### LABOR'S LAST STAND?

Washington and New York pundits, including liberal apologists for labor, are finally recognizing that the modern-day "robber barons" are the union leaders who use their unlimited powers to hold America's economy in bondage.

World and Congressional attention has been focused on metropolitan New York, where nearly 11 million people literally have been given the back of the hand by the "public be damned" attitude of a single union leader.

This man, who wields a power so great that he can deprive 6,300,000 readers of their daily newspapers, is Bertram A. Powers, president of Typographical Union No. 6, whose 2,900 members called a strike on December 8 of last year, putting 22,800 newspaper workers on the street because they would not cross his picket lines.

### Severe Economic Blow

The intolerable blow to the people whose economic life is inextricably tied in with its nine newspapers is difficult for anyone living outside of the New York area to comprehend.

New York's department store sales are off about 10 percent over the same period last year, many small merchants are barely hanging on. Broadway shows have been forced to close, parking garages, restaurants, stationery stores, and record shops, all of which depend on newspaper advertising by the large department store to attract suburbanites to the city, find that these customers have thinned to a trickle.

Aside from the economic loss, every taxpayer is contributing to the cost of the strike through unemployment insurance, now running well over one million dollars a week. Moreover, every union typographer in the nation must contribute an additional three percent of his gross wage, in addition to the regular one percent strike assessment, to help support the New York strike — about \$330,000 a week.

### Man Without Pity

That Powers is a man without compassion, even for his own members, is demonstrated in this statement by him:

"Only a long strike... will swing the pendulum so that we might obtain those things that belong to us... the demise of one or more newspapers is possible."

There is a dire possibility that at least two newspapers will fold, meaning that many of Powers' own members, as well as hundreds of other employees, may have no jobs to return to after the strike.

As of February 26, (provided that strike has not been settled meanwhile) the 22,800 employees will have been out of work twelve weeks, for a wage loss in excess of \$30 million. This means that each employee already has lost an average of \$1,600. So, even if they get the \$30 per week package Powers is demanding, rather than the \$10 the publishers say is all they can afford to pay, it will take about 15 months to recoup losses from the long layoff.

### Beginning Of The End?

Men in high places, both political and business, are seeking immediate protection from unwarranted strikes that work untold hardships on vast populations. Many Congressmen are suggesting we extend to unions the anti-trust laws that govern business. Others suggest that compulsory arbitration, long abhorred by labor, may be the ultimate answer. Still others point out that the whole problem would be solved simply by undoing the many artificial aids given to union leaders through legislation of the past 30 years.

Mr. Powers, in arousing opinion to the breaking point, may be unwittingly performing a useful public service. The New York newspaper strike could go down in union history as Labor's Last Stand as a privileged class of the nation's economy.

## Medallion Placed At Old Camp Colorado Sat.

It is pleasing to know that our famous old land marks are being preserved, as the building at Camp Colorado, at the ceremony, Saturday, placing the historical medallion on the only remaining part of the Old Army Post.

The Coleman High School Band played three numbers. Mrs. J. A. B. Miller gave the invocation. Miss Doris Miller, chairman of the Historical Survey Committee, told something of the history of Camp Colorado. How it was moved from the Colorado River to this site in 1856. Signs of the old chimneys can still be seen on the river, south of Whon, near the Military Crossing, as this was the route from San Antonio to Forts to the north and west.

The Guard house, a small, shed-roofed room, dated 1857 over the door, is at the back of the northeast side of the large rock house. The Post was abandoned by the Federal forces in 1861 and the property was purchased by Henry Sackett in 1870.

A large rock building was added, joining and south of the Guard house, dated 1879, over the door, and was used for a Post Office and store.

Mr. and Mrs. Ted Ehrler now live in the large rock house that has been added to the west of these earlier buildings and invited guests to inspect all of the building.

The old Military Cemetery to the east is extremely interesting. We are told most of the older graves have been moved. There are still lots of them, though the years have erased the names and dates, one has a sense of peace and quiet, walking among the old stones.

Miss Miller concluded by presenting the historical medallion to the Sackett family.

When we have an urge to drive this summer, let's see Coleman County. Have you ever been to Camp Colorado?

## 4-H Club Week March 2-9

"4-H: Young Citizens in Action" is the theme of National 4-H Club Week March 2-9, 1963. Some 100,000 Texas 4-H Club members have planned activities for the annual observance which is the most important 4-H event of the year.

4-H Club work is the youth phase of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. 4-H Club work is voluntary. There are no dues, and 4-H is not a school subject. To become a 4-H member an individual must be between the ages of nine and twenty-one, must want to be a member, know about 4-H work and what is expected. 4-H members learn improved practices in agriculture, home economics, and related fields by carrying on 4-H result demonstrations. 4-H is a family affair in which the youngster and his parents, with the advice of adult leaders and county extension agents, decide upon a result demonstration. The 4-Her works with an adult leader in a subject-matter group developing the result demonstration, learning useful and practical skills.

