### Local Air Force Man, Howard Voss, Receives Air Commendation Medal

Airman First Class Howard S. Voss, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. P. Voss, of Santa Anna, was awarded the Air Force Commendation Medal in ceremonies October 5, at A1C Voss' duty station in Japan.

The citation accompanying the Medal read: "Airman Second Class Howard S. Voss, AF25864957, distinguished himself by outstanding achievement while assigned to the 6921 Security Wing, United States Air Force Security Service, from 1

February 1960 to 30 April 1964. During this period, Airman Voss' unselfish devotion to duty, outstanding technical skill and tenacity resulted in the formulation of analytical techniques which yielded information of the utmost importance to this command and related agencies. His outstanding performance and sincere devotion to duty have reflected most favorably upon himself, the United States Air Force Security Service, and the United States Air Force."

Airman Voss was promoted from Airman Second Class to Airman First Class during October in addition to receiving the Air Force Commendation Medal.

A1C Voss is a 1961 graduate of Santa Anna High School. He entered the Air Force in January of 1962, following two years of Air Force Reserve duty.

### Annual Budget Okayed By School Board Tuesday

The Board of Trustees of the Santa Anna Independent School District met Tuesday, October 6, in the board room of the Coleman County Telephone Cooperative building. Among main points of business handled was the adoption of the budget for the 1964-1965 school year.

Largest items of expense are teacher salaries, \$112,000.50, and administrative salaries, \$19,785. Retirement of serial bonds will take \$8,000, and interest on these bonds will require \$6,135. Total budget expenditures will be \$185,429.73.

Income and funds available will total \$195,277.43, according to the adopted budget. Of this total, \$70,608 from local sources, and \$113,973 from state sources. As of September 30, enrollment in the Santa Anna Independent School District totaled 449 students.

### Lions Club To Sell Light Bulbs Monday

The annual Lions Club light bulb sale is scheduled for Monday, October 19. This annual event sponsored by the Santa Anna Lions Club helps raise funds for various Lions Club activities. Among projects sponsored by the Lions Club of Texas are a rehabilitation camp for crippled children, and training and guidance facilities for blind adults.

The local sale features sacks of light bulbs selling for \$2 per sack. A regular assortment includes four 100-watt bulbs, two 75-watt bulbs, and two 60-watt bulbs. However, other assortments can be furnished on request.

The Santa Anna Lions Club has been divided into teams for the sale, with each team responsible for one of the five city zones.

All Santa Annans are urged to support this annual sale, according to local Lions Club president Chester Galloway. Besides getting a bargain on light bulbs, they will be helping the Lions to help many unfortunate youngsters and adults.

### Local Farm Bureau Sets Annual Meet Thursday, Oct. 22

The annual membership meeting of the Coleman County Farm Bureau will be held at 6:00 p.m., Thursday, October 22, at the Recreational Building on the Coleman County Rodeo Grounds.

Among features of the meeting will be election of 16 directors, four from each precinct in the County; adoption of resolutions; election of delegates to the state convention in Houston, November 8 to 11; and lots of barbecue. Each family is asked to bring a salad and a dessert.

### Coleman County Sues Two Others Over Boundaries

Echoes of the days of range wars and boundary disputes sounded in 52nd District Court this week, as Coleman County filed suit against Taylor and Callahan counties, charging discrepancies in the common boundaries of Coleman County with the other two.

The alleged overlap between Coleman and Taylor counties amounts to about 400 feet along the four and one half mile common border. Along the 25 mile boundary between Coleman and Callahan counties, the disputed territory ranges from 400 to 850 feet wide.

Principle purpose for the suit is clarification of the proper boundary between the counties for taxation reasons.

Coleman County asked in the suit for the Court to establish the Coleman County boundaries as the proper and legal borders. The suit alleges that the Coleman County boundary was established by survey by J. T. Evans in 1885.

### Santa Anna Ends Survival Course

Staff Sergeant Pleamon Cruger Jr., formerly of Santa Anna, has completed the rigorous US Air Force survival and special training course conducted by the Air Training Command at Stead AFB, Nevada.

Sergeant Cruger, an inflight refueling operator, received combat-type escape and evasion training to enable him to survive under adverse climatic conditions and hostile environments.

The Sergeant is being assigned to a unit at Blytheville AFB, Arkansas, which supports the Strategic Air Command mission of keeping the nation's intercontinental missiles and jet bombers on constant alert.

The Sergeant is a graduate of Santa Anna High School. His wife is the former Marcella A. Fusila of Omaha, Nebraska.

The Santa Anna Volunteer Fire Department was busy during the past week, standing by during the Coleman fire (story elsewhere in this issue), putting out a barn fire and dousing an automobile that turned into a real hot rod.

### Coleman Fire Hits Business Buildings

A late Sunday night fire seriously damaged two Coleman businesses and threatened other buildings in the downtown area of the county seat city.

Gray Mercantile Company of Texas, 109 West Pecan, and King's Cafeteria, next door, were both heavily damaged by a fire that apparently started from defective electrical wiring on an upstairs floor of the Gray Mercantile building. Hinds and Lindsey Insurance Company offices were not damaged by fire, but suffered some water damage.

First alarm went in about 9:15 Sunday night. The Coleman Fire Department, aided by units from the Halliburton Oil Well Cementing Company and from Dago Oil Well Cementing Company, fought the blaze, trying to stop the fire roaring through the two businesses, and protect surrounding structures. Units from Santa Anna, Abilene, and Brownwood were on standby alert, but were not called.

No complete estimate of damage is available at presstime, but Mark Griffiths, an owner of Gray Mercantile, said that the firm had a pre-holiday season inventory of from \$30,000 to \$40,000 in appliances in the building. One good point, Griffiths said, was that all the color television sets owned by the firm were out for demonstration the night of the fire.

According to reports, the building housing the mercantile firm was one of the oldest business structures in Coleman. The electrical wiring in the building at the time of the fire was the original wiring installed when the building was constructed.

