## Texas Employment Commission Survey Team To Be In Town Starting Monday

A team of interviewers from the Texas Employment Commission will be in Santa Anna on Monday and Wednesday of each

week, beginning Monday, November 16. The team will headquarter in the Santa Anna Lions Club Building, and will be open from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.

Purpose of the Santa Anna interviews is twofold. The survey team will be obtaining information about the labor force available in Coleman County for a report on the County that will be published in book form and made available to industries and businesses seeking new locations.

Coleman County will be the fourth county in the state to have such a survey made.

Second purpose of the operation is to provide services of the Texas Employment Commission

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to Santa Anna area residents, including job counselling, placement information and aptitude testing.

The interviews will take only 15 minutes and should include all persons 16 years of age and older. J. C. Moore, who is directing the Coleman County survey, emphasized that the team needs to talk with all persons in this age group, regardless of whether they are employed or not, in order that the county survey report be as complete and comprehensive as possible. The report contains information about employed as well as employable persons in the county.

With about 225 bandmen from throughout the district participating, about 80 were chosen for each of the two all-district bands.

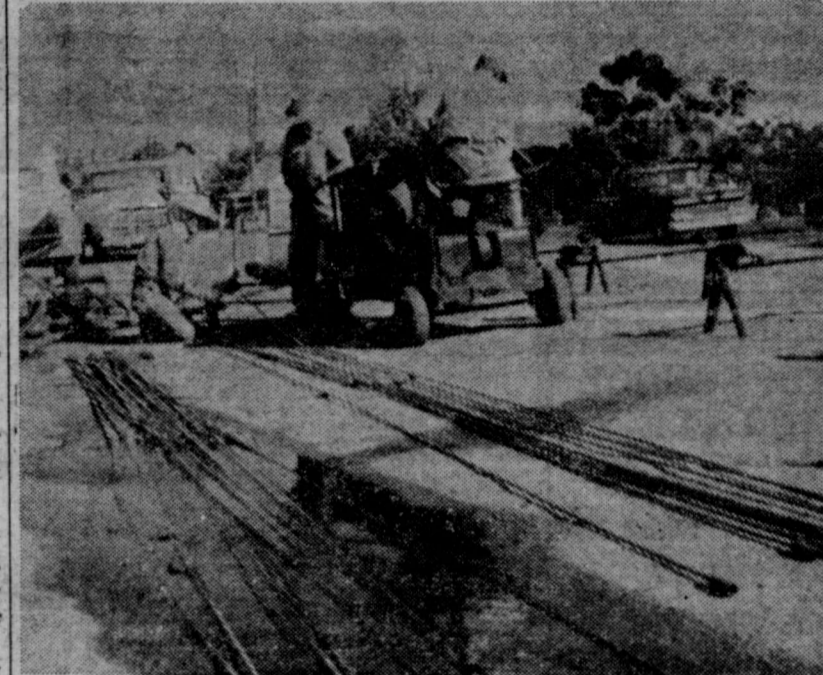

## Farm And Livestock Counts Scheduled For Santa Anna Area Next Week

Plans for taking the 1964 Census of Agriculture in Coleman County were announced today by Jack Miller, newly appointed census crew leader for the county.

The job will be done in three stages, the crew leader said. First will come recruitment and training of enumerators to count all farms in the county. About one enumerator for each 150 farms will be needed.

Shortly after November 19, the Bureau of the Census, an agency of the US Department of Commerce, will start the second stage by mailing agricultural census questionnaires to all rural boxholders in the County. This will give farm and ranch operators, who are required by law to fill out the forms, a period of time to consult their records and fill in answers to the questions.

In the final stage, enumerators will visit each farm in the county to collect the questionnaires. At the time of this visit, the enumerators will help farmers complete answers to any questions the farmers may have had difficulty with. Enumerator visits are scheduled to begin in

this County on November 23. Enumerators will take about three weeks to complete their work, the crew leader estimates.

The Census of Agriculture is taken every five years in the years ending in "4" and "9" to gather up-to-date information on the nation's agricultural resources and production. Such information is vital in making decisions affecting many segments of the Nation's economy. Data gathered include the number and size of farms, acreage and harvest of crops, livestock inventory, information on farm equipment and facilities, farm products sold, and use of fertilizers, insecticides and herbicides.

Rural mail carriers from the Santa Anna Post Office will require 40 to 50 working days to completely clean the Santa Anna system.

The work is being done by Industrial Pipe Cleaning Company, of Dallas. Due to the nature of the operation, it is necessary for the water to be shut off through the main while work is in progress on that section. Residents of the areas affected are notified prior to the turning off of the water. Several hours are required for completing each section.

