

SHOCKING WHITEWASH

If Americans have not grown completely shockproof, it is the opinion of many close observers of national affairs that people should be shocked beyond measure at a recent action of a government bureau. They refer to the granting of its highest honor and a \$50,000 tax-free prize by the U. S. Atomic Energy Commission to Dr. J. Robert Oppenheimer. The formal presentation of the award will take place later this year, probably by the President of the United States. So there is still time to consider the enormity of this action by a bureau of the American government, with taxpayers' funds, to rehabilitate the reputation of Dr. Oppenheimer.

Security Risk

Dr. Oppenheimer is an acknowledged genius in the field of nuclear physics. But in 1954 the Atomic Energy Commission (its personnel has changed completely since then) denied to him access to secret material because, by a 4 to 1 vote and after a long and exhaustive hearing by a specially appointed and impartial board, they found he was a security risk. Dr. Oppenheimer's own counsel testified to the fairness of the hearing. The evidence showed that among other things Dr. Oppenheimer had close and intimate associations with known communists, some of whom were engaged in espionage, that he contributed money to the Communist Party, that he was not truthful in his testimony before the board, etc.

Whitewash

Ever since then, a group of leftwing, scientists, plus the usual fuzzy-minded liberals some of whom are now in high posts in the New Frontier, have been trying to whitewash Dr. Oppenheimer of the security-risk charge which he brought on himself. However, most of these were private efforts. But now every patriotic American should be deeply concerned about several aspects of what has become an official effort to "clear Dr. Oppenheimer's name" as it is called.

First, the Atomic Energy Commission is an official agency of the U. S. Government. Thus it is acting in the name, and with the money, of the American people — without so much as a by-your-leave — to whitewash Dr. Oppenheimer.

Second, the only one who can really clear his name is Dr. Oppenheimer himself. All he needs to do is ask for another hearing, tell the full story truthfully and frankly — which he did not do nine years ago — and purge himself of the associations and actions that made him a risk to the security of his country. But when Dr. Oppenheimer was asked last year — at a White House dinner, no less — if he would like another hearing, according to the New York Times he was reported to have replied, in effect, "Not on your life."

Third, and perhaps most important, the award to Dr. Oppenheimer is notice to every budding young scientist in America that they need not be too concerned about how careless they are in their associations or to what extent they may endanger the security of their country.

Perjury

Last but not least, it is perhaps forgotten that Dr. Oppenheimer adamantly opposed our development of the hydrogen bomb. He is believed to have done so from sincere motives. Nevertheless he withheld a letter he received from an Atomic Advisory Commissioner who did not agree with his position. The letter came to light only years later at his security-risk hearings, where he falsely told the inquiry board that he had had no communication with that commissioner.

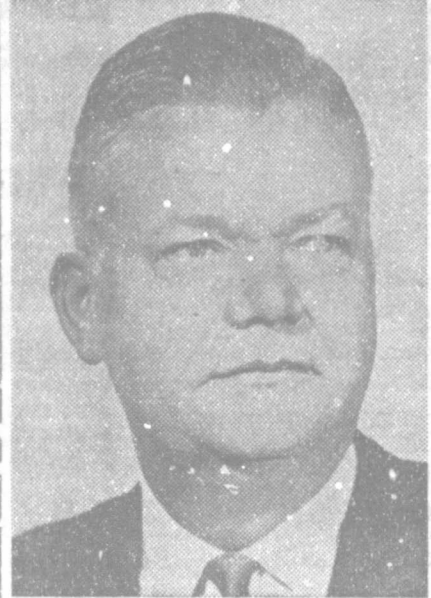

They added that churches throughout Texas are planning special services during the observance and invite all citizens to attend and participate in them.

Many of the state's soil conservation districts are also planning tours, special meetings and recognition for achievements in their districts. The theme for the 1963 observance is — "Eyes to the Future."

Soil Stewardship Week is sponsored nationally by the National Association of Soil Conservation Districts.