None of the firefighters, including professional and volunteer members of the Coleman Fire Department and many local citizens, were injured in the blaze. The fire was brought under control about 12:30 Monday morning, although the debris still smoked heavily at 9:00 a.m. Monday.

No plans for reopening or relocating the two businesses have been announced at presstime.

### Park Land Set To Be Sold For Medical Center

In a record turnout, for this type of election, the voters of Santa Anna overwhelmingly balloted to allow the city council to sell a portion of old Ranger Park, in east Santa Anna, for the construction of the first unit of a new medical center.

With 317 votes cast, the final tally stood at 230 for the proposal, 85 against, and two ballots thrown out for improper marking.

So large and unprecedented was the vote that although a record number of ballots had been printed, it was necessary for the city to make a rush order about 3:30 p.m. to have additional ballots printed.

Voters cast ballots for or against "Granting the City Commission of the City of Santa Anna, Texas the authority to sell its interest in part or all of that certain tract of land known as 'Ranger Park' in HT&B RR Survey number 58, Abstract 1615 in Coleman County, Texas and being described in Deed of Record in Volume 405, Page 200 of the Deed Records of Coleman County, Texas here referred to."

Despite faulty early information issued by the city to the effect that property tax payers were eligible to vote with no poll tax receipt needed, the turnout exceeded expectations. In fact, the reverse was true, with all poll tax payers residing within the city eligible to vote whether property owners or not.

Main reason for the election was to allow the city to sell a 2.4 acre portion of the old park to the Santa Anna Medical Center for the first unit of a new medical, a 40 bed rest home. The city will receive \$250 for the 2.4 acres.

Mayor Ford Barnes hailed the results of the election as a vote of confidence in the city commission. The overwhelming manner in which the proposal was approved was also interpreted as a vote for the continuing growth of Santa Anna by the people of the city.

Credit was given to The Santa Anna News for the number of citizens voting by urging a large turnout in the Tuesday election.

Starting date for the rest home now depends on how quickly title and deed arrangements conveying the land can be worked out.

## LEGAL NOTICES

## ORDINANCE NO. 227

**AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING DRILLING OR OPERATING WELLS FOR OIL AND GAS AND OTHER MINERALS WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF SANTA ANNA, TEXAS, WITHOUT A PERMIT; PROVIDING REGULATIONS CONTROLLING THE DRILLING OF SUCH WELLS; FIXING THE TERMS AND CONDITIONS FOR SECURING PERMIT; PROVIDING FOR FEES TO BE PAID FOR SAID PERMIT; PROVIDING FOR POSTING OF BONDS TO INDEMNIFY THE CITY AND/OR THE INDIVIDUALS FROM LOSS BY VIRTUE OF SAID WELLS, AND FIXING THE AMOUNT OF SAID BONDS; PROVIDING FOR THE DIVIDING OF THE CITY INTO DRILLING BLOCKS AND LIMITING THE NUMBER OF WELLS TO BE DRILLED IN ANY ONE BLOCK; ESTABLISHING A TAX ON PRODUCTION FROM SUCH WELLS; MAKING THE VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE A MISDEMEANOR; FIXING THE PENALTIES FOR SUCH VIOLATION; REPEALING ALL LAWS IN CONFLICT HERewith AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.**

**BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF SANTA ANNA, TEXAS:**

Section 1. The word "person" wherever used in this ordinance means and includes any natural person, corporation, association, partnership, receiver, trustee, guardian, executor, administrator and a fiduciary or representative of any kind.

The term "drilling block" is defined to be a tract of land consisting of lots or blocks adjacent or contiguous to each other, and forming one unit of land, and containing not less than ten acres each. Boundaries of the drilling blocks are hereby established and adopted as shown on the map attached hereto and referred to above, which map is hereby designated as the "Drilling District Map", and said map and all the notations, references and information shown thereon are hereby made a part of this ordinance as if the same were set forth in full herein. It shall be the duty of the City Secretary to keep on file in his office the original of said drilling block map and duplicate copies thereof, showing all of the changes, amendments or additions thereto.

Section 2. It shall be unlawful for any person to drill or commence to drill a well for oil or gas within the limits of the City of Santa Anna, Texas, or to work upon or assist in any way in the prosecution of the drilling of any such well without a permit for the drilling, completion and operation of such well having been first issued by authority of the City Commission of the City of Santa Anna, Texas, in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 3. The drilling, completion and operation of only one well for oil or gas may be authorized by permit as herein provided on each drilling block shown and designated on the attached map, hereby referred to and made a part hereof for all purposes; and it shall be unlawful to drill more than one well on each such drilling block; provided, however, that in the event a well is lost or abandoned as a dry hole, the permittee may relocate the well on the drilling block involved and drill and complete such relocated well under the permit for the first well by filing a plat and certificate showing the abandonment of first well and the location of the second well.

Section 4. It shall be unlawful to drill any well for oil or gas within any of the streets or alleys of the City of Santa Anna, Texas, or to block or encumber or close up any street or alley in any drilling or producing operations except by special permit by order of the City Commission, and then only temporarily.

Section 5. In the event any application for a permit for the drilling, completion and operation of a well for oil or gas shall be made by any person not owning or not holding oil and gas contracts from the owners of all lots, blocks or parcels of land included or embraced within a drilling block as shown upon the map hereto attached, a permit shall be issued to such applicant, his heirs, successors and assigns only upon the following conditions in addition to such other sections of this ordinance,

to-wit:

