THE ROAD TO WEALTH IS PAVED WITH GOOD SERVICE

One of the blessings of the free enterprise system is the incentive to acquire wealth. Every man — even if born in poverty — can hope to be a millionaire.

Yet, today, we have somehow discredited wealth — and made it appear to be the product of evil doing. In truth, the acquisition of wealth should be a badge of merit. Here's why:

Free Choice

In a free enterprise economy, people buy products and services because they want to — not because the government has forced them to. Everyone has the right to dispose of his property in the way that he desires.

This means that in order to make money, you must offer a product or service people really want. The more you satisfy the real desires of the people, the more money you'll make.

Your ability to acquire wealth depends upon your satisfying the wants of others. In other words, wealth is a measure of the service you give. The more service, the more wealth.

Why do people resent the wealth of others? A man like Henry Ford should be honored for providing low-cost automobiles for America — instead of being despised for acquiring a billion dollars. Would it have been better to keep Henry Ford poor — and thus prevent all but the very rich from having cars?

Why be afraid that someone will make money at something? We should be hoping they do — because of the service they will have to give the world to achieve it.

To Keep It

And once wealth is acquired, the same concept of service remains. To be enjoyed, wealth must be distributed.

If you make a million dollars, you have to do something with it. Bury it in the back yard and it'll be worthless to you. But if you go out and spend it, you'll be distributing it to others in exchange for the things you want.

Even if you put it in the bank — or in any form of investment — it will help to create jobs, produce products that people want, and raise the standard of living. In fact your wealth will earn interest in direct ratio to the amount of service it provides your fellow man.

If your money is to be of value to you, it must be employed in a way that will serve others. There's no way to avoid that ironclad rule.

So why be afraid of wealth? We should avidly seek it — and should understand the process by which others have acquired it.

But we must remember that these rules apply only in a free economy. Wherever government enters the picture — as it has in hundreds of areas today — the concept of service is discarded and we are forced to spend money on items we wouldn't voluntarily support.

Key

Do you want wealth? Then find the best way to be of service to your fellow man. This applies whether you are employer, employee, professional man, stockholder — anyone in any position.

And to help us all benefit, we should get the government out of our economic affairs — so the concept of service will be absolute.

Eleven Boys To Play Final Football Game Here Friday Night, 8:00 P. M.

The Longhorns from Early High School will visit Santa Anna Friday night for the final game of the season for both the Mountaineers and the Longhorns. The outcome of the game will determine whether Santa Anna and Burnet will tie for fourth place in the district and leave Early in sixth place or put Early in fourth place, Burnet in fifth place and the Mounties in sixth place. Bangs is bound to wind up in the cellar.

If the Mounties win the game they will have sole possession of fourth place in the season standing, with Burnet, Early and Bangs finishing in that order below the Mounties. If Early wins, Santa Anna, Burnet and Early will be tied for fourth place.

Thus, it would be nice if the Mountaineers can win this final game of the year. And, we feel, they are plenty capable of doing so. But it will have to be a team effort and not a one-man show. Every boy on the team is urged to put forth that extra little effort on every down for this final game. You will always be glad you did.

The Longhorns have won two games this year. They won over Bangs 22-0 and Richland Springs 22-12. They had a 0-0 tie with Jim Ned. They lost to Dublin 52-0; Copperas Cove 35-0; Burnet 42-24; Rising Star 19-14; Goldthwaite 44-6; and Marble Falls 14-6. They have scored 94 points this season, 58 of them being in conference play and given up 218 points, 129 of them in conference play. The Mounties have scored 84 points this year, 56 in conference play and given up 143 points, with 111 being in conference play.

Poll Tax Stays

Only one of the four amendments voted on the past Saturday received the approval of the voters over the state. That was No. 2 on the ballot, to allow more money for the needy aged, blind and disabled persons.

The Poll Tax amendment was soundly defeated in the county and in the state. Santa Anna voted 152 to retain the poll tax to 41 for repeal. The county voted 783 to retain the tax to 247 for repeal.

Good Rains Here

About two inches of rain fell in Santa Anna Friday of last week. It was pretty general all over the county. Some places report about 1½ inches to more than 2 inches.

The rain fell slow enough that most of it soaked in the parched ground. Very little stock water was caught in any area that we know of. More rain is badly needed by all the farmers and ranchers.

Henry Campbell Buried Monday

Funeral services for Henry Campbell, 96, were held in the Seventh-day Adventist Church at 2:00 p. m. Monday. Mr. Campbell died in Milan, Tennessee on Friday, following a lengthy illness. Burial was in the Santa Anna Cemetery under direction of Hosch Funeral Home.

Mr. Campbell was born in Burnet County Feb. 12, 1867. He lived in Santa Anna for many years and owned three farms in this area. Soon after his wife died in 1951 he went to Tennessee to make his home with his son, Dr. Thomas H. Campbell. He was a member of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church and was largely responsible for the Cumberland Presbyterian Church being built in Santa Anna. This building is now the Seventh-day Adventist Church.