Farm Bureau Urges "No" Vote On Referendum

Waco (Spl) — The president of the Texas Farm Bureau said this week that small wheat growers eligible to vote May 21 will not be subject to wheat quotas and penalties if the wheat certificate plan is voted down in the referendum.

C. H. DeVaney said that small wheat growers in many parts of the state are being misled into believing that if the plan fails to carry they will become subject to quotas and penalties, "anyway."

"Nothing could be further from the truth," the farm leader asserted. "Those growers with less than 15 acres will be free to plant as much as they please, the same as larger growers, if the wheat control plan is defeated. Any wheat farmer, if he chooses, could stay within his allotment and be eligible for price support at 50 per cent of parity."

The Texas Farm Bureau president explained that when small growers elected in writing to become co-operators should the plan pass, they were only complying with regulations to make themselves eligible to vote.

"Obviously, if the wheat control plan is voted down and no new legislation enacted, they could not be made to comply with non-existent provisions," he said.

Wheat Issue Discussed In Farm Magazine

The wheat referendum, — agriculture's hottest subject, is thoroughly discussed in the June issue of The Progressive Farmer. In a special 4-page article entitled, "Wheat — Agriculture's Burning Issue," Progressive Farmer editors have gone behind the battle lines of this heated controversy to untangle some of the confusion that has developed.

Annual Mailbox Improvement Program In May

The week of May 20-25 has been designated by the Post Office Department as Mailbox Improvement Week. Mailboxes on mounted city routes, rural and star routes with delivery and collection service are to receive attention.

Postmaster Lee Strother said patrons should furnish mail receptacles which are convenient and safe to use, neat appearing and one that will protect the mail. Boxes that are properly erected and maintained contribute to efficient, speedy delivery of mail.

Rural and star route patrons are required to provide mail boxes of the standard approved type. They should be kept in good servicable condition and should be easily served by the carrier from his vehicle. Names of the owners should be shown on the side of the box visible to the carrier as he approaches, or on the door if boxes are grouped. The box number may also be shown on the box. Boxes and supports should be kept painted.

The Post Office Department said that boxes should be grouped where practicable, particularly where adequate turnouts can be provided.

Boxes should be located on the right side of the road in the direction of travel of the carriers.

Postmaster Strother urged all patrons of rural and star routes to make every effort to keep their boxes in good condition at all times, and to keep the supports and nearby area in good condition.

Local Carriers To Distribute Survey Cards

Postmaster Lee Strother reminds rural patrons of the Santa Anna Post office, to be on the lookout for June Livestock Survey cards. Next week, mail carriers will leave survey cards in a sample of boxes along their routes.

"USDA bases livestock and poultry estimates on replies to this survey," Mr. Strother explains. "It is important for everyone who gets a card to fill it out and return it to the carrier. This way, USDA gets a representative sample of the area's livestock and poultry holdings."

Local carriers assisting in the survey are: M. L. Guthrie Jr., Routes One and Two; D. H. Moore, Whon Star Route; and Mrs. Bertha Allen, Rockwood Star Route.

Survey cards will be forwarded to Cary D. Palmer, State Agricultural Statistician in Austin. After adding and analyzing these cards, USDA Statisticians are able to estimate the State's milk production, calf and pig crops, lamb and wool crops, and the number of hens and pullets.

"Information from this survey will guide livestock and poultry producers in making important business decisions," Mr. Strother concludes.

State Capitol NEWS

Austin — Gov. John B. Connally says he is giving a great deal of thought to the appointment of a successor to former Railroad Commissioner William J. Murray Jr.

He says he hopes to find a replacement before the Senate adjourns on May 24, so his choice can be confirmed.

The governor stated he also is working hard on appointments to his "Committee of 25." This is a committee which will be charged with an extensive study of education beyond high

school.

