HOW YOU CAN
BE TAX-EXEMPT

If you could get a permanent and total exemption from the income tax, what would you do with the money you'd save.

Take a moment and dream about it: Would you invest that money in a business? Buy a new car? Move into a better home? Get that new furniture you've been wanting?

We're talking about quite a bit of money, you know. If you make \$6,000 per year, you probably pay around \$600 in personal income tax. At \$10,000 per year, the tax is over \$1,300. And at \$20,000, the tax is almost \$4,000 every year.

What would you do if that money was suddenly yours to spend?

Possibilities

It could add up pretty fast into a comfortable retirement fund. Or maybe you'd like to invest it in stocks and bonds. Or a college education for your child.

Maybe you just want to have a good time — so you might take a trip to Europe or Las Vegas. Then again, you might be inclined to support your church or favorite charity to a much greater degree than you can presently afford.

Facts

The average \$10,000 - a - year man could trade for a new car every year with the money he presently pays in income taxes.

Let's examine some other possibilities: Perhaps you'd like to give some of your money to the Communist dictator of Yugoslavia — where a good part of your income tax money goes now.

Or, instead, would you like to invest in some good farm subsidies? On the average, over \$100 of your annual income tax presently goes to subsidize, control or regulate agriculture.

In fact, it is 700 such "welfare state" projects that consume your entire income tax payment every year. Federal ventures like public power, farm subsidies, foreign aid and pork barrel projects consume more money every year than is collected by the personal income tax.

The federal government receives enough revenue from other taxes to cover our defense needs and all other constitutional requirements — without the income tax!

Proposition

The proposed Liberty Amendment — already approved by six states — will eliminate the government's spending spree and repeal the income tax.

So start dreaming. What would you do with that money? It can be yours — once the Liberty Amendment is enacted. But your help is needed to make it a reality.

Visualize what having your income tax money would mean to you. Then realize that this would be yours every year for the rest of your working life. That's how much you can benefit from the Liberty Amendment.

Good Crowd At Telephone Co-op Annual Meeting

A good crowd gathered at the high school Saturday evening for the Coleman County Telephone Cooperative's annual meeting. The registration began at the football field but had to be moved into the auditorium when rain began falling about 7:30 p. m. About one-half inch rain fell during the evening.

Directors elected were Gordon Monsey of the Mozelle area; Frank Gillespie of the Burkett area; W. T. Nixon of the Valera area; and C. H. Wise of the Rockwood area. New officers will be elected at the regular directors meeting, which is held the third Thursday in each month.

The Cooperative has enjoyed good financial success, as revealed by the report at the business meeting. Total cost of the system to date has been \$849,046.76. Depreciation has amounted to \$146,327.03, leaving the net value of the system at \$702,719.73 and the total assets at just over \$800,000.00.

Total revenue for the past year was \$122,887.15, with the operating cost for the year being \$119,523.84.

The telephone co-op plans to build a new office building on the property purchased recently from the City of Santa Anna. Plans are also in progress for the Glen Cove area to be included in the Cooperative's operating system in the near future. It is hoped that construction of the Glen Cove system will begin in about 60 days.

The Cooperative now operates in just over two-thirds of the county and will operate in about three-fourths of the county when the Glen Cove area is incorporated into the system.

Ceramic Show To Be Here Sunday Afternoon

The first Coleman County Ceramics Show will be presented here Sunday, Sept. 22, in the Lions Club Den, located on Santa Anna's main street. The building will be open to the public from 1:30 to 6:00 p. m. No admission will be charged and nothing will be offered for sale.

The show is being sponsored by a number of local and area ladies who are interested in ceramics as a profession and hobby. There will be entries from various parts of the state, with some coming from Abilene, Waco and several nearby areas. Anyone who desires to be invited to bring your ceramic work and enter them in the competition.