Survivors include one son, Dr. Thomas H. Campbell of McKenzie, Tennessee; four grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

Officiating ministers were Rev. James Gilbert of the Trinity Cumberland Presbyterian Church in Fort Worth, Rev. S. R. Estes, pastor of the Bowie Cumberland Presbyterian Church in Fort Worth and Rev. Bobby Weathers, pastor of the Santa Anna Methodist Church. Pallbearers were Dick Baugh, Norval Wylie, P. E. Snook, Henry Newman, Calvin Campbell and O. L. Cheaney.

Dublin beat Early 52-0, then just barely beat Santa Anna 6-0. On the other side of the ledger, Marble Falls beat Santa Anna 22-0, then just barely won over Early 14-6. Comparing all the other scores, the game could go either way — it just depends on the determination of the Mountaineers. We all know the Longhorns are going to be determined to win this game.

The game will be played at Mountaineers Stadium at 8:00 p. m. Admission prices will be \$1.00 for adults and 25 cents for students.

Mountaineers Take 30-6 Win Over Bangs

The Mountaineers kept their drive in high gear all through the game Friday night and came home with a 30-6 win over the Bangs Dragons. The game was played on a wet field, but it did not apparently have any effect on the outcome of the game. No rain fell during the game, but a strong wind from the east hampered both teams through the first three quarters. It died down during the final quarter.

THE GAME

The Mounties took the kickoff and returned to their 24-yard line. They made a first down and drove on to the 50-yard line where a fumble was recovered by Bangs. The Dragons made 2 first downs, driving to the Santa Anna 10-yard line, but were held for downs there and the ball went over. Getting a sustained drive underway, the Mounties drove the 90 yards to pay dirt with 1:41 left in the quarter. Horne went the final 22 yards. Try for extra points was missed and the Mounties led 6-0 at the end of the quarter.

The Dragons took the kickoff and returned to their 38-yard line, drove to the 45 and lost back to their 43 and punted to the Mountie 42-yard line. The Mounties gained to the 47, lost a yard and Horne took the hand off from McIver and raced 52 yards, to the Dragon 2-yard line. Boyet went through right tackle for the TD with 10:58 remaining in the quarter. The pass try for extra points failed.

The Dragons' Jimmy Rust took the kickoff, momentarily fumbled it, then twisted and turned his way from the 6-yard line to the 40-yard line. Rust failed to gain on the first down, but on second down he broke into the clear just after crossing the line of scrimmage and went the 60 yards to pay dirt with no one close to him. It just took 58 second for the Dragons to score this TD, but they failed to make their extra points.

The Mounties took the kickoff on their 30 and returned to the 44. Getting another sustained drive underway, the Mounties drove to the Dragon 4-yard line and Horne went through left guard for the TD. Try for extra points failed, but the Mounties had a 18-6 lead.

The Dragons took the kickoff to their 23-yard line, lost a yard, then gained out to almost their 33. Lacking just inches for a first down, the Dragons decided to risk the fourth down but failed to make

it. The Mounties took possession of the ball on the Dragon 32 and drove to the Dragon 5. Horne went into pay territory, but the TD was called back for an infraction and the Mounties were penalized 5 yards. On the next play they lost back to the Bangs 11-yard line with the ball going over. With just seconds left in the half, the Dragons got off one play as time run out.

The third period was scoreless, with both teams having a bad time. The Dragons took the kickoff and returned to their 29. They drove to their 37 and on a punt formation, a Santa Anna lad jumped off side, giving

the Dragons a first down. The Dragons drove to their 48-yard line and fumbled with the Mounties recovering. The Mounties made a first down with the help of a 5-yard penalty, but could not gain any more and punted to the Dragon 22-yard line. The Dragons gained to their 37 and got off a short 5-yard punt. The Mounties drove to the Dragon 7-yard line as the quarter ended.

On a fourth down try, the Mounties gained a yard, but the ball went over. The Dragons were penalized 3 yards on a personal foul, then gained out to the 11-yard line and on the next play picked up nice yardage, but another infraction at the 14-yard line caused them to be penalized 7 yards, back to their 7-yard line. They gained a yard and punted to their 46-yard line with the Mounties returning to the Dragon 26. On first down and behind good blocking, Horne went the 28 yards to pay dirt, with 9:27 left in the quarter. The pass try for

extra points failed. The Dragons took the kickoff on their 7 and returned to their 21, but could not gain a yard in three tries and punted to their 42-yard line. The Mounties returned to the Dragon 27. Attempting the passing route, but not getting any protection, the Mounties lost back to the Dragons 43 on two tries. McIver connected with Horne on a screen pass that went to the 30-yard line. The Mounties pulled a fancy play for the first down. McIver handed to Cullins, who handed to Horne and Horne passed to McIver and it was good for the first down on the Dragon 15-yard line. The Mounties gained a yard, then suffered a 15-yard penalty, back to the 22-yard line. One pass failed, they gained 2 yards, then Horne took a pass and went to the 4-yard line. They lost back to the 9, gained to the 4 and Horne went into the end zone for the final TD. They attempted to kick the extra point, but failed.

The Dragons took the kickoff on their 11 and went to their 21. They gained a yard, then lost back to their 15, connected with a pass to their 21 and punted to their 46-yard line. The Mounties tried 2 passes and on the last play of the game lost 4 yards.
