### *Fun With Friends and Acquaintances*

When I was in Eagle Pass recently to speak at the chamber of commerce banquet, a woman sat down to visit with my wife. I found out later she was in her mid 60's, even though she looked 20 years younger. Her face had no wrinkles. She told my wife some of her beauty secrets. She rubs coffee grounds on her face twice a week. She does not drink coffee, but uses the abrasive grounds to act as an exfoliant. to make her skin smooth. She also sleeps on her back with her face to the ceiling, never sleeping on her side. She does not go outside without sun protection. "I do not take the sun," she said. I thought that was interesting.

At the other end of the state a week later when I did the chamber of commerce keynote speech in Clarendon, I met John Morrow. He is a successful water well driller who drives a 1976 pickup he bought new. It has nearly half a million miles on it and has worn out one engine and two transmissions. On his wedding night years ago he was the proud owner of a souped-up Dodge Polara 500. After the wedding he was driving it fast to get away from his friends who were following him. His

car had tin cans trailing behind it. At 115 miles an hour it blew a front tire and turned over half a dozen times. The car landed upright and John and his bride got out with just a few scratches. I thought that was interesting.

In Del Rio my friend Gary Humphreys noticed some trees in the cemetery were suffering due to drought conditions. He got out his chainsaw and went to work cutting down the dead Italian cypress trees known as cemetery trees. Some are 70 feet tall. He has removed more than 100 trees, putting them in a pile and burning them while firemen stand by. At his own expense he bought new trees to replace the ones he took down. When people noticed what he was doing, they started giving him money. I thought that was interesting.

We have two good friends who were born and raised in West Texas and had never been to the Big Bend National Park. We left Big Spring one Friday morning and headed for the mountains. We stopped for coffee at the beautiful tourist center in Fort Stockton, took pictures of the giant roadrunner and toured the fort area. We

# Borden County Tracksters Compete Strong at District and Area Meet

The Borden County Coyotes and Lady Coyotes participated in the Area track meet Thursday and Friday. The prelims of this meet was used as the results to crown a district champion. The Borden County Coyotes amassed 211 points during this time to garner their 9<sup>th</sup> straight district title. This is quite an amazing accomplishment as the district has changed 5 times in this time frame, which means the Coyotes see different teams every two years, but with a total team effort they easily outdistanced the second place Highland Hornets 211 to 117. The Coyotes had 15 boys compete on the varsity level and all 15 athletes contributed points as they all placed in the top 6 of their respective events. District champions included all three relays, the 400 relay of Nick Proulx, Hunter Jones, Jayton Lewis, and Corbin Summers. This group would also be the Area champions with a time of 44.99 in an unbelievably difficult wind to compete in. This same foursome won the district and area title in the 800 relay with a time of 1:36.26. The group of Summers, Korbin Martinez, Trace Richey and Ryan Willborn won the district mile relay in a time of 3:45.55, this group would finish second in the Area portion of the meet. Other district champions included Hunter Jones in the Pole Vault, 9'6", Long Jump 20'3". Korbin Martinez won the 300 hurdles and the 800 meter run in a very impressive 2:10 in this wind. This marked the 4<sup>th</sup> straight year for K-Mart to qualify for the regional track meet as a winner in the 800 and runner-up in the 300's and 1600 relay. This is a very difficult combination and his contributions to 4 consecutive district titles will be sorely missed. Ryan Willborn turned in a nice 53.3 to win the 400 meters, Diego Bernal would win the shot put to round out

the district champions.

These same young men from the relays with their winning performance would qualify for regional. Other regional qualifiers included from the field events, Long Jump, Hunter Jones and Ryan Willborn with a 20'3" and 19'9" jumps respectively. Hunter Jones in the Pole Vault with a 3<sup>rd</sup> place finish. Braxton Barnes with a personal best 126'4" throw to finish 3<sup>rd</sup> in the discus. Diego Bernal also had a PR with his 3<sup>rd</sup> place throw of 43'5 1/2" in the shot put. Along with the relays, the coyotes got regional qualifying times in the 3200 from Dylan Murphy with a PR 11:48 and Morgan Wilson. K-mart qualified as we mentioned earlier in the 800 and 300 hurdles. Hunter Jones finished 2<sup>nd</sup> in the 200 with a time of 23.16. Jayton Lewis finished second in the 100 meter dash with a near school record 10.89, one of the few races the big wind helped, that and the short hurdles. Ryan Willborn also qualified with a very impressive 53.13 winning the 400 and Payton Merket ran a 56.37 for a 3<sup>rd</sup> place finish a trip to regional.

