AgriLife Research Looks at Practicality of Drone Use in Ranching

SAN ANGELO – They may not replace the pickup, horse or 4-wheeler, much less a good sheep dog, anytime soon, but a Texas A&M AgriLife Research scientist thinks drones have practical ranching applications that will expand in the near future.

Dr. John Walker, resident director of research at San Angelo, said the small unmanned aircraft have gotten pretty popular recently and he wanted to explore their practical application in ranch settings.

“So I went and bought one,” he said. “The first advice someone gave me, and it was good advice, was to buy a cheap one, a toy, and learn to fly it before buying an expensive one.”

Walker said neophytes should plan to spend at least \$1,000 or a bit more for a

drone, as units in that price range have what is needed for any real practical application.

But what can you do with one other than take aerial photos and video?

“Right now, out of the box, you can use it to check things,” he said. “You can locate lost stock and eventually check fences and waterings. One of the neat things with the more expensive ones is you can program them to run a route, so if you want to check fences, do it once and save that route into the drone. The next time you want to check that fence, you don’t really have to fly it, but just tell it to run that route and it will.”

“I’ve used it to herd sheep. It’s fun, but you have to watch where you’re going.”

“You can move sheep very gently and that’s really impressed me. I thought as soon as they saw the drone, they’d take off running, but they really don’t. Now goats will a bit at first, but sheep will just move along slow and easy.”

Walker said there are currently plenty of limitations.

Battery life is the major one with batteries only lasting about 25 minutes. Obstacles, especially trees and brush, also pose problems, though he said there are models on the market designed to avoid trees and other hazards.

Sun-glare on the screen of a smartphone or iPad used as a monitor on the controller is also a problem, though Walker will soon test the practicality of a pair of “virtual flight” goggles. He said they are worn by the operator for a real-time “drone’s eye view” thus dispensing with the need for the clamped-on screen.

He said the future of using drones on the ranch is bright with a plethora of possibilities.

“I think as the technology improves you’ll be able to do a whole lot of other things,” he said. “What I’m looking forward to is a new type of radio frequency identification ear tag or RFID tag that’s evolving.”

My Favorite News Story

I did radio and television news for nine years when I was just out of the Army and getting ready to start a life. One Friday morning in November of 1961 Bruce Frazier, the farm broadcaster at the station where I worked, told me he had heard that a woman was coming to Big Spring the next day to launch a hot air balloon. Like any novice reporter, I put it on the air, not really knowing if it was a joke or a real story. Saturday morning the San Angelo newspaper carried a story that said “there’s a report that a balloon is going to be launched from Big Spring but we have contacted the FAA and it has no knowledge of any balloon flight.”

Well, now I had to prove that I was right. I called Cecil Hamilton at his flying field where the launch was to take place. He told me the lady with the balloon had arrived at 3 AM and was in a local motel. I called the motel and did a phone interview with Constance Wolf, the lady balloonist. She asked me if I could take her out to Hamilton field. I of course said yes.

She is the most fascinating

woman I have ever known. She was a technical adviser for the movie *AROUND THE WORLD IN 80 DAYS* and her balloon was the vehicle that took Cantinflas and David Niven on their journey. She was the first woman to balloon over the Alps. She and her husband Abby Wolf started the Aircraft Owners and Pilots Association. They lived on an estate called Wing-over at Blue Bell, Pennsylvania near Philadelphia. They were known in social circles as an exciting and romantic couple famous for their parties. Attendees had to arrive by plane and sometimes there would be 150 private planes parked on their runway.

When I met Mrs. Wolf she was dressed in a flight suit and wearing a thin mesh veil. She said the veil was to hold her head on. She was 56 years old, the epitome of grace and daring. She was launching her balloon to take away some of the attention the Soviets were getting after Yuri Gagarin became the first man in space. Besides that, a Russian woman had set an endurance record

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Tough Second Half Leads to First Regular Season Loss in Three Years

The Borden County Coyotes for two quarters looked like not only the best team on the field against a very athletic and talented Calvert Trojans, but some could argue the best team in the state for those same two quarters. The Coyotes again playing shorthanded as four varsity football players would miss this contest as Dylan Murphy was recovering from a concussion, Braxton Barnes was recovering from knee surgery, Ryan Willborn was recovering from a knee injury and Nick Proulx awaits shoulder surgery. In spite of these injuries, the Coyotes seemed to be firing on all cylinders as they built an early 40 to 6 lead scoring on their first 5 drives and would actually score on the first 6 drives of the game leading 48 to 14 late in the first half.

