ILL LEGALITIES DESTROY FREEDOM

We have the right to run our own affairs. We have the right to be prejudiced. We even have the right to be wrong. We have the right to be Methodists, Catholics, Jews or Atheists. Or to be anti any or all of these.

We have the right to hire only Baptists, Jews, Negroes, left-handers or members of the D. A. R. In the "right-to-work" states, we have the right to hire a man without forcing him to join a union. He has freedom of choice. Are we going to let the politicians take these precious privileges away from us with "civil rights" legislation? If we are going to be free people, no government — federal, state or local — can tell us whom we have to hire or fire. The next step after that would be to tell us where we have to work, as they do in communist countries.

Natural

I intend to hire and fire anybody because of race, color, creed, sex or the way they part their hair. If I want to pursue my happiness by hiring only aboriginal idiots, that is my natural right and I will be uncivil to all who try to deny it. No government has the right to force integrated firing, hiring, schooling, praying playing, eating.

A Supreme Court of judges decreed in 1896: "If the races are to meet upon terms of social equality, it must be the result of natural affinities, a mutual appreciation of each other's merits and a voluntary consent of individuals."

Unnatural

An integrated social order in which there'll be no distinction because of race, religion, color or nationality may be a noble objective but like Communism, it's against human nature and can't be put into effect without dictatorship.

Some time ago a story made the rounds concerning an agitator addressing a London crowd. Among other things he promised that, come the Revolution, all workers would ride in Rolls-Royces. A Cockney spoke up and said he didn't want to ride in a Rolls-Royce. The agitator glared at him and answered, "Come the Revolution, you'll ride in a Rolls-Royce whether you like it or not."

If Socialism ever takes over here, you'll do exactly what you're told in every respect, like it or not. And if enough people rebel, the government will then be forced into instituting firing squads. Federal aid is federal control. Federal aid is, finally, dictatorship.

Legal

According to Supreme Court "law," demonstrators can sit-in, sleep-in and block the entrances of private businesses, legally. It is "coercive" to demand that they leave if it is in a segregated community, but it is not coercive for these agitators to ruin a person's business. No man has a right to sit-in or otherwise obstruct the business of another man.

Unions discriminate "legally" against non-union members and against the public. Why? Because a bunch of crooked, lily-livered politicians in Washington sold out for the union vote.

We are free, not when the majority is free, but when the individual is free.

County Savings Bond Sales Reach \$29,100 in August

Savings Bond sales in Coleman County during the month of August totaled \$29,100 according to Mr. Robert I. Bowen Jr., Chairman of the Coleman County Savings Bonds Committee.

Savings Bond sales in Texas for the first 8 months of 1963 totaled \$99,644,534 which represents 66.2% of the state goal.

"The 1963-64 School Savings Stamp Program is again in full swing. This has been an important feature of the bond program since 1941. All children buying their first U. S. Savings Stamp this Fall — whether at school or at the post office — will receive certificates signed by the seven Mercury Astronauts, making them "Junior Astronauts," Chairman Bowen announced.

Last Non-Conference Game To Be Played Here Friday Night With Clyde

The last non-conference game of the season for the Santa Anna Mountaineers will be played on the local field at 8:00 p. m. Friday. The game will be with the highly rated Clyde Bulldogs and should be a real ballgame.

The Bulldogs have a high-scoring team that uses the air ways or their powerful ground attack to a good advantage. They have scored 76 points this season and given up only 47 points. Clyde won over Roscoe 35-14 in the season opener, then fell to Haskel 25-14 and last week run over Bangs 27-8, for their 2-1 record.

The Mountaineers have a powerful line that is not going to give up many points and last week they proved they can cope with at least a part of a passing attack. As yet, the Mounties just haven't been able to get their scoring machinery to function right. Horne and Valdez are both being sprung through the line quite often, only to be taken down by the linebackers. Eventually (and this would be a good week to do so) they are going to find the combination to getting more than the 34 or 5 yards per carry. And this is not meant as ridicule either. The Mountaineers have one of the

best teams Santa Anna has fielded in a long time and we are proud of them. The spirit of cooperation and determination manifested by the team shows a great team spirit, and when a group of boys play as a team it can only mean they are going places. These boys have what it takes and we just might see them win their third game of the season Friday night. But, it will not be an easy victory as the Bulldogs are a determined lot also.

The large number of fans that turn out for the ballgames are also a big boost to the boys. At Dublin last week there was a good crowd from Santa Anna present, as well as all the local students attending Tarleton State College in Stephenville and several students from other colleges.

The self-employment tax — like other taxes throughout history — is not optional for those who would like to pay the tax. If you make more than \$400 a year of self-employed income and haven't already paid social security taxes up to the maximum of \$4800 income you just don't have any option — you owe self-employment tax. Qualifying for social security benefits is pretty important, in addition to staying out of trouble with Internal Revenue.

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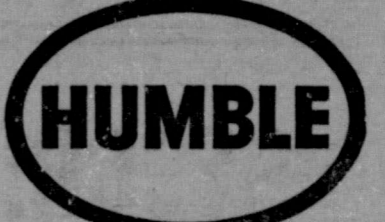

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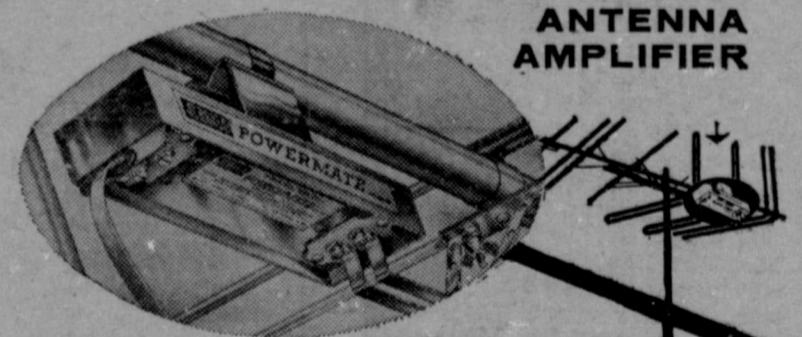

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Mountaineers Lose Thriller To Dublin

The Mountaineer forward wall just about contained the Class AA Dublin Lions Friday night, but finally let them complete a couple of long passes in the final minutes of the game. The Lions won 6-0 and scored on their only sustained drive of the night. The Mounties got within sight of the goal line twice, but just could not muster that extra effort it takes to push across a score from inside the 10-yard line.