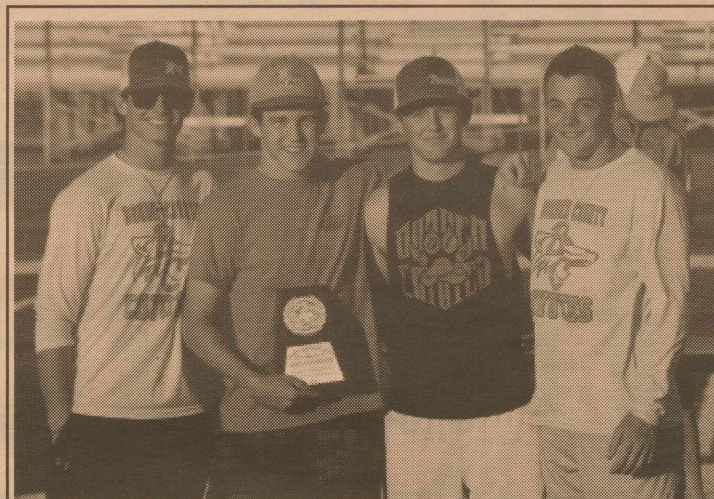
With these qualifying men along with some other point getters in the Area portion of the track meet, the Coyotes for the 5<sup>th</sup> straight year were crowned as Area champions amassing 150 points to Grady's 102.

On the girls' side, the Lady Coyotes had their best showing since they won the state title some 4 years ago. The girls scored 122 points just missing the runner-up spot as Westbrook tallied 127 points and Ira came away with the title. District champions for the girls included the 1600 meter relay team of Preslea Hall, Rayme Jones, Katie Gray and Emma Key in a time of 4:35.21. Emma Key also came away with the title in the 400 meter dash with a nice time of

1:04.04. Zoie Key came away with the 3200 meter title with a time of 13:33.30. The last district champion was Tatum Richey in the 100 meter hurdles in a nice time of 17.23.

As for the area results, the 1600 meter relay foursome would finish the meet winning the relay and qualifying for the regional track meet. Other regional qualifiers were Zoie Key qualifying in the 3200 meter run and the 1600 meter run. Tatum Richey would qualify in the 100 meter hurdles with a second place finish and a personal best 16.98. Emma Key and Katie Gray would both qualify in the 400 meter dash as Emma would win with a 1:06.10 and 1:09.66. Emma would also qualify with her 86'6 1/2" throw in the discus. Rayme Jones would jump a personal best 15'10 1/2" to finish 3<sup>rd</sup> and earn a trip. The foursome of Richey, Jones, Hall and Karly Etheredge would finish 4<sup>th</sup> and qualify in the 400 meter relay in the difficult wind conditions they would run a seasons best 54.12. Etheredge, Key, Hall and Jones would then finish 3<sup>rd</sup> in the 800 relay to qualify for regional as well. This would also mark the most girls to qualify for the regional track meet since, Karly, Zoie and Tatum were freshmen and members of that State Champion Track team. Congratulations to all of you that qualified for the regional track meet, but also to all of you that participated in the district/Area track meet. Almost every athlete that participated scored in their respective divisions. Thank you all for sacrificing your time to participate in this very difficult sport, but a very rewarding sport. Competing against yourself is something we can do every day of our life and what we place in a meet is not a measuring stick for success, it's the journey and the

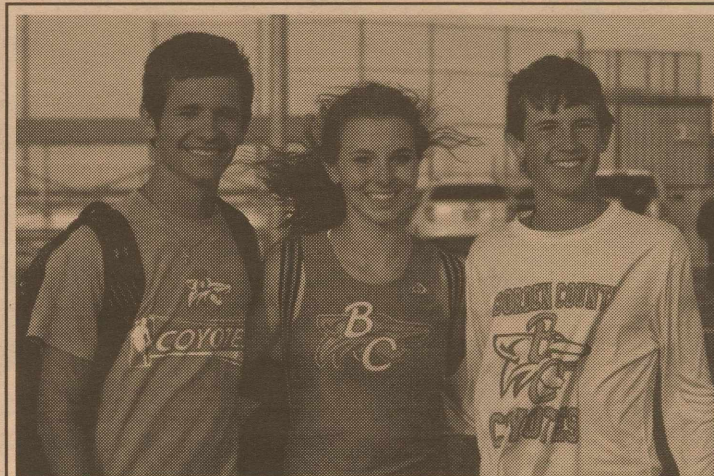

The Borden Coyotes combined pitchers for a no-hitter and sprayed 15 hits to beat the Hermleigh Cardinals, 12-1, and clinched a playoff spot.

The Coyotes got on the board first with leadoff hitter, Ryan Willborn scoring on a sacrifice fly by Trace Richey. Willborn expanded the lead to 3-0 with a two out triple plating Kale Yarbro and Steven Carrillo in the second inning. Braxton Coor added a run in the third inning scoring Korbin Martinez from third base on a fielder's choice. Yarbro also scored on a triple by Carrillo giving Borden a 5-0 lead.