There will be seven competitive classifications. Judging will be by the point system, with 10 points for the choice of design and adaptability; 25 points for color, harmony or contrast value; 30 points for originality; and 35 points for workmanship. Ribbons will be awarded four places in each division.

There is a division for children; one for teenagers and five divisions in open class competition as follows: Porcelain, Ceramics, China Painting, Originals in Clay and Glass (Kiln fired pieces).

Everyone attending will be invited to register. Door prizes will be given in the late afternoon, but the winners need not be present to win.

\$184,471 Budget Approved by Local School Board

The Official Budget of the Santa Anna Independent School District for the year 1963-64 calls for an expenditure of \$184,471.44. Revenue for this period is estimated at \$185,785.00.

Expenditures for the school year include: Administration, \$12,355.00; Instruction, \$115,496.15; Health Services, \$2,306.23; Pupil Transportation, \$20,290.00; Operation of plant, \$9,296.00; Maintenance of Plant, \$4,350.00; Fixed Charges, \$3,078.81; Student Body Activities, \$700.00; Community Services, \$60.00; Capital Outlay, \$2,600.00; Debt Service, \$13,939.25.

Estimated revenue is as follows: Local sources, \$66,885.00; County sources, \$415.00; State sources, \$118,085.00; Incoming transfers, \$400.00.

A total of \$6,387.52 in balances were on hand September 1, with almost \$6,000 of that amount being in the Interest and Sinking Fund for retirement of debts.

The assessed valuation of the district is 3,800.00. The tax rate for the year was set at \$1.85 per \$100 valuation. Of this amount, \$1.50 goes to maintenance and 35 cents goes for debt service and interest and sinking fund.

For those interested, a complete copy of the budget is available for inspection at the school office or The Santa Anna News office.

State Capital NEWS

Austin — Gov. John Connally has taken the offensive against his potential 1964 opposition backers in spectacular fashion. He surprised a poll tax rally here by lowering the boom on Bexar County Commissioner Albert Pena, state chairman of the Political Association of Spanish-Speaking Organizations (PASO). Pena is among

Texas liberals who have been critical of the Governor's opposition to federal civil rights legislation.

Connally charged that "self-seeking politicians" are out to turn the poll tax repeal campaign into "a sideshow for their own purposes." Their aim, in the Governor's view: bloc voting.

He blasted Pena as a "would-be political boss" who builds his power by erecting a wall between Mexican-Texans and Anglo-Texans, using Teamster Union organizers as bricklayers. Pena, who played a big hand in the city council election in Crystal City early this year, denied he is a "boss". He said the Governor's speech was a "sadtistic, under-the-table, oblique way of telling the people



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he favored retaining the poll tax."

Connally's friends applauded his sizzling speech, one of the hottest he ever has made.

Pena's friends, including Don Yarborough of Houston, who evidently will be running against Connally again next year, rushed to his defense and heaped new criticism on the Governor.

REPUBLICANS

First announced statewide candidate to emerge on the pre-1964 political scene is a Republican. He is George E. W. Bush, 39, of Houston, who seeks his party's nomination for the U. S. Senate.

Bush and other Republican hopefuls have been discussing their chances with the GOP State Executive Committee.

Present were Jack Cox of Houston and Dr. Milton V. Davis of Dallas, mentioned as Senate race starters; also Des Barry of Houston, who ran for congressman-at-large last year, and State Rep. Horace Houston of Dallas, who has said he might run for Governor.

GOP Congressman Ed Foreman, Odessa; Bruce Aiger, Dallas; and Sen. John Tower were on hand when the committee talked finances, organization, and voter registration.

PARKS REPORT

A two-year study, recently completed and presented to the Governor, proposes expenditures of \$305,000,000 to acquire and develop 373,000 more acres of Texas parks by the year 2000.

Connally, lauding the report, suggested organization of a citizens group to follow through on needed parks programs. He also revealed he is studying possibility of buying part of the 72,000 acre J. C. Hunter Guadalupe Mountain ranch as a State Park.

