The following was published in the monthly magazine of West Texas Utilities Company, The Electric Times, was titled "God Left the Challenge In The Earth" and was written by Dr. Allan A. Stockdale:

When God made the Earth, He could have finished it. But He didn't. He left it as a raw material — to tease us, to tantalize us, to set us thinking and experimenting and risking and adventuring! And therein we find our supreme interest in living.

Have you ever noticed that small children in a nursery will ignore clever mechanical toys in order to build, with spoons and strings and sticks and blocks, a world of their own imagination?

And so with grown-ups, too. God gave us a world unfinished, so that we might share in the joys and satisfactions of creation.

He left the oil in Trenton rock.

He left aluminum in the clay. He left the electricity in the clouds.

He left the rivers unbridged—and the mountains untrilled.

He left the forest unfelled and the cities unbuild.

He left the laboratories unopened.

He left the diamonds uncut.

He gave us the challenge of raw materials, not the satisfaction of perfect, finished things.

He left the music unsung and the dramas unplayed.

He left the poetry unreamed, in order that men and women might not become bored, but engaged in stimulating, exciting, creative activities that keep them thinking, working, experimenting, and experience all the joys and durable satisfactions of achievements.

A man in Florida turned a miserable old greenwater swamp, mosquito-inhabited, into a beautiful garden.

Once a sanctimonious visitor, who was inspecting it, exclaimed, "Oh, dear brother, what a beautiful garden you and the Lord have made from this swamp!"

"Yes," came the reply, "but you should have seen it when the Lord had it all by Himself."

So it is with the world. There is no Shangri-La where our every want can be supplied by wishing. There is no substance to the philosophy of "getting by." There is nothing worthwhile gained by chance.

Work, thought, creation. These give life its stimulus, its real satisfaction, its intriguing value.

In Oberlin, Ohio, there is a woodshed, and by the woodshed, a grave. There lies Charles Martin Hall. For years he experimented in that woodshed on how to get aluminum out of clay at less than the market price of \$500 a pound. He risked his time and money. He suffered discouragement after discouragement. But when at last he found the way, he created an industry which today employs a quarter million workers.

Each year thousands of high school and college graduates leave their study halls to seek jobs! A few with ability to experiment will accept the challenge of raw material as did Charles Martin Hall. In realizing their dreams they will enlist the support of others with faith in them and the courage to back that faith, at the risk of their own savings, through periods of discouragement and disappointment. Then management know-how will translate those dreams into buildings, machinery, stable jobs—to make life better for all Americans.

That is how our nation has progressed from a wilderness frontier. That is how we will reach a standard of world civilization yet undreamed.

Progress comes, not by some magic word and not by government edict, but from the thoughts, the toil, the tears, the triumphs of individuals who accept the challenge of raw material—and by the grace of God-given talents produce results which satisfy the needs of men.

Santa Anna Kidnap Note Turns Out To Be Hoax; Couple Jailed In Ballinger

A Santa Anna service station operator found himself in the middle of a situation right out of a detective magazine Tuesday, September 29. E. F. Talley was working in his Sinclair station on Wallis Avenue when a car pulled in and parked just down the side street from the station. A young girl, estimated

by Talley to be 15 or 16, got out of the car and entered the station restroom. Emerging, she carried a paper towel with which she seemed to be wiping her face. Pausing at the water fountain, the girl dropped the towel.

About ten minutes later, Talley went to get a drink at the fountain and discovered the towel had writing on it, written with a lipstick. It said: "Call the police, I'm being kidnapped."

Talley contacted Deputy Sheriff Nick Buse who radioed ahead. The couple was picked up in Ballinger.

In a telephone report from Ballinger just before presstime, The News learned that the kidnaping report was a hoax contrived by the girl. According to a spokesman for the Ballinger Police Department, the couple had been living together in Waco for the past couple of months, and the man had been drinking on the trip. The girl, desiring to get away from her companion, contrived the kidnaping story and dropped the note.

Both members of the couple were jailed in Ballinger the man for driving without a license and the girl for vagrancy.