The Coyotes added three runs in the fourth and four runs in the fifth inning to extend its lead to 12-0. Hermleigh added one unearned run in the bottom

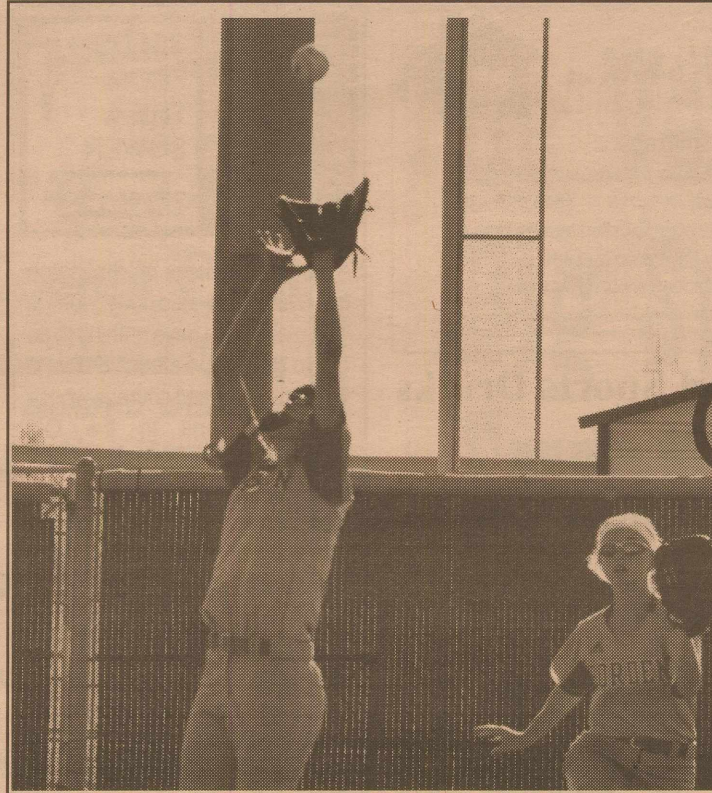
half of the fifth, but the game was called by the 10 run mercy rule.

Richey threw four innings of no hit baseball striking out four batters and walking three. Yarbro finished the game throwing one inning allowing one unearned run, striking out one batter, and walking one.

The Coyotes are now 4-0 in district play which wrapped up a playoff spot.

Willborn finished the game with three hits, three runs, and three rbi's. Martinez also had three hits for the Coyotes, plus a couple of runs. Hunter Jones, Yarbro, and Carrillo added two hits for Borden. Jayton Lewis, Richey, and Coor each had a hit.

Borden improves their record to 7-0-1 on the season.

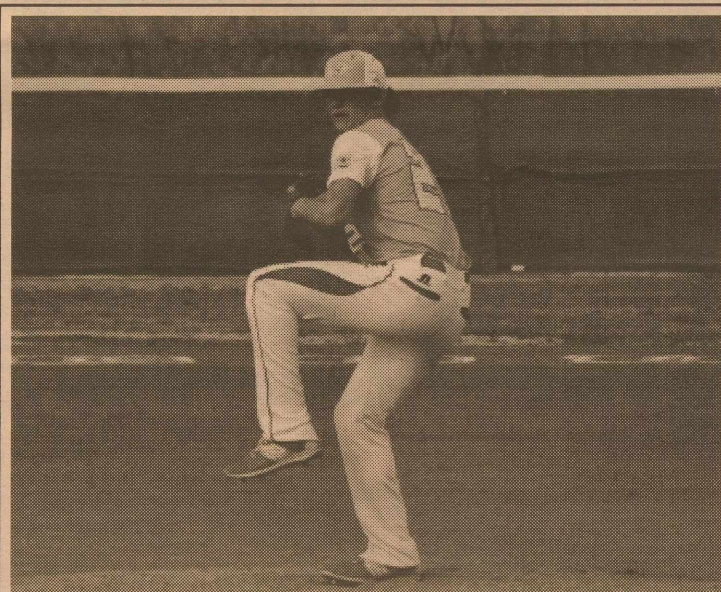

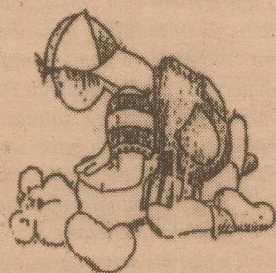
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Pitcher, Hunter Jones pitches a no-hitter against the Hermlaigh Cardinals at home.

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## Rethink Soda Pop and Sports Drinks for Health

Drinking water is the best way to keep your body hydrated. Water is needed for your body's systems to work. Water makes up 60% of your body weight. Every system in your body needs water. Water takes toxins out of organs, carries nutrients to cells, and provides moisture for ear, nose, and throat tissues.

