

Now, Richey's Borden County Coyotes are going to get the chance to play in the same place which the Cowboys currently call home - AT&T Stadium at Arlington.

"I've always been a Cowboy fan so to be down there on those sidelines and on that field ought to make for an experience that none of us will ever forget," Richey said.

Richey's Coyotes booked their reservations for AT&T Stadium after walloping the previously No. 1 state-ranked Happy Cowboys, 92-58, last Saturday evening at Levelland's Lobo Stadium.

Afterwards, Richey ranked ast Saturday's dominating performance as one of his squad's best.

"It's got to rank right up there as one of our best especially considering who we were playing. Our guys just came up with so many amazing extraordinary plays," Richey said. "Happy is as good as football team as we've seen all year. Those guys were just so well coached and so explosive. They're a complete team.

from a traffic-choked daily commute, unhappy marriage, or heavy workload — can have real physical effects on the body. It has been linked to a wide range of health issues, are physically active, whether including mood, sleep, and appetite problems — and yes, even heart disease.

Doctors don't know exactly how chronic stress affects the heart. Most likely, stress triggers inflammation, a known instigator of heart disease, but that hasn't been proven. "I think the conventional opinion is that stress is bad for your heart, but the data are much escape stress when it follows murkier," says Dr. Deepak Bhatt, director of the Integrated Interventional Cardiovascular Program at Brigham and Women's Hospital.

Yet stress may influence heart disease in more subtle ways. "Stress does cause some people to act in ways that increase their risk for heart disease," Dr. Bhatt says. For example, when stressed, peo-ple often eat unhealthy food and don't have the energy or time to exercise. Stress can also lead us into other heartdamaging behaviors, such as smoking and drinking too much alcohol.

Breaking the connection requires both learning to deal with stress and managing unhealthy habits. These five simple tips can help you do just that.

1. Stay positive. Laughter has been found to lower levels of stress hormones, reduce inflammation in the arteries, and increase "good" HDL cholesterol.

2. Meditate. This practice of inward-focused thought and deep breathing has been

Constant stress — whether shown to reduce heart disease risk factors such as high blood pressure. Meditation's close relatives, yoga and prayer, can also relax the mind and body.

3. Exercise. Every time you you take a walk or play tennis, your body releases moodboosting chemicals called endorphins. Exercising not only melts away stress, it also protects against heart disease by lowering your blood pressure, strengthening your heart muscle, and helping you maintain a healthy weight.

4. Unplug. It's impossible to you everywhere. Cut the cord. Avoid emails and TV news. Take time each day — even if it's for just 10 or 15 minutes to escape from the world.