Mayor Ford Barnes noted that the City Secretary has received several complaints about the rusty color of the water after service is restored. This is a natural reaction to the cleaning, the Mayor said, and in no way affects the quality of the water. It is a temporary condition, he noted, and it not something the City Secretary can remedy.

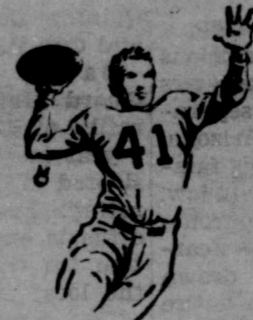

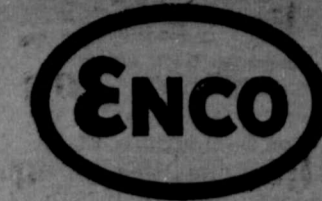

## EDITORIAL

### Fifteen Minutes And The Future

Santa Anna, and Coleman County, is being offered an outstanding opportunity. Whether or not we benefit from this opportunity depends on each of us.

The Texas Employment Commission, working with the United States Department of Labor, has been carrying out a series of economic base reports on Texas counties. This new program has been used to survey two East Texas counties, Cass and Sabine, and one West Texas county, McCulloch. Coleman County will therefore be one of the first of the 254 counties in the state to benefit from this program.

What this program does, stripped of the details and technical terminology, is to provide a comprehensive report on the physical and economic features, and on the labor market, or potential labor market, of a county. This information is compiled and published in book form, and is made available to industries considering establishing a plant in the area, or moving an existent plant.

The study now underway in Coleman County will tell prospective industry whether or not the County can provide labor of the quality and quantity needed. This is, of course, a most important consideration in the establishment of any commercial operation.

How this information is obtained is simple. A team of trained interviewers visit the communities in the county, talking with persons 16 years of age and over, determining the amount and type of employment for which they are suitable.

This takes a 15 minute interview. By taking the time to stop by the Santa Anna headquarters of the TEC team, the citizen of Santa Anna will be making a very definite and marked contribution to the future of our city. A small turnout will indicate to prospective industry that the people of the area have little interest in improving their economic situation, which is not a good recommendation for any place.

In addition, the visit can be of definite benefit to the individual. The TEC team offers assistance in job counseling and placement, and they will arrange to give a comprehensive aptitude test to interested persons, without cost or obligation. This test pinpoints the special talents of the individual, possibly suggesting new and exciting job prospects.

Here are some facts about the program:

**WHERE:** Lions Club Building, Santa Anna.

**WHEN:** Each Monday and Wednesday, 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.

**WHO:** Everyone in the community 16 years of age and older. with the emphasis on **Everyone**. The survey needs information on employed as well as unemployed persons, professional men (such as doctors) and housewives, men and women, young and old. Potential industry is interested in the overall employment and economic picture of a community, which is obtained from such information. The larger the turnout, the more the industry will think people here are interested in new businesses and new prospects.

**HOW:** Stop by any time the Santa Anna office is open, for the 15 minute interview.

**WHY:** To benefit yourself and your community; to show that you are supporting Santa Anna's efforts to be a better community, offering a better way of life to all its citizens.

## COTTON REPORT

Sample Receipts at the USDA Cotton Classing Office in Abilene were steady compared to the two past weeks. The classing total for the week ending November 6, was 14,573 samples which brought the season total to 80,863. At the corresponding time last season, about 35,000 samples were processed each week and the classing total was 240,575. The cotton harvest is about one-third complete.

District 2 accounted for about 10,450 of the samples classed last week and the quality of samples from that area improved slightly. Seventeen percent of the cotton was classed in the white category, 72 percent was light spotted and eleven percent was spotted. Three percent of the samples were reduced in grade due to bark or grass. Predominant grades and their percentages were: Middling, 12 percent; Middling Light Spotted, 47 percent; Strict Low Middling Light Spotted, 22 percent; and Strict Low Middling Spotted, seven percent.

Most of last week's cotton quality improvement was increased staple lengths. One percent of the samples stapled 13/16; 15 percent was 7/8; 58 percent was 29/32; 24 percent was 15/16; and two percent was called 31/32 or longer. Thirty four percent of the samples were 7/8 and shorter the previous week.

Mike readings were steady with 85 percent of the readings in the 3.5 to 4.9 range and 14 percent miked 5.0 and above.

Prices received by producers were steady. Strict Low Middling Light Spotted and lower grades of cotton brought 80 to 135 points over the applicable loan rates. Select lots of long staple cotton having a desirable tensile strength sold at 500 points over loan values. Short staple white cotton continued to move into the CCC loan. Cottonseed prices ranged from \$47 to \$50 per ton.

