### Word Is Official: Sand Company To Move To Arkansas

Officials of the Silica Products Company, Incorporated, of Guion, Arkansas, who recently purchased the assets of the Santa Anna Silica Sand Company, announced last week that they intend to dismantle the plant of the local firm and ship the equipment to Arkansas.

This announcement ended some local speculation that the Arkansas firm might try to continue operations on Santa Anna Mountain.

Robert Smith, plant foreman for the Santa Anna Silica Sand Company, was retained to supervise dismantling of the plant here.

Smith told **The News** that the dismantling operation would take several months, and that some of the employees of the Santa Anna Silica Sand Company would be retained to work on the dismantling.

Components of the Santa Anna plant will be shipped to Arkansas by rail and truck, according to Bob Markland, manager of the Santa Anna Silica Sand Company.

The glass sand firm began operations in Santa Anna 20 years ago.

### Santa Anna High School Stage Band Presents Concerts Here And In Mozelle

The Santa Anna High School Stage Concert Band made its initial appearance on Monday, November 23, and followed up with a concert at the Mozelle Livestock Show, Tuesday, December 1.

The parade will begin at 2:00 p.m., at the City Hall. Route of the parade will be from City Hall east to Lee Street, south on Lee Street to Wallis Avenue, west on Wallis (Highway 67 & 84) through downtown Santa Anna to Fifth Street. At Fifth, the parade will double back, returning east on Wallis to First Street, turning south on First to North Santa Fe, thence west to Second Street, and then north on Second back to the starting point at City Hall.

Following the parade, Santa Claus, on a rare personal appearance direct from the North Pole, will be available for the smaller citizens, in the old Western Auto Store building, which is next door to the new Western Auto Store building.

The annual Lions Club pancake sale will be in progress during the day Friday, starting at 11:30 a.m. though 1:30 p.m., and again from 3:00 p.m. through 8:00 p.m.

Crowds numbering in the thousands usually attend the big annual Christmas opening parade in Santa Anna, and Mayor Ford Barnes estimates a crowd of approximately 3,000 will attend the event this year.

Randy Matson, called the "top athlete of his age in the world today," will make two speaking appearances in Santa Anna, Tuesday, December 8.

The 19 year old Matson finished second in the shotput in the Olympics in Tokyo this year. He trailed his teammate, veteran Dallas Long, by five and one half inches, with a toss of 66 feet, three and one quarter inches. The third place finisher trailed Matson by more than two feet.

A student at Texas A&M, Matson won the Southwest Conference freshman shotput and discus competition the past season, throwing farther than all the varsity competitors. He holds the national high school record for shotput and discus throw, and was all-state basketball player two years at Pampa High School.

Matson, who stands six and one half feet tall, and weighs 250 pounds, will speak at Santa Anna High School at 10:30 a.m., and at the regular weekly meeting of the Santa Anna Lions Club at lunch.

Matson is being brought to Santa Anna by West Texas Utilities Company.

### Santa Fe Asks To Stop Local Passenger Runs

The Gulf, Colorado and Santa Fe Railroad has filed a request with the Texas State Railroad Commission to discontinue two passenger trains through Santa Anna.

The petition was filed shortly after the ruling was delivered allowing the Texas and Pacific Railroad to discontinue two passenger trains between Fort Worth and El Paso.

Reason for the request, as stated by the Santa Fe, was the discontinuance of the Railway Post Office service September 26. On that date, the Post Office Department switched most of commercial mail movement from railroad to truck transport.

The Santa Fe has requested that the Railroad Commission okay its request to discontinue passenger trains number 77 and 78, presently running between Brownwood and San Angelo.

Most railroads in the United States lose money on their passenger operations, the few exceptions being lines serving tourist areas, and suburban commuter lines. The Santa Fe Railroad spokesman noted that the Post Office Department's failure to renew the contract for the Railway Post Office service will increase the line's net annual deficit on the passenger trains affected "more than 75 percent."

Santa Fe's number 77 stops at Santa Anna at 3:07 a.m., westbound, from Brownwood and terminating in San Angelo. Number 78, the return trip, is due in Santa Anna at 10:59 p.m. and on its way east.

If the request for discontinuance of these two trains is approved, Santa Anna will have only two passenger trains. A California express will stop in Santa Anna at 11:16 p.m., eastbound to Houston, and at 2:27 a.m., westbound. Santa Anna is

not a scheduled stop for either of these trains, and they do not offer local service. Passengers wishing to travel either of the express trains must make reservations in advance, and the train is signaled to stop.

