### THE CLOAK OF THE MINORITY

Emotion has long been recognized as a prime mover in the political scene. People often support causes because of the emotion generated — rather than for any logical reasons.

Such an emotional base has carried the present "civil rights" movement a long way. It has become fashionable to be a part of a "downtrodden minority" that seeks legislative aid for its "oppressed" position. It has reached the point where one can take cover under the "cloak of the minority" and can expect sympathy, favoritism and power to transgress others' rights.

For example, the proposed "civil rights" bill will require employers to change hiring practices to give favorable treatment to minority groups, regardless of skills and wages asked. The cloak of the minority thereby gives one group the right to invade a man's business and his rights. Obviously, the same condition exists with respect to the proposed "public accommodations" section of the pending bill.

What's wrong with this? Is it that integration is wrong? Or is it that the Communists may be behind the "civil rights" movement? Neither is an important consideration in this case. For the government of the United States should not be concerned, in any way, with integration or segregation, with minority groups or majority groups, with the desires or fears of Communists.

The Constitution of the United States does not recognize any distinction between races, religions, political affiliations or social customs. It does reaffirm certain unalienable individual rights over which no government has any jurisdiction whatsoever. It approaches every citizen as an individual — who cannot be deprived of free speech or religion whether he stands as a minority of one or is part of a unanimous majority. Either way, his rights are inviolate — according to the American way.

Since the Constitution recognizes everyone as an individual, it does not attempt to prohibit the alien political views of a Communist. Neither does it try to take sides between the integrationist and the segregationist. But it does attempt to preserve the climate of individual freedom in which the integrationist and segregationist can each practice his own choice voluntarily.

If a businessman wants to serve members of all races — or if he chooses to serve members of only one race — this is his choice to make voluntarily. If we are to remove this freedom from him, we have removed his right to control his own business — and we will have thereby broken the back of the incentive system that has produced the great abundance that members of races share today.

We must learn to separate ourselves from the catch-words and emotional appeals. We should be concerned with neither majorities nor minorities. We must not build the power of government to enslave us on behalf of either. It is just as wrong to justify restrictive legislation on the basis of majority interest as it is to grant favorable treatment to minority races.

We must not hide behind any shadowy cloaks. We must learn to walk out in the open standing upon the principles in which we believe, arguing their merits openly, and—above all—respecting the rights of all individuals to conduct their personal affairs in freedom.

We achieve nothing when we attempt to force our will upon others. In the rich, inspiring climate of freedom, the best ideas will triumph because they are best.

All men should have the right to pursue their individual lives as they see fit, voluntarily contracting with others for goods and services, interfering in no coercive way with the property of others. Governments should be restrained to the simple duty of protecting the lives, liberty and property of all.

## County Republican Convention To Be Held Saturday

The Coleman County Republican convention will be held in the court room of the county courthouse, Saturday, May 9 at 3 P. M.

The public is welcome at the meeting, at which resolutions will be presented, the results of the elections of May 2 discussed, and delegates elected to the two state conventions to be held later this year.

Mrs. C. D. Bruce, the retiring county chairman, expresses satisfaction with the turnout at the primary election, and foresees even stronger Republican voting in November than in previous years.

## Minor Changes To Affect Local Post Office

Most of the residents of Santa Anna will not be affected by the recently-announced adjustments in parcel post and post office window services, as well as money orders, Postmaster John C. Gregg said.

Mr. Gregg explained his statement was prompted by some misunderstanding about the scope of these changes. Re-capping the local postal situation, the local postmaster pointed out that about the only changes that will be made in the local office will be closing the windows a little earlier on Saturday. Actually, new instructions have been issued for small offices, like the Santa Anna office, that each may continue the same services as previously rendered as long as it does not require any more than one clerk being on duty.

So, from 8:30 a. m. to 12:00 noon there will be only one clerk on duty to take care of business at all three windows, but this will not necessarily affect any service rendered by this office.

Rural and star route carriers will continue delivery of parcel post, same as in the past. They will continue to take applications for money orders on Saturdays.

## Lenda Oakes To Receive Honors

Lenda Oakes, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lenton Oakes of Brownwood and a granddaughter of Mr. J. T. Oakes and Mr. and Mrs. Lige Lancaster, won first place in the state Theta Rho Girls essay contest, and will represent the Rebekah Assembly of Texas at the United Nations Pilgrimage For Youth in June.

She was one of 16 contestants from over the state who submitted an essay on "Why I Would Like To Go To The United Nations Pilgrimage For Youth." Each applicant was recommended for this honor by her pastor, high school principal and a member of the Rebekah Lodge.