The four-leaf clover is the accepted emblem of 4-H. The letter "H" on each leaf stands for Head, Heart, Hands and Health. The 4-H colors are green and white.

Coleman County has two hundred, ninety 4-H members enrolled in ten community 4-H Clubs representing Coleman, Santa Anna, Novice, Mozelle, Rockwood, Talpa, and Centennial who have made special plans for observance of this week.

Adult leaders are the key persons in every 4-H Club. The thirty-two organization leaders in the Coleman County 4-H program help club members plan and carry out the monthly club meetings and club activities. In addition to these organization leaders, there are thirty-one subject-matter leaders — (subject-matter groups are made of 4-H members who are interested in a particular phase of subject matter: safety, foods, and nutrition, electricity, home grounds beautification, clothing, etc.). 4-H Club members reflect

## 3 Negro Women Arrested Here On Theft Charge

Three Negro women were arrested two miles east of Santa Anna about 5:00 p. m. Friday and charged with felony theft. Bond was set at \$5,000 for each in the Justice of the Peace Court Saturday morning.

Bobby Williams, Highway Patrolman, arrested the women on a speeding charge. All are from Albuquerque, N. M. and are presently in the county jail at Coleman. They are: Birdie Mae Black, 35; Mary Helen Ross, 23; and Barbara Lefay Thomas, 29, who was also charged with speeding.

A pickup order had been broadcast over the Highway Patrol network for the women. A description of the car and women were given. When stopped, the women had a number of ladies' dresses in the car.

Mrs. H. A. Birdwell, owner and operator of Johna Lee's Ladies Apparel in Coleman, identified four of the dresses as being taken from her store. The four dresses were valued at over \$110.00.

Barbara L. Thomas plead guilty to the speeding charge and was fined \$200 plus costs. The women contacted a Lubbock lawyer to defend them.

If they are convicted of the charge, the sentence can run from 2 to 10 years.

### Spring Fishing Time Is Also Snake-Time

Waco — Springtime is also snake-time says A. W. Lewis, Director of Region II of the Texas Game & Fish Commission in Waco. Each year there are many victims of snakebite who could easily have avoided either the bite or unpleasant after-effects.

Snakes frequent log and brush piles, and warm places under litter and debris, both in rural areas and around homes in town. Fishermen are constantly exposed to the danger of snakebite, but with a little caution, most accidents and practically all deaths could be avoided.

Lewis suggests to campers, picnickers, fishermen and hunters that a snakebite kit be added to the other personal or family gear, and a practice session would be of practical benefit. Knowledge of the correct way to handle the materials in the kit will many times mean the difference in effective treatment and failure.

Snakes are largely nocturnal reptiles, and special care should be taken in weeds and brushy places. Never reach under rotting logs or rock piles, and whenever possible boots should be worn with the trousers leg on the outside. Often heavy cloth will deflect the fangs and save a victim from bite.

A 5-year record in Texas showed 357 bites by diamond-backed rattlers, 23 by prairie rattlers and 258 by copperheads. Coral snakes rarely bite, and no authentic records exist concerning fatalities resulting from such bites. Lewis advises fishermen to use extreme care in the spring season.

All entries must be mailed to the Poultry and Egg National Board as outlined in the official rules and post-marked not later than March 9, 1963.

The Texas program is being conducted in cooperation with the Poultry and Egg National Board, Beanblossom explains. It's all a part of the biggest chicken promotion of the year, he adds.

The person who submits the top Texas recipe will represent the State in the national finals to be held at Salisbury, Maryland, June 13-15, as a guest of the Texas Broiler Council. Numerous awards will be presented on the national basis.

Beanblossom says this is a wonderful opportunity for those who enjoy this kind of activity and are willing to share their favorite chicken cooking recipe with others.