# State Capitol NEWS

Governor John Connally remains the dominant figure on the statehouse scene. He received more than 1,800,000 votes in the general election, to lead the Democratic ticket.

An overwhelming majority of Texas voters liked the Demo ticket headed by native son President Lyndon Baines Johnson.

Republicans were left with little to be encouraged about. However, GOP leaders insisted their party has "the zeal and spirit to make a fast comeback" and will begin the 1966 campaign immediately.

Statisticians for the two political parties have gone to work to explain the tremendous Democratic sweep of Texas. One logical explanation of Johnson's landslide simply was that 400,000 more Texans than ever before appeared at the polls. And apparently they were about all Democrats. Turnout was some 88 percent of the qualified voters, also a new record in this century in Texas.

President Johnson received 64 percent of the 2,700,000 Texas votes cast (to 36 percent for Senator Barry Goldwater). This represented the largest total in a presidential race since the late Franklin D. Roosevelt's 71 percent margin for a fourth term in 1944.

Senator Ralph Yarborough defeated GOP candidate George Bush by carrying nearly 56 percent of the total. But Bush got more votes than any previous Texas Republican candidate for senator. The Houston oilman was the first GOP senate candidate to rack up more than a million votes.

Republicans, although better organized and financed than ever, lost every statewide and Congressional race and all legislative races except one. GOP Frank Cahoon, of Midland, won. In the scramble, the Republicans lost two Congressmen, Bruce Alger, of Dallas, and Ed Foreman, of Odessa, and nine members of the Texas Legislature.

Makeup of the Legislature in general remains conservative-moderate. Leadership will continue in the hands of Lieutenant Governor Preston Smith and House Speaker Byron Tunnell. The latter is assured another term as speaker on strength of member pledges.

Texas voters also approved all three state constitutional amendments on the ballot.

In so doing, they knocked out legislative authority to transfer one percent of the permanent school fund to the available school fund; authorized the Legislature to enact a program of medical aid to the aged not on welfare rolls but having difficulty paying their doctor bills; and required bills creating or substantially altering conservation and reclamation districts to be published in newspapers and cleared by Texas Water Commission.

### WATER

A committee of legislators and citizens headed by Representative Bill Clayton, of Springlake, is considering a recommendation to the Legislature in the field of soil and water conservation.

A daylong hearing revealed that oil and water regulatory bodies don't mix. Spokesmen for oil companies want the law clarified so their salt water disposals are regulated only by the Railroad Commission. Bill Abington, counsel for the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association, outlined that view.

But J. W. Buchanan, of Dumas, pollution control chairman for the Texas Water Conservation Association, felt differently. He thought the Texas Water Commission should be given the power to veto applications for salt water disposal into the ground, as a means of making sure that underground water supplies are not polluted.

Committee will meet again to reach decisions on this and other proposals before it.

### COLLEGE GROWTH

The 32 junior colleges which are supported in part by state money gained 16.7 percent in enrollments this fall.

Growth of community colleges was even greater than state colleges and universities, which checked in 144,309 students, a gain of 9.4 percent over last year.

New emphasis on the need for higher education, plus the simple fact that the bumper "war baby crop" is reaching college age, accounts for growth.

Community colleges, to give vocational and technical courses, are a major part of the recommendations of the Governor's Committee on Education Beyond the High School. Need for at least a dozen new community colleges is indicated.

### OPINIONS

Attorney General Waggoner Carr said a section of the state driver responsibility law requiring "immediate" surrender of driver licenses when accident liability requirements are not met is unconstitutional. Department of Public Safety said it still is unlawful for anyone to refuse to surrender a suspended or revoked license.

In other opinions, Carr held that:

### SHORT SNORTS

State Board of Insurance has delayed to January 1 a requirement that mutual aid and burial associations raise their rates high enough to build reserves to meet expected demands on their policies, since the November 1 date did not give the associations time to calculate necessary statistics.... Thirty travel writers from many states and four foreign countries were tour guests of the Texas Tourist Agency and visited Dallas, Fort Worth, Amarillo, Palo Duro Canyon, Odessa, El Paso, Ciudad Juarez (Mexico), Guadalupe Peak, Fort Davis, Big Bend National Park, Fort Clark, and the Floresville Ranch of Governor Connally.... State Board of Education heard revived protest against adoption of five biology books allegedly promoting atheism and three government texts.... Workmen's compensation insurance rates go up 1.4 percent on December 1 as losses pushed up premium rates in most lines of business.... The University of Texas and Texas A&M University have undertaken studies which will make up a part of the Texas Water Commission's master plan for Texas — UT will determine water needs of each area of Texas to the year 2020; A&M will forecast agricultural water needs to the same date.
