### LET'S NOT PUT IT TO A VOTE

In California, it appears that citizens will vote this year on a proposal to outlaw "pay television."

If the proposal carries, it will mean that every California citizen will be deprived of his right to choose for himself his own entertainment.

Strangely, one important local Chamber of Commerce in the state went on record as favoring the concept; of the individual's free choice — but also favoring the initiative resolution (the placing of the question on the ballot) because "the right of the initiative must be inviolate." In other words, it is wrong to take away man's free choice — unless the majority says it's right.

In the name of democracy, we are required, then, to put to a vote any proposal suggested to restrict the freedoms of ourselves and our fellow men. Along with this, politicians and writers refer regularly to elections and congressional decisions as the "people's will" which must be respected.

**"DEMOCRATIC" CONCEPT**

Is this right? Does the majority have the right to run our personal lives for us? Or has the word "democracy" been twisted and perverted to allow a few influential politicians to gain control over us all? To understand the implications of this "democratic" concept, merely imagine the following matters being put to vote in your community.

Should you be separated from your family because someone covets your spouse?

Should you be forced to work as a slave, without wages?

Obviously, you wouldn't feel very sympathetic toward "democracy" if the voters decided "yes" on these questions.

But let's not stop there. Let's choose some more questions that could be put to a vote:

Should you be required to give a percentage of the money you earn to Communist governments?

Should you be deprived of your right to choose what customers you will serve in the business establishment you created and you own?

Should you be deprived of the right to view Pay TV — even though you and the operators of the Pay TV system can come to mutually agreeable terms?

These questions are, of course, being debated currently as the majority attempts to answer them on behalf of the individual. In fact, you are already giving up a percentage of your income to the Communists — because your "representatives" in Washington have decided this matter for you, by majority vote.

**INDIVIDUAL RIGHTS**

No nation can survive the havoc and chaos that result when matters of private property become questions of majority rule. For if a man's property can be taken from him by public vote, he soon realizes there is no reason to work hard to acquire property. The resulting loss of incentive shows production to a standstill and the country descends into poverty and a slavery run by an all-powerful bureaucracy.

America was built by individuals, acting individually, each in his own self-interest. Private property was generally respected and it thereby provided an incentive for the greatest production breakthrough in the history of the world.

America's future prosperity and freedom depend upon a return to this concept of individual rights that can not be taken away by anyone.

We dearly need to reappraise our reverence for the "right to vote." For the rights of man to life, liberty and property cannot be voted upon. They have come from the Creator, not the majority.

They were spotted by a large number of local folks though.

Mrs. Kate Holmes said the storm on Thursday almost caused her considerable damage. Lightning apparently struck close to her home as it burned up her electric clock and knocked out her refrigerator. She said she picked up a half stone Friday as large as a hen egg and has it in her freezer.

Pierre Rowe said he watched the tornado go over his home Thursday afternoon and it sounded like a freight train, but it did not come toward the ground. However, the high wind blew down one of the trees in his front yard.

Republicans voting at Santa Anna will be from Santa Anna, Trickham, Whon, Rockwood and Shields precincts. All other Republican voters will go to the Miller and Miller offices in Coleman, where their precinct boxes will be.

Precinct conventions will be held at the polling places at 3 p. m. on May 2. All Republicans are urged to attend. At these precinct conventions, any resolution may be presented and voted on, and it is thought that the present cattle prices, the national debt, the U. S. foreign policy, and the civil rights disorders may bring out some statements from Coleman County Republicans.

**For Smoother Knots**

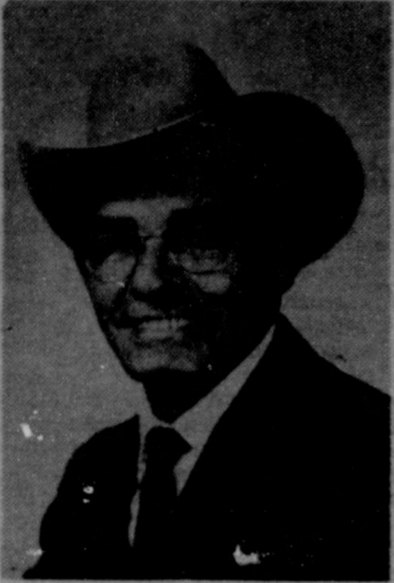
When you tie a monofilament leader to your nylon line, put a drop of clear fingernail polish on the knot. When it dries, put on another drop. You'll discover

**Sen. Yarborough Lists Achievements In His Campaign**

"I seek re-election to the United States Senate on a record of accomplishment," Senator Ralph Yarborough said this week.

