PERVERSION OF THE LAW CAUSES CAUTION

Want the key to anything terrible that lies ahead for the United States and the world? It is locked tight in these words, "I don't want to become involved."

In these simple words, respectable "citizens" have explained their conduct of a few weeks ago, when a woman was harassed and finally killed by a persistent murderer. The woman was followed home late at night by a man who stabbed her. She cried for help, lights went on, the man fled. No help came, no one called the police. Then he returned to the wounded woman, and stabbed her again. Her cries were noticed again, but unheeded. He returned the third time, stabbed her fatally, and she died because the neighbors "didn't want to become involved."

This is a remarkable story, to be sure, but it is not simply a case of let George do it. It is the result of years of twisting of the law, chiseling, stupid legal decisions, codding of criminals, selling of influence, and of unjust damage suits. Closely associated with it is the case of the doctor — or any citizen, for that matter — who dares not stop to render aid at the scene of an accident, lest he be sued later by the "grateful" victim or his survivors.

Before you condemn the good people of Queens for not doing what was an obvious requirement of any human being, put yourself in their shoes. Are you ready to become involved in a possible domestic hassle? Are you ready to risk possible personal injury to interfere in a private quarrel? Do you care if the ruckus outside your door spreads into a riot? Can you be sure that the cries for help aren't really designed to lure someone outside for purposes of robbery or murder? Are you ready to defend yourself against false charges? Better against: Let him who is without fault, cast the first stone.

The answer lies in greater individual responsibility. When the victim cried out in Queens, a single person could have summoned the police. Or a handful of responsible citizens could have corrected the situation. No clear-cut condemnation can be made, however, without a careful check of police records; what happened the last time a citizen of Queens tried to render aid?

The 38 persons who stood by as a woman died will never forget the experience. Let's hope they realize the lesson to be learned, and apply their newfound knowledge to the daily problems that arise in the serious business of being a decent citizen of the greatest country on earth.

Valuable Rain Falls Monday

Good rains fell throughout the Central Texas area of the state Monday night and early Tuesday morning. Official measurement at the Coleman Gas Company office was 1.85 inches. Reports from other parts of the city indicate that as much as 2½ inches fell right here in town.

Down in the Trickham-Whom area the rains were somewhat lighter than at other points, but they received more than an inch, which is an excellent rain for that area. More than 5 inches fell in the Lake Brownwood area, and some reports indicate that more than 6 inches fell in the Talpa area.

So far as the value of the rain, it would be impossible to estimate it. All the small grain crops were beginning to suffer from lack of water. Pastures and other farm land was also suffering. A good general rain like this does all the country a lot of good.

Predictions are that there is a good possibility for more rain before The News is put in the mails Thursday morning.

Two Car Wrecks Here During The Weekend

Two automobile accidents happened in the Santa Anna area during the weekend. The first accident happened late Friday afternoon near the Williams Fruit Stand, when Mrs. California Gray was in a collision with a Brownwood car. No injuries were reported and damage to both cars was light.

Sunday afternoon, about 5:00 p. m. Jack Bates was in a collision with a Ballinger car just inside the east City Limits. Damage to both cars was heavy, with the Bates car being damaged almost as much as the value of the car.

Some of the Ballinger folks were shook up, but were not considered seriously injured at the time of the accident.

Both accidents were investigated by City Marshal M. R. Simmons and the Texas Highway Patrol, Al Chambers and Jake Petzold.

Changes To Be Made In P. O. Window Service

The limited adjustments in some postal services ordered in Washington March 10 by Postmaster General John A. Gronouski to save \$12.7 million will begin to take effect in Santa Anna and other cities May 4, 1964, Acting Postmaster John C. Gregg, said today.

Mr. Gregg said service changes planned locally include four hour window service on Saturdays. Only one consolidated stamp and parcel post window will be open, from 8:00 a. m. to 12:00 noon. Registry and COD services will be available at the consolidated window.