The applicant shall be free to enter into such contracts and agreements with the owners of such other lots, blocks or tracts as he may be able to make. If agreements are not reached with all owners of lots, tracts and blocks within the drilling block, then the owner or owners of oil and/or gas lease or leases and/or owner or owners of the right to lease oil and/or gas of any given lot or lots, block or blocks, tract or tracts shall have the right of option, by notice to the permittee given in writing within thirty (30) days after the issuance of a permit for a well on the drilling block involved, either (1) to treat his interest as a working interest and to contribute toward the actual cost and expense of drilling, completing and operating said well with all necessary appurtenances currently each month in the proportion to the said interest owned and in the proportion that the number of square feet in area owned by him in the drilling block bears to the number of square feet embraced in said block, and thereupon receive the same proportion of the oil produced and saved from such well or the value at the well at the option of the permittee and a like proportion of natural gas produced, saved and utilized or sold, or the value of same at the well at the option of the permittee; or (2) to treat his interest as a royalty interest and receive, delivered free of cost in the pipe line to which the well is connected, a share of all oil produced and saved from such well, equal to one-eighth (1/8) of the proportion of the whole quantity of oil so produced and saved that the number of square feet in the area owned by him bears to the number of square feet in such drilling block, or at the election of permittee to receive such proportion of the value at the well of oil so produced and to receive a like proportion of the gas and casinghead gas produced, saved and utilized or sold, or at the election of permittee the value at the well of such proportion of gas or casinghead gas produced, saved and utilized or sold, or at the election of permittee within the period provided, the obligation shall then be upon the permittee, his heirs, successors, and assigns, to make settlement with such owner on the terms provided in Option 2 above, providing for the payment of a one-eighth (1/8) royalty. If the owner of a lot or lots, block or blocks, tract or tracts shall exercise Option 1 above, and treat his interest as a working interest, as therein provided, the permittee shall be entitled to reimburse himself for such owners proportionate part of oil, gas and casinghead gas or the value thereof, making deliveries of products or settlement for the value thereof. If Option 1 is exercised by the owner of any lot or lots, block or blocks, tract or tracts, such owner shall, within the time provided for notice of his election above set forth, file with the City Secretary a bond or other obligation executed by such owner as principal and by an authorized surety company as surety, in which such principal and surety agree, bind and obligate themselves to pay to the permittee, his heirs, successors and assigns currently each month that proportion of the actual and necessary costs and expenses involved in the drilling, completion and operation of such well that the number of square feet embraced within the lot or lots, block or blocks, tract or tracts, of such owner bears to the total number of square feet in such drilling block, such bond to be approved by the Mayor and held by the City Secretary for the benefit of the beneficiaries therein. Permits shall be issued in all such cases upon the condition that the permittee, his heirs, successors and assigns shall make settlement in accordance with the provisions hereof.

In determining the total number of square feet in a drilling block there shall be included the area in streets and alleys within the drilling block. In determining the total number of square feet embraced within a lot or lots, block or blocks, tract or tracts, there shall be included that portion of streets and alleys which the owner of the lot, block or tract owns, but no part of any street or alley shall be so included where title to the street or alley involved (subject only to easement for public use)

is not in the owner of the lot, block or tract.

Section 6. In case there should be filed with the City Secretary and pending at the same time applications for permits to drill on any single drilling block within the limits of the city made by more than one applicant, that application shall be granted, if otherwise sufficient, which shall be made by the person holding the greater area of ground within the drilling block by ownership in fee or by lease or other contract authorizing the drilling and operation on land for oil or gas.

Section 7. Every application for a permit to drill, complete and operate a well for oil or gas shall be in writing, signed by the applicant or by some person duly authorized to sign same on his behalf. It shall be filed with the City Secretary and accompanied with a deposit of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) cash as a fee to the city. The application shall state the drilling block and the particular lot and location in the block where the proposed well is to be located, and shall have attached to it certified or photostatic copies of the deed, oil and gas lease or drilling contract with the owners of land covering the lot, block, tract or tracts in said drilling block over which the applicant has control for oil and gas purposes, together with abstracts of title or certificates of title satisfactory to the City Commission, to the end that the application will show what proportion and what parts of the drilling block the applicant owns in fee or holds under lease or drilling contract from the owners. The applicant may withdraw the abstracts or certificates of title after they have been examined by the City Commission. The application shall also be accompanied by a plat or map of the drilling block, showing the designation of the lots, blocks or tracts owned or controlled by the applicant and showing the exact location of the proposed well, which location shall be as nearly as practicable in the center of the drilling block. The application shall also be accompanied by two duly executed bonds, each given by the applicant as principal and a surety company authorized to do business in the State of Texas as surety. One of these bonds shall run to the City of Santa Anna, Texas, for the benefit of the city and all persons, firms and corporations concerned, conditioned that if the permit be granted and if drilling operations be commenced thereunder the applicant and his assigns will comply with the terms and conditions of this ordinance in the drilling and operation of a well; that the applicant will restore the streets and sidewalks and other public places of the city which may be disturbed in the operations to their former condition, will clear the block and lots of all litter, machinery, derricks and buildings erected or used in the drilling or operation of said well whenever the well shall be abandoned or the operation thereof discontinued, and that the applicant or his assigns shall pay any and all damages recoverable at law against him or them suffered by any person or corporation as to property in the city from fire or from oil, gas or water caused by or originating from the operations connected with such well. Such bond shall be in the sum of Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00); provided, however, that if within thirty (30) days after the drilling and completion of said well no claims have been presented against the applicant or his assigns under the terms and conditions of such bond, then the sum of same shall be automatically reduced to Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00). The other bond above provided for shall run to the City of Santa Anna, Texas, for the benefit of all persons, firms, or corporations owning lots, blocks or tracts of land in said drilling block who have not executed at the time of the filing of such bond or who shall not execute during the term of said bond and prior to the accrual of liability thereunder leases, drilling contracts, waivers, or other form of contract under which the applicant or his assigns is or are authorized to operate the premises of said owner for the development and production of oil and gas, and shall be conditioned upon the settlement or payment by the applicant or his assigns for oil and gas in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance. This bond shall be in the

sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00); provided, however, that the sum of the bond shall be automatically reduced by an amount in proportion to the difference between the total area of the drilling block and the total area owned by the applicant in fee or covering which he has leases from or drilling contracts with or waivers from the owners authorizing operations for the development and production of oil or gas. It is specifically provided that, in lieu of any surety bond or bonds required to be given hereunder, the applicant may file with the City Secretary his personal undertaking or undertakings, which shall be in the same amount and shall contain the same conditions as hereinbefore provided with respect to surety bonds, and which undertaking or undertakings shall be secured by United States Government security or securities of the State of Texas or of counties or municipalities in the State of Texas having a par value equal to the amount of the surety bond or bonds in lieu of which such undertaking or undertakings is or are given, which securities shall be deposited in escrow in a state or national bank jointly selected by the City Secretary and the applicant or his assigns along with and attached to a copy of the written undertaking for which they are to be held as security.

