### CUDDLING UP WITH WHOM?

Since we seem to be in for an era of "sweet reasonableness" between the New Frontier and Khrushchev's Russian Communists — an era that will last as long or as short a time as it suits the Butcher of Budapest — it was fascinating to listen to the ruminations of a wise old gentleman, now retired, who was close to world events of the past 30 years.

#### Outrage

This gentleman says that many of our citizens are too young to understand the enormity of the outrage which the New Frontiersmen are committing against the American people and their free institutions. He was referring to the New Frontier's cuddling up with the Russian communists under the mistaken notion that the Russian Reds are now enemies of the Chinese Reds, and that it is possible to reach agreements with any kind of communist. He doesn't accuse the New Frontiersmen of deliberately perpetrating this outrage — they may do so unwittingly because most of them are pretty young too. He suggests that we ought to project ourselves back to the days of the fascist and nazi governments in Europe.

#### Looking Back

Suppose Hitler and Mussolini had had a public falling-out — something that easily could have happened because they did have their disagreements. Would that suddenly have made Hitler a "good guy" and Mussolini a "bad guy"? How would we have reacted then, if our President had sent his representatives to Berlin to make agreements, amidst laughter, jokes and champagne toasts, with Adolf Hitler while a band played "Love Walked In" (which is what happened at the signing of the test-ban treaty in Moscow recently)? Suppose we had "negotiated" with Hitler on the fate of France or Belgium or Holland? Suppose we had broken off relations with Hitler's Quisling following his rape of Norway, but later sent Averell Harriman or someone like him to conduct a friendly chat with Quisling while he was visiting his boss Hitler at Berchtesgaden — a chat to prepare the way for reestablishment of relations with Quisling such as is now being done with Khrushchev's stooge Kadar of Hungary. Suppose the American Secretary of State was kept cooling his heels for a day at Berchtesgaden until Hitler was ready to play a game of badminton with him — which is what happened to Secretary Rusk at Khrushchev's Black sea resort.

#### Fantastic

Looking back, it seems impossible that Americans would have countenanced any such gay and fantastic "accommodation" as it is now called, with Hitler and his Nazi aggression. Yet today our leaders do this very thing with a dictator who is part of a world conspiracy sworn to destroy freedom and free men everywhere and who is thus as bad as or worse than Hitler.

## Vehicle Inspection Stickers Now Ready

Austin — Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, announced today that the new 1964 vehicle inspection sticker is available now at all Official Inspection Stations in Texas.

"During the summer months, the department has conducted intensive re-training schools for all owners and mechanics of inspection stations," Garrison said. "These men are now qualified and they are ready to serve the motoring public in their vehicle inspection needs."

More than five million vehicles registered in the state are required by law to be inspected at one of the 5,000 official stations between now and April 16, 1964. Operators of vehicles not displaying the new sticker by that date will be in violation of the law.

Garrison urged motorists to get their vehicles inspected at the earliest possible time and pointed out:

"Since the vehicle inspection program began in Texas, vehicle defects as causative factors in motor vehicle accidents has been reduced from 13 percent in 1951 to five percent in 1962. We have every reason to hope that with continued voluntary compliance with this law, accidents can be further reduced."

## Junior High Begins Workouts This Week

Don W. Davis, Junior High Football Coach, said he would issue equipment to his sixth, seventh and eighth grade boys on Tuesday and Wednesday of this week. Regular football practice is scheduled to begin on Thursday, with their first game scheduled for Tuesday, Sept. 17.