Domestic and international money orders will NOT be issued and all money order windows will be closed. Rural and star route carriers who provide rural features, will not accept money order applications on Saturdays. All postal savings business will be suspended on Saturdays.

General delivery service will be provided at the combination window. Delivery of parcel post will be at the combination window also.

The Postmaster General instructed that there will be no after hours window service on any day of the week. Windows are open weekdays from 8:00 a. m. to 5:30 p. m. and patrons are urged to transact as much of their postal business during the weeks as possible.

The Postmaster emphasized that no essential major services are affected under this order. There will be no change in the manner in which local mail is handled, other than the above-mentioned services. Letters and other first-class mail will be handled with the same priority as ever.

The economy step, Mr. Gregg explained, is in line with President Johnson's programs under which the recent Federal income tax cut was provided. It has nothing to do with his recent appointment as Acting Postmaster, but has been ordered for all post offices throughout the country.

State Capitol NEWS

Austin — Texans will have ample opportunity to give their views on how the state should be divided into 23 congressional districts of equal population.

A seven-member study group of Texas Legislative Council (research arm of the Legislature) plans to begin extensive hearings over the state soon after the May 2 primaries.

Congressmen and party officers already have been invited to make suggestions as to how districts should be drawn with approximately 416,000 population each.

U. S. Supreme Court has supported a Houston federal court ruling that the districts must be formed to provide "equal representation for equal numbers of people" as nearly as possible. The Houston court on April 1 agreed that the Legislature should have a chance to do the

job in regular session of 1965.

Sen. George Moffett of Chillicothe, senior member of the Legislature in point of service, heads the study committee which will conduct the hearings. Other members are Sen. Abraham Kazen Jr. of Laredo, and Reps. Paul Floyd of Houston, Tommy Shannon of Fort Worth, Wayne Gibbens of Breckenridge, Richard C. Slack of Pecos and G. F. Mutscher of Brenham.

Gov. John Connally praised Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr for his representation of the state during the redistricting case. He said work of Carr and his assistants made it possible for the state to "hold our 1964 congressional elections without the requirement of a special session or at-large (statewide congressional) races."

COURT REFORMS
U. S. Supreme Court Justice Tom Clark came to Austin for the Texas Conference on Judicial Selection, Tenure and Administration, sponsored by the State Bar of Texas.

Two hundred and fifty lawyers, judges and laymen talked about how to improve the

judicial system. Court organization and administration, and judicial selection, tenure, retirement, discipline and removal were discussed. Lawyers and judges from a dozen other states where court reforms have been enacted participated.

AGING
Governor Connally revealed that 1,400 of the 3,500 senile patients in state mental hospitals have been moved to private nursing homes in the last year.

He told his Committee on Aging that this is one method being used to better the lot of older, ill persons. Many have been sent to mental hospitals because there was no place else for them to go. But under the new Federal-state program of paying nursing home costs of the ailing aged, those not really mentally ill can be taken out of the state hospitals.

He urged the committee, headed by Sen. Walter Richter of Gonzales, to find further ways of bettering the lot of older Texans.

HIGHER EDUCATION
Texas Commission on Higher Education allocated \$3,980,000 in appropriations to meet student enrollment increases in the 20 state-supported senior colleges for the coming school year.

At the same time, the Commission took a step toward higher standards in the state colleges when it moved to abolish state financial support for "questionable" or "frill" college courses, including:

1. Courses not counted toward graduation requirements;
 2. Tour or travel courses;
 3. Certain "work experience" courses;
 4. Dramatic and forensic activities not in regularly organized classes;
 5. Courses devoted exclusively to learning operation of one or two simple business machines;
 6. Social or self-improvement courses;
 7. Remedial courses on the high school level not carrying college credit;
 8. Orientation courses aimed at counseling or guidance of freshmen students.
- Commission approved recommendations to strengthen graduate and research programs in the North Texas area and authorized new third and fourth-year courses for Angelo State College, San Angelo.