Relative Of Local Residents Killed In Auto Accident

Mrs. Hazel Griffin, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Lee Murray, of Santa Anna, and sister of Fred Murray, of Santa Anna, was killed in an automobile accident in Dade City, Florida last week.

Mrs. Griffin had lived in Dade City for the past 18 years, where she was a registered nurse. She was planning to move to Santa Anna about the first of next month to work at the Santa Anna Hospital, where her brother is administrator.

Mrs. Griffin had been an officer and member of several professional organizations in the nursing field. She was a member of the Seventh-Day Adventist Church.

Survivors, in addition to her husband, son, parents, and brother, include four other brothers, Earl and Lester Murray, of Doole; R. D. Murray, of Tampa, Florida; and Wilson Murray, of Riverside, California.

City Calls Special Election To Okay Park Land Sale

Acting Tuesday, September 29, the City Commission of the city of Santa Anna acted to call an election on Tuesday, October 13, for the purpose of granting the city the authority to sell all or part of the land known as Ranger Park.

Official notice of the election appears in this issue of The Santa Anna News.

Purpose of the election is to allow the City Commission to sell part of the land now included in Ranger Park to the Santa Anna Hospital, for the construction of a 40-bed, \$115,000 rest home.

The rest home is the first unit of a proposed medical center that will make Santa Anna one of the leading medical centers in the Southwest.

All details of construction of the rest home are completed, pending only the legal technicality of the election. Financing has been obtained for the unit, and the contractor is ready to begin work, according to Mayor Ford Barnes.

The land for which authority to sell is sought was originally deeded to the state several years ago for use as a park. After operating the park for several years, the state transmitted the tract to the city of Santa Anna.

An overflow crowd attended services at United Presbyterian Church of Santa Anna Sunday, September 27, on the occasion of the dedication of the Church's new sanctuary building.

During the open house, for which the women of the Church were hostesses, led by Mrs. Monte Guthrie, the choir sang hymns in the background.

Approximately 200 persons registered during the morning services and the afternoon open house. The new sanctuary, located at Willis Avenue and Fifth Street, is only the second building occupied by the United Presbyterian Church since its founding in Santa Anna in 1885.

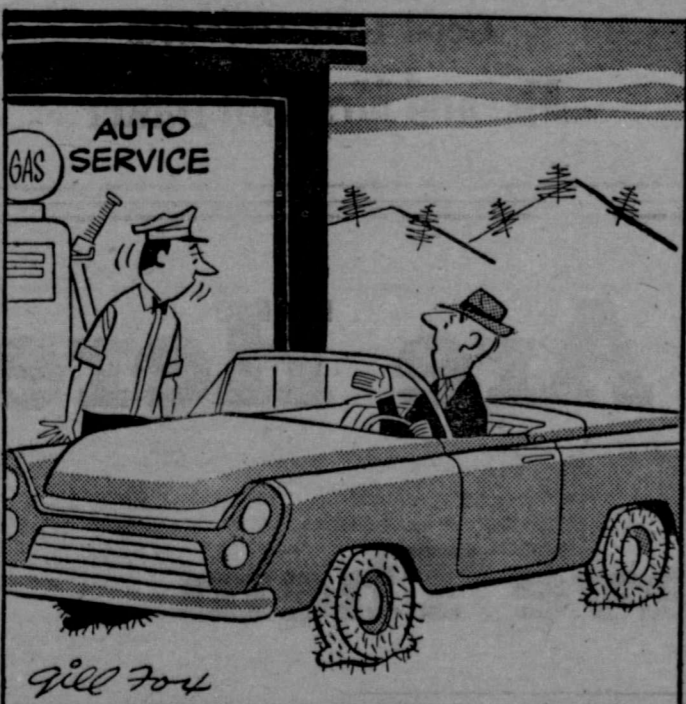

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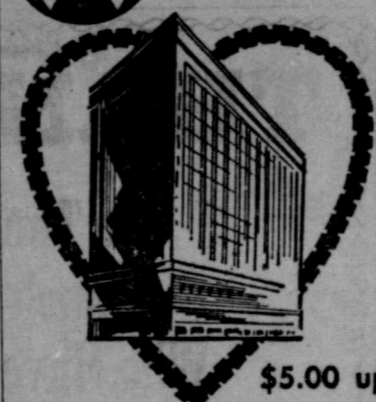

