THE AMERICAN WAY

IN HOLLYWOOD

The Movie Museum, dedicated in Hollywood on October 20, 1963, will house the record of achievements of this glamorous industry. Dedication speeches pledged the revitalization of the movie business.

It will, however take more than passionate resolve to restore Hollywood's one time greatness. It will take OPPORTUNITY — freedom of action and the right to self determination — to fulfill the pledge.

This freedom of action, the opportunity to do and prosper, has been politically removed from the movie industry and from others. Before these industries can be restored to the glory they achieved through the American concept of free opportunity for all, the principle of liberty must be restored. Without it there can be no glory, no greatness, no growth — only the museum memories of what once was.

But how did our concept of opportunity vanish? Was it not when politicians voted themselves the power to dip into the pay envelope of all of us, in any degree whatever, as they themselves might determine? This is the historic method of destroying initiative. It has been properly said that this "power to tax is the power to destroy." The individual income tax has this power.

To further the decline of privately financed picture production, the Federal bureaucrats invaded the business and became the world's greatest movie producer. Why should not this be so? It was our tax dollars which were used for capital, and government agencies are not required to contend with such cost items as interest, rents or taxes at any level, or with losses paid by our dollars. Emphasizing the political domination of the film industry, a federal agency seized the General Aniline Co. in World War II, and refused to return it to its rightful owners for 20 years. This political agency thus became a principle producer of raw film stock, and as such held dominant control of picture production.

Such fantastic controls and penalties upon the movie industry caused producers to look elsewhere for opportunity, and they found foreign governments, made fat with American "foreign aid" dollars, most anxious to transport movie production and jobs from the United States to their own lands.

To assist the flight of American industry to other lands, our tax dollars were again employed by the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD) to help induce American producers, including movie producers, to move to foreign fields. Various political pressures, subsidies, guarantees and immunities were offered.

As a result more than half of our motion pictures are being produced in foreign countries — and this includes all the big ones. The blight which has descended upon Hollywood, as it has upon other industrial centers, provided the incentive for the impassioned pleas to restore the productivity of Hollywood.

As prologue to the dedication of the Movie Museum, a group called "government trade and labor experts" advanced the idea that the "elimination of foreign film subsidies" might provide a "partial cure for Hollywood's problems."

Actually, such an approach does not constitute a cure. It is but a sop to an industry dying of political strangulation. The only possible way to rejuvenate the American movie industry, or any other industry, is to restore its freedom of action — its opportunities.

To restore these virtues to industry and to people, they must be retrieved from government. This is the purpose of the LIBERTY AMENDMENT, pending in Congress as H. J. Res. 23 and already approved by six States. Dr. No-Yong Park, an authority on the affairs of the Far East, will be at the high school auditorium at 10:30 a. m. Wednesday, Nov. 13. Price of admission will be 25 cents and the public is cordially invited to attend. This is one of the series of Southern School Assemblies programs, sponsored by the Student Council.

Now an American citizen, Dr. Park was born and reared in Manchuria and received his education in Asia, Europe and America. He holds a Bachelor of Arts degree from the University of Minnesota, and M. A. and Ph. D. from Harvard University. While in College, he won many literary and oratorical prizes in competition with our American students in their own language.

He has taught at many of our leading universities and colleges and has written a number of outstanding books, some of which were highly recommended by the Book-of-the-Month Club and literary critics throughout the world. He is one of the very few Oriental writers and lecturers who has been honored by Freedoms Foundation at Valley Forge for an outstanding achievement in bringing about a better understanding and appreciation of our American way of life.

For more than a decade, Dr. Park served as a special lecturer on Far Eastern affairs at the Institute of International Understanding under the auspices of Rotary International and the Department of Concerts and Lectures of the University of Minnesota.

He has criss-crossed this continent for over a quarter of a century lecturing for The Associated Clubs, composed of Executives Dinner Clubs and Knife and Fork Clubs International. Above all, he has inspired and stirred millions of our young people throughout the country with his challenging and stimulating lectures.

It seems at this point the Eagles will be the undisputed district champions, with Copperas Cove being in second place, losing only to the Eagles. Marble Falls will likely be in third place. The last four places will be determined in the other games this and next week.

Wool Sewing Contest To Be Held In San Angelo

The District 4 "Make It Yourself with Wool" contest will be held December 14 on the campus of San Angelo College. District 4 is made up of eleven counties including Brown, Coke, Coleman, Comanche, Concho, Glasscock, Irion, Reagan, Runnels, Sterling, and Tom Green.

The "Make It Yourself with Wool" home-sewing contest is sponsored by the American Wool Council in cooperation with the Women's Auxiliary of the American Sheep Producers Council.

All the work must be done by the contestant, and the garment must be made of 100% wool fabric which is knitted, felted, or loomed in America. Each contestant must model her garment.

Sub-debs, 13 year old girls, may make an all-wool skirt, skirt with sleeveless jacket, or jumper. Juniors, 14-17, seniors, 18-21, and adults may make an all-wool dress, suit, coat, or ensemble.

The winners of the district contest will participate in the state contest which will be on the campus of San Angelo College on January 11, and the junior and senior winners at state will represent Texas at the national contest in Albuquerque, New Mexico, January 20, 1964.

There will be attractive prizes given at district, state and national levels. A tour of the Caribbean, college scholarships, savings bonds sewing machines, wool fabrics, sewing equipment, patterns, and fashion publications are listed among the awards.