Parks experts who prepared the report argue that proper development of the recreation, historical and scenic areas would boost the state's economy \$200,000,000 a year.

CREDIT INSURANCE
State Board of Insurance heard praise and criticism of its proposed new rules regulating credit life, health and accident insurance at a second hearing here.

The 58th Legislature gave the Board authority to regulate life, health and accident insurance on loans. For the first time, group credit insurance also was included.

The agency came up with a proposal to establish a test for reasonableness of the relation of benefits to premiums. Some companies claimed the suggested formula resulted in too-high rates.

No decision was reached as to when the rules will take effect, pending completion of an at-

torney general's opinion.

TRAVEL RECORD

State Highway Engineer De Witt C. Greer says Texans will set a new all-time record for miles traveled this year — 49,500,000,000 vehicle miles, an increase of two billion miles over last year.

Half of the mileage will be logged in urban areas. In other words, seven percent of Texas highways will carry 50 percent of the traffic. Other 93 percent will be scattered over 93 percent of the road system.

A "disturbing discrepancy," says Greer... "one we must certainly deal with as we plan for the future. Big question is whether we can continue to modernize and upgrade the Texas Highway system quickly enough to take care of this traffic efficiently — and above all, safely."

APPOINTMENTS

Leslie G. Burnett of Austin, Claude Brown of McCamey, and J. B. McDuff of Crockett have been named by Governor Connally to the Texas Industrial Commission. Ray Horton of Houston was reappointed.

Brown, auto dealer and oilman, replaces San Angelo publisher Houston Harte, who resigned. Burnett, labor official, succeeds Jack A. Marin, San Antonio union leader.

McDuff, telephone executive, succeeds Jack H. Drake, Westlaco Chamber of Commerce executive.

Another appointment by Connally was Judge Solomon Casseb Jr. of San Antonio as presiding judge of the 4th Administrative Judicial District. Judge Howard Green of Cuero resigned the post to accept appointment as chief justice of the new 13th Court of Civil Appeals at Corpus Christi.

TOURIST AGENCY

Texas' brand new Tourist Development Agency has opened offices in the Sam Houston Building on the Capitol concourse.

Director Frank Hildebrand Jr. hopes to get together with his

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advisory board this month to review advertising presentations.

Agency will be out to prove itself to the legislature. It hopes to demonstrate that it can do enough for the Texas economy with its initial \$200,000 advertising appropriation to justify a bigger budget in the future.

WATER WARNING

Chief Engineer John Vandertulip of the Texas Water Commission warns that the five wet years since 1957, when the last drought broke, have lulled Community leaders to sleep. As a consequence Texas cities and industries are in danger of running shy of water.

Vandertulip deports that existing reservoirs will not supply present cities and industries with sufficient water if another seven-year drought develops.

SHORT SNORTS

A special election to fill vacancies in the House of Representatives created by resignations of Dallas Democratic Reps.

Robert H. Hughes and Bob Johnson will be held on November 9.

Texas Municipal League President Robert Willis Jr. of Livingston called on all city officials to give "active attention" to revision of municipal revenue policies and broadening the local tax base.

HERE IN WASHINGTON practical politics is taken for granted. I recall hearing the late Sam Rayburn's much-quoted admonition, made during a heated partisan debate: "Those who go along, get along." For years every President has knocked himself out to take care of those in Congress who have hewed the party line. A defeated Senator or House member, if he was faithful, is often rewarded with a lush government job.

That is one of the rewards of the party faithful as our political system has evolved. Roosevelt did it. So did Truman. And Ike followed suit.

The New Frontier has been generous in that regard. Grace Pfost, former Congresswoman from Idaho, a party faithful, defeated last year, in a bid for the Senate, holds an \$18,000 job in Federal Housing; Sidney Yates of Illinois, a former House member who tried to unseat Senator Dirksen last year, was put on the UN staff at \$22,500. Frank Smith, Mississippi House faithful, after his defeat was rewarded with membership on the TVA board.