"I have been your Democratic United States Senator for seven years. In those seven years — working with and for the people of Texas — we have made major steps forward in education, agriculture, conservation, and many other areas."

Listed as major accomplishments by Sen. Yarborough are:  
Tax Cut: He has fought for the just-enacted tax cut — to stimulate the economic progress of this country — since he was first elected to the Senate in 1957.

Education: He co-authored the 1958 National Defense Education Act which provides loans for thousands of Texas students in 77 State colleges and universities.

Agriculture: He is a leading supporter of soil and water conservation programs, rural electrification and agricultural research.

Veterans: 15 laws bearing Sen. Yarborough's name have been passed on behalf of veterans.

Water Conservation: He vigorously supports water conservation programs.

National Defense: He advocates national defense by well-trained, well-equipped Army, Navy, Air Force and Marines.

International Affairs: He co-sponsored the Peace Corps Act, and supported the Nuclear Test Ban Treaty halting atmospheric testing.

Economic Advancement: He co-authored the Area Redevelopment Act of 1961, called "The Magna Carta of East Texas Economic Redevelopment."

Federal Employees: He has fought to maintain the efficiency of Federal service and to provide pay scales comparable to those paid in private industry.

**Gov. Connally To Make Statewide TV Address Friday**

Governor John Connally will review steps of progress for Texas under his administration in a special half-hour statewide telecast Friday night of this week. The program will be carried on more than 22 stations in all parts of Texas. Tentative time in most areas is 8:30 p. m. on CBS stations.

It is the first major appearance by the Governor of his reelection campaign. He has made a few non-political appearances over Texas, but mostly concentrated on tending to duties of the governorship at Austin.

In the half-hour program, to originate from the State Capitol, Governor Connally is expected to stress several highlights of his administration on which he has placed emphasis since taking office. Foremost is likely to be the field of education, which has been a frequent theme of his statements. At the governor's recommendation, the 58th Legislature authorized creation of the Committee on Education Beyond the High School, which currently is evaluating the state's educational resources and laying out a blueprint for the future.

The Governor also is expected to dwell on increased industry for Texas and point out that 317 new plants were built in the state last year — second only to New York. He also likely will point out that the state's new Texas 65 Health Plan provides low cost medical care for aged as a result of legislation passed last year. More than 50,000 elderly Texans enrolled in the plan the first thirty days.

In addition to the statewide half-hour program, Governor Connally also has revived his popular "Coffee With Connally" series inaugurated two years ago. The 5-minute informal program is scheduled in stations throughout Texas — in most areas on NBC stations during the Today show.

Brownwood — Bob Havins has been appointed to the new position of director of public relations at Howard Payne College, it has been announced by Dr. Guy D. Newman, president. Havins will continue to handle sports publicity and alumni activities, and will coordinate the new department of public relations.

Tessica Martin will continue to handle the bulk of the relations of the college with the news media as director of the college news bureau.

Martha St. Clair will work in the new department in the area of student recruiting.

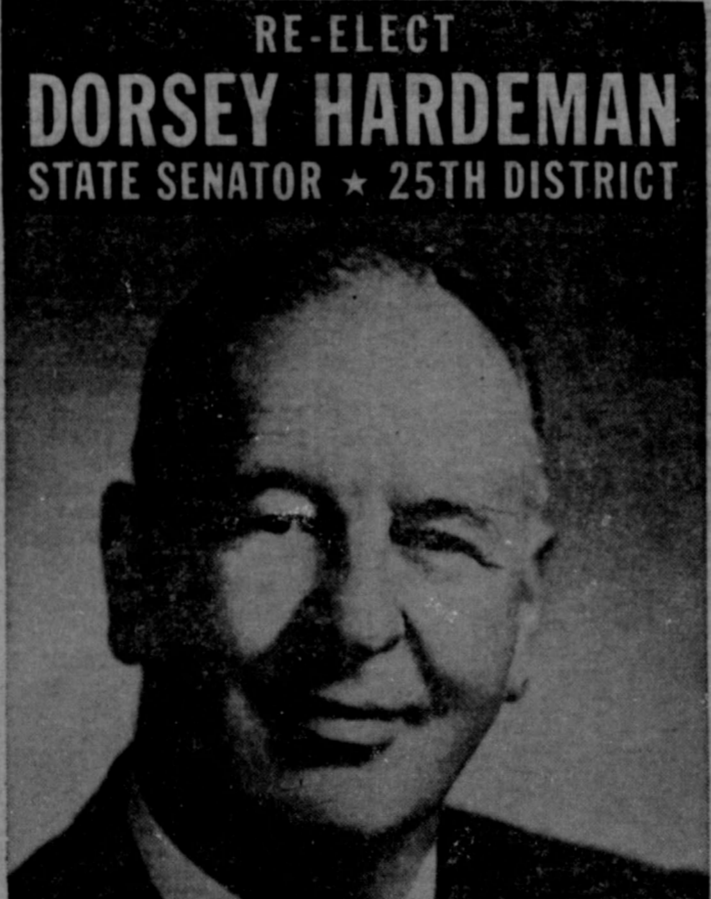
Havins and Miss Martin, both of whom have been doing some teaching, will spend their full time in the new department, Dr. Newman said.

