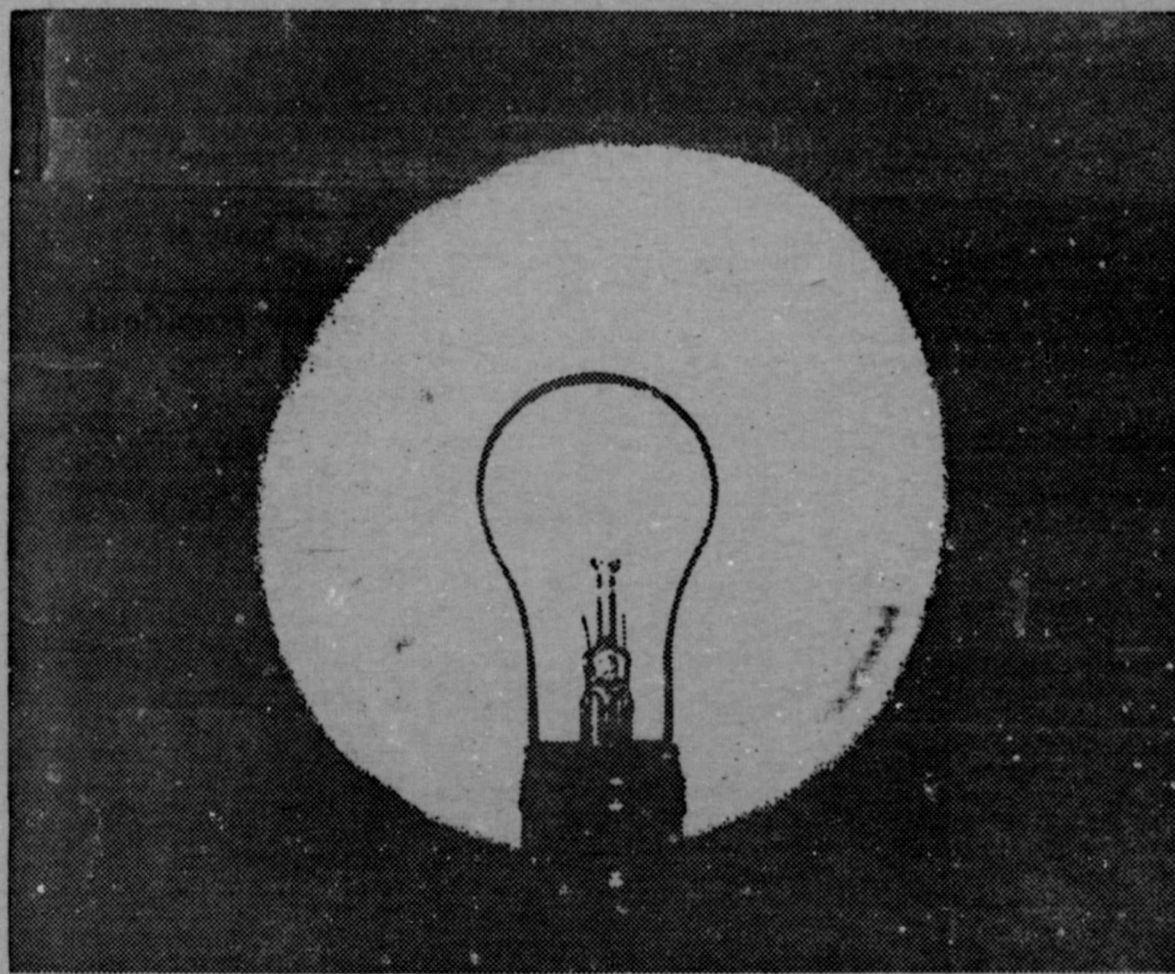

SELECTIVE SEEING

If all the competing senses gave equal attention to every message aimed at it one could easily see the bedlam that would result in the nerve centers of the brain.

If every object in our line of vision or every sound within earshot registered at the same time it would drive us crazy. Fortunately, Mother Nature helps our brain maintain a balance and controls these "messages" as they are received. We learn "selection" and "suppression" in infancy.