Section 8. Notice of filing of each application for permit shall be given by the applicant as follows: At least ten (10) days prior to the date of hearing on the application, a copy of notice in the form hereinafter prescribed shall be sent by registered mail to each owner and lease of lots, blocks and tracts in said drilling block not owned by or under lease to the applicant, addressed to the last known address of such land and lease owners if known to the applicant; and a copy of such notice shall likewise be published at the cost of applicant in every issue of the official paper of the City of Santa Anna, Texas, for ten (10) days prior to the date of such hearing. If the official paper be published weekly, the publication shall be made in one issue thereof for the period of time prescribed. Such notice shall state the lot and block number on which the applicant is asking for a permit to drill and the date and place of hearing, and shall be in words and figures as follows:

"Notice is hereby given that \_\_\_\_\_, acting under and pursuant to the terms and provisions of an Ordinance Regulating the Drilling of Oil and Gas Wells within the Limits of the City of Santa Anna, Texas, and Providing for the Public Safety in connection therewith, being Ordinance No. \_\_\_\_\_, did, on the \_\_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_, 19\_\_\_\_, file with the City Secretary of the City of Santa Anna, Texas, an application for a permit to drill a well for oil and/or gas upon Lot No. \_\_\_\_\_, Block No. \_\_\_\_\_, in Drilling District No. \_\_\_\_\_, as defined by Ordinance No. \_\_\_\_\_. A Hearing upon such application will be held in the office of the City Secretary of the City of Santa Anna, Texas, at \_\_\_\_\_ on the \_\_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_, 19\_\_\_\_, at \_\_\_\_\_ M."

Proof of notice shall be made by the applicant by filing with the City Secretary an affidavit of the printer or publisher of the paper in which the notice is published containing a copy of the notice and stating the issue of which and period of time during which the notice was published, an affidavit of the applicant showing the date and persons to whom the addresses to which the notice was mailed by the applicant, and proof that such addresses are the last addresses of the persons involved known to the applicant.

At the time fixed in said notice a hearing on such application shall be held at the office of the City Secretary.

Section 9. The City Commission shall have the power and reserves the authority to refuse any application for a permit where by reason of the location of the proposed well and the character and value of the permanent improvements already erected on the drilling block in question or adjacent thereto and the use to which the land and surroundings are adapted for civic purposes, or for sanitary reasons, the drilling of an oil or gas well will be a serious disadvantage to either the health, safety, morals or welfare of the city and its inhabitants; but when a permit shall be refused for any of these reasons, but not otherwise, the

deposit in cash as a fee made with the application shall be returned to the applicant. Except as hereinbefore provided, if an application be found by the City Commission to comply in all respects with the terms of this ordinance, the city shall be authorized to issue a permit for drilling, completion and operation of the well applied for. The granting and issuance of a permit for a well on a drilling block as provided in this ordinance shall automatically operate as a rejection and denial of all other pending application or applications for a well or wells upon the drilling block involved, or any portion or portions thereof.

Section 10. No permit shall be granted or issued for the drilling of a well except upon ground owned by the applicant or held by him under oil and gas lease or drilling contract from the owner, giving the owner's permission or authority to drill the well; and when a permit shall have been issued, the same shall terminate and become inoperative without any action on the part of the City Commission unless within ninety (90) days from the date of issue actual drilling of the well shall have been commenced; and after the drilling of the well shall have commenced; the cessation of drilling operations prior to the completion of the well for a period of six (6) months shall operate to terminate and cancel the permit and the well shall be considered as abandoned for all purposes of this ordinance, and it shall be unlawful thereafter to continue the operation or drilling of such well without the issuance of another permit; provided that if said well shall be completed as a producer and shall thereafter cease to produce, the permittee shall have the right to conduct deepening or reworking operations on said well within six (6) months after cessation of production without having to procure a new license. If and when any permit shall terminate and become inoperative as in this section provided, or if and when the permittee or his assigns shall file with the City Commission written notice of his or their election to surrender his or their permit and abandon the premises covered thereby, then if no claims under the bond or bonds, undertaking or undertakings shall have been filed within thirty (30) days, the City Secretary shall return the bond or bonds, undertaking or undertakings theretofore furnished by the permittee in connection with such permit; and if claims are filed within such time, upon the satisfaction or defeat of such claims such bond or bonds, undertaking or undertakings and/or security or securities shall thereupon be returned to the permittee or his assigns.

Section 11. Neither this ordinance nor any permit issued hereunder shall be interpreted to grant any right or license to the permittee to enter upon or occupy in any respect in drilling or production operations any land except by the written consent of owner; nor shall it limit or prevent the free right of any lot owner to contract for the amount of royalty to be paid with respect to his own land or other consideration therefor, or for damages, rights or privileges without respect thereto.

Section 12. In operations under a permit the permittee or his assigns must observe the following rules, and the failure to observe same shall be unlawful, to-wit:

(a) All permanent oil tanks or battery of tanks must be surrounded by a dike or ditch of at least the capacity of the tank or battery of tanks.

(b) No flow tank, unless it is entirely buried, or other tank of any size, shall hereafter be placed nearer than one hundred fifty (150) feet to any derrick, rig, building, power plant or boiler of any description.

(c) No field working tank having a capacity of ten thousand (10,000) barrels or more shall hereafter be built nearer than two hundred (200) feet (measured from shell to shell) to any other like tank or tanks.

(d) Printed signs reading: "Dangerous, No Smoking Allowed", or similar words, shall be posted in conspicuous places on each producing drilling unit.

(e) All permittees' premises shall be kept clear of high grass, weeds and combustible trash within a radius of one hundred (100) feet around an oil tank, tanks or producing wells.