COURTS SPEAK
Fifty-third District Judge Herman Jones granted the first injunction sought by the state to enforce the new small loan act.

Action was against E. L. Parker, operator of an Austin liquor store, whom Regulatory Loan Commissioner Frank Miskell alleged was lending money at rates in excess of 10 percent

without obtaining the required state license.

State Supreme Court knocked out a state law granting a landowner, whose property is surrounded by another's, right of way across the neighbor's land. It's decision, overturning lower courts, denied Baylor County rancher Wilmer Cleg-horn authority to a road through the W. T. Waggoner Ranch.

An El Paso army sergeant convinced the Supreme Court it should hear arguments on April 22 in his suit for Texas voting rights. Many servicemen have complained about state regulations which permit them to vote only in the county where they resided on entering service.

Texas Court of Criminal Appeals rejected the third appeal of Billie Sol Estes from an eight-year prison sentence for swindling. However, the court made technical corrections in its earlier opinion which enables Estes to file another motion for rehearing.

Court of Criminal Appeals ordered a new trial for a Bandera County man convicted of sheep theft. He was sentenced to life imprisonment for the theft of one sheep after the jury learned he had two prior convictions for passing bad checks.

Court ruled that state's attorney had failed to prove the man's guilt, since the sheep-theft charge was filed by one rancher but testimony centered around "suspicious activities" of the convicted man in the pasture of another rancher who had not filed charges.

APPOINTMENTS
John P. Thompson and R. L. Thornton Jr., both of Dallas, were named by Governor Connally to Texas Turnpike Authority.

Thornton succeeds his late father for a term expiring February 15, 1967. Thompson succeeds the late Bert Fields for a term expiring February 15, 1969.

Charles H. King Jr., also of Dallas, was sworn in on April 15 as Commissioner of the Bureau of Labor Statistics.

WATER
Oil operators in the New and Old Batson and Sour Lake Fields of Hardin County were given a warning by Texas Railroad Commission to dispose of their salt water "in satisfactory manner." However, the commission decided not to issue an order banning the use of open disposal pits.

Lower Neches Valley Authority asked for the hearings on the ground that oilfield salt water was polluting streams from which Beaumont and its industries get water.

VETERANS LAND SALE SET
Twenty-two forfeited veterans land tracts in seven counties will be offered for sale on May 12, Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler has announced.

Bids on the tracts in Guadalupe, Hidalgo, Maverick, Uvalde, Wilson, Zavala and Culberson Counties must be received at Sadler's office by 10 a. m. on date of sale.

OIL ALLOWABLE SET
Texas Railroad Commission set May oil production allowable at 2,800,000 barrels daily for prorated wells, based on production at 22.5 percent of potential. That's a decrease from the 29 percent formula of the last three months and 2,900,000 barrels daily for April.

Figure still is the highest for May in the last five years.

OPINIONS
The Attorney General held in opinions:

That the new Ector County detention facilities for juveniles and adult women do not properly separate the boys from the girls and juveniles from grownups;

That county court misdemeanor defendants do not have an absolute right to see the prospective juror list before trial;

And that prison inmates are eligible for parole consideration after serving two years (one-fourth) of a two-to-eight year sentence.

SHORT SNORTS
General revenue fund deficits as of April 13 has risen to \$38,800,000, State Treasurer Jesse James calculated, with balance in all state funds at \$178,100,000. Governor Connally announced

106 separate schools and 3,400 trainees authorized in the state-federal Manpower Development and Training program already have graduated 1,000 trained workers from the re-training program.

State Board of Vocational Nurse Examiners accredited four new schools: Municipal Hospital at Winters; Wintermute Memorial Hospital, Klon-dike; Terrell School of Vocational Nursing, Terrell; and Ennis Municipal Hospital, Ennis.