CONNALLY ACCOMPLISHMENT

Governor Connally can claim a record of accomplishment with the 58th Legislature, which has carried out the following items on the list the governor laid out in his messages to the Legislature:

1. A bill authorizing the Texas Water Development Board to acquire water storage space in federal or local reservoirs is ready for Connally's signature.
2. Revision of the antiquated

state Code of Criminal Procedure probably will go to a Senate-House conference committee to iron out differences.

3. Loan regulation bill is near final passage.

4. A constitutional amendment removing the ceiling on welfare grants has passed the Senate and is ready for House action.

5. Padre Island National Seashore bill has been signed into law.

6. Proposed constitutional amendment repealing the poll tax passed the Senate and awaits House action. A bill to set up a registration system to replace the poll-tax and a revision of the election code are close to final form in conference committees.

7. A tax package — mainly increases in sales taxes on cars and clothes and a year-long extension of the corporation tax — has been signed into law.

8. A Senate-passed bill limiting governors to two elected terms now awaits House action.

9. Municipal annexation bill, which sets some limits on the powers of cities to annex territory, is ready for his signature.

10. Measure creating the Texas Tourist Development Agency has been signed into law.

Both houses also have passed the bill to create a 25-member Committee To Study Education Beyond the High School; bills giving San Angelo and Pan American colleges senior status and full state support; and the Game and Fish-Parks Board merger.

SOME EXCEPTIONS

Connally's plan to reorganize the State Banking Commission ran into banker opposition. But a bill allowing Connally to name one member to replace Atty. Gen. Wagoner Carr probably will get through.

His proposal to give the governor authority to control budgets of state agencies within the total dollar limits set by the Legislature got a chilly reception from a House committee and hasn't been heard from since.

WOMEN'S RIGHTS

Proposed constitutional amendment by Sen. William Moore of Bryan to give women equal property rights was passed by the Senate back in January. It was then sent to a House committee headed by Rep. Jim Cotten of Weatherford. Cotten waited until the first week of April to hold a hearing then never named a subcommittee to consider women's rights.

Finally, an impatient House, hammered by demands from impatient women voters, instructed Cotten's committee to bring the bill out for a vote. Cotten withstood all pressures—even a full-scale committee revolt—until the House took the

bill away from him and sent it to the House Insurance Committee.

Some action is promised, but there's no word as to when.

WHITHER SHALL IT WAVE

El Paso Sen. Frank Owen's bill to forbid the flying of the flag of the United Nations on or in public buildings ran into what may be a fatal delay in the House.

Delay motion came on the heels of a speech by Rep. Howard Green of Fort Worth. He said legislators have received a flood of mail favoring the Owen bill, which attacked leading Texans like former Sen. Tom Connally, former president Dwight Eisenhower and Vice President Lyndon Johnson as being "tools of the communist conspiracy."

These men will live on in memory when their detractors are "lost in the junk heap of history," Green declared. Bill's House sponsor, Rep. Walter Knapp of Amarillo, replied that "the mere fact that a lunatic fringe is supporting this bill is no reason to turn it down."

Further debate was postponed a week, which could mean indefinitely.

HOLIDAY CONFIRMED

For the first time since the reconstruction era, a Negro holds a state office as a member of a major board.

Senate confirmed the appointment of the Rev. C. A. Holliday of Fort Worth to the State Board of Corrections, despite early opposition to Connally's choice.

OPERATORS WIN

Oil and gas operators won a battle when the House approved a measure making it illegal to transport more than a pound of mercury without proof of ownership.

This law is expected to cut down the thefts of mercury from automatic gauges on oil tanks and gas pipelines.

SHORT SNORTS

Vegetable dealers will be required to purchase a bigger bond under a bill ready for the governor's signature.

Parks managers have reported record attendance at state parks so far for 1963.

Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation notified Governor Connally that livestock producers and sportsmen have met and exceeded their \$3,000,000 goal for screwworm eradication.

State Treasurer Jesse James reported that the General Revenue Fund was out of the red on May 7 for the first time since September 1, 1962. Fund balance was \$222,402.87.

