



Secrets to a Cleaner Kitchen

These simple tips are your key to a cleaner, tidier kitchen. Everyone has one of those friends, neighbors or relatives whose kitchen is always spot-less, no matter what. How do they do it? We can't answer that, but we can share the some secrets for keeping a kitchen shipshape.

1. Accomplish a little each

Schedule a small amount of tidying each night as you're cleaning up the dinner dishes. For instance, on Wednesdays you could clean the stove, and on Sundays you could check the fridge for leftovers that should be thrown out. This kind of daily routine helps keep your kitchen in good shape, without having to spend hours at a time.

Use your dishwasher.

These days, it seems like everything is dishwasher safe. So take advantage of it! Stove drip pans and burner covers, small refrigerator shelves, plastic drawer organizers and other plastic or metal items can probably go in the dishwasher—just make sure to load plastic items onto the top

Some experts believe that dishwashers use less water than hand washing, so as an added benefit, you could potentially conserve resources and save on your water bill while saving time and energy. If possible, run the dishwasher only when it is fully loaded. To see if something is dishwasher safe, check your product manual, the manufacturer's Web site or a customer service

kitchen, stand on a step stool or a chair and take a look around. From the higher perspective, you'll be able to see spots you might have missed or areas that need attention, such as the tops of cabinets. Conversely, if you sit or kneel on the floor, you'll probably see lower cabinet doors that need washing or crumbs that 8 Secrets to a Cleaner Kitchen should be vacuumed up.

4. Work top to bottom.

When you're doing a deep cleaning of your kitchen, it makes sense to take it from the top: start by dusting cabinet tops; then wash cabinet doors (and wipe out cabinet interiors as needed); move on to wiping countertops, then undercounter cabinets and finally the floors. As dust and crumbs fall while you're working, they're not falling onto areas you've already cleaned—so you'll avoid having to clean an area twice!

5. Get creative with your cleaning tools.

When your sponges and cleaning brushes won't work for certain tasks, look around your house for an ad-hoc tool that can help. The tip of a chopstick or pencil wrapped in a piece of paper towel is just the right size to clean the crevices in an unplugged countertop grill or waffle maker, while a retired toothbrush with some All Purpose Cleaner can scrub away debris around handles and knobs and gunk from your sink drains. And a plastic knife can scrape baked-on spills from the stove or even chip away debris in the space between the stove and the countertop.

6. Take it outside.

If your kitchen is small, it can be hard to maneuver when you're cleaning it. Wash bulky items such as refrigerator shelves and oven racks in the bathtub or even outside, in a basin of water. You'll have more room, and you'll be less likely to splash water on the

7. Wipe up spills right away. 3. Get a new perspective.


nates with courtesy invariably have a much more loyal and productive staff.

Cattle Tuberculosis Confirmed in Texas Panhandle Dairies

AUSTIN - The Texas Ani- free status. In 2002 however, mal Health Commission that status was temporarily re-(TAHC) has confirmed Cattle tuberculosis (TB) in two Texas Panhandle dairies located in Castro County. The infected herds are under quarantine and will remain so until the herds meet all requirements for quarantine release through testing and removal of infected animals. Dairy, calf-raising and dairy heifer raising operations in Texas and other states with epidemiological links to the infected herds will be tested to determine the possible origin or potential spread of the disease.

Cattle tuberculosis is a chronic debilitating respiratory disease whose symptoms can include progressive weight loss, chronic cough, and general loss of condition. Like many other diseases, TB transmission is facilitated when animals are concentrated or held in close confinement. Infected animals normally spread the TB bacteria to their herd mates by expelling infective droplets into the air which are inhaled, or contaminate feed.

