"The drouth has cut our crops short all over the state this year. Better prices, however, have kept the white wings of prosperity hovering over us. The crops in the greater part of the state have already been harvested. Now is the time for cleaning up and plowing. We are likely to have a series of dry years. Begin plowing now, and plow deeply. Harrow after each rain until planting time so as to produce a soil mulch. Cultivate shallow. Be careful in seed selection; secure good, pure seed as near home as possible and we can look with