(f) Open earthen storage for oil is prohibited.

(g) All oil tanks, where there is a gas hazard, shall be gas

tight and provided with proper vents.

(h) No forge or open light shall be placed inside the derrick of a well showing oil or gas.

(i) Boilers must be equipped with steam lines for fighting fire and must not be set nearer than one hundred (100) feet to any producing well.

(j) All oil and gas pipe lines laid upon or across a public road or highway must be buried to a reasonably safe depth.

(k) Wherever available and practical, electric light and power shall be installed in congested drilling areas.

(l) A minimum of one hundred (100) feet of surface casing shall be set and cemented with sufficient cement to fill the annular space back of the casing to the surface. Cementing shall be by the pump and plug method. Cement shall be allowed to stand a minimum of forty-eight (48) hours before drilling the plug. The position of the oil horizon shall be determined by coring or testing and the producing string swung and cemented at the top thereof.

(m) A blow-out preventer, control head and other connections for keeping the well under control at all times shall be installed as soon as surface casing is set. The blow-out preventer on the second string shall be hydraulically controlled. Blow-out preventer shall be tested against pump pressure at least once every twenty-four (24) hours; all control equipment shall be in good working order condition at all times.

(n) All wells shall be equipped with a Bradenhead with a working pressure sufficient to protect well under pressures encountered. The Bradenhead shall not be welded; and the same shall be equipped with the proper pipe connection and valve accessible at the surface.

(o) No boiler or electric lighting generator shall be placed nearer than one hundred fifty (150) feet to any producing well or oil tank.

(p) Any rubbish or debris that might constitute a fire hazard shall be removed to a distance of at least one hundred (100) feet from the vicinity of wells, tanks, and pump stations. All waste shall be burned or disposed of in such manner as to avoid creating a fire hazard or polluting fresh water strata.

(q) All well heads, pits and tank batteries shall be adequately protected with "man proof" fencing.

(r) The person, firm or corporation so drilling or operating an oil and/or gas well shall make adequate provision for the disposal of salt water or other impurities which he may bring to the surface of the earth in such manner as not to contaminate the water supply of the City of Santa Anna, Texas, or to destroy vegetation.

Section 13. In addition to all other taxes provided by law, there is hereby levied a tax on oil produced within the City of Santa Anna, Texas, of 2 cents per barrel of 42 standard gallons. Said tax shall be computed upon the total barrels of oil produced or salvaged through the earth within the city and shall be based upon tank tables showing one percent of production and exact measurements of contents. Provided, however, that the tax herein levied on oil shall be two percent of the market value of said oil whenever the market value thereof is below one dollar (\$1.00) per barrel of forty-two (42) standard gallons. The market value of oil, as that term is used herein, shall be the actual market value thereof, plus any bonus or premiums or any other things of value paid therefor or which such oil will reasonably bring if produced in accordance with the laws of the United States, State of Texas and the City of Santa Anna, Texas.

The tax hereby levied shall be a liability of the producer of oil, and it shall be the duty of such producer to keep accurate records of all oil produced, making semi-annual reports as hereinafter provided.

The purchaser of oil shall pay the tax on all oil purchased and deduct tax so paid from payment to producer or other interest holder, making such payments so deducted to the City Secretary by legal tender or cashier's check payable to the City Secretary. Provided that if the oil produced is not sold during the semi-annual period in which produced, then said producer shall pay the tax at the same rate and in the manner as if the oil were sold.

The tax levied herein shall be paid semi-annually on or before

the 31st day of each August on oil produced during the preceding first six months of the calendar year and on or before the 31st day of each January on oil produced during the preceding last six months of the preceding calendar year by the purchaser or producer as the case may be, but in no event shall a producer be relieved of responsibility for the tax until same shall have been paid; and provided, in event the amount of the tax herein levied shall be withheld by a purchaser from payments due a producer and said purchaser fails to make payment of the tax to the City of Santa Anna, Texas, as provided herein, the producer upon paying said tax shall be subrogated to the right of the City of Santa Anna, Texas, to collect from the purchaser the penalties and interest which may have otherwise accrued by failure to make payments as hereinafter stated.

It is further provided that unless such payment of tax on all oil produced during any six months' period shall be made on or before the date specified above, such payment shall become delinquent, and a penalty of 5 percent of the amount of the tax shall be added, whereupon such tax and penalty shall bear interest at the rate of 3 percent per annum from the

date due until date paid. The tax herein levied shall be borne ratably by all interested parties, including royalty interest, and producers and/or purchasers of oil are hereby authorized and required to withhold from any payment due interested parties the proportionate tax due.

The City of Santa Anna, Texas, shall have a lien in and upon each oil well and the equipment incident thereto, together with the respective interest of all parties therein, to secure the payment to the City of Santa Anna, Texas, of all taxes due hereunder on oil produced from said oil wells; and this lien shall be in addition to any other liens and methods provided herein or by law for the collection of taxes.

**Section 14.** Any violation of any of the terms of this ordinance, whether herein denominated as unlawful or not, shall be deemed a misdemeanor; and any persons convicted of any such violation shall be fined in a sum not exceeding One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00); and any natural person so convicted shall be committed to jail until such fine and costs are paid. Each day of the continuance of such violation shall be considered a separate offense and be punished separately; and any person, agent or employee in such violation be so punished

therefor.

**Section 15.** Any and all ordinances of the city which are in conflict with any of the terms of this ordinance be and the same are to the extent of the conflict hereby repealed.

**Section 16.** If any section, sentence, clause, or part of this ordinance shall, for any reason, be held invalid, such decision shall not affect the remaining portions of this ordinance, and it is hereby declared to be the intention of this Commission to have passed each sentence, section, clause or part thereof irrespective of the fact that any other sentence, section, clause or part thereof may be declared invalid.