The offense which includes starters center Braxton Coor, Guard JW Nix, End Diego Bernal, fullback Ben Justice, Quarterback Hunter Jones and Tailback Corbin Sumners, Trace Richey and Jayton Lewis would come in and play several plays at fullback and the second group would include Steven carrillo at center, Morgan Wilson at Guard, Kale Yarbrow at End, Payton Merket, Lewis, Richey and Justice would also play in the backfield with this group. The 6 scoring plays of the first half would then be followed by a perfect start in the extra point department as well as Easton Edwards nailed all 6 kicks in the first half. Hunter Jones hit Braxton Coor on the second play of the game on a pass play covering 38 yards. Corbin Sumners would then hit Diego Bernal from 24 yards for another scoring strike. Jones would add a 16 yard touchdown run to cap the first quarter and a 24 to 6 lead. Sumners would score the next two touchdowns from 8 and 2 yards before Jones would cap the first half scoring with a 19 yard run. The Trojans would

score late in the second quarter to make the score 48 to 22. For the first time, a miscue on a deep pass that could have potentially answered the Trojans to end the half was missed and the score would be 48 to 22 to start the second half with the Trojans getting the ball.

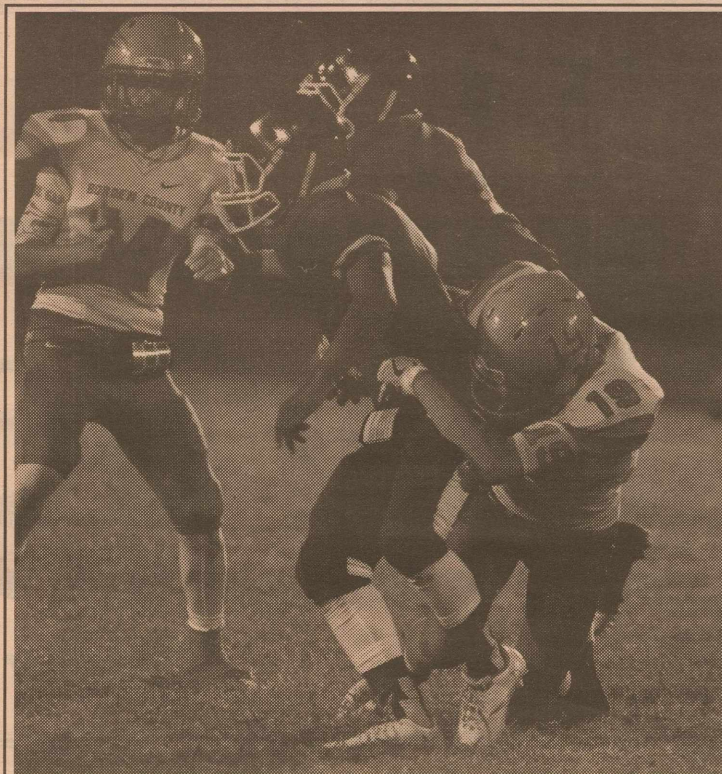
The Trojans continued with the momentum they gained just before half and with a quick touchdown the lead was down to 48 to 28. The Coyotes came down and just missed scoring on several plays and on a 4th down play Borden County elected to attempt to kick a 29 yard field goal, but the kick was just left and momentum remained with the Trojans. Calvert continued their good play and another score cut the lead to 48 to 36. The Coyotes would answer immediately as Sumners sprinted 39 yards for the score, but the snap on the kick was high and the lead would only be 54 to 36. The Trojans wasted very little time to get back on the board to end the quarter making the score 54 to 42 heading to the final quarter. The Borden County offense, which seemed like a machine early now, struggled to move the ball and a 4th down stop gave the ball back to the Trojans and after a quick score the score was 54 to 50. The Coyote offense would finally get some things going again which would cap off with another Sumners run, this time a very tough 21 yard sprint. The extra point was blocked, but the Coyotes had a 60 to 50 lead. After a nice kick and coverage the Coyotes seemed to regain the momentum, but on the first play a pair of Coyotes knocked each other off the tackle and as a result the receiver squirted free and raced 70 yards for the score to make the tally 60 to 56.

