In April of this year, a New York publisher released a new book entitled "The Life Of An Amorous Woman & Other Writings." It is a collection of stories by the Japanese writer, Ihara Saikaku.

According to the publisher's catalog: "The title story of this collection—"The Life Of An Amorous Woman"—is usually considered Saikaku's greatest novel. Told in the first person by an aging former beauty whose highly erotic nature has been her constant undoing, it ranges over all of 17th-century Japanese life, as the lady successively is wife, streetwalker, court lady, courtesan, farmer's consort and streetwalker again."

"Money and Sensuality" The catalog also reveals that much of the author's attention "was devoted to money and sensuality. Only since World War II have his works been published without censorship and discovered in their full richness."

These lines are not quoted to shock you, to suggest that this book be banned or burned, or to worry about someone's dirty mind. If anyone wants to spend their hard-earned money publishing this material — hoping that someone of like mind will buy it — then they should have the right to do so. Meanwhile, I will personally protect my own mind — and that of my child — against such intrusions.

BUT — there is an added ingredient in this particular case history that has nothing to do with freedom of the press.

"United Nations Project" The publisher's catalog goes on to state that this book is "a project of the UNESCO Translations Program." UNESCO is the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization.

U.S. taxpayers pay the major share of UNESCO's budget — as with all over UN activities. Your support of the "amorous woman" is just one more case of many in which your tax dollars pay for activities of which you have no knowledge—and which are contrary to your best interests. This is by no means an isolated example. Your donations to UNICEF — voluntary and through taxes — were utilized to help finance the UN war of aggression against Kaganga.

It's Your Money! Do you enjoy the fact that your money is being used to translate the erotic adventures of a streetwalker? Is this work so important in advancing the educational, scientific or cultural state of the world that we should allow our government to tax us for this purpose?

Or would you prefer to have those who are interested in erotic adventures pay for their production? Would you prefer to use your money for things your family needs and wants? If you'd like to see the foolishness stopped, support Congressman Ut's bill, H.R. 427, to withdraw the U.S. from the UN and all its special agencies. This is the only lasting solution to the problem.

McDANIEL JOINED WTU IN 1955

McDaniel has been employed by WTU for the past 8 years and has been working in the service department in Junction for the past 4 years. Shortly after graduation from Robert Lee High School in 1955, McDaniel was employed in the service department in Robert Lee and was transferred to Junction in 1959.

Born in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, in 1935, he attended elementary school in Marengo, Iowa, and when he was 12 he accompanied his parents, Dr. and Mrs. J. D. McDaniel, to Siam, where his father served one year as a missionary-doctor with the Presbyterian Mission. During the year McDaniel spent abroad, he visited in Japan, Shanghai, Hong Kong, Singapore, Burma, Rome, London and Cairo.

Mr. Mulroy, who began his long career with West Texas Utilities Company in 1924, moved to Santa Anna from Ozona in 1932 and has served as local manager here for the past 31 years. Mrs. Mulroy has been working as cashier and bookkeeper in the company office since 1946.

Born in New Orleans, Louisiana, in 1898, Mulroy attended school in Pass Christian, Mississippi, and received his degree from Holy Cross College in New Orleans. Following graduation from college he came to Texas and was employed as a clerk at the Crazy Hotel in Mineral Wells.

In 1924 he resigned in Mineral Wells and was employed by WTU as a salesman in San Angelo. During the next 5 years Mulroy worked as a salesman in Cisco and later was promoted to sales manager. While working in Cisco he met Bernice Key, secretary to the WTU district manager in Cisco. They were married in 1927.

The rodeo will open each night with the Grand Entry, which at times has several hundred head of horses in it. Other features each evening will be bareback bronc riding, calf roping, saddle bronc riding, steer wrestling, girls barrel race, matched roping contest and bull riding.

The matched roping contest will be between Bill Teague of Crane, Texas and Jim Bob Altizer, a former world champion calf roper several times. Teague was the 1954 champion team roper and runner-up in All-Around. Both have roped in Coleman before.

Several specialty acts are included this year, along with the appearance of a number of queens, representing various phases of activities in Texas and the nation.

The Coleman Rodeo Association is a member of the RCA. They extend each an invitation to attend all the performances. The rodeo is operated without profit to any individual.

LIGHT

Ever since men first looked at the sun they have marveled at the phenomenon of light. It is difficult for us to realize that our heat-giving planetary neighbor is 93 million miles from us. Since light travels at the speed of 186 thousand miles per second, it takes less than 8 minutes for that light to reach us. Light, because it travels at this tremendous speed and is part of an energy band, can be harnessed for many uses. We are just beginning to understand how to do this.

Light has many qualities that add to its mystery. For instance, white light has all of the colors in it. The colors of the spectrum are red, orange, yellow, green, blue, indigo and violet. Red has the longest wave length and violet, the shortest. If you extend past the violet end you reach the ultra-violet area. On the red side we have the longer wave lengths which are the infra-red spectrum. So, on either side of the light band is irradiation and heat. Both of these are a part of the complete energy spectrum. We know that different colors have different effects upon human beings. Red is supposed to excite and blue to inhibit. Green is restful and yellow makes us cautious.