**Section 17.** This ordinance shall take effect and be in force upon its publication in THE SANTA ANNA NEWS.

## Prison Rodeo Performances To Be Held Each Sunday During October

October is Texas Prison Rodeo month, and each Sunday will find thousands of Texans converging on Huntsville to witness one of the most colorful and roughest rodeos of its kind in the world.

The main attraction in each show will be tough inmate cowboys attempting to tame tougher prison-produced broncs and bulls in a host of events not usually found in other rodeos.

Each performance is opened with a Prison Rodeo "Special" known as the Mad Scramble. Ten chute gates swing wide simultaneously, and 15,000 pounds of humped hatred—in the form of vicious Brahman bulls—catapult into the arena, a man clinging desperately to each heaving back. This is rodeo behind the walls, rodeo as wild and savage, yet fantastically funny, as any in the nation.

Additional events include the calf tussle—40 calves and 80 men loose in the arena at the same time. In two-man teams, the cowboys will try to wrestle their calf (if you can call a 400-pound critter a calf) across the finish line for top money. Another prison rodeo special called "hard money" features one engaged Brahman bull with \$50 tied to his horns by means of a nylon string. The object of the game is very simple: Just walk up to the bull, and remove the sack from the bull's horns.

For added attractions and specialty acts, Rodeo officials have booked some of the greatest names traveling the professional rodeo circuit today. These include trick riders Ted and Betty Lamb, Maureen Moon, and Connie Griffith, whose fabulous acts have been hailed by rodeo reducers everywhere as "the greatest in rodeo of this age;" such famous clowns and trick riders as Billy Keen and Bill Garsee who have appeared at every major rodeo in the Southwest the past several years, plus widely known mounted quadrilles from throughout the state.

The highlight attraction will be the personal appearance of the Duke of Paducah, Sunday, October 4 and 11, at 2:00 p.m. Guest stars on succeeding Sun-

days include the ever popular musical comedy of the Harmonica Rascals on October 18 and 25, and country singing personality Jimmy Dean on October 25. Pre-rodeo and between-events entertainment will be furnished by talented inmate groups such as the Western Stringsters, the Jail House Beatles, the Jug Band, the Hungry Three, the Barber Shop Quartet, the Military Band, and the popular Goree Gals from the women's unit of the Texas Department of Corrections.

Net proceeds of the rodeo go into the educational and recreational fund of the Department. The fund supports such inmate activities as education, vocational training, recreation, spiritual guidance and special dental, optical and medical services not provided by the state.

Reserved seat tickets are \$2.40; \$3.75 and \$4.40 each, tax included. Tickets may be obtained by writing Rodeo Ticket Office, Huntsville, Texas, enclosing check or money order.

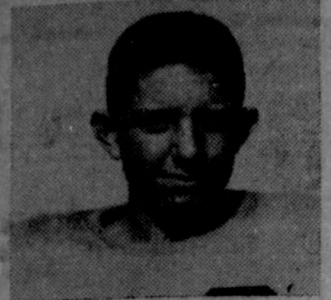

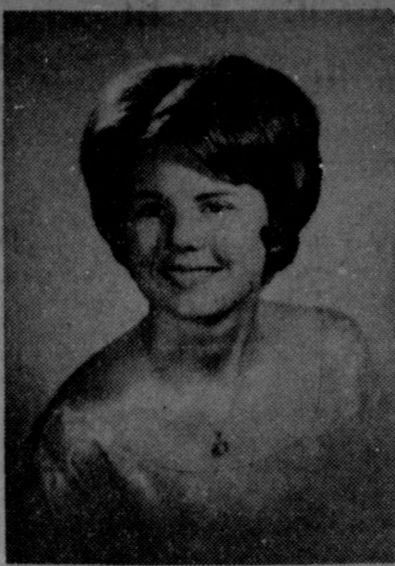

The wild free rapture of desert love, burning sands, flaming love and the torch of faith. The walls of the Mission school were not enough to keep out the hot flame of desert passion." Sounds like it was written by a firebug.

## WATER

Source of water supplies for Texans in the year 2000 will be the subject of a massive hurry-up research job by the Texas Water Commission and other cooperating state agencies and consulting engineers.

Report will be complete by November, 1966, if the Legislature provides \$1,135,000 needed for the work.

Governor Connally, moving water to top priority along with higher education, gave the Commission \$46,000 from his emergency fund to get the work stepped up. The Commission already has switched 12 of its engineers and geologists from regular duties to planning work.

Connally will urge the Legislature in January to provide the necessary money for water planning.

### COTTON REPORT

The cotton harvest steadily gained momentum and sample receipts picked up considerably at the USDA Cotton Classing Office in Abilene. Samples classed for the week ending October 9, 1964, totaled 10,054 compared to 2,111 for the previous week. Total samples classed this season now stands at 26,622 compared to 89,852 at the corresponding date last season.

District 2 (Coleman, Runels, Taylor, Nolan, Mitchell, Scurry, Fisher, Jones, Stonewall, Kent and Dickens Counties) accounted for about one-half of the samples classed last week.

Grades dropped with seven percent of the cotton classed white compared to 18 percent for the previous week. Fifty four percent was light spotted and 38 percent was spotted, tinged or gray. Middling light spotted was the predominant grade with 29 percent of the samples in this group. Twenty three percent was classed strict low middling spotted. Less than one percent was tinged or gray. Six percent of the samples were reduced in grade due to grass, bark or rough preparation.

Staple lengths shortened considerably and were: 12 percent 13/16; 37 percent 7/8; 32 percent 29/32; 15 percent 15/16; three percent 31/32; and one percent one inch or longer.

Mike readings improved slightly. Ninety three percent miked in the 3.5 to 4.9 range. Four percent miked 3.0 to 3.4 and three percent miked 5.0 and above.

Demand for white cotton was almost nil and was poor for 7/8 and 13/16 cotton. Strict low middling light spotted and lower grades sold freely at 30 to 70 points over the CCC loan, net to the producer. Cottonseed prices advanced to \$45 and \$46 per ton FOB gin point.

## State Capitol NEWS

Governor John Connally has given new emphasis to the long drive to abolish the state property tax and leave the revenue source to local governments.