On the next offensive possession the Coyotes seemed to seal the deal as Sumners broke a nice 39 yard score, but a penalty wiped the game

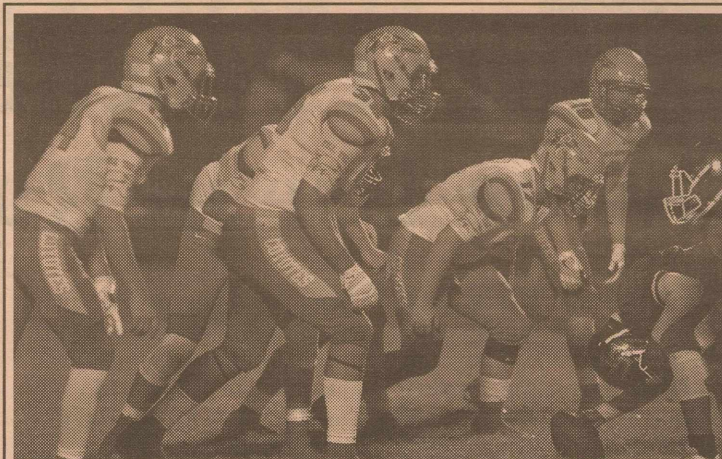
winner off the board and after failing to get a first down, Borden County gave the ball back to Calvert. The Trojans moved the ball down to the 1 and with a trick play on the 1 they had their first lead of the game with: 07 left. The Coyotes had one last shot, but the pass was tipped away just as it appeared they might sneak away with a touchdown on the last play. As a result of a tough second half for the Coyotes the Borden County Coyotes had their first regular season loss in three years.

Leading the way for the Coyotes statistically was Will Yarbrow with a tackle, Braxton Coor with 2 tackles and a tackle for loss, 4 receptions for 116 yards and a score, Payton Merket with 2 tackles, Corbin Sumners with 11 tackles, 2 tackles for loss, 2 big hits, a caused fumble and a pass break up and 31 carries for 306 yards and 4 td's, 3 receptions for 40 yards and 1 of 1 passing for 24 yards and a score. Ben Justice had 7 tackles and a caused fumble and 3 carries for 32 yards. Morgan Wilson

The Borden County Pups hosted the New Home Leopards Thursday for their opening game of the 2016 season. The Borden County Pup defense started the game with a quick 4 and out. This starting group included 8th graders Mason Cole, Keegan Benavidez, Trey Edwards, Trent Edwards, Quentin Freeman, Justin Willborn, William Partney and Tommy Kingston. This group definitely had some high moments throughout the contest and this opening series was their best moment of the game. After forcing the quick 4 and out this same group rotated in along with Gunner Shofner to produce a quick score as Mason Cole sprinted 36 yards for the Cubs score to make it 6 to 0 with 3:06 left in the first quarter. The Leopards would answer to tie the game at 6 with 1:37 left in the first. Borden County put together a long drive, but facing 4th down, Tommy Kingston found Mason Cole open and with pass and catch the Pups regained the lead. Ky Edwards, following

the footsteps of his older brothers split the uprights with his kick and a 14 to 6 lead. With 1:35 left in the second quarter the Leopards answered to cut the lead to 14 to 13. The Pups couldn't do anything with the ball just before half and on the last play of the half the Leopards scored on a 36 yard pass play to take a lead that they would not relinquish the rest of the game. The Leopards led 20 to 14 at intermission.