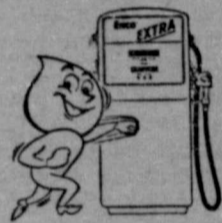
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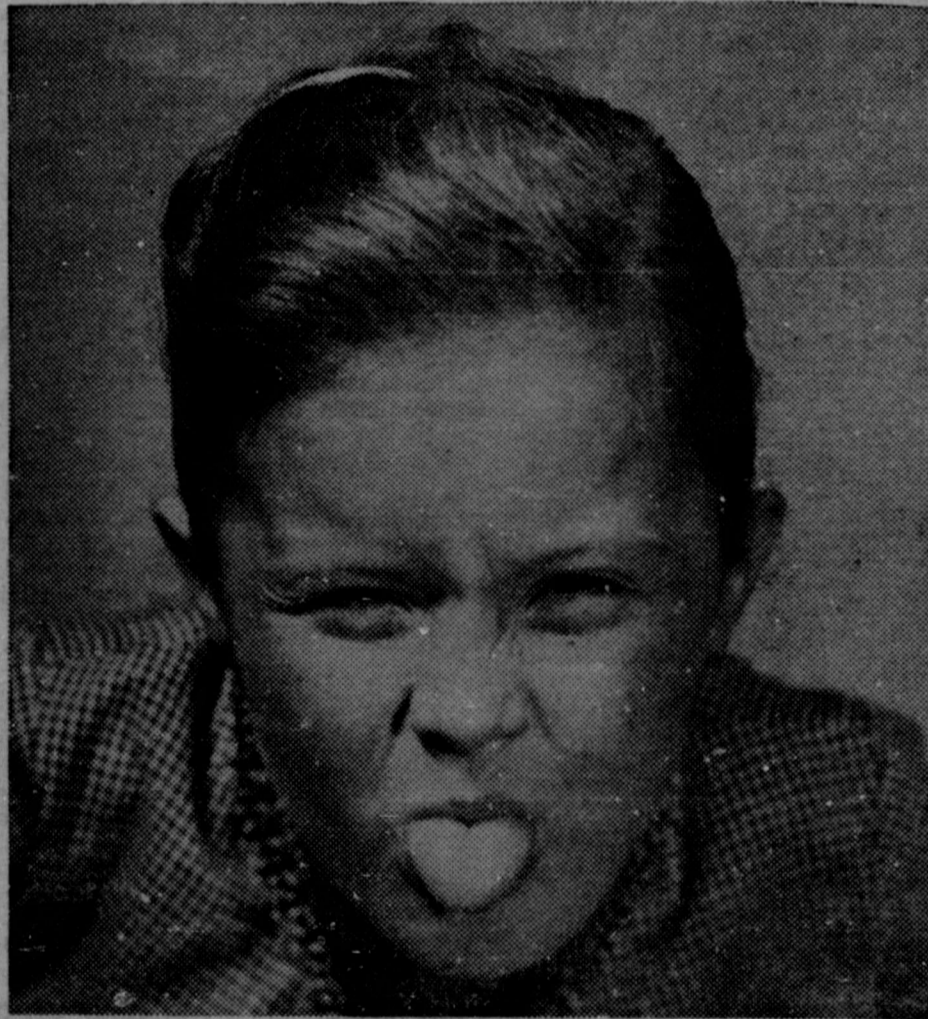

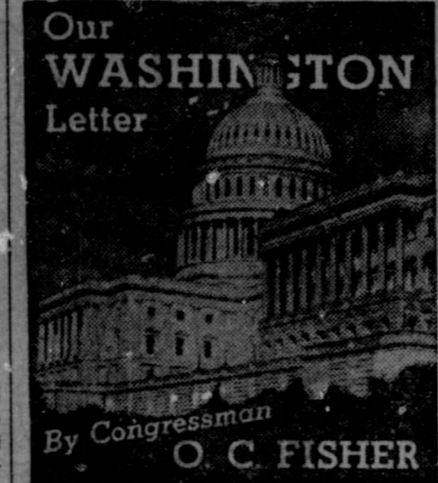

BY A WHOPPING 34-MARGIN the House last week whacked 600 million dollars off of the Administration's mammoth foreign aid bill. The President last January asked for 4.9 billion dollars. Then, after the Clay Report, he sent a message to Congress agreeing to a 400 million dollar cut. The House Committee proceeded to reduce the amount by an additional 600 million dollars. The 600 millionollar cut voted by the House then brought the net total down to about 3.5 billion dollars. But the Senate has yet to act on it. I joined with 11 other Texans in voting for the cut. Ten Texans on the other hand voted against the reduction.

The fact is that in a way the USA has become a sort of captive in handouts to foreign countries around the world, as a part of our foreign policy. No less than 100 nations around the world have been recipients. Like spoiled relatives who are favored by the rich uncle, it becomes increasingly difficult to cut them off. And that explains the dilemma Uncle Sam has gotten himself into.

The House also tightened the controls on the use of this money, when appropriated. Contrary to Administration desires the House voted to set a minimum 2% interest charge on loans for economic development; tightened the ban on aid to nations that trade with Cuba; blocked funds for a huge state-owned steel mill in India, and demanded guarantees against the takeover of American property abroad as a condition of aid.