In two speeches during the past week — to county judges and commissioners and to the Texas Municipal League — the Governor called for a "phasing out" of the ad valorem levy by the state. That will require a constitutional amendment and, what Connally termed, a "period of readjustment."

Although the tax provides only 2.7 percent of the state's revenue, the Legislature, usually hard pressed to balance the budget, has been slow to act on abolishing the \$40,000,000 a year revenue source.

"There will never be a convenient time," acknowledged Connally. "All we need is the extra courage to do what should be done."

This step, he said, "is the most tangible way I know to put meaning in our plea for more local self-government."

Connally also told municipal officials that city problems should be solved at the local level. He warned against continued search for solutions at the state capitol level.

The Municipal League, as expected, recommended still another source of revenue for local government.

City officials told their TML board of directors that legislation authorizing cities to levy a municipal sales tax, subject to local voter approval, should be considered.

Directors in a mid-December meeting here will consider this proposal and almost certainly adopt it as one of the League's top legislative projects for 1965.

## MENTAL HEALTH AGENCY URGED

A 26-member group, planning improvements in Texas mental health services, recommends a central State Department of Mental Health.

Under the proposal submitted, all mental hospitals and clinics and present State Health Department services in the field would be transferred to the new agency. The full 112-member Mental Health Planning Committee scheduled an October 16 meeting here to complete its work and make recommendations to the next Legislature.

## CARR REPORTS ON ASSASSINATION

Attorney General Waggoner Carr's report on the assassination of President Kennedy criticized overzealous news coverage of subsequent events in Dallas and concluded that law enforcement agencies should improve their methods of exchanging information.

Governor Connally, who received the report last week, concurs in Carr's recommendations, which include the following:

—That lawyers and news media get together with officials and agree on working relationships designed to prevent "future disorder and confusion in pretrial activities, deficiencies in security for prisoners (and to) improve judicial ethics in criminal trials." (News media, including representatives of the Texas Press Association, already are meeting with a State Bar group on trial news coverage.)

—That Federal, state and local law enforcement agencies study how to keep each other better informed and recommend tighter security measures for high officials and distinguished guests in the state.

Carr's 5,000-word summary report, supported by 17 volumes of data, appeared particularly critical of the FBI's failure to inform local police that Lee Harvey Oswald was in Dallas.

Attorney General said he believed his decision to shelve plans for a Texas court of inquiry into the November 22 assassination and the wounding of Connally was wise, in view of the thorough job done by the Warren Commission. However, he said, he is ready to call such an inquiry if further investigation appears needed.

## TEACHER PAY RAISES BACKED

State Board of Education has thrown its weight behind teacher pay raises.

Proposal was one of 11 legislative objectives agreed on at a meeting here. Texas State Teachers Association is pushing for a \$45-a-month raise for classroom teachers. Board of Education did not specify any dollar amount.

## COURTS SPEAK

State Supreme Court got off to a brisk start in its 1964-65 term, handing down 100 decisions on the opening day, last week.

In the most spectacular of the rulings, court refused a State Bar request to block attorney Melvin Belli — he who lambasted Texas and its courts after his client, Jack Ruby, received the death sentence for shooting Lee Harvey Oswald. Should Belli try to enter another Texas case, the new opinion stated, his qualifications will be subject to review by the court in which the case is pending.

Court also: —Declined to hear a suit attacking the Texas Water Commission's approval of a \$12,500,000 dam and reservoir on Little Wichita River, a Wichita Falls city project. Landowners protested the site.

—Balked at reviewing its July 15 decision invalidating a trustee's sale of West Texas land on which Billie Sol Estes defaulted in payments. This ruling left standing an earlier decision in favor of four landowners from whom Estes leased the property after allegedly conveying it to them.

—Held that Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler must accept an oil and gas lease a Taylor County landowner insisted he executed with Trace Mining Company.

## The Oil Industry Is An Important Part Of The Coleman County Economy

A \$9.6 million a year ingredient in the prosperity of Coleman County is the production of oil and gas, the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association

says in its current survey of economic factors stemming from petroleum operations here.

Using just-published US Bureau of Mines figures as a base, the Association has projected what oil and gas activities mean in this County. In 1962 Coleman County was producing more than 2.7 million barrels of crude oil and 13 billion cubic feet of natural gas. The oil was valued at \$8 million; the natural gas at \$1.6 million.

Coleman County ranks 96th among the 254 counties in the state in total value of oil and gas production.

"Demand for Texas crude oil picked up enough last year to give us an increase of about three percent over 1962 on a statewide basis. This slightly improving trend seems to be holding this year as more autos are put on the road and nationwide business conditions accelerate," said James L. Sevell, president of the Association. "It will be several months, however, before we know to what extent individual counties are participating in the current market."

The dispersion of oil dollars through Coleman County business channels and the healthy effect given property values by petroleum industry activity are indicated by several figures published by the Association.

It is estimated that royalty payments to Coleman County landowners who are fortunate enough to have producing wells on their property create a "crop" worth about \$1.2 million annually. These and other farmers and ranchers who have leased acreage for exploration receive additional rental and bonus payments, but sufficient current data is not available for measuring the amount.

Oil and gas operators invested an estimated \$1.7 million in Coleman County last year in the

search for new fields and in the development of zones where production has been found. The Oil And Gas Journal reports that 105 wells were drilled in the County in 1963, resulting in 41 oil wells, seven gas wells, and 57 dry holes.

Drilling operations included 25 wildcat wells in which operators hunted oil in new territory or at new depths. About \$884,000 of the drilling expenditures was lost to dry holes, the Association estimated.

Petroleum industry payrolls contribute about \$1.5 million a year to the County, according to Texas Employment Commission records. They show about 360 persons directly employed in oil and gas operations.

The state government's financial interest in Coleman County operations is measured by the \$484,000 a year which the operators and royalty owners provide the state government in production taxes. These payments are in addition to those paid to local units of government and schools as property taxes. Oil and gas property taxes are reflected in local support of many Texas school districts. For example, 63.7 percent of the local taxes for the Talpa School District comes from oil and gas operations.