The boys on the line: McCarrrell, Hartman, Bates, Perry, Allen, Blanton, Morgan, Cupps, all played outstanding ball as well as the line backers and safety men.

Dublin was known to have a good passing attack. The best defense against passing is rushing the passer and they did just that through most of the game. Until the final minutes of the game, the Lions managed to get off only 2 passes with one of them being completed in the second period for 4 yards. In the last minutes the Lions completed 4 passes, with two of them being long ones. This put them in scoring position and three ground plays put them over the goal line.

The Mountaineers tried four passes but could not complete any of them. They actually tried more but McIver was smothered before he could get the ball off. This same thing was true for the Lions, which goes in the records a ground play.

It was a real thriller for the fans from both schools.

THE GAME

Dublin took the kickoff and returned it 18 yards, gained a first down and staying on the ground attempted a 4th down try that failed and gave the Mounties the ball on the Mountie 41-yard line. The Mounties made 2 first downs, gaining to the Lion 33, but a 4th down try failed and the Lions took over. The Lions made two first downs, to the Mountie 31-yard line and a 4th down effort failed. The Mounties gained 2 yards, then lost it as the quarter ended.

The Mounties gained 6 yards and punted to the Lion 26. The Lions gained 4 yards on two plays and connected with a 4-yard pass, then punted to the Mountie 31-yard line, with McIver returning to the 43-yard line. The Mounties lost 2 yards, then gained it back, then lost 5 yards on a fumble with the Lions recovering on the Mountie 37. The Lions gained 4, suffered a 5-yard penalty, then gained to the 27, but did not quite make a first down, with the ball going over. The Mounties gained to their 45 and punted to the Lion 19, with the ball being returned to the 31-yard line. Attempting to get off a long pass, the quarterback was smothered, fumbled the ball and the Mounties recovered on the Lion 26-yard line. Horne, McIver, Boyet and Valdez drove to the 4-yard line. On a 4th down try, Horne was pushed out of bounds on the 2-yard line to stop the drive less than a minute before the half. Dublin then ran the clock out with quarterback sneaks, gaining three yards.

The Mounties took the kickoff and returned it 17 yards. Getting a sustained drive underway, all four backs rotated, making three first downs and gaining to the Lion 10-yard line before the drive bogged down. McIver attempted to pass from the 10 but lost back to the 18, then tried a pass that failed to connect, with the Lions taking the ball on their 18. They drove out to the 35, but a penalty put them back to the 19. They picked up five yards, then two pass attempts were smothered and the Lions lost back to their 14 and punted to the Mountaineer 45, with McIver returning to the Lion 48, where he fumbled with the Mounties recovering. Here, one official tried to give the ball to the Lions, which really brought a howl from the Mountaineer fans. However, another official straightened out the mixup and the Mounties drove to the Lion 41 as the quarter ended.

With the score still 0-0, the Mounties failed to make a 4th down effort pay off and the Lions took the ball on their 38-yard line. They gained only 3 yards and punted to the Mountie 17. The Mounties could not gain and got off a short punt to their 46-yard line. The Lions gained 7 yards and fumbled with the Mounties recovering on their 41. The Mounties gained 4 yards and a personal fowl against the Lions increased the gain to the Lion 40. However, 4 plays gained only 7 yards and the Lions took over again. A 15-yard penalty put the Lions back on their 18-yard line. During a time out one of the officials gave the Lions a talking to, that seemed to settle them down and was the down-fall of the Mounties. When play resumed, the Lions connected with a 30-

yard pass, pick up a first down on the ground plays, connected with two short passes, then connected with a 27-yard pass, that put them on the Mountie 10-yard line. On the third play Quarterback Gary Sharp went over on the quarterback sneak for two yards and the only score of the game with 55 seconds remaining. Their try for extra points failed.

The Mounties took the kick-off and returned to the 31-yard line, gained 3 yards on the ground and two pass attempts failed, with the fourth down effort being another pass attempt that was smothered for a loss of 6 yards as the game ended.

Results of Games For Last Week

The Mountaineer's forward wall contained the highly rated Dublin Lions for 46 of the 48-minute game, with the Lions finally managing to get their passing attack working and winning the game 6-0. The Mountaineers drove to scoring position twice, but just could not come up with the final effort to get over the goal line. This was a good defensive game and one that kept the fans on the

Moments later Howe ran 15 yards for another TD, but the extra points run failed. Howe sneaked over from the 2 for the next TD. Then he hit Dennis for another TD that covered 25 yards. Bangs scored in the final quarter. Clyde is now sporting a 2-1 record.

Goldthwaite compiled 824 yards on the ground and in the air to topple Evant 52-6. Most of the Eagle scores came on long gainers. They scored 22 points in the first period, 14 in the second, 10 in the third and 6 in the last. The lone Evant TD came on a 52-yard run following a pass interception. 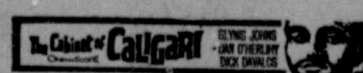