Hearings on the application by the Santa Fe Railroad to discontinue passenger trains number 77 and 78 are scheduled for the Tom Green County Courthouse, Thursday, January 14.

The pancake panorama will begin at 11:30 a.m., just in time for lunch (or a late breakfast) and continue until 1:30 p.m., at which time there will be an intermission for the big Santa Anna Christmas parade, after which the Lions will again be serving their good griddlecakes, beginning at 3:30 p.m. and continuing until 8:00 p.m.

A spokesman for the Lions Club has announced that the batter is being battered, the butter is being buttered, the syrup and honey and molasses is being stockpiled, lots of coffee is being brewed, and the old milk cow is working overtime to have plenty of cold milk ready. Tickets are 50 cents each, for which the ticketholder can eat as much as he can hold. Tickets are available from any Lions Club member or at the door. It is recommended that tickets be purchased from Lions Club members in advance, as they will be sold for four bits each, while they cost the full 50 cents at the door.

 Mrs. John R. Banister was the first president, and served as Librarian without pay for many years. Miss Dora Kirkpatrick was one of the early Librarians.  
 About 1954, while F. Z. Payne was mayor, the City Council voted to give the use of the house, the present home of the Library. Mrs. Bruce was president of the Board at that time. Money was raised through donations to redecorate, and to buy new books.  
 Among the expensive books donated were from the R. C. Gay Estate, Samson Millard and Rev. Womack.  
 The City Library is for the use of all local people as a Community Center and Club Room. All of the local civic organizations are represented on the Library Board. And it is hoped this beautiful city owned, library, with all modern conveniences will be used and appreciated by everyone.


## Mozelle Livestock Show Tuesday

**EDITORIAL**

**Delinquency Or Desperation?**

A man who is associated with the Boys Club organization pointed out a discrepancy in the handling of a certain juvenile problem recently.

This discrepancy is one that merits the attention of our legislators in Austin. It is to be hoped that the people of Texas become aware of the situation, and demand that their elected representatives take steps to correct it.

The situation is this: In Texas, if a juvenile runs away from home, for no matter what reason, he is automatically classified as a juvenile delinquent. This classifies the boy or girl who runs away to escape an intolerable situation at home (and such a home life is one of the principle causes of juvenile delinquency), along with the juvenile who commits actual criminal acts. This places the youngster who is doing no more than trying to escape a situation with which he cannot cope, in the same category as the young criminal, and certainly starts such youngsters out with two strikes against them in the attempt to find a decent place in society.

It should not be too difficult for arrangements to be made to handle such runaways separately and distinctly from the regular juvenile offender. Certainly, a percentage of runaways involve delinquency, but some procedure should be established to judge these cases separately, and not automatically to group all juvenile runaways as juvenile delinquents, as is now the case.

If you agree, why not drop a short note to our state representative (Ben Barnes) and state senator (Dorsey Hardeman) and tell them so? That is all that will be needed to get this unjust situation corrected—enough people letting their representatives know they want it corrected.

**Slump**

The Texas Employment Commission survey office in Santa Anna, which is seeking information about the employment situation in our area, which will be published in a book and made available to industries interested in locating here, processed only six people through the office Monday, November 30.

Santa Anna got off to a great start in supporting this effort by the state to help us get more industry. In fact, we have been running far ahead of the totals for Coleman. But we are apparently becoming complacent. We should have a goal of seeing to it that every person in the Santa Anna area 16 years of age and up, employed or not, seeking employment or not, male or female, doctor, lawyer, Indian chief, housewife or safecracker, or whatever other classification they may fit, stops by for the important 15 minute interview. Fifteen minutes will not mean much to you, but it could mean a great deal to our community.



610,000 Americans still have active tuberculosis or are classified as "high risk" individuals.




- A. 110,000 are known to have active tuberculosis.

School District, during the 1959-1960 year. The following fall Bowen moved to the Santa Anna

Bowen is running into the same problems with the 1964 edition of the Mountaineer basketball team that the coaching staff faced during football season. A group of young and inexperienced players make up the squad (there is not a senior on the team) and Bowen also finds himself hampered by a lack of height and a scarcity of shooting ability.

In an attempt to compensate, Bowen has resorted to a system of extreme ball control, in which the Santa Anna team attempts to get the ball, and then freezes it, making no attempt to shoot, passing the ball back and forth around the edges of the court, forcing the opposition to come after the ball. Object of this strategy is to prevent the opposing team from scoring, while placing the defensive team in a position in which they must run the risk of fouling in order to gain the ball.

"We won't be the highest scoring team around here," said Bowen, "but we will win some ballgames."