Selective seeing is one of the reasons the brain is able to sort out from the many objects in the field, that which is important. The more one learns to be selective in his seeing, the more he will comprehend. People have this art of concentration in varying degrees. Some people can read a book—and comprehend everything in it—while the radio or TV is blaring. These are the people with a high degree of selectivity in seeing and hearing.

This ability may be developed by the individual if we train ourselves. Its benefits are obvious as well as rewarding. If the batter, in a baseball game, paid more attention to the roar of the crowd and the "rhubarbs" of his opponents, instead of watching the oncoming ball, he would not be in his profession long.

Make sure the sense of sight is operating properly from the start by having regular eye examinations. The National Eye Research Foundation advises us to do this every six months.

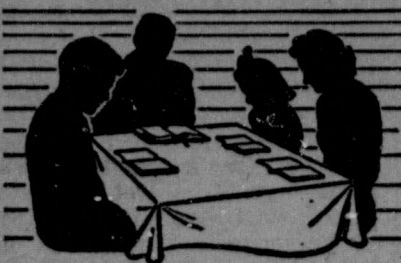

# Mountaineers Take 5th Straight Loss

The Mountaineers showed some signs of improving Friday night, but were still far from top form as they lost to the Copperas Cove Bulldogs 20-14 in the third conference game for Santa Anna and the fourth for the Bulldogs.

The Mounties were without the services of stellar guard, Ronnie Bates, which hurt considerably.

### THE GAME

The Mounties took the kickoff but could not gain a first down and punted, with the Bulldogs taking the ball on their 46-yard line. They drove to the Mountie 19-yard line, but lost back to the 35 on a fourth down pass try. The Mounties were penalized 5 yards, attempted a pass that was intercepted at the 35-yard line. The Bulldogs lost a yard, then using power plays drove all the way to the goal, going over from 3 yards out with 1:07 left in the quarter. The attempted kick for the extra point failed. The Mounties took the kickoff and as the quarter ended they were on their 27-yard line.

The Mounties drove to their 45-yard line and had to punt. The Bulldogs took the ball on their 14 and returned to their 25. Failing to gain a first down, the Bulldogs managed to get off a short punt that was good for only 8 yards with the Mounties getting the ball on the Bulldog 39-yard line. The Mounties drove to the Bulldog 22, lost back to the 27, then gained to the Bulldog 16 with the ball going over on fourth down. The Bulldogs tried one ground play, missed on a long pass and got off another short punt on third down, with the Mounties getting the ball on the Bulldog 36-yard line. The Mounties gained to the Bulldog 19, then lost back to the 29 on a third down pass attempt. On fourth down they executed a real neat double reverse that put them down on the Bulldog 11, where the Bulldogs got a personal foul penalty that put the Mounties on the 6-yard line. Boyet went through left tackle for the TD with 1:05 remaining in the half. McIver kept the ball and rolled out around right end for the 2 extra points.

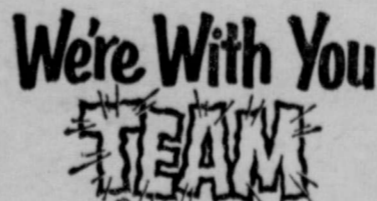

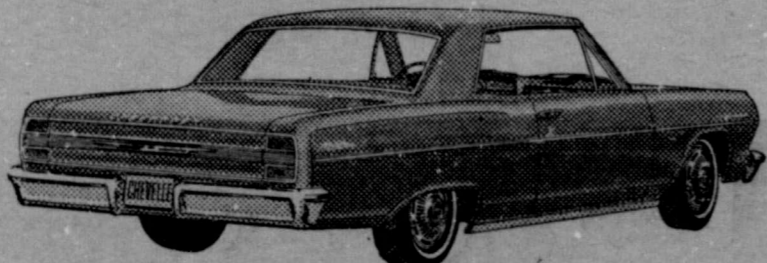