A total of \$725,445 in judgments has been entered against operators of alleged slant oil wells in East Texas, according to Attorney General Carr.

Texas Highway Department announced that 1965 license plates will have three letters and three digits (Example: AA-A-123) for about eight million possible combinations.

Discovery of a case of scabies in a feed lot at Hart (Castro County) led to a new requirement that the 500,000 cattle shipped to California annually must be certified as free of the disease, according to notification received by Texas Animal Health Commission.

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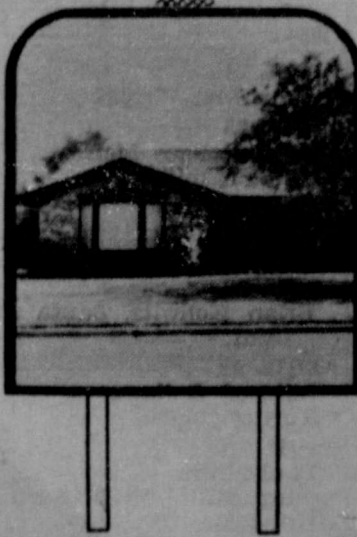

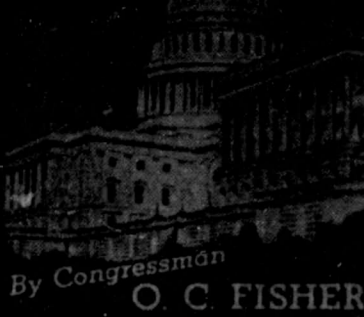

and animal life deserves protective measures during the spring fawning and nesting season.

He particularly cautioned against molesting fawn deer which often times are adopted under the mistaken belief that they have been abandoned. Watson said the Game and Fish magazine, in an early edition, will illustrate what happened to a Florida man when he was attacked by a "tame" deer which, as is natural, became belligerent in the fall. He noted a Texas law forbids "adopting" wild deer.

Watson also suggested that dogs, cats and other pets be restrained during the spring season when doe deer are heavy with fawn and when ground nesting birds are vulnerable to domestic predators.

Our WASHINGTON Letter



RACE PROBLEMS keep popping up in Washington news. It gets a little boring but since March of 1963 a substantial share of the time of the Congress has been devoted to this emotional and political issue.

Last year it was estimated that Bobby Kennedy spent more than 50% of his official time dealing with racial issues. In fact, Bobby was credited with triggering the first Freedom March, featuring bus loads of a mixture of Negroes and whites who invaded the south to test local segregation customs. Freedom marches led to the Birmingham demonstrations and mob actions, the shooting of a Negro NAACP leader in Jackson, a march on Washington, and an assortment of sit-downs, sit-ins, boycotts, blockades, interspersed with a variety of intimidations and threats.

Over in Brooklyn the CORE chapter is threatening a "stall-in" of cars to tie up traffic at the New York's World Fair on April 22. The plan is to have 2,000 CORE-driven cars run out of gas simultaneously in the main traffic lanes that day, as a protest against racial discrimination. But it may be stopped.

A touch of comedy has entered the picture. Some of the politicians who encouraged the mass demonstrations are now being forced to urge the Negroes to forego this latest threat. Even Bobby Kennedy has quietly suggested that the Negroes slow down.

HERE IN WASHINGTON, which the late President Kennedy said should be the Nation's showcase for integration, the age-old principle of "birds of a feather flock together," has been asserting itself. In 1955 (just after the Supreme Court decision barring segregation in public schools) in the District of Columbia public schools for the first time integrated. In Eastern High School, for example, in 1955 there were 510 white students, and 688 Negroes; eight years later, in 1963, there were 15 whites and 1,774 Negro students!

At McKinley High School, in the District, in 1955 there were 521 whites and 659 Negroes; eight years later, in 1963, there were 15 whites and 1,774 Negro students!