Don Magnuson of Washington, bumped off by a Republican in a re-election bid to the House last year, was consoled with a \$16,000 job in Interior. Floyd Breeding, an able House member from Kansas, draws \$18,000 a year in Agriculture, following his defeat last year. Walter Moeller of Ohio, another defeated party faithful, draws \$16,000 in the Space Agency.

Ex-Congressman Frank Kowalski of Connecticut, who challenged Abe Ribicoff for the Senate, was appointed on the Subversive Control Board at \$20,000 a year. Ex-Congresswoman Kathryn Granahan, a Philadelphia party faithful who lost out in re-districting, now gets \$20,000 a year as U. S. Treasurer; and Catherine Norrell, also a victim of re-districting in Arkansas, was made Assistant Secretary of State.

Many of these appointees are, of course, very capable people. But the general practice causes observers to recall Stonewall Jackson's jibe: "To the victor belongs the spoils."

Hunting Accidents

Many millions of Americans will take to the field and forests this fall to hunt everything from cottontail rabbits to Canadian moose.

At least 200 of these hunters will be brought back dead. They'll be killed in accidents involving guns. And back of almost every hunting accident is one cause, carelessness. Today's Health, the magazine of the American Medical Association, offers some basic pointers that will help you both to return unharmed from your hunting trip and to avoid bagging a fellow hunter.

Know what you're firing at before you pull the trigger. Be certain that the rustle in the

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brush is actually a deer and not another hunter. Never climb through or over a fence with a loaded gun. Unload the gun, then reload after you've crossed. Don't shoot at a flat, hard surface. Ricocheting bullets can kill or wound at long distances. Never look down the barrel of a gun to see whether it's loaded. You can't tell by looking down the barrel anyway, and there's always the chance of an accident. Always carry a gun so that you control the direction of the muzzle even if you stumble. Keep the safety on until you're ready to shoot. Keep guns away from children. Never leave a weapon unattended without first unloading it. Store guns and ammunition safely out of the reach of children. Unload guns carried into camp or home. Keep guns cased until reaching the hunting area. Always be sure the barrel is clear of obstructions, such as mud or snow. Alcohol and guns definitely don't mix. Avoid drinking while you're carrying a loaded gun. Above all, treat a gun with respect. Never point it at a human. It might go off.

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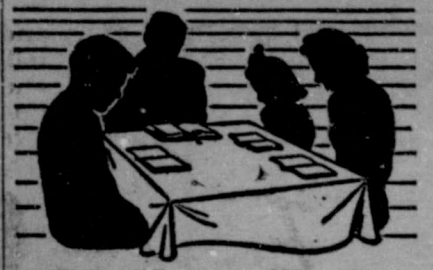

They should be worn whenever you are working around dangerous instruments or where your eyes are exposed to flying sparks, metal particles, sand, or other polishing materials and generally all places where that million to one accident might occur.

A modified safety goggle is worn many times in most of our popular physical contact sports. Hockey, football and basketball are excellent examples. We have all seen pictures in the paper of players searching for a teammate's lost contact lens while the game is interrupted. These tiny vision aids act, at odd times, as a safety device for that portion of the eye covered. The National Eye Research Foundation has in its files many actual cases where an eye has been saved, in a hunting accident, for instance.

Another, sometimes neglected rule for safety where our eyes are concerned, is a regular and professional eye examination every six months.

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Mountaineers Improve; Win Over Cross Plains

The Mountaineers showed considerable improvement Friday night as compared with their first game of the season. They lost only one fumble and lost 21 yards during their ground game, but gained a total of 234 yards on the ground and 12 yards in the air.

