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TIME	PLACE
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Austin — U. S. Supreme Court says the present line-up of congressional districts is unconstitutional. But the day for redistricting still is far away, according to Gov. John Connally and Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr.

Texas' 22 Congressional districts have the greatest variance in size of any state, ranging from 214,000 to 980,000 population. This, the high court said, is not fair and it must be corrected.

Because the 1964 elections already are under way the Supreme Court allowed Texas 30 days in which to ask a three-judge Federal court in Houston

to delay the effectiveness of the order.

Governor Connally is sure the court will recognize the fact that absentee voting will begin on April 12 and that filing deadlines already have passed.

He insists that the major legislative surgery required cannot be done in a 30-day special session of the Legislature and should be left to the regular 140-day session which starts January 12. He felt the Court would agree that it now is too late to redistrict for 1964 elections.

TRAINS GOING

Passenger trains continue to disappear from the Texas scene. Latest moves are by the Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific Railway Co. and the Fort Worth & Denver Railway.

They want to do away with the Fort Worth to Houston run of the Twin Star Rocket.

Texas Railroad Commission will hear this proposal on May 12 in the Dallas City Hall.

SALT WATER

Texas Water Pollution Control Board agreed, after three public hearings, to outlaw the use of unlined surface pits for disposal of oilfield salt water in eight South Plains Counties.

Oil and gas operators were given until September 1, to make other arrangements for disposal of their brine. Water-users in the area, which contains the greatest irrigation section in Texas, had complained that the oilfield salt water was seeping into the fresh water strata known as the Ogallala formation.

Covered by the no-pit order are Bailey, Cochran, Dawson, Hale, Hockley, Lynn, Swisher and Terry Counties.

COURT SPEAKS

Texas Supreme Court, in a decision with far-reaching consequences, has ruled that holders of paid political office are ineligible to run for the Legislature during their present terms.

Specifically, the Court ordered the Taylor County Democratic Committee to remove the name of 104th Dist. Atty. Tom

Todd from the ballot as a legislative candidate.

State Democratic Committee Secretary Frank Erwin Jr. said copies of the opinion will be sent to all county chairmen for their guidance. Erwin earlier had advised of the ineligibility of paid officials to run for the Legislature.

Supreme Court also ordered a new trial in a case hanging on the question of whether newspaper carriers are independent merchants or employees of the publishing company.

Suit was brought by Gerald Witt Love against Newspapers, Inc., and C. E. Cargile, contract carrier for the newspapers, following an auto collision. Lower courts found for Love. However, the new decision held the independent contractor issue had been improperly submitted to the jury. Earlier decisions have supported the position that a newspaperboy or carrier is an independent agent and not an employee of the publication.

In other action the Supreme Court:

...Held a legislative act cannot be nullified by a state agency's regulations. Case involved coastal fishermen absolved of violating an agency order outlawing net fishing in the Chambers County part of Galveston Bay.

...For the second time refused to accept a mandamus petition aimed at keeping all who saw telecasts of the slaying of Lee Harvey Oswald off the Jack Ruby murder trial jury.

...Reversed lower courts and ruled that a physician hired part-time as a company doctor is not an employee of the company.

SUPER-AGENCY BACKED

Governor Connally's Committee on Education Beyond the High School will recommend that the Legislature set up an 18-member state coordinating agency with jurisdiction over both junior and senior colleges and universities, says Chairman H. B. Zachry.

Committee has been under fire from state capitol newsmen for holding closed-door sessions. Zachry defended the policy but hinted that reporters will be allowed in on at least part of future meetings.

TEACHING STANDARDS APPROVED

Texas Board of Education ap-

proved new standards for training of school teachers and administrators and a special in-service training linguistics course to help teachers teach students to express themselves better.

Minimum foundation school program costs were pegged at \$555,000,000; the 1964-65 local fund assignment (local school district share) at \$111,000,000.

A pilot program of concentrated study for migrant students now operating in Edinburg, McAllen, Pharr-San Juan-Alamo, Weslaco and San Benito will be expanded to 10 districts next fall.

Board members approved a request to dissolve the Liberty County Junior College District, dormant since its creation in 1958.

SHORT SNORTS

Governor Connally used some of his constitutional money-spending authority to allocate \$2,350 to pay National Guard troops called to active duty on February 4 during the Panhandle blizzard.