Waco — Fishing in state parks is on the upswing. M. F. Horton, keeper at Meridian State Park, said visitors have been catching black bass, crappie and channel catfish. Park Superintendent B. G. Rogers at Possum Kingdom State Park, said good strings of crappie and black bass are common-place in his area. Park Keeper A. A. Templeton at Lake Brownwood State Park, said the lake is up about three feet from recent rains, causing murky water. However, he added, visitors have been catching channel

**Humble to Open World's Fair Information Centers**

Houston — A network of 2,000 World's Fair travel-information centers will be opened by April 22 at service stations of Humble Oil & Refining Company in thirteen East Coast states and the District of Columbia. April 22 is the first day of the fair.

Robert O. Goodykoontz, vice president in charge of Humble's Eastern Region, said the number of information centers will be expanded to at least 3,000 in a few more weeks. Motorists will be able to identify the stations with travel centers by a newly-designed metal driveway sign saying, "World's Fair Information." A

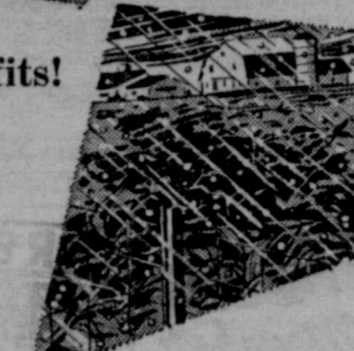

**Gordon McLendon Stresses Civil Rights In His Campaign**

Gordon McLendon concentrated his fire on the pending civil rights bill in the waning days of his campaign for the Democratic nomination for U. S. Senator.

He followed a schedule designed to reach, through personal contact and communications media, the greatest number of voters before the May 2 primary. His itinerary calls for thousands of miles of travel in to all sections of the State by plane and helicopter.

"My opposition to the bill being debated in the Senate actually is a crusade for civil rights," he declared. "I'm not in favor of denying any of our citizens the rights granted them by the Constitution, but I am against the passage of this bill because certain sections of it threaten the civil rights of all citizens. Those provisions would deny everyone, regardless of race or national origin, the right of trial by jury and deprive us all of control over our property — including our very homes."

"Some of the people who are demanding the passage of this bill, without changing a word or a punctuation mark, evidently are misled. But I am convinced that the leaders who are mapping the strategy of this high-power campaign know exactly what they are doing. They see in this bill, with its disregard of fundamental civil liberties, another instrument of power over the lives of the American people."

McLendon emphasized that the only way of registering majority opinion on the principles involved in the campaign, is to vote in the Democratic primary.

**Shooting Resort Report Books Due**

Austin — All property owners or managers of shooting resorts and shooting preserves who accept payment for hunting privileges must turn in their record books to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department by May 1. Most of the reports have already been received from hunting preserve operators since the major game seasons closed in January.

The open season on hunting resorts, where pen-raised birds are released for "put and take" hunting, closed on April 1. The report books, furnished with each shooting preserve or shooting resort license, show the name, address and hunting license number of each hunter who hunted for pay during the season. Also shown is the time spent hunting and the amount and kind of game killed.

Reports may be turned in to the nearest game warden or mailed to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, John H. Reagan Building, Austin, Texas, 78701.

**Agriculture Dept. Has Services That Benefit All Texans**

The agency headed by Texas Agriculture Commissioner John C. White provides more direct services to Texas consumers than any other department of State government, White's office reported this week.

During Commissioner White's administration of the Texas Department of Agriculture, the report said, programs which directly benefit all Texans have been begun and increased to such an extent that consumer services are now 5 times greater than when White took over. Direct consumer services under White's department include such important programs as checking for honest weights on all goods for home and industry sold in Texas, inspection of egg grades and quality, quality tests of all brands of automobile anti-freeze, inspection of numerous kinds of fruits and vegetables and inspection of nursery products.

In addition to responsibility for fairness in the sale to Texans of the billions of items which come under these prog-

rams, White's agency is in charge of numerous additional laws and services which benefit Texas farmers.

area where birds from previous releases are known to have survived. It is expected that more birds will be delivered to the same area later this year. Francolins, also known as the gray partridge, is a recent exotic game bird import from Southern Iran.
