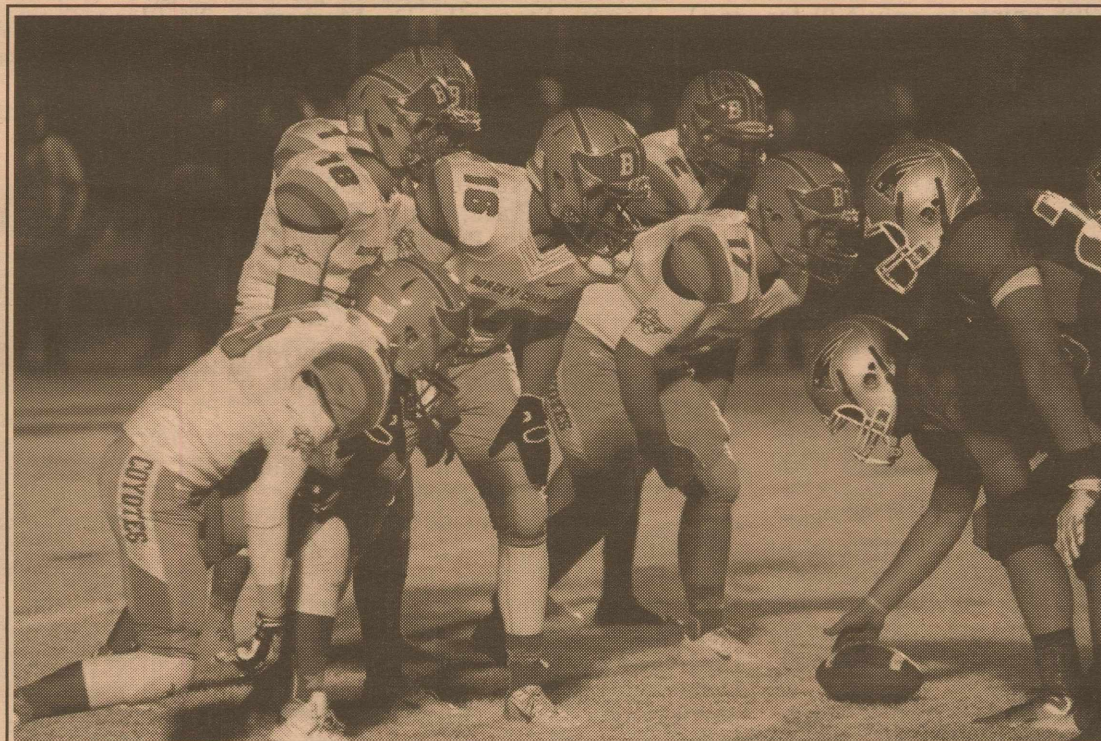

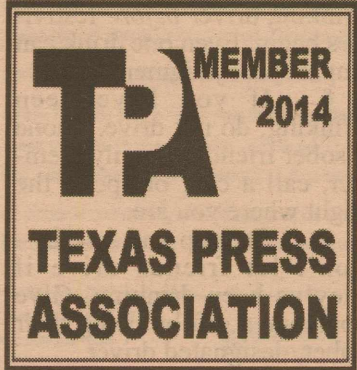

play, which ended up taking points off the board for us. So we only had two penalties tonight, but they both ended up being huge," Richey said. Sumners led all Coyote ground gainers Friday with 148 yards on 21 carries. He also completed five of his eight pass attempts for 96 yards, while also hauling in one catch for 30. Borden County's Hunter Jones completed six of his eight passes for 103 yards. Jones ran for 14 yards on two carries. The Coyotes' Riley Herridge had three catches for 48 yards, including two touchdowns. With four offensive and five defensive starters back from a ball club that spent this entire season ranked as one of the best in the state, the 2014 Borden County Coyotes should be a fun team to watch again. "It's time to reload again," Richey said.