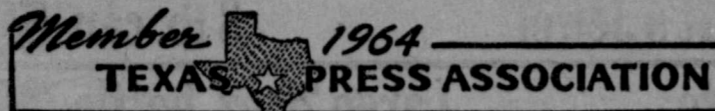

Mountaineers Lose Penalty-Marred Homecoming Game To Dragons, 20-0

In as poorly officiated a game as has been seen in Mountaineer Stadium in quite some time, the Bangs Dragons topped the Santa Anna Mountaineers before a Homecoming crowd by a score of 20-0, Saturday night.

The quality of the officiating did not materially effect the overall outcome of the game, since Bangs was harder hit by penalties than Santa Anna, but it made for all dull and exasperating game, particularly during the first half.

A total of 17 penalties for 155 yards were assessed during the contest, not including penalties refused and offsetting penalties. In one first-quarter series of downs, three penalties were called in four downs.

Officials were apparently out of touch with what was occurring on the field from before game time, when one arbitrator bellowed into the crowd, which was preparing to stand for the National Anthem, the invocation, and the alma maters of the two schools:

"Let's get things going, it's already after eight o'clock." No watch in the pressbox showed later than 7:50 at the time.

Santa Anna lost the toss and kicked off to the Bangs 24 yard line. After a penalty on the first two plays from scrimmage, the Mountaineers intercepted a Dragon pass on visiting team's 26 yard line. Two downs later the Santa Annans were back on the 32, and after a pass went incomplete, Gary Williams punted to the Dragon 13. A quick pass from quarterback Travis Hallford to end Tommy Stephens moved the ball to the mid-field stripe. The first down play moved the Dragons into Mountaineer territory for the first time, to the 44 yard line. Then a brand of lightning known as Pete Ramsey struck for the first time during the evening, travel-

ing the 44 yards to paydirt with 8:11 remaining on the clock. Hallford passed to halfback Ecky Allen for the two point conversion. Bangs 8, Santa Anna 0.

Following the kickoff, Santa Anna performed a rarity, running four downs without a penalty being called. However, three downs moved the ball only one yard, to the Mountaineer 36, and the fourth down punt carried to the 50. Bangs immediately went afoul of the officials, losing 15 yards. The belated first down play carried back to the Dragon 45, and from there the old wives' tale about lightning not striking twice was proved untrue, as Ramsey streaked the 55 yards to the goal for his second tally of the evening. The pass attempt at the conversion went astray, and the score stood at 14 for the Dragons, 0 for the Mountaineers.

Following the kickoff, the local footballers moved the ball around between their own 27 and their 4 yard line, going forward part of the time and backwards part of the time, and finally kicked to the Bangs 37. The Dragons took the punt, made 15 yards on a penalty against the Mountaineers, lost five on a penalty, carried five on a run by Ramsey, lost 15 on a penalty, and ended up punting to the Santa Anna 35, as the quarter ended. Score: Bangs-14, Santa Anna-0, officials-nine penalties for 85 yards.

The second quarter turned into a seesaw battle, with Bangs having somewhat the better of things, as the officials, apparently exhausted by flag-throwing in the first period assessed only one penalty. After a strong stand halted a Bangs drive on the Santa Anna 10 yard line late in the half, the Mountaineers fumbled on the first play from scrimmage after taking possession, and the Dragons recovered. The first play out of the bag was a pass from quarterback Hallford to end Mark Anderson, for the final tally of the evening, with 22 seconds left in the half. Another pass attempt for two points failed, and the half ended on a 20-0 mark.