The reasons for the slash are varied. Among other things, it reflected dissatisfaction with the federal budget deficit; concern over our gold drainage to foreign countries; and also widespread criticism of foreign aid across the country.

Observers also believe the decisive vote for economy in this instance reflects anger over the President's Civil Rights proposals.

It should be noted that in addition to the foreign aid that will be voted this year, there is a substantial carry-out in the pipe line from appropriations previously approved by the Congress. If there were no legislation this year on the subject there would still be enough money available to carry on a high foreign aid program for 2 or 3 years.

The forthright House action last week, if sustained, should mark a definite trend against many extravagant aid programs aboard. In considering this type of spending, we but need to remind the recipient countries that the public debt of the United States is greater than the public debt of all other nations in the world combined.

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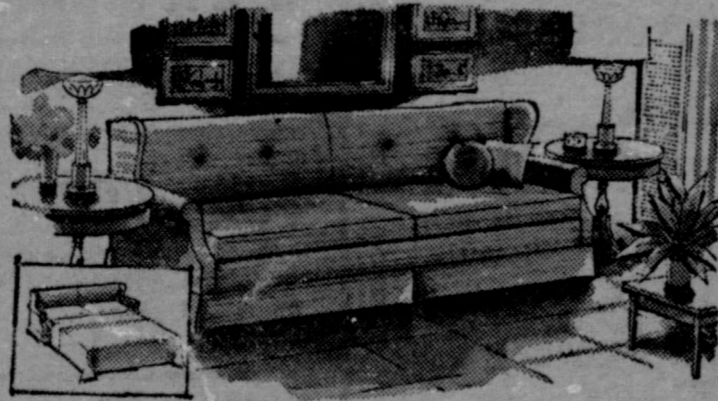

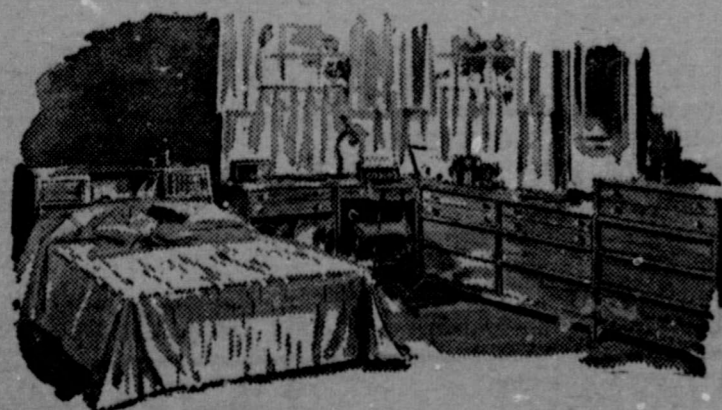

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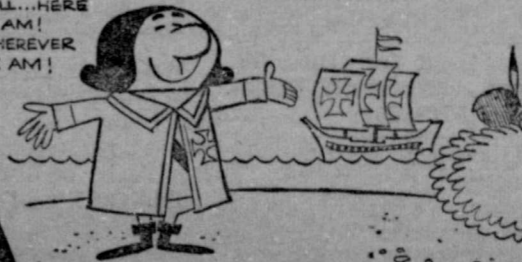

**Korean Vets Have Until Sept. 13 To Change "RS" Policies**

More than 100,000 Korean veterans have only until September 13 to exchange "RS" insurance policies and qualify for a special cash dividend. Mr. Hague, Manager of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Waco, Texas said today.

Expiring on September 13 is their eligibility to qualify for the dividend which returns to them part of the premiums they have been paying based on the rate structure established by law, Mr. Hague said.

In order to qualify for the special dividend, the "RS" policyholders have the choice of either:

1. Exchanging their "RS" term policies for "W" term policies, costing generally about one-third of what they are paying for their present insurance; or

2. Converting their "RS" policies to one of several low-cost permanent plan insurance policies.

The amount of the special dividend depends upon the length of time the policyholder has held his policy, and his age, the VA Manager said. The dividend payments average approximately \$100.