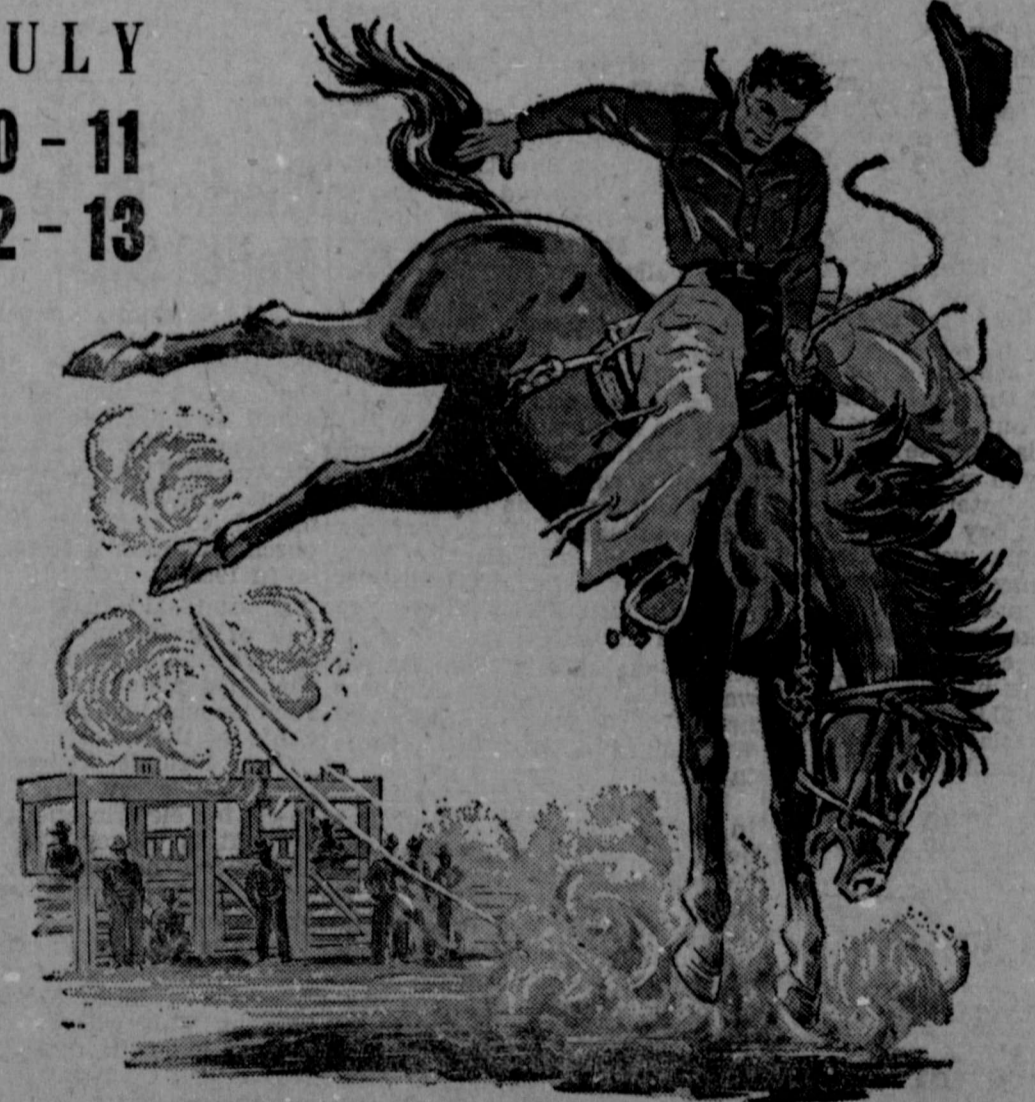

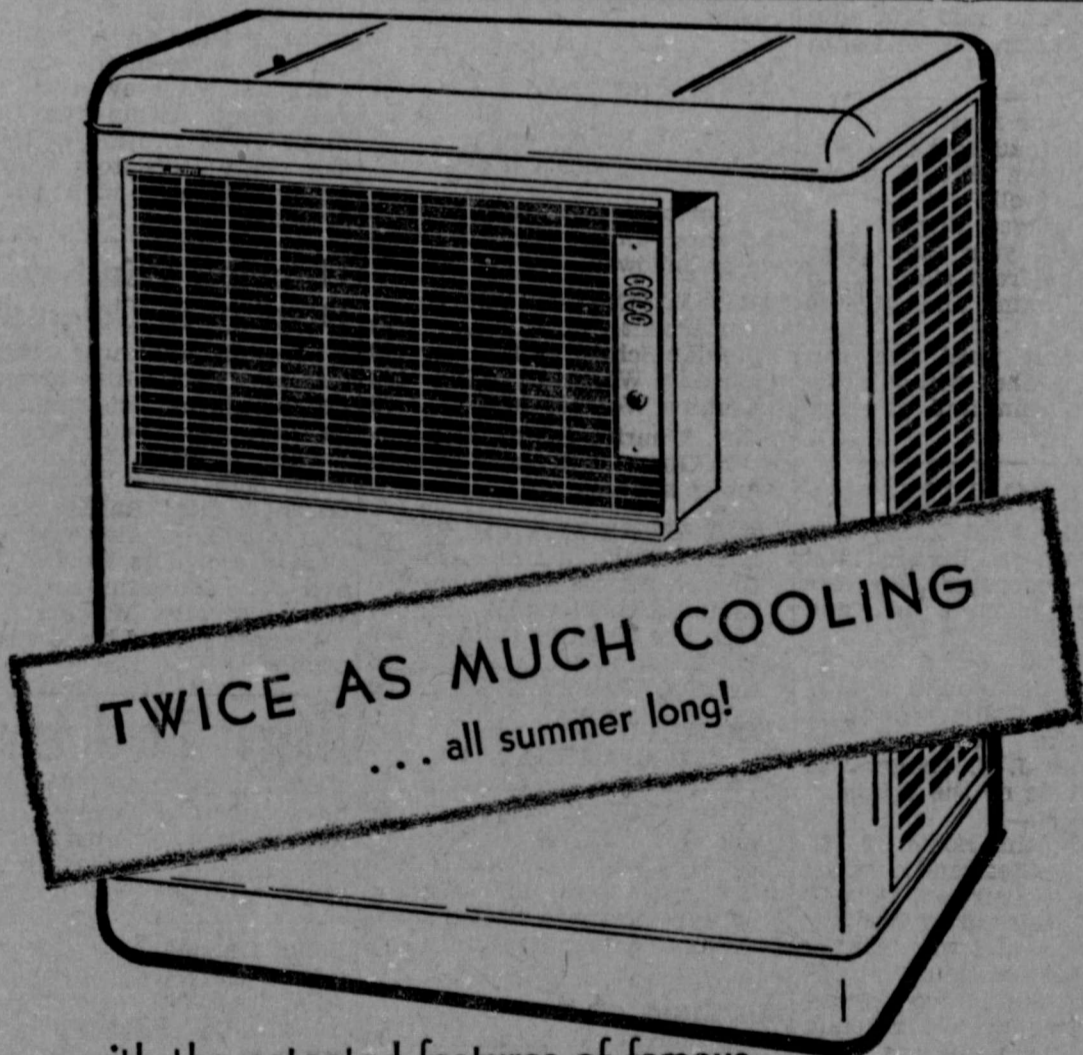

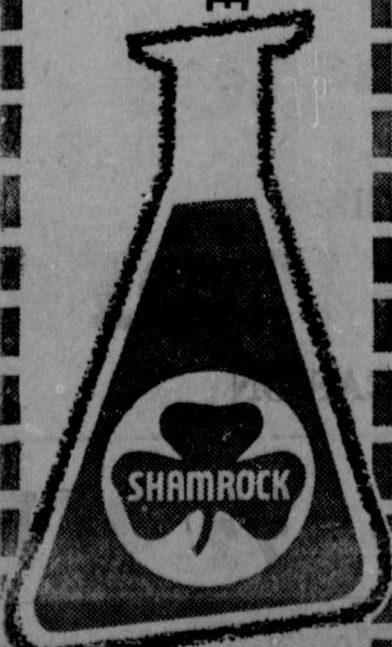

PHYSICIANS SEEK TO UNIFY MEDICINE, RELIGION

Seeking to heal the "whole man," Texas physicians are being guided by the President of the Texas Medical Association into a serious program of unifying medicine and religion.

"Each day the clergyman and the doctor must meet problems that concern life and death. Certainly, only benefit to the total health of our patients can come from better cooperation and understanding between the two professions," writes Dr. Robert Mayo Tenery, President of the Association, in a recent issue of Texas State Journal of Medicine.

He has appointed a special committee to study the implementation of a program in Texas which has been developed by the Department of Medicine and Religion of the American Medical Association. Pilot programs were undertaken in Abilene, Pampa, and Dallas, Texas, and in other cities across the nation in 1961 and 1962.

Dr. Tenery, a Waxahachie surgeon, has himself long been interested in the interrelation of medicine and religion. He is an active Presbyterian and has served as a ruling elder and a member of the board of trustees

Session of the Texas Medical Association in Dallas, Dr. Tenery expressed his belief that this Committee on Medicine and Religion might provide an answer to the criticism that medicine has changed from "an art with a little science to a science with a little art."

"We need to consider the whole man... We can put bones together but we cannot heal. God does the healing. Better un-

derstanding between the ministry and the physicians is something that can accomplish a great deal in the years ahead," he said.