A different Mountaineer squad took the field following halftime, possibly bolstered by the occasional presence in the lineup of Frank Valdez, who saw limited action due to an injury. During the second half, the

Mountaineers were the better team on the field. In the third quarter, the Santa Annans picked up two first downs while limiting the Dragons to one. The halftime rest apparently revived the referees, as they meted out four penalties during the third period, for a total of 30 yards.

As the third period drew to a close, the Mountaineers mounted a drive beginning on their own 12 and moving on runs by Roy Joe Harvey and a Harvey-to-Valdez pass, to the Santa Anna 35 yard line, and a first down.

The drive ran out of steam as the fourth period opened, and the fourth down kick was partially blocked, ending up on the Santa Anna 5. The Dragons ran only one successful play after taking over, however, before the hard-charging Mountaineers jarred halfback Ronnie Horton lose from the ball, with Valdez recovering for the locals.

Despite a pair of completed passes, the Mountaineers were unable to pick up first down yardage, and the ball went over again on downs. Bangs got the pigskin on the Santa Anna 46, and three downs later they were still on the 46, as the Mountaineers put the brakes on the ever-dangerous Ramsey, necessitating a kick. Taking the ball on their own 18, the local team moved down to the Dragon 35 on the good right arm of quarterback Lindon Wells, who completed tosses to Valdez and Harvey. However, a pass interception ended this Mountaineer drive. It only took Bangs four plays to run out of downs, and the punt carried to the Santa Anna 35. From there another farcial situation took place, as the officials called so many penalties, and the head linesman allowed the down count to become so confused, that no one, least of all the Mountaineers, knew which down was coming up. Assuming a third down situation, the Mountaineers were surprised to learn that the officials had decided the down was the fourth, a fact they imparted to the local team after the down had been run. The scoreboard showed second down, the field marker showed third down, and the officials decided it was fourth down.

Again Bangs tried to move the ball without too much success, and the punt was taken by the Mountaineers on their own 15 yard line. With 10 seconds showing on the clock, Wells uncorked a pass to Gary Rider who weaved through Dragon tacklers and tightroped the sideline all the way to the goal. However, the inevitable red flag lay on the field about the Bangs 15 yard line. Clipping was the ruling. The game was declared ended and the touchdown null-

fied, despite efforts of Mountaineer coach Rufus Cobern to protest two incorrect aspects of the call: (1) That Rider had crossed the goal before the offense occurred, which under the rules followed by most officials, means the touchdown counts, with the penalty being assessed on the try for extra point; and (2) That if the penalty did stand up, the Mountaineers were entitled to another down, since the rulebook states that a game cannot end on a penalty, and the play must be taken over. To this argument, the official in question replied, "game's over" and sprinted for his car. A fitting climax to a very poorly called game.

In the statistics department, the Dragons garnered eight first downs while the Mountaineers were gaining four. Bangs passed eight times, completed three for 63 yards, Santa Anna was tossing 16 times, with six completions for 159 yards. Although the Mountaineers outgained the Dragons in the air, it was a different story on the ground, as the Santa Anna squad could only pick up 18 yards this way, while Bangs was grinding out 230. Santa Anna kicked nine times, averaging 21 yards per boot, and Bangs punted four times, for a 28 yard average. Each team lost three fumbles, and each lost the ball once on pass interceptions. The referees gained 170 yards on 18 penalties.

In writing reports of these games, The News attempts to report as objectively as possible while giving readers the feeling and flavor of the game. The only way this could be done in regard to this contest is in reporting the quality of officiating. This in no way should be taken to detract for the accomplishment of the Bangs team in winning the game.

An example of the quality of officiating took place during the midpart of the game, when the Mountaineers were penalized 15 yards, for unsportsmanlike conduct, for accidentally having 12 men on the field. This offense is normally assessed five yards, for illegal procedure, unless the officials are sure that it is done intentionally. Despite the frantic efforts of the Santa Anna coaches to get the extra man off the field in this particular instance, the official ruled that the offense was intentional, thus unsportsmanlike conduct. In several years of covering high school football games, this is the first time this reporter has seen this call, or even heard of it being used.

The players of both teams tried their best during the game. It is to be hoped that hereafter the officials will do the same.