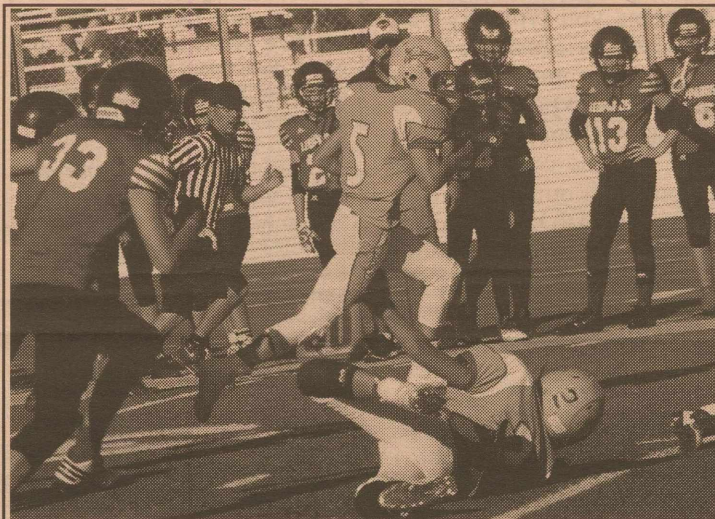
The Pups would get the ball to start the second half, but on the very first play, the turnovers began as a fumble resulted in great field position for the visitors. Moments later the Leopards extended their lead to 26 to 14. The Pups fumbled again on their very next possession and just like that 3 minutes into the second half another Leopard score made the score 33 to 14 for the visitors. On the next offensive possession the home team threw an interception moments after dropping a touchdown pass. The Leopards again made the Pups pay for the turnover to

extend the lead to 39-14. The Pups finally took care of the football and as a result they got back on the scoreboard as Mason Cole followed some nice blocks by Shofner, Edwards, Kingston, Benavidez, and Freeman to pay dirt from 32 yards out to cut the lead to 39-20. After a defensive stop the Pups again turned the ball over and again the visitors made them pay as they scored their final touchdown of the evening with :56 left to make the final 45 to 20.

At halftime the rest of the Pups played a 10 play scrimmage, this group consisted of 8th graders Blane Justice, Ky

Edwards, Miles Wilson, Ryen Ramos and 7th graders Thomas Snell, Jose Zorola, Christian Torres, Ethan Stephens, Justin Willborn. Healthy Eating on a Budget

These days, we're all looking for ways to keep our budget in check. While you may think you can't eat healthy and save, think again! Try a few of our tips to stretch your grocery dollars:

1. Trim the sales. Shop what's on sale or in season—whether it's produce, poultry, fish or local fare. Build your weekly menu around good deals advertised in grocery circulars—but refrain from buying what you won't use.

2. Can it. Choose canned or frozen veggies over fresh to keep foods bills in check. Stock up when your favorites are on sale—and rotate foods so the first in is the first out. And, there's no waste if you forgot about it!

3. Cool refuel. Dilute beverages such as lemonade or fruit juices with sparkling mineral water and a twist of citrus. Better yet, drink tap water or use refillable water bottles and save more calories and cents.

4. Go meatless. Meat can be the most expensive part of a meal. Instead, serve up beans, tofu, and whole grains for a less expensive source of protein. Add in some fruits, veggies or salad and round out the rainbow of nutrients.

5. Economize. Buy family packs only if you use that amount. It makes sense to buy big and save, if you have

storage space or can share—especially for paper goods or items with long shelf lives.

6. Minimize. Limit shopping trips to just once weekly. You'll save on time and gas, cut out impulse purchases and take advantage of fresh sale items. Good deal!

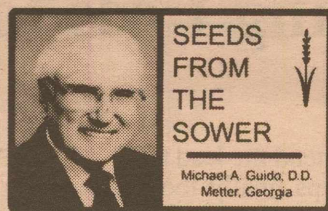
7. Make cents. Download and clip coupons regularly for items you typically buy. But check prices at the shelf. Sometimes another brand may be less expensive—even without a coupon.

8. Do the math. Look at the price per ounce details on store shelves to be sure you're getting a good deal. Buying in bulk is often cheaper but be sure the numbers support your purchase decisions.

9. Mother of invention. Include an "innovation day" in menu planning and create a meal from what you have on hand. Experiment with new combinations—and use up what's in cabinets, fridge and freezer.

10. Fill'er up. Eat before you shop. Shopping when hungry (or with ravenous tag-a-longs) can distract you—making it difficult to stick to your shopping list. And it could cause you to fill the cart with unplanned food purchases. Ouch!

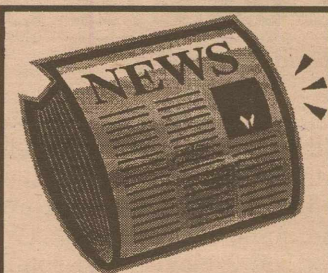
After waiting for weeks for an owner to come identify the gold he was told by his attorney and the police department to keep what he had found. What the flood destroyed and took from him also brought him wealth.