Some people drink sports drinks as if they were water. Soda pop is another favorite beverage. Billions of gallons of soda are sold in the United States. Many health experts believe there is serious health consequences associated with drinking too much of these sugar-added beverages.

Soda pop is high in sugar and calories and has little nutritional value. The acid and sugar in soda pop can promote tooth decay. Another potential effect on health is the weakening of bones. Any carbonated drink can affect calcium absorption and bone density. This may be important for older women who drink a lot of soda, including diet. The decrease in bone-density may increase the risk of osteoporosis, a weakening of the bones, later in life.

Sports drinks have many of the same health concerns as soda. Although they can taste great and are marketed as healthy, they have added sugar and a lot of calories. Drinking sports drinks and not using the extra calories through physical activity can lead to weight gain.

Sports drinks have their place. They are beneficial for long periods of activity, for events in hot, humid conditions, and for sports with quick bursts of energy, such as a 90-minute soccer game. Sports drinks that contain more than 14 to 19 grams of carbohydrate per 8 ounces can lead to cramps, nausea, and vomiting. Choose when to have sports drinks wisely. Enjoy refreshing water more often and limit pop

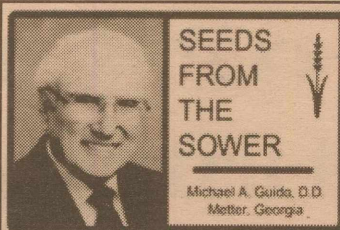
and sports drinks!

*What about Diet Soda?*

Choosing diet soda may reduce sugar and calories, but artificial sweeteners may also contribute to health issues. Studies suggest that diet soda pop can result in greater weight gain than regular pop. When you consume a high-calorie food or beverage, your body thinks you are taking in nutrients and energy. After drinking a diet soda, your body "loses" the connection between "sweet" and "nutrients." So, you may feel hungry more often when drinking diet soda pop.

The youth have been working for the past four months to build, plan, program and troubleshoot for the competition. The GEAR experience has benefits for the youth to: Foster creative thinking; Increases understanding of scientific and engineering principles used in the design process; Students learn valuable skills (time management, critical thinking, etc.) needed in the real world; and Provides instructors with a forum where students can learn how classroom lessons apply to real world challenges.

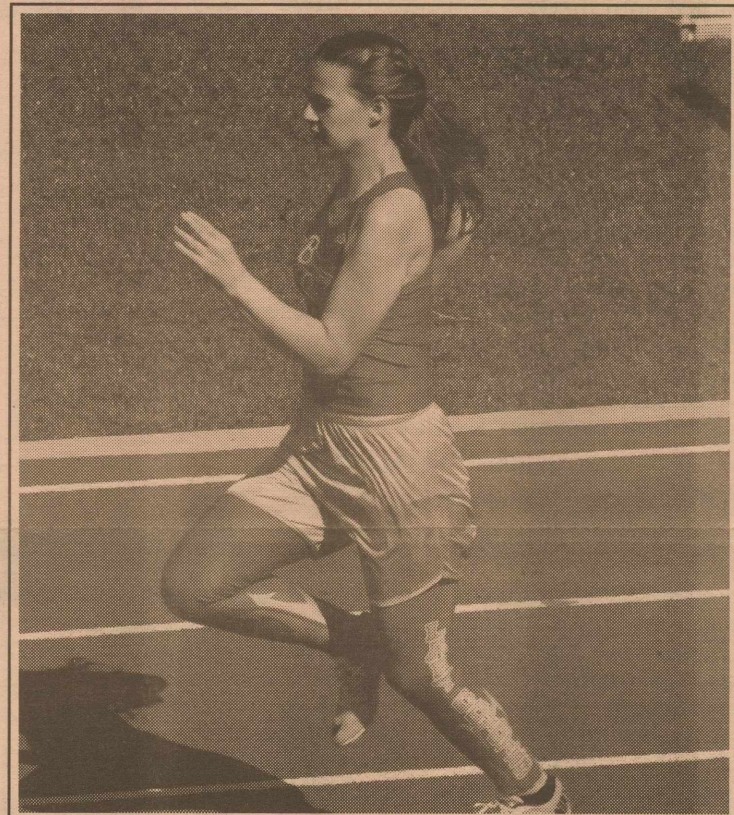

2016. Under this designation, producers with operations in any primary or contiguous county are eligible to apply for low interest emergency loans.

Emergency loans help producers recover from production and physical losses due to flooding and other natural disasters.

Producers have eight months from the date of the declaration to apply for emergency loan assistance. FSA will consider each loan application on its own merits, taking into account the extent of losses, security available and repayment ability. Producers can borrow up to 100 percent of actual production or physical losses, to a maximum amount of \$500,000.