## 494 Votes Cast In Democratic Primary Election

A total of 494 votes were cast Saturday in the local Democratic First Primary Election. Of primary interest to local citizens was the Sheriff's race, in which M. R. (Bud) Simmons polled a total of 373 votes. The incumbent, W. J. Smith, polled 78 votes locally, but over the county he polled enough votes that there will not be a run-off election. Locally the other candidates received: J. F. Templeton, 7; J. H. McDorman, 11; and T. R. Knowles, 23.

Governor John Connally was re-elected in one of the heaviest votes a Governor has ever received, defeating Don Yarborough and two other opponents. Preston Smith received a big majority of votes for Lieutenant Governor. Ralph Yarborough won his bid for a second full term in the U. S. Senate by defeating Gordon McLendon, by a sizeable vote.

Joe Pool and Robert W. Baker will be in the only state-wide run-off in the second primary. Both are seeking the U. S. Representative at Large post. Pool is the present representative and polled the largest number of votes. John C. White continued his hold on the office of Commissioner of Agriculture by a large majority over Millard Shivers. Jerry Sadler was re-elected as the Commissioner of the General Land Office. Jim C. Langdon was elected to fill out the unexpired term on the Railroad Commission. Jack Pope was nominated for Place 1, Associate Justice, Supreme Court of Texas.

Dorsey Hardeman defeated Juanita Camfield by a large majority for the 25th District Senate Seat in the Texas Legislature. Ben Barnes was nominated over his write-in opponent, with very few write-in votes being cast. Glenn R. Lewis apparently defeated E. C. Grindstaff for District Judge of the 119th Judicial District, in a very close race.

All the candidates on the ballot who had no opponents were nominated with most of them receiving some write-in votes, but not enough to show very much opposition to the office holders.

N. W. Purcell was nominated as the County Democratic Chairman. He received 64 write in votes in Santa Anna. Several others received from one to 16 votes for the non-paying position. Glen Copeland received 90 write-in votes as Precinct Democratic Chairman. Ford Barnes, who has served in this position for a number of years, received 51 votes for the place.

The Second Primary election will be held throughout the state on Saturday, June 6th.

The Republicans will have one contest on their ballot, seeking to nominate a candidate for United States Senator, to oppose Ralph Yarborough in the General Election in November.

Her husband is employed in Brownwood and also attending Howard Payne. They are members of the First Baptist Church in Brownwood.

They plan to make their home in Santa Anna.

# State Capitol NEWS

Austin, Tex. — Gov. John Connally has moved into the plush working quarters ever occupied by any of this state's governors.

Last week workmen put finishing touches to the first overall remodeling of the offices in 76 years. Until now Texas governors have been tending to state business in cramped and poorly arranged offices.

Construction has been underway since last January. Capitol visitors once again are welcome all day in the mirrored and flag-draped gubernatorial reception room.

The governor occupies a large, gold-carpeted, crystal-chandelier-hung office. He also has an adjoining conference room, a small kitchen unit and shower cabinet.

Gold carpeting runs throughout the second floor suite. Modern ceilings, lighting and air conditioning have been installed, and the fine old wood-work sanded and refinished to its original state.

Redecoration of the governor's downstairs offices will not be complete for 30 days. Meanwhile, part of his staff will continue to occupy temporary quarters on the Capitol's first floor.

APPOINTMENTS

Mrs. Richard M. Kleberg Jr. of Kingsville and Dr. Hesiquio Rodriguez of Harlingen were named by Governor Connally to six-year terms on the Texas A & I College board of directors. Connally re-appointed John F. Lynch of Houston to a new term on the board.

Mrs. Kleberg and Dr. Rodriguez succeed J. H. West of Bishop and the late O. E. Van Berg of Mercedes.

SCREWORM ERADICATION

The financial fate of the Southwest screwworm eradication program should be apparent by May 8. That's when the appropriation bill embracing eradication plans is supposed to come out of the agriculture subcommittee of the U. S. House appropriations committee.

Pierce Johnson of Austin, attorney for the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation, says the bill was written to provide \$2,750,000 in federal funds, to be matched by local funds. But SWAHRF officials have asked Congress to put up all \$5,500,000, since the screwworm has been eradicated in Texas, and maintenance of a barrier to prevent migration of screwworm flies from Mexico is an international program.

SOIL CONSERVATION

Planning costs for watersheds on Upper Bosque River, Hondo Creek and Donahoe Creek cost the Texas State Soil Conservation Board \$134,938, according to State Auditor C. H. Cavness' report on the past two fiscal years.