State plan for construction of hospitals under the Hill-Burton Act has been revised, according to the State Health Department which is issuing copies of the revised procedure until June 15.

HARRIS COMPLETES BASIC TRAINING

San Diego, Calif. (FHTNC) — John W. Harris, son of Mr. and Mrs. Leon Harris of Santa Anna completed basic training, April 19, at the Naval Training Center, San Diego, Calif.

The nine-week recruit training includes physical fitness, basic military law, military drill, customs and etiquette of the naval service, swimming and survival first aid, ordnance and gunnery and a basic knowledge of shipboard routine.

During the training, recruits receive tests and interviews which determine future assignments in the Navy. Upon completion of the program, they attend service schools for technical training or are assigned to ship or shore stations for on-the-job training.

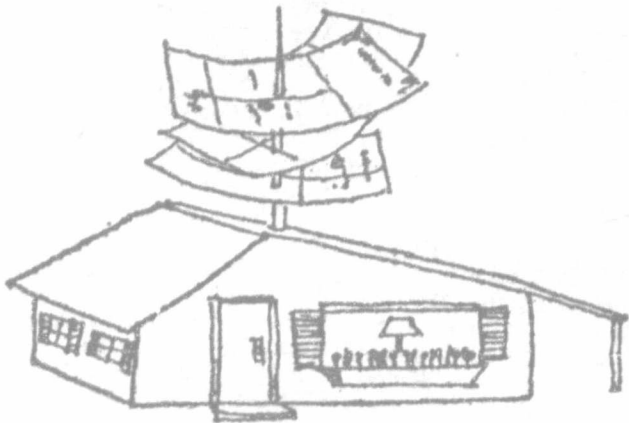

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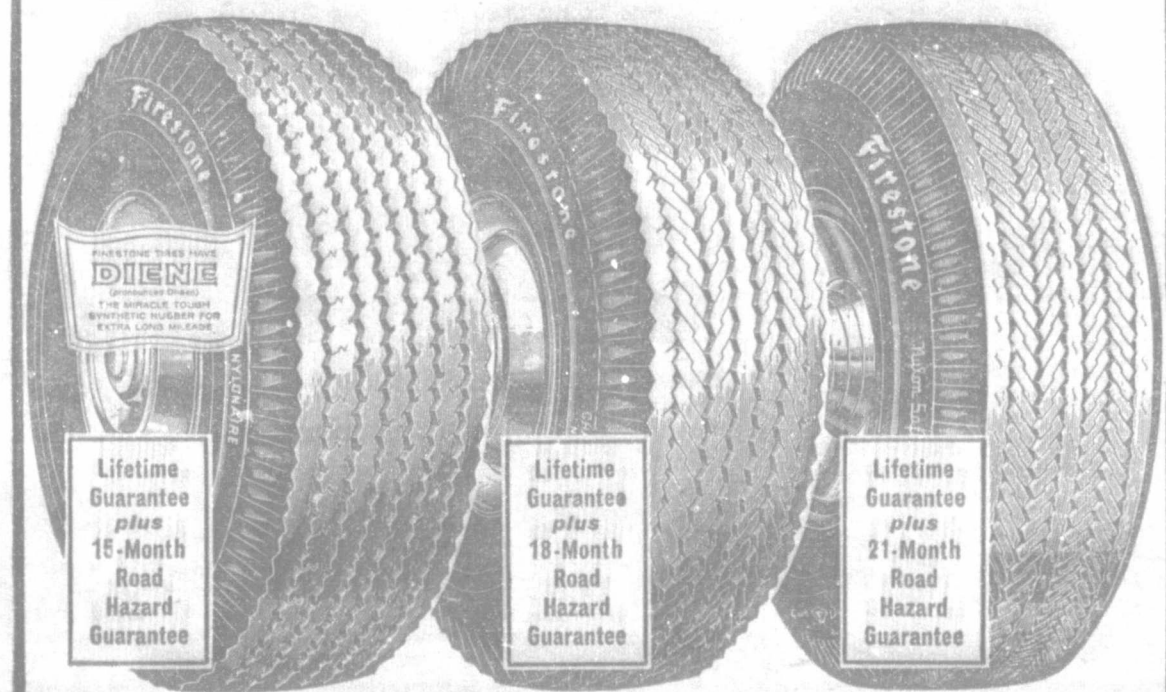

Miss Jettie Kirkpatrick, president of the local group, presided at the dinner, and Miss Alta Lovelady introduced the guests.