**Applicants Being Accepted For Federal Service Employment**

Applications are now being accepted for the 1964 Federal Service Entrance Examination, the U. S. Civil Service Commission has announced. This examination, open to college seniors and graduates regardless of major study, as well as to persons who have had equivalent experience, offers the opportunity to begin a career in the Federal service in one of 60 occupational fields. These positions are located in various Federal agencies both in Washington, D. C.

and throughout the United States. Depending on the qualifications of the candidates starting salaries for person appointed from this examination will be \$4,690 and \$5,795 a year. A written test is required except for those candidates who have attained a sufficiently high score on the Graduate Record Examination Aptitude Test. Applicants who file by September 19, 1963 will be scheduled for the first written test on October 12, 1963. Six additional tests have been scheduled. The closing date is April 14, 1964.

Management Internships with starting salaries of \$5,795 and \$7,030 a year will also be filled from this examination. An additional written test is required. Applicants for these positions must file by January 16, 1964.

Details concerning the requirements, further information about the positions to be filled, and instructions on how to apply are given in Civil Service Announcement No. 311. The announcement may be obtained from many post offices throughout the country, college placement offices, Civil Service Regional offices, or from the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C. 20415.

**Poisonous Snakes Bulletin Available**

Austin — "Red and yellow kill a fellow," has been used by many outdoorsmen to help them identify the venomous coral snake found in most counties of the eastern half of Texas.

The cottonmouth, rattlesnakes and copperheads may lack some of the coral snake's brilliance, but they possess their share of venom and have characteristic scale patterns and colors that distinguish them to the hunter, fisherman, hiker or birdwatcher.

Texas' sixteen species and subspecies of poisonous snakes, with full color illustrations of each, are described in the Parks and Wildlife Department's revised Bulletin No. 31, "The poisonous Snakes of Texas and the First Aid Treatment of Their Bites."

John E. Werler, the author, also provides the color photographs for this attractive and informative publication. Mr. Werler, director of the Houston Zoological Gardens, has performed a real service to Texas outdoorsmen with his treatment of poisonous snake recognition and an even greater service with suggestions on precautions to be used at home and in the field which will help prevent snake bite. He presents a modern, step-by-step, recommended procedure on the first aid treatment of snake bite as well as helpful information on snake bite diagnosis and suggestions to physicians who may treat snake bite victims.

### HEALTH AND SAFETY TIPS FROM THE AMERICAN MEDICAL ASSN.

#### FOOTBALL

The sports pages of the nation's newspapers are turning rapidly from a summer of baseball reporting to writing about the 1963 football season.

Football is back again. Fall training in the high schools and colleges is either already under way or will be in a few days.

Along with the organized teams millions of American youngsters are swarming the parks and vacant lots for afternoons of kicking and passing, blocking and tackling. And the bumps and bruises are piling up on the practice fields and sandlots of every village and hamlet. Most of these minor injuries aren't serious and are borne with pride by the eager athletes.

Each year, however, there are serious injuries from football, even a few deaths. Not many, when considered in relationship to the great numbers of players involved, but still a health problem. Many of the injuries are unnecessary and could be avoided.

The basic safety rules for football are few and simple —

- Proper physical conditioning before beginning the rough body contact phase of training is essential. The body hardened by training will resist injury and will be less prone to fatigue. Any ex-grinder will tell you that he was much more prone to injury when he was too tired to be fully alert.

- Careful coaching leads to skillful performance and fewer injuries. If your boy is on a regular school team, the chances are he will be taught the fundamentals. The athlete who knows how to block and tackle in the right way is much less likely to get hurt.

- Good officiating makes for more enjoyment of the game and also for fewer injuries. The referee who knows his job and knows how to control the game adds much to the fun and safety of the sport.

- Proper equipment and facilities are highly important to safety. If your son is playing this season, satisfy yourself that he has proper padding, a good helmet, proper shoes. If his equipment is old and worn, see that it is replaced.

- Medical care that is readily available also is important for football safety. Not all teams will be able to have a physician present at all practice sessions but medical services should be quickly available. The physician is best qualified to judge whether apparently minor injury is more serious than it appears.

Boys playing on the organized school teams most likely will have all of these safeguards at hand. It's up to the parents to protect the youngsters who are playing on unorganized sandlot teams.

Football is one of this nation's great sports. It is a rough, tough game and sometimes the players get hurt. Injuries can be held to a minimum, often prevented, by following the safety rules.

### Control of Winter Grain Mites

It is almost time for farmers and ranchmen to seed small grains, says H. A. Turney, area entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The entomologist reminds that fields which have been planted in small grain for the past three to four years should not be replanted to this crop, because of the possibility of winter grain mite damage. The rotation will help to control the destructive pest, he said.