Bill Horne was the driving force that led the Mountaineers to their second victory in as many outings. Horne, left half-back, ran left and right, through every line position and up the middle. He carried the ball 28 times and gained a total of 152 yards, mostly 4 and 5 yards at a time, with his longest gainer being 23 yards in the third period. On the first play from scrimmage for the Mountaineers, Horne fumbled the ball away, but was not long in making that up.

The Buffaloes never threatened to score and only got across their 50-yard line twice, once gaining to the Mountaineer 47-yard line in the first period and in the third period they gained to the Mountaineer 44-yard line.

Frank Valdez suffered an injury midway in the second period, but it did not seem to be serious. However, he was unable to return to the game for the evening. Mac Boyet, Horne and McIver did most of the ball handling after the injury, but Valdez gained considerable yardage during the time he was playing. Bobby Morgan intercepted one pass and caught two passes during the evening.

THE GAME

Cross Plains received the kickoff and returned 7 yards, they gained 4 on the ground and connected with a nice pass for 13 yards and a first down. They failed to gain the necessary yardage for another first down and the Mounties took the ball on the Buff 48-yard line. Horne attempted to go through right

tackle and fumbled with the Buffs recovering. Four downs did not gain the Buffs 10 yards and the Mounties took over again. The Mounties made a first down on the Buff 41, then gained to the 35 and attempted a short pass that was intercepted. The Buffs lost 11 yards, then gained 5 on a Mountie penalty and attempted a long pass. Morgan intercepted it on the 40-yard line and picked up an additional 3 yards. The TD drive got underway with Horne and Valdez doing the ground gaining and Morgan taking a pass from McIver for 10 yards. Horne went 5 yards through right tackle for the TD

and a pass attempt failed for the two extra points. The Mounties kicked to the Buff 31 and they lost a couple of yards. As the quarter ended, the Buffs had gained to their 37-yard line.

Failing to make a first down, the Buffs punted to the Mountie 22 with McIver returning to his 30-yard line. A first down put the Mounties on their 42, but they lost back to their 34 and punted to the Buff 31-yard line. The Buffs failed to gain but 8 yards and lost 5 of that on their only penalty of the evening, then punted to the Mountie 28. McIver got a nice return to his 46. The Mounties picked up two more first downs, then lost a yard when Valdez was injured. They gained almost enough for the first down on the Buff 24-yard line as the ball went over. The Buffs gained a first down and worked their way to their 41, but lost back to their 38, attempted a pass, then gained back to their 41 with the ball going to the Mounties at that

point. The Mounties took a 5-yard penalty, gained to the 37, then lost back to the 45 as the half ended.

McIver took the kickoff on his 9-yard line and returned to his 26. Failing to gain but 5 yards, the Mounties punted to the Buff 35. The Buffs gained a first down, but could not make the second one in three tries and punted. McIver took the punt on his 13-yard line and returned to his 36. It took the Mounties 12 plays to cross the goal line and make the 64 yards, with Horne and Boyet taking care of the ground work shores. Horne went the final 3 yards by going wide around left end, then plunged through left guard for the two extra points. The Buffs returned the kickoff 11 yards as the quarter ended.

Losing five yards in three tries, the Buffs punted to the Mountie 36, with McIver returning to the Buff 43. Boyet gained 3 and a penalty put the Mounties back on their 45. Cross Plains' Barr intercepted a pass

on his 40 and picked up 5 yards to his 45. Two ground plays and a 3-yard pass put the Buffs on the 50-yard line. They punted to the Mounties 13, with McIver returning to his 27. The Mounties gained to the Buff 49 and punted to the 23. The Buffs lost back to their 21, then gained to the 25 and punted to the Mountie 37. Taylor, McIver, Horne and Boyet drove to the Buff 29. Here Coach Smith sent in most of his second-string reserves to give them some valuable experience. They did not gain much ground, but suffered a 5-yard penalty and let the ball go over on downs at the Buff 36-yard line. With only seconds remaining, the Buffs attempted to pass, but lost 10 yards, then with only one second left on the

clock, failed to connect with a long pass.