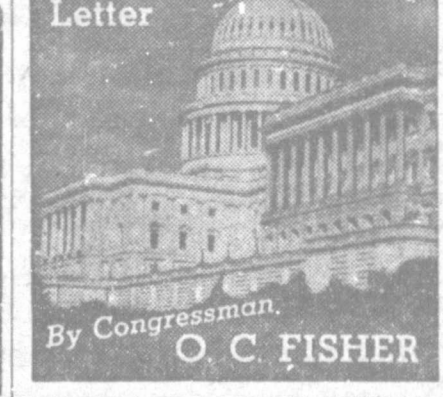

Our WASHINGTON Letter



THUS FAR THIS SESSION there has been a surprising amount of support from Dixie for New Frontier legislative programs. This has given rise to speculation by observers as to how far this trend will go. Several major bills, calling for expenditures of billions, remain to be acted upon. These include medicare, federal aid to education, aid for mass transportation, and a multitude of welfare proposals.

With substantial southern support the Senate has already passed the transportation bill, designed to improve facilities for moving people by mass transportation means — whether railroad commuter, rapid transit or motor buses — in order to relieve mounting traffic congestion in urban areas. This is a \$500 million federal project, and includes both grants and loans to the big cities.

Actually, transportation problems are essentially local in nature and should be no business of the federal government. San Francisco, for example, only last year approved a \$792 million bond issue to finance an entirely new transit system without outside help. Los Angeles has a plan now to help solve its transit problem by local financing. Many other cities are doing the same. But there is considerable

Of Interest To VETERANS Questions And Answers

Q — A friend of mine — no relative — died without funds or family recently. Due to our long association, I arranged a funeral and picked up the tab. The deceased had served in the Army from 1931 to 1935. Will the VA pay a burial allowance in this case?

A — Not unless the deceased had been in receipt of service-

connected compensation at the time of death or had been discharged or retired for disability incurred in the line of duty. Neither service-connected nor disability discharge would be necessary had the deceased been a wartime or Korean Conflict veteran.

Q — What is the procedure for getting a veteran into a VA hospital in a medical emergency?

A — Patients requiring emergency medical treatment may be taken directly to the nearest VA hospital, but if possible the veteran or someone acting for him should communicate with the VA by telephone or telegraph beforehand.

Gardening Safety

The home gardeners are out in force again this spring for the annual round of digging, spading, mowing, trimming, pruning, transplanting and generally getting ready for another summer of keeping up the appearance of a few square feet of ground surrounding the family homestead.

Your doctor knows that gardening is good for you. It's good exercise for the body and good therapy for the spirit. It also has many minor hazards to health and safety. Most of them can be avoided.

Take it easy for the first few weekends in the garden. If

you've done nothing more strenuous all winter than walk a few blocks, give your muscles and your wind a chance to regain strength gradually. Some aspects of gardening are hard work that can put undue strains on long unused muscles.

An integral part of gardening is cuts and scratches, from twigs, rough stones, sharp tools. First aid usually is simple: Wash the wound with soap and water and apply an adhesive bandage. Let it bleed a little to wash away impurities. Deeper cuts, of course, will require medical attention.

The home gardener who neglects getting a shot of tetanus toxoid is asking for trouble. Tetanus germs linger in the soil, particularly if there are farm animals around or if barnyard manure is used on the garden. Tetanus, or lockjaw, is a serious condition, but it can be prevented by inoculation.