## You Better Watch Out, I'm Telling You Why: Cops are cracking down on drunk driving

The holiday season is right around the corner. As Americans prepare for festivities with family and friends, the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service *Watch UR BAC* program wants to remind all drivers that it's dangerous to drive after drinking. You have to choose your role *before* drinking begins: will you drink or will you drive? Remember, even if you only have a little bit to drink and think you're "okay to drive," you could still be over the legal limit.

Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service reminds drivers that the *Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over* campaign runs from now until January 1, 2015.

Due to the increase in drunk-driving related fatalities around the holidays each year, law enforcement agencies will be out in force. 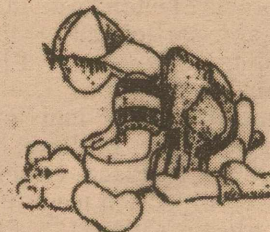

If you are uncomfortable giving such a gift, don't help out financially.

Although it's troubling to see someone suffer, you are not responsible for their life. The closer someone is to you, the more you will feel for them and the more you will want to help. Nevertheless, you have to allow another person to live their life.

Just because you believe

someone has a problem doesn't mean they see it that way. Everyone has their own perception, which is their reality. You may not understand how another person is living the way they are. Yet, they don't see anything wrong.

Although it's normal to feel sympathetic concerning the circumstances of others, don't allow their problems to become yours. It is OK to offer suggestions if asked. What, if anything, is done with the information is out of your hands. Most importantly, don't neglect your own life while feeling sympathy for someone else.

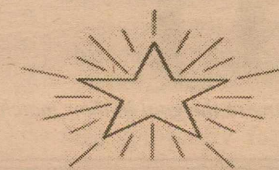

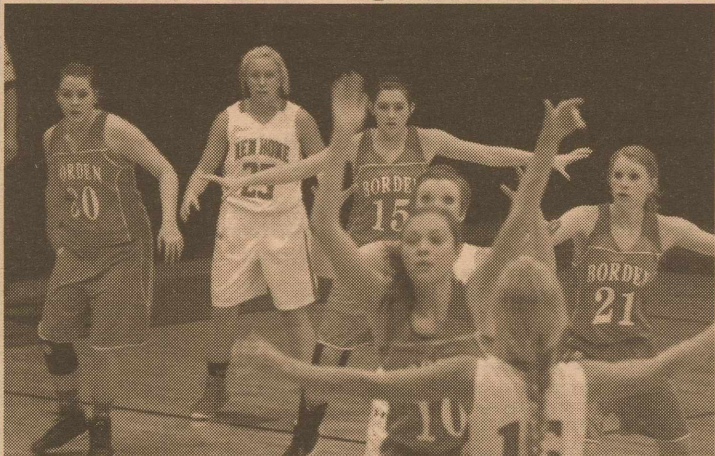

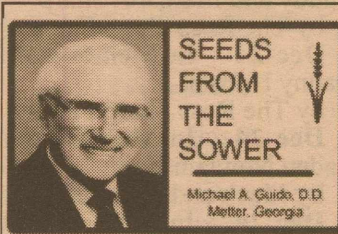


Missy Coyote, Emma Key, looks for an opening to the goal in their match up against the Highland Lady Hornets.

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (U.S. EPA) has established the MCL FLUORIDE at 4 mg/L, and has determined that it is a health concern at levels above the MCL. Analysis of drinking water in your community for FLUORIDE indicates a compliance value in quarter three, 2014 of 5.37 mg/L for EP001.

This is not an emergency. However, some people who drink water containing FLUORIDE in excess of the MCL over many years could get bone disease, including pain and tenderness of the bones. Fluoride in drinking water at half the MCL or more may cause mottling of children's teeth, usually in children less than nine years old. Mottling, also known as dental fluoro-

sis, may include brown staining and/or pitting of the teeth, and occurs only in developing teeth before they erupt from the gums.

An alternate source of water should be provided to the affected population, which consists of children less than nine years old. The alternate water should be used for drinking and cooking only. However, if you have health concerns, you may want to talk to your doctor to get more information about how this may affect you.

We are taking the following actions to address this issue: water vouchers are available to families with children 14 years of age or younger, also we are working to correct the problem by investigating the possibility of connecting to another system.