CALL TO ORDER

Judge Sharp called the August 23, 2016, Special Session of the Commissioners Court to order at 8:36 A.M.

APPROVE MINUTES

Commissioner Adcock made a motion to approve the minutes of August 9, 2016 as presented. Commissioner Belew seconded the motion. Motion carried.

FISCAL YEAR 2016 PROPOSED TAX RATE

Commissioner Belew made a motion to set the proposed tax rate at 0.71750 for Fiscal Year 2016. Commissioner Reyes seconded the motion. Motion carried.

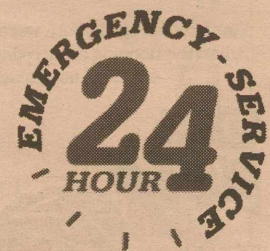

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Practicality of Drones in Ranching...

"Those in use now only have a range of about 3 feet; basically used with animals going down a working chute. But there are some new ones that can broadcast up to a mile or more. So if your drone was equipped with the appropriate sensor, you could send it up and find those sheep with those particular ear tags and have the drone start drifting the sheep to wherever you wanted them to go.

"I can even imagine having a grazing plan built around this technology where pastures could be divided into different sections and the drone herds the stock into that section and the next day moves them to the next and so on."

Walker concedes there are some stock-related issues that would have to be worked out, namely a way for making the sheep move once they figured out the drone can't actually make them. He said a feed reward once they reach their intended destination could well be the answer, much like a cattleman penning cows with a feed sack.

"I really do think there will be a future for drones in the

ranching industry," he said. "There's high-tech stuff like conducting vegetation inventories and even deer surveys. They could be used for things we haven't even thought about, maybe monitoring the health of individual animals on the range for example.

"But right now I think the off-the-shelf models could probably do some practical time-saving things for people, particularly if you've got a rough old ranch with two-track roads that take forever to get around on to check water. You could go up to the top of a hill and if you've gone to that trough before, you can fly that drone about 40 miles an hour and it doesn't take it long to go a mile and check that trough. You can see what that trough looks like through the drone's camera lens without worrying or spending half a day to get there and back.

"I just think they have a lot of potential," he said. "Right now they are still kind of a toy, but it's a fun and potentially useful toy. There's worse things you could spend your time and money on that have a lot less potential."

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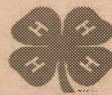

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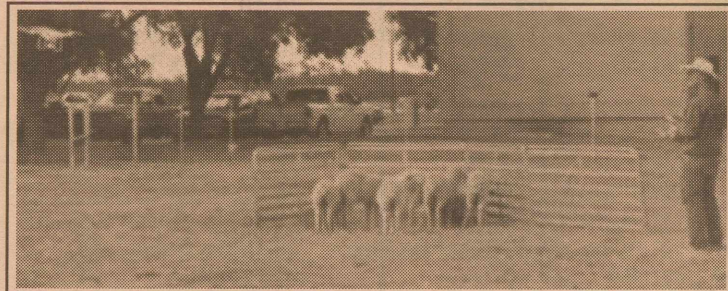

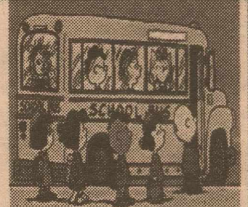
for staying up in a balloon 34 hours. Mrs. Wolf wanted to set her own record. When her balloon took off just after midnight on Sunday, November 19, a huge crowd had gathered at Hamilton field. People cheered and horns honked. I traveled with the ground crew and sent reports back. The whole nation followed the flight. When she landed at 4 PM in Boley, Oklahoma she set 15 records for women's balloon flight. She covered 1,500 miles and had been aloft for forty hours

and eight minutes, soaring up to 13,597 feet. We were sitting in a truck stop at Boley after her flight and she had calls from major news organizations all over the country. I was a young reporter at the time Mrs. Wolf and I became friends. When Susan and I got married, she was among the very first to send us a gift and good wishes. We kept in contact and I treasure her letters written on a circular piece of stationery. She passed away in 1994 at the age of 89.