Mrs. S. M. Harvick, Ozona, is the Texas contest director. Mrs. Percy J. Pace, Head of the Department of Home Economics at San Angelo College, is the District 4 director. The District 4 coordinator is Mrs. Rushing Sheffield. Publicity director is Mrs. X. B. Contract Awarded On Glen Cove Telephone Lines

The Coleman County Telephone Cooperative, Inc., awarded a \$59,153.98 contract to the Brooks Construction Co. of Shawnee, Okla. Tuesday afternoon. The company is to install all the new telephone lines in the Glen Cove area, which will become a part of the operation of the Telephone Cooperative when completed.

This will be a new type construction for this area. All the lines will be underground. This will reduce the maintenance costs of the lines and will avoid ice storms, lightning, etc.

A new telephone exchange is in the process of construction in the Valera area and Glen Cove will be operated from that exchange.

The contractor has 60 days to begin construction and 45 days to complete the contract after work begins. It is not known at this time just when construction will get underway.

MIS-LABELING OF MOHAIR content in apparel products being sold in retail stores is now under scrutiny before the Federal Trade Commission and the Commissioner of Customs. Last week a mis-labeling racket was exposed when I revealed that 14 sweaters were purchased at random at leading stores in New York, then tested and found to contain only a fraction of the mohair which their labels indicated.

These sweaters were among one million imported from Italy, then put on the market with false labels of the amount of mohair each contained. This practice downgrades mohair because purchasers who become dissatisfied with the garment would naturally blame the complaint on the failure of the mohair in the purchase to uphold its traditional quality, and would do serious harm to the reputation mohair has acquired.

The retail stores that sell these sweaters have indicated surprise and a willingness to remedy the mistake. In the meantime, The Federal Trade Commission is expected to order additional tests and then take appropriate steps to clamp down on this type of fraud and deception.

A personal fowl midway in the first period caused the ball to be placed on the Bulldog 40-yard line, when it would have been on the Bulldog 14 if it had not been for the penalty. In the third period two penalties hurt very badly. The Mounties had the Bulldogs bogged down near the Mountie 30-yard line and on a 4th down effort that would have dropped the Bulldogs back to the 32-yard line and gave the Mounties possession, one of the Santa Anna boys grabbed a face guard and the 15-yard penalty put the Bulldogs on the Mountie 16-yard line with a first down. The Bulldogs went on to score their first TD from that point. Later in the same period a clipping penalty on a punt return put the Mounties deep in their own territory, on the 10-yard line, but the ball would have been near the 50-yard line if it had not been for the infraction.

Everything looked good for the Mounties at halftime though, as they had a 12-0 lead, but the Bulldogs came out with determination in their minds for the second half and they controlled the game from then on, until the last minute, when a determined effort took the Mounties from their 43-yard line to the Bulldog 25, but their first field goal try for the year was unsuccessful and the game ended in a 12-12 tie.

THE GAME

The Mounties took the kickoff on their 16, returned to their 31. It just took six plays for the Mounties to cover the 69 yards to pay dirt with Horne going in from the 1-yard line. Try for extra points failed. The Bulldogs took the kickoff on their 13 and returned to their 30. They fumbled on second down with the Mounties recovering on the 41-yard line. After making a first down on the 26, a penalty put the Mounties back on the 40, then a big loss and a fumble gave the Bulldogs the ball on the Mountie 46-yard line. second period, the Mounties went on to pay dirt with McIver going the final 3 yards on a keeper around left end. The try for extra points failed and the Mounties had a 12-0 lead with 7:38 left in the half. The Bulldogs took the kickoff on their 5, returned to their 25. Still attempting to go the passing route, the Bulldogs failed to gain, but lost back to their 16-yard line and punted out to their 44. The Mounties failed to gain a first down and punted, with the ball going into the end zone.

At this point the officials made a ruling that baffled most everyone on the field. A Santa

Anna lad touched the ball on the 6-yard line and most everyone was of the opinion that the ball was dead right there. The Bulldogs took the ball on the 20, but could not gain a first down, then punted to the 50-yard line. A holding penalty put the Mounties back on the 40-yard line, a pass failed, then the Mounties lost 2 yards and punted to the Bulldog 21-yard line with a return to the 26. A 5-yard penalty put the Bulldogs back on their 21. A pass failed, then the Bulldogs lost back to their 16 and tried

two more passes with the second one being completed, but not for enough for a first down and the Mounties took over with just time for one play in the half. Horne gained 5 yards as the first half ended.

With fire in their eyes, the Bulldogs took the kickoff on their 14-yard line and returned to the Mountie 49-yard line. They gained a first down, picked up 4 yards, lost 5, then gained 8, to the 27. Attempting a fourth down play, the Mounties had the ball carried down on the 32, but a 15-yard penalty (face guard) put the Bulldogs on the Mountie 16-yard line with a first down. It took the Bulldogs four plays to cross the double stripe to pay dirt, with the quarterback going the final 2 yards on a keeper. They attempted to kick the extra point, but failed.

The Mounties took the kickoff on their 22, returned to their 37, but could not gain a first down, then punted to the Bulldog 29-yard line. A 5-yard

penalty put the Bulldogs back on their 24, then they gained out to their 33 and punted to the Mountie 25, with McIver returning to near the 50-yard line, but a clipping penalty put the Mounties back on their 10-yard line.