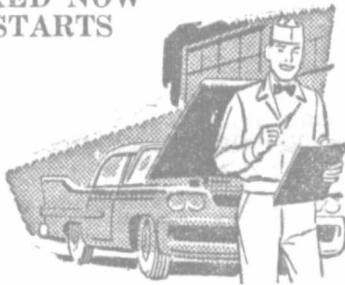

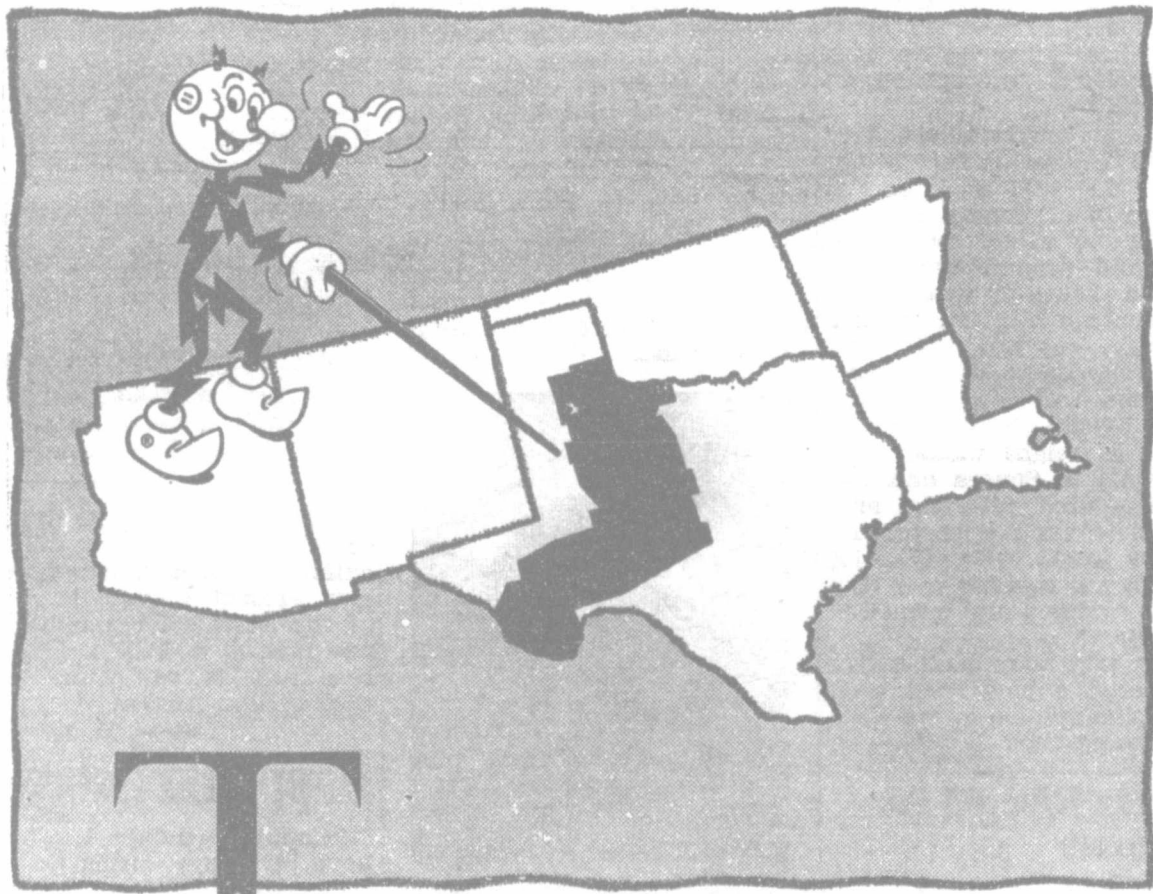

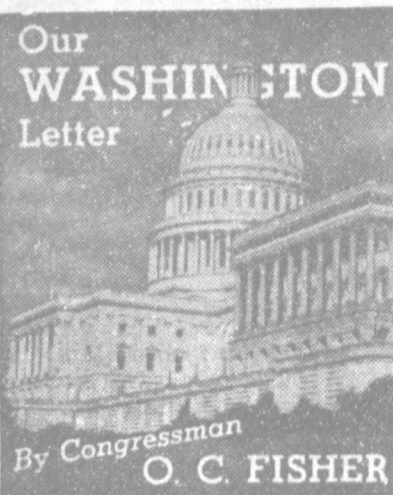

BY A VOTE OF 385 TO 20, the House last week voted to continue the House Un-American Activities Committee, with funds requested by the committee to finance its operations during the coming year. A hard core of liberal-radicals fought the action to the bitter end.

A LETTER FROM Adm. H. G. Rickover advises that he has just returned from the first sea trials of the USS LAFAYETTE, our 29th nuclear powered submarine, and the 11th equipped to fire Polaris missiles.

The LAFAYETTE, he points out, is the first of a new, larger class of Polaris subs, and is the largest ever built. She will ultimately be armed with missiles having a range of 2500 nautical miles.

With the 14 submarines included in this year's appropriations, the Navy will have 35 Polaris and 40 attack nuclear submarines in operation, under construction, or authorized. This should put us far ahead of the Soviets in this type of naval craft.

Scoffing defiantly at his critics, Congressman Adam Clayton Powell, the Harlem Negro, cried "racial discrimination" last week when he was publicly accused of abusing travel privileges, padding his payroll, and engaging in a multitude of other questionable actions. His wife, a white woman, lives with their baby, in their palatial home in Puerto Rico, where she draws \$13,000 a year as a top assistant to Adam.

Adam, who looks like he is about three-fourths white and one-fourth colored, is Chairman

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of the House Committee on Education and Labor. In that responsible position he enjoys certain privileges, which he abuses with much gusto. Last summer, while Congress was very busy, he showed up in Europe accompanied by two attractive young women secretaries — one white and the other colored, making the champagne circuit at taxpayers' expense.

Although it is the duty of the House to put a stop to this sort of business, very little has been done, except that his foreign travels have been halted. I have introduced a bill requiring that when a member hires a staff member who does not actually work in the member's office, permission must first be obtained from the House Committee on Administration, showing justification in writing. If this bill should be enacted it is believed Adam will have to take his absentee wife off the payroll.