Dr. Dorman H. Winfrey of the Texas State Library reports that 42 Texas cities spent \$13,100,000 on library construction during 1963.

State Selective Service Director Morris Schwartz said Texas' draft call in April will be 449, against March's 610.

Texas Industrial Commission's short courses on local industrial attraction, called Texas Industrial Planning Seminars or TIPS, are becoming so popular that the commission's director, Harry W. Clark, has scheduled three a week throughout the month of April and May.

Air Pollution Control Association gave the State Department of Health a certificate of award for its work in educating Texans as to the need for prevention of air pollution.

Governor Connally named Thomas F. Anderson, operations manager of the Alcoa plant at Point Comfort, as manufacturers' representative on the Texas Water Pollution Control Board

to replace C. M. Shigley of Dow Chemical Company, Freeport, who resigned.

San Antonio will be the site of the Southern Governors Conference from October 10 to 14.

Kuyk Logan, city editor of the Oklahoma City Oklahoman, has resigned that position to become publicity director for Don Yarborough's campaign for governor.

State Banking Board approved a charter for Quinlan State Bank in Hunt County, accepted applications for Yorktown Community Bank and Expressway Bank and Trust of Dallas. Guaranty Bank of Lubbock application was withdrawn.

Texas farmers and ranchers received less for their products in mid-February than in January, United States Department of Agriculture reported.

Texas business activity index rose to a new all-time high during the first month of 1964, University of Texas Bureau of Business Research statisticians reported.

W. G. Wally Jr. of Beaumont and James F. Parker of Kountze were the only two candidates filed as Democratic candidates

for judge of the Beaumont Court of Civil Appeals at the end of the extended filing deadline.

More Turkeys For Piney Woods

Tyler — Eight more eastern wild turkeys were flown from southern Florida to Texas for release in northwest Tyler County, according to J. Weldon Watson, executive director of the Parks and Wildlife Department.

"This brings our season's release total to 25 of these fine game birds which we hope will do well in our piney woods counties," said Watson.

The turkeys, two adult males, four adult females and two sub-adult hens, have both Florida and Texas bands on their legs to aid in future identification.

F. W. Neujahr, chief pilot for the Florida Game and Fish Commission, delivered the live cargo to Charles E. Boyd, Parks and Wildlife Department biologist, for release late in the afternoon on January 28.