A variety of other species are susceptible to TB, including elk, deer, bison, goats, about TB, call 1-800-550-8242 swine, cats and humans. Sheep or visit http:// and horses are rarely affected. Although TB can affect humans, pasteurization of milk removes any risk of transmission, and meat from infected animals does not enter the food


Tuberculosis has a long incubation period (months to years) and was once the most prevalent infectious disease of cattle and swine in the United States. Cattle TB caused more losses among U.S. farm animals in the early part of this century than all other infectious diseases combined. Through a cooperative state-federal program, bovine tuberculosis has been nearly eradicated from

livestock in the US. In 2000, Texas finally earned USDA TB accredited-

voked when two infected cattle herds were detected. After extensive testing, Texas regained its TB-free status from USDA in October 2006. This effort included testing over 2,000 purebred beef operations and all of the state's dairies. Slaughter surveillance and identification practices for dairy cattle necessary to aid in tracing of high risk cows was also greatly enhanced at that

Dr. Dee Ellis, Texas State Veterinarian said, "The detection of these new herds simply indicates our strong surveillance system is effective. The TAHC is working closely with the dairies involved and the Texas dairy industry to ensure the disease is quickly contained, and the affected dairies can return to normal business practices as soon as possible." Texas' current TB-free status is not expected to be affected by the new disclosures.

ATTENTION PROPERTY

OWNERS

Property owners have certain rights that may reduce their property tax burden.

HOMEOWNERS

Persons who own their residence on January 1, 2015, may claim their home as a residential homestead. The filing of this document is only necessary if the homeowner has changed homesteads since January 1, 2014, or has become eligible for additional exemptions since last year. Homeowners may also defer the portion of the tax on their residence homestead if the value of the home was raised more than 5% above the previous year. Although the tax collection is deferred, interest continues to run on the unpaid portion of tax at a rate of 8% per annum and the deferred tax remains a lien on the property. To apply for the deferral, the owner should contact the appraisal district and complete an application.

DISABLED PERSONS

Persons who are disabled under Social Security law are entitled to additional exemptions on their residential homestead. Disabled applicants must apply with the appraisal district and furnish a determination letter from Social Security. Disabled persons now receive all benefits on their home that are available to over 65 persons (see

PERSONS WHO ARE OVER 65 YEARS OF AGE-EXEMP-TIONS AND DEFERRAL

Persons who are over 65 years of age or disabled persons may file for additional exemptions and a ceiling on school taxes for their residential homestead if they become 65 during 2014. Over-65 persons should apply for this exemption at the appraisal district office in their county. Over-65 persons are also eligible to defer paying the tax on their residential homestead is they wish. The taxes continue to accrue during the deferral along with an interest rate of 8% annually. but no attempt will be made to force payment during the deferral Details and an application may be obtained from the appraisal district or the State Comptroller.

DISABLED VETERANS

Persons who have been declared disabled by the Veteran's Administration are eligible for additional exemptions on property they own. The declaration letter from VA is mailed annually, but the appraisal district only needs a copy in the first year of eligibility or it the percentage of disability changes. In certain situations where the disabled vet is 100% disabled and unemployable, their homestead can be completely exempt

FARM AND RANCH OWNERS

Farmers and ranchers may be entitled to receive an alternate method of appraisal determined by the farm income to the property. This method is available to farms and ranches commercially raising crops or livestock or which are used as a wildlife habitat under State guidelines. An application for agricultural use value and additional information is available from Borden County Appraisal District. Refiling is only necessary if requested to do so by the Chief Appraiser.

EXEMPTION APPLICATIONS

Exemption applications for all property tax exemptions including total exemptions for charitable, religious, and other total exemptions may be obtained from the Borden County Appraisal District or through the State Comptroller's Office at 1/800-252-9121 or at their website at http://www.window.state.tx.us/taxinfo/taxforms/02-

BUSINESS PERSONAL PROPERTY OWNERS

State law now requires the filing of a rendition declaring what types of business personal property that a person or company owns. Failure to file the rendition will result in a 10% penalty. If a fraudulent rendition is filed, a 50% penalty is mandated. A rendition can be obtained from the appraisal district office where the property is located. Deadline - April 15. A 30 day filing extension is available by written request.