Sprays, powders and other poisons that kill insects or weeds are very useful in helping make a better garden. They also can be hazardous. Insecticides and weed killers are usually safe, if you read the directions and follow them. Keep the unused residue tightly capped and out of the reach of small children.

Power garden tools, particularly lawn mowers, save many an aching back for the home gardener, but they also slice off an occasional toe or finger. Study the directions that come with your power tools carefully. They mean what they say about safety precautions.

Bees, wasps and spiders are out for the spring season, and now and then you may get stung. In most instances the sting will be painful for a short time and then fade. If you are allergic to insect stings, ask your physician about desensitizing injections.

Accent on Health

On your next backyard cook-out, don't make your weale skewer from an oleander branch. Even if your host offers you one peeled and sharpened, tell him politely but firmly: "Thanks, but no thanks."

The things are poisonous — leaves, limbs, flowers, bark and roots.

When a group of hunters suddenly sickened after broiling steaks over an open fire, a doctor detected symptoms of digitalis poisoning. All disclaimed any connection with digitalis, a powerful heart stimulant.

But when the medico learned that oleander limbs had been used to skewer the steaks, he had his answer: oleander branches contain a poison which acts like an overdose of digitalis. Chances are many of your back yard shrubs and flowers actually are masking powerful poisons behind a facade of beauty.

Of all plants grown in the average American home garden, an expert on plant poisons counted more than 100 which contained poison, some lethal. The same authority counted 54 harmful plants in a single issue of a seed catalog.

A dime package of castor bean seeds, for example, packs a poisonous punch sufficient to kill five children.

One tulip bulb contains enough poison to kill a man. And sweet peas, although seldom fatal, are poisonous enough to keep a victim bedridden for weeks with a form of paralysis.

A poison in elephant ears, so plentiful in Texas, causes a painful swelling and itching of the mouth, tongue and throat when chewed. A growth called "dumb cane" gets its name from the fact that when chewed it causes tongue swelling to the point that speech is impossible.

Admittedly there are few actual deaths attributed to eating poisonous plants. But the potential is always there. And your guess is as good as anyone's as to how much disabling illness is caused by back yard foliage.

Besides the ones mentioned, here's a partial list of the most common poisonous plants. Poisonous parts are indicated in brackets:

Monks hood (all parts), water hemlock or poison hemlock (all parts), larkspur (foliage), fox glove (foliage), Christmas rose (roots), mountain laurel (all parts), golden chain (seeds), all species of rhododendron (foliage), wild black cherry (dried foliage).

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War Veterans Can Claim Burial Expense Benefits

Reimbursement for burial expenses of an eligible deceased veteran may be claimed from the Veterans Administration any time within two years after the veteran's permanent burial or cremation. Glyndon Hague, Manager of the VA Regional Office in Waco reports.

Reimbursement not to exceed \$250 will be paid toward burial expenses of wartime veterans, or of peacetime veterans receiving service-connected disability compensation from the VA at the time of their death, or who had been retired for disabilities incurred in the line of duty.

Mr. Hague said the undertaker should claim the reimbursement if he has not been paid, or the party who paid the undertaker may claim the reimbursement.

From any VA office, or from most post offices, the undertaker may secure an American flag with which to drape the veteran's casket. The flag may be given to the next of kin or, if there is no next of kin, to the closest friend of the deceased veteran, Mr. Hague said.

At the state track meet he placed fourth in the Class A high hurdles and sixth in the low hurdles after finishing second in regional competition in both events. He was the District 9-A champ in the high jump, and high and low hurdles. His best track marks are 5-10, 14.7 and 20.3.

He is the son of Mrs. Tom Stewardson of Santa Anna.

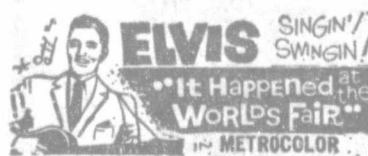