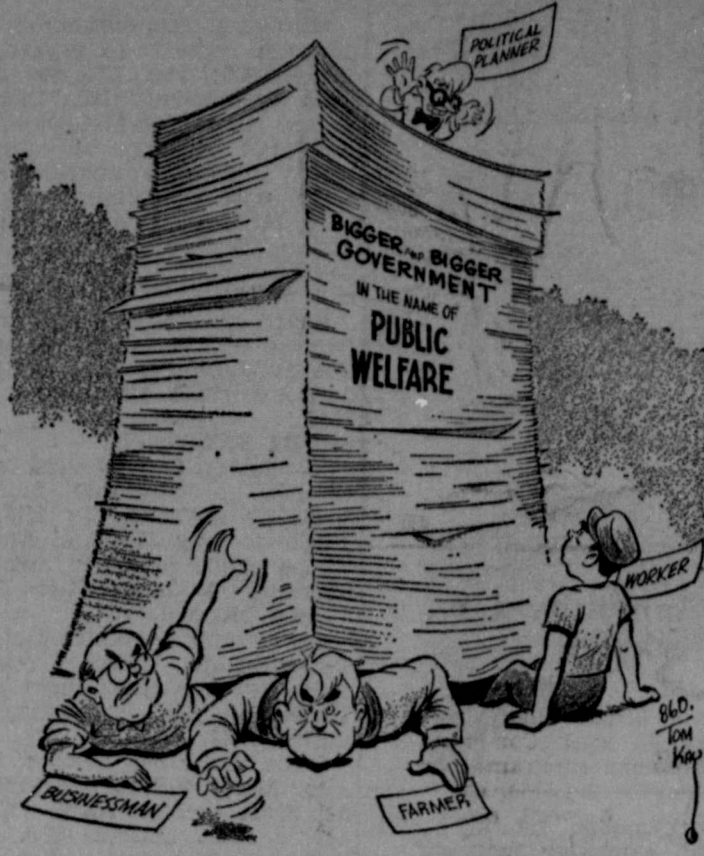

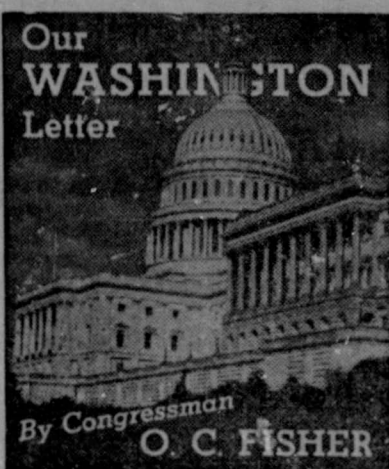

Fertilizing Grain Sorghum Pays

College Station — Fertilization of grain sorghum has paid dividends for the past six years at the Blackland Experiment Station at Temple, according to Dr. E. D. Cook, station agronomist.

On the Houston Black Clay soils, continuous cropping of grain sorghum has shown little increase in yields from phosphorus alone, he says. Nitrogen alone gave some increase in yields but the greatest increase was produced with a combination of nitrogen and phosphorus. Thirty pounds each of phosphorus and nitrogen increased yields about 700 pounds per acre, while an additional 30 pounds of each element gave 200 more pounds of grain. This last 30 pounds of each fertilizer element was just about paid for by this increase in yield, says Dr. Cook.

Results of fertilization were even more pronounced at Hillsboro on Houston soils, says the agronomist. In these tests 30 pounds of nitrogen and phosphorus gave 1,400 pounds additional yield, and another 30 pounds of these two elements produced 500 more pounds per acre.

At Hillsboro increased yield from fertilization of grain sorghum following cotton was not as large as that from sorghum following sorghum.

In other studies conducted at Temple it was shown that the source of nitrogen used on grain sorghum had little to do with yields of the crop, says Dr. Cook. Ammonium nitrate, anhydrous ammonia and urea were found to be about equally good in the tests. Also the time of application of fertilizer had little or no effect on grain yields, but early application is best from the standpoint of land preparation, he says.

Checking Returns

District Director of Internal Revenue, Ellis Campbell Jr., said that the percentage of correctly prepared returns has increased sharply in the past few years, but numerous simple mistakes continue to show up.

Mr. Campbell said: "The best advice we can give on filing a return is when you complete it, resist the temptation to put it in the mail right away. Set it aside for a day or two, then give it a thorough review for omitted income or deductions, errors in arithmetic, printed name and current address, social security number, correct copies of W-2's, signatures."

Quite often, Mr. Campbell pointed out, the taxpayer will find that a review of his return will turn up mistakes he did not notice previously. "It's human nature to want to put the return in the mail immediately," he said, "but a careful review by the taxpayer now may prevent delays in processing your return or the issuance of a tax refund check or savings bond."

Mobile Feed Milling Studied

College Station — With the growing demand for custom milling of feed grain in Texas, mobile feed mills are becoming popular. Custom milling, which involves grinding the farmer's own grain and mixing it with balanced concentrates, has increased greatly since 1939.

A new aspect was added to the custom milling of grain with the advent of the mobile mill. With this complete processing unit mounted on a large truck, grain and roughage can be ground, feed concentrates mixed and molasses blended right on the farm.

The first mobile feed mill operation was established in Texas in 1955, according to MP-689, "An Analysis of Mobile

Feed Milling Operations in Texas." The new publication of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station says that by 1961 the number had jumped to 75. Even with this tremendous expansion, many farmers, feeders and agribusinessmen are not familiar with the mobile mill and the service it provides. Therefore, the publication was prepared to acquaint them with such mills.

MP-689 contains sections describing mobile feed mills, factors to consider in establishing a mobile operation, operational policies and practices and operational expenses and receipts. Income and cost analysis data is also cited in the publication. For a copy of MP-689, write the Department of Agricultural Information, Texas A&M University, College Station, Texas.

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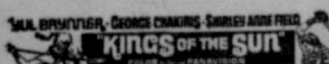

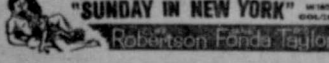

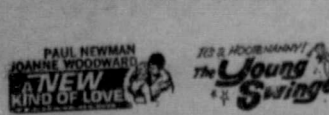
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