Among the County's industrial operations is the processing of oil and gas. Four natural

gasoline plants and one cycling plant are operated to recover butane, propane, natural gasoline and other liquids from natural gas. They have a capacity of 20.5 million cubic feet a day.

## Mountaineers Never Say Die In 50-0 Trouncing By Dublin Lions Friday

It was Custer's Last Stand, the Battle of the Alamo, and the Fall of the Roman Empire, all rolled into one and stuck on a football field last Friday night, as the Santa Anna Mountaineers fell before the mighty Lions from Dublin by a count of 50-0.

The Dublin team brought only 18 players to the game, leaving most of the second string at home for a B-team game, and the Lion coach showed little interest in using the reserves he did bring, as the highly-ranked AA team rolled over the hapless but fighting Mountaineers.

It was an evenly-matched contest until the Mountaineers made the mistake of kicking off to start the game. It took the Lions exactly four plays and 1:58 minutes to tally, with workhorse John Turney going over from the four yard line. Turney tried to add the extra point, but the kick went wide.

Following the kickoff, Santa Anna mounted a drive that carried into Lion territory, mainly on the passing arm of quarterback Eddie Jones, but the drive was halted and following the punt, the visitors took over on their own 45. It took them three plays to score this time, with Turney trotting 45 yards for the TD. Just to put the frosting on the cake, Turney carried the conversion over, and the score read Dublin 14, Santa Anna 0.

Following the kick, the Mountaineers used three downs in moving the ball four yards, then punted. Apparently winded by their earlier efforts, the Lions required four plays to score, with halfback Roger Freeman going in from the 14 yard line. Turney passed to end Richard Stevens for the conversion, a 20 yard play because the Lions had received a 15 yard penalty on the first try for extra point.

The Mountaineer drive ran a-

ground when Dublin quarterback Larry Gibson snared a Lindon Wells pass on the Santa Anna 39. A five yard penalty put the Lions back on the 44, and then Freeman proceeded to add six more points to the overloaded scoreboard, going all 44 yards in one jaunt. The ever-present Turney added the extra point on a kick and the score stood 29-0 with 1:51 left to play in the first quarter.

Following the kickoff, the Mountaineers, who didn't give up all night, got a respectable drive going from their own 35 to the enemy 36, picking up two first downs in the process, mainly on two complete passes from Wells to Jones. However, Wells was trapped far behind the line of scrimmage shortly after the second quarter began, being dropped on his own 48. Lin Wristen, who did a good job in the punting department all evening, boomed a kick down to the Dublin 24 yard line.

It took the Lions ten plays to score this time, slowed down by a never-say-die Mountaineer defense and a 15 yard penalty. Halfback Kenneth Jurney tallied from the Santa Anna three, and fullback Jackie James carried over for the two-point conversion.

Following a first down Santa Anna quickkick that caught the Lions by surprise, the Dublin offense went into gear again, using three plays to score, with the final yardage being gained on a seven yard scamper by halfback Eli Bell. Turney's extra point kick was blocked, and the score stood Dublin 43, Santa Anna 0.

The Mountaineers fought back, mounting a 20 yard drive that saw the local squad pick up two first downs. The drive again failed on the intercepted pass, as Dublin quarterback Jody Thiebaud snared an Eddie Jones aerial on the midfield stripe and carried it back to the Santa Anna 35. However, the Mountaineers held for downs and took possession as the half ended. Finally.

By agreement of the coaches for both schools and the game officials, the clock was allowed to run straight through each quarter during the second half. The clock was not stopped during time outs, on pass incomplections, while penalties were being assessed, or at other times during play when the clock is normally stopped.

Following the kickoff starting the second half, Santa Anna made its deepest foray into Dublin territory, moving to the Lion 34 before losing the ball on downs.

When Dublin took over, they ran two plays and then fumbled, with Tommy Blanton recovering for the Mountaineers on the Lion 44 yard line as the

quarter ended. However, the Hillbillies were unable to capitalize on the break, moving the ball only three yards in four downs. A fourth down pass attempt was completed, but gained no yardage, with the ball going over to the Lions.

The Dublin devastators moved from their own 41 to the Santa Anna 25, picking up a pair of first downs on the way, but another fumble pounced on by an alert Mountaineer defender, Nelson Perry this time, brought the drive to a halt.

Again, the locals were unable to make the break pay off, as they fumbled in turn on their second play from scrimmage, with the Lions recovering on the Mountaineer 22. In two plays the Lions tallied again, with Turney going over from the nine, and adding the extra point on a kick.

Following the kickoff, the Mountaineers, never quitting, began another drive, with a pass completion from Jones to end Raymond Cupps being the final play in the game.

With one or two exceptions, the statistics don't reflect the lopsidedness of the game. First downs totaled 13 for Dublin, five for Santa Anna. The Mountaineers tried 22 passes, completed seven, for 67 yards, and the Lions went to the air eight times, with three completions for 62 yards. Two Mountaineer passes were intercepted, while the Lions lost none. Santa Anna kicked five times, averaging 26 yards per boot, but the Dublin bunch needed no punts at all. Santa Anna was penalized four times for a total of 40 yards, and the Lions received 12 penalties totaling 130 yards. Santa Anna ground out 14 hard yards rushing, while their opponents were garnering 346 yards on the ground. The Mountaineers lost one fumble while recovering four Dublin miscues.

In short, the Mountaineers, a team few picked to finish out of the cellar in their own Class A district were going up against one of the top-rated AA teams in the state, with predictable results. What was not predictable, and was much to the credit of the local team, was the way in which they fought every inch of the way, never quitting, and the vast improvement they have shown over earlier performances. Had the Mountaineer team that went up against Dublin last Friday night been pitted against some of Santa Anna's earlier opponents, such as Cross Plains, the Santa Anna won-lost record might be different. If the Mountaineers continue to improve at the same rate as in the past, they will cause quite a bit of trouble to several teams before this season is over.