The winter grain mite builds up to damaging populations in late winter and early spring, Turney explains. The necessity of chemical control can be eliminated or decreased to a great extent by the use of rotation, he adds.

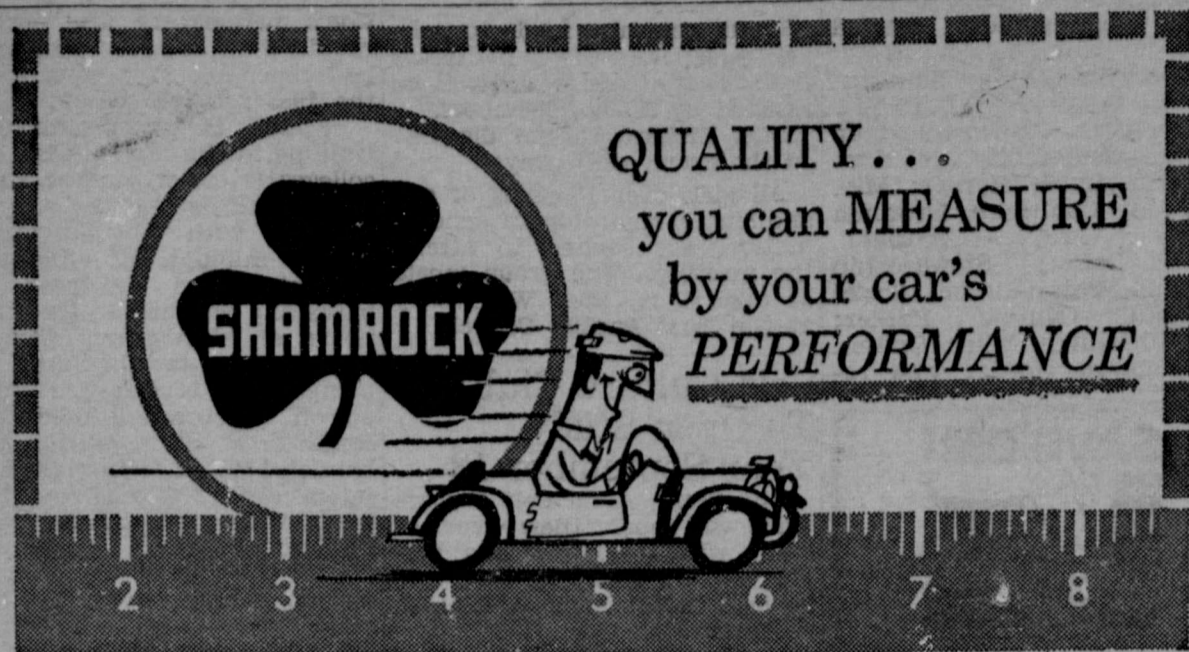

### It's Time For... EYE CARE

VISION SCREENING

We hear the expression "vision screening" many times of late. Schools have vision screening programs and industry screens the vision of its applicants and personnel. When you apply for a driver's license you have your vision tested, or screened.

Many precision instruments have been created and developed to aid industry and the schools as well as for use by your eye doctor. The tests usually cover points to determine whether the individual sees with one or two eyes, whether he is having difficulties with his eye muscles, his depth perception. First the right eye, then the left and, finally your sight is tested with both eyes open. Tests are made at near-point to find out whether we see properly. An experienced person operating these instruments can tell a great deal about the individual being tested. He can then recommend that those who are having, or are suspected of having visual difficulties, see their optometrist or ophthalmologist for diagnosis and treatment in depth.

The value of eye screening devices is that they can point out problems very quickly and early. We must remember that screening alone will not halt eye trouble. The National Eye Research Foundation urges eye examinations every six months because many cases of blindness today could have been prevented if detected.

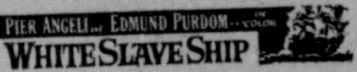

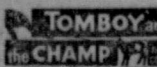

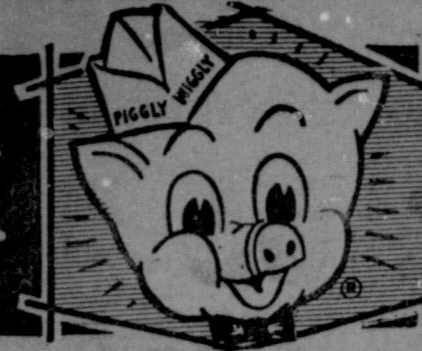