Cavness said the Board spent a total of \$552,930 on its continuing efforts to conserve state soil resources and reduce effects of flooding in small watersheds.

Legislative appropriations of \$572,579 were provided during fiscal 1962 and 1963. Biggest outlay was \$215,001 for almost 200 soil conservation districts which the board administers around the state.

MOSQUITO ERADICATION PLANNED

First allotment of federal funds — \$174,198 — in a five-year, \$750,000 program aimed at wiping out the mosquito in Texas was received by State Budget Director Bill Cobb.

Texas State Department of Health will administer the program. The federal government, co-signer of a Pan American Health Organization agreement to stamp out yellow-fever-carrying mosquitoes, is underwriting the plan in a nine-state area, Puerto Rico and the Vir-

gin Islands.

Mosquito abatement and education teams now are being organized for assignment in key areas of Texas. Dr. James L. Goodard of the U. S. Public Health Service said the mosquito must be eliminated from the U. S. to prevent its spreading to outer western hemisphere nations.

BUILDING BOOM SLACKS

Despite a spring boom in apartment building, issuance of building permits in Texas in March dropped 8 percent from March, 1963.

UT Bureau of Business Research thinks a slump in non-residential construction accounted for the over-all drop.

TOURISM EXPANDING

Two Texas officials predicted tourism in the state is going to start booming.

Governor Connally said tourism will become the "fastest-growing Texas industry." He called the state's new advertising program "one of our soundest investments in the economic and recreational future" of the state.

J. Weldon Watson, executive director of the Parks and Wildlife Department, said the fact that a Texan is President makes Texas more popular with visitors. Many of them want to know "how close such and such a park is to Johnson City," said Watson. He sees tourism and park use as having a "mighty impact" on the Texas economy.

BANKING-LOAN HEARINGS SET

State Banking Board will hear application on May 13 for charters of Peoples State Bank of Marshall; Southwest State Bank of Brownwood; and Expressway Bank and Trust of Dallas. Action is due at that time on applications of Texas State Bank of Abilene and Royal Bank and Trust Company of Dallas.

Savings and Loan Commissioner James O. Gerst set a June 17 hearing on the application for Trinity Valley Savings and Loan Association at Madisonville. Proposed directors are from Midway, Normangee, Buffalo and North Zulch, as well as Madisonville.

TOO SLOW FOR PENSION

Some long-time Harlingen firemen who recently decided they want to participate in the firemen's pension plan waited too long, according to Attorney General Waggoner Carr.

Carr ruled that the 1957 Firemen's Relief and Pension Fund Act provides that a fireman forfeits his right to participate if he failed to enroll, and the 1963 firemen's pension law covering fully-paid firemen in part-volunteer departments embodies the same terms.

GOLIAD MEMORIAL PLANNED

Governor Connally named a Texas committee to work with a Mexican group on plans and financing for a suitable memorial at Goliad to Gen. Ignacio Zaragoza. The general's victory over French forces on May 5, 1862, is celebrated throughout Mexico. General Zaragoza was born in Goliad.

The Texas Legislature in 1961 accepted the birthplace of Zaragoza as a state park historical site but provided no funds for developing it.

Good Neighbor Commission Director Glenn Garrett heads the Texas planning group. Other members are Parks and Wildlife Director J. Weldon Watson; Tourist Development Agency Frank Hildebrand; and Historical Survey Committee Director George Hill.

COURTS SPEAK

Supreme Court in a 7-2 decision refused to direct that military servicemen who enlist out of state be permitted to vote in Texas.

The majority held servicemen have no "federally-protected right" to vote where they are stationed. El Paso-based Sgt. Herbert N. Carrington, who enlisted in Alabama, brought the suit, challenging a state constitutional provision which limits servicemen stationed in Texas to voting in the county where they resided when they entered the service.

In a dissenting opinion, Chief Justice Robert W. Calvert and Associate Justice Clyde E. Smith said the ruling denies some servicemen the right to vote in all elections. They further contended the state constitution violates the equal protection clause of the 14th amendment to the U. S. Constitution.

Same issue is soon to be tried in federal court at San Antonio where two other servicemen have filed suit.

Third Court of Civil Appeals upheld district court ruling against an AFL-CIO suit charging Texas Employment Commission with "pro-employer lobbying." Court's new opinion said TEC members have a duty to advocate needed changes in unemployment compensation laws. Court also held former Commissioner J. J. Pickle (now congressman) acted within his authority in recommending amendments.

Supreme Court agreed with lower courts which nullified incorporation of Mayhill near Denton.