At Roosevelt High School, also in the District, in 1955 there were 634 whites and 518 Negroes; last year, eight years later, there were 19 whites and 1,319 Negroes!

The same ratio runs through all the District schools. The whites have simply chosen to move into suburban areas or send the kids to private schools. It happened that in the District of Columbia, unlike most places, the people did have those alternatives available.

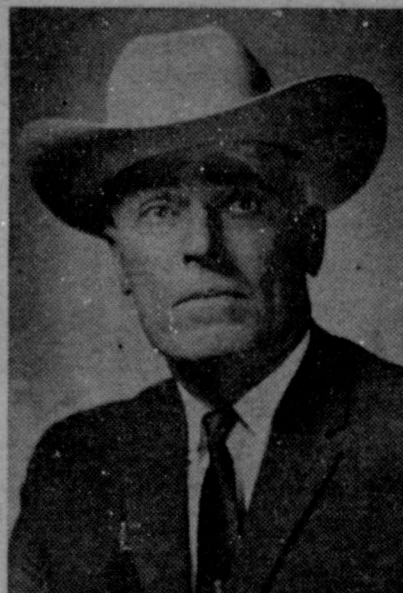

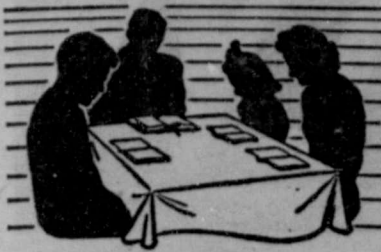

BRAINY BOX GIVES ENGINES FAST CHECK

AN ELECTRONIC BRAIN that completely checks out an engine's ignition system in less than five minutes has been developed. According to the manufacturer, the gadget, no larger than a bread box, tests the starter, coil, condenser, rotor, cap, points, plugs, battery and all ignition wiring, checks the low- and high-voltage system and even AC ignition pulses. The "ignition trouble analyzer" has a special meter which gives direct readout on engine performance, point condition and spark plug efficiency.

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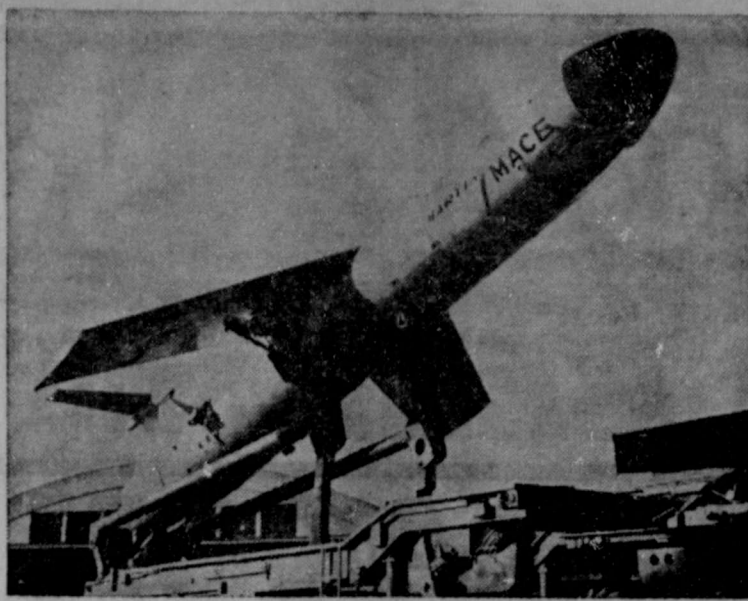

New USAF Ground-Hugging Missile



Here is a picture of the MACE, the Air Force's new ground-hugging missile that can carry an atomic or conventional warhead at speeds of more than 650 miles an hour.

Powered by a turbojet engine, the MACE resembles a sleek jet fighter, with its 22.9-foot wings and 44-foot body. Although its maximum altitude is 40,000 feet, the MACE can fly a few feet above the contour of the terrain and, at top speed, zoom

over hills and other obstacles to its target. It has a two-way guidance system known as AT-RAN (Automatic Terrain Recognition and Navigation).

When towed on a special launcher with its wings folded against its body, the missile can be dispatched from previously inaccessible launching sites. Only a small clearing is needed to aim and fire it. Initial thrust is provided by a booster rocket, which is jettisoned after take-off.

Austin — Can you get food poisoning from frozen food? If frozen food thaws out, should it be destroyed? Can you refreeze meat that has thawed out?

These questions persist although frozen foods have become an integral part of modern living. But properly stored, handled and prepared, frozen foods will serve you and your family well.

Food poisoning, originating from frozen foods, is a rarity. Processors are careful to prepare and freeze their products at the peak of freshness, insuring that bacteria are at a minimum. The very act of freezing the food suppresses the ability of the bacteria to multiply. Not until food temperatures rise and conditions become favorable to growth of the bacteria do they begin multiplying.

And what about frozen foods that have thawed out... must they be destroyed? Not necessarily. After all, they must be thawed before they can be cooked and eaten. If foods have been thawed only for a short time, they may be safely eaten. The important question is how long have they been thawed out and how high the temperature has been. If the temperature went no higher than 45 degrees, the foods may be maintained at this level safely for several days but should not be refrozen.

Is it ever safe to refreeze meat that has thawed out? Refreezing meat is permissible if the meat was fresh at the original freezing and if it was thawed for only a short period. There may, however, be some degrading of flavor and quality with the second freezing. The risk in refreezing cured or smoked meats is greater. These meats may be slightly spoiled even though there is no discoloration, off-odor or other signs of spoilage.

Can you tell about the quality of frozen food simply by looking at it? Loss of quality — resulting from improper handling or extended storage — is usually indicated by loss of flavor and color. (This is particularly true of vegetables.) Orange juice, as it deteriorates, tends to separate and "settle out" rapidly when reconstituted. Cream sauces appear curdled and the liquid begins to separate.

To preserve the quality of frozen foods, store them at the lowest possible temperature.

and when you transport them from the store to your freezer, do so quickly as possible. Rising temperatures cause chemical changes which influence the food's flavor and quality.

HEALTH AND SAFETY TIPS FROM THE AMERICAN MEDICAL ASSN. GALLSTONES

In the upper right part of the abdomen is a small pouch called the gall bladder. It is a temporary storage center for bile, and is a part of the digestive system.

Sometimes lumps of solid matter composed of bile pigment and salts form in the gall bladder or in the ducts leading to it. These are called gallstones.

There may be only one small gallstone, or there may be hundreds. They can be so tiny that they look like sand or they can be as large as a golf ball. Gallstones occur more often in women than in men and more frequently in persons past 40.

Exactly why we get gallstones is still somewhat of a puzzle. They are generally thought to be the result of changes in composition of the bile, or stagnation of the bile, or infection. Poor eating habits may be a factor.

Gallstones often lay quietly in the gall bladder or bile ducts. But if a large stone starts to move, you'll know immediately that something's wrong. The pain will be severe, and will cause the sufferer acute agony. The attack may be over in a few minutes or it may last for days. Sometimes it becomes mildly chronic and may be interspersed with acute episodes.

Of course, not all sharp pains in the upper right abdomen are from gallstones. Only your doctor can tell with proper diagnostic techniques.

Gallstones sometimes are called a penalty for living the good life, as they may be associated with rich foods and fats in the diet. Doctors often recommend plenty of water and outdoor exercise, such as golf and gardening.

You can't diagnose gallstones yourself. Your abdominal pain may or may not originate in the gall bladder. Let your doctor decide, and recommend treatment.

Doors open Sunday morning to the public for the all-day singing, which will include class singing and also quartet singing until 4 o'clock in the afternoon.

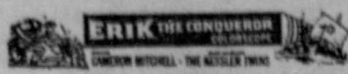