**COTTON REPORT**

Last week's cotton classing activity was at its lowest level since late in September according to B. B. Manly, Jr., at the USDA Cotton Classing Office in Abilene. Sample receipts for the week ending November 27, 1964, totaled 3,788 and brought the season classing total to 113,288. The 1964-65 harvest is about 45 percent complete in the classing area.

About 2,200 samples were received from District 2 last week. The quality of cotton was about the same as it was the previous week. Fourteen percent of the samples were classed in the white category, 78 percent was light spotted, seven percent was spotted, and less than one percent of the samples was below grade. The percent of samples reduced in grade due to bark, grass and rough preparation increased to five percent.

Staple lengths were: five percent 7/8 and shorter; 46 percent 29/32; 48 percent 15/16; and one percent 31/32 and longer.

Mike readings were very good with 93 percent in the 3.5 to 4.9 range.

Light spotted and spotted cotton were in greatest demand last week. Prices were steady. The amount of cotton moving into the Commodity Credit Loan increased due to an increase in white cotton ginned in the past few weeks.

**State Capital NEWS**

A post-election review of statewide voting totals shows that only 89 percent of the 3,100,000 Texans who were qualified to vote actually made it to the polls on November 3.

Total number of ballots cast—2,760,788.

Not all of those who went to the polls voted in all the races. In Travis County, for instance, 3,461 of the 67,419 who cast ballots failed to vote in the presidential race. Elsewhere around the state, 52,304 Texans who voted in the governor's race did not vote on the lieutenant governor's race, which placed next on the ballot.

Highest vote getter, in this election and in Texas history, was Attorney General Waggoner Carr. He racked up 1,901,038 votes. Governor John Connally was next with 1,877,137. Lieutenant Governor Preston Smith was third, with 1,833,747.

**LAWMAKERS TAKE OATH**

All 42 freshmen in the 150-member Texas House of Representatives have already taken the oath that makes them state officials. They started drawing their \$4,800-a-year salary the day of their oath-taking.

Thirty three took the oath jointly in the special swearing-in ceremony. Lieutenant Governor Preston Smith participated, along with House Speaker Byron Tunnell and Secretary of State Crawford Martin.

Freshmen legislators who did not come to the Capitol were sworn in at home by local judges. Many did so for sentimental reasons.

**SENIOR CITIZENS' INSURANCE**

At the end of its first year of operation, the Texas 65 Health Insurance Plan — authorized by the 1964 Legislature for persons over age 65 — reported that benefit payments totaled more than \$2,549,000 during the year.

Although 59,917 persons signed up during two enrollment periods, officials estimate that deaths and other causes brought the total registration down to 40,000 by the year's end. Sixty four companies in the state participate in the nonprofit program designed to "provide low cost coverage for those Texans who previously were unable to purchase health insurance because of their age or health status."

Average age of present participants is 73 years.

**POLLUTION JURISDICTION RULING**

State Water Pollution Control Board is appealing a ruling by Judge Herman Jones, in a Superior Oil Company suit against the state, that the Railroad Commission has exclusive jurisdiction over disposal of oil and gas field waste.

Under the ruling, the Water Pollution Control Board does not have authority to issue orders with regard to the use of open unlined salt water disposal pits designed to handle oilfield waste.

**RECEIVERSHIP SUIT FILED**

J. N. Nutt, State Insurance Commissioner, instituted the first receivership of any significant size in recent months when he initiated proceedings against Great American County Mutual Fire Insurance Company of Lufkin.

District Judge Hman Jones of Austin granted the state's application for temporary receivership. This was followed by resignation of several of the company's officers.

Nutt estimated that about 3,000 policies were active at the time court proceedings began.

**HIGHEST STATE BUDGET PROMISED**

Governor Connally says that his state budget proposals will be "a good many million dollars" higher than the present spending level.

He is "hopeful" that new taxes can be avoided, but is "not prepared to say there will be none."

Connally covered a wide range of subject matter in a press conference.

He regretted closing of a few Texas military bases but commented that the action has to be "understood as the price we pay for change, for knowledge and for leadership."

He applauded creation of a Lyndon B. Johnson State Park, in Gillespie County, as "an excellent idea" and said he hopes the state eventually can acquire the Johnson home itself as an historic landmark.

Moving his own inauguration

date from January 19 to January 26 is "entirely satisfactory" with him. The later date would permit more Texans to attend his swearing-in ceremony, a Democratic Victory Dinner, in Austin, and the President's inauguration (January 20) in Washington.

**WATER PLANNING**

Congressman Joe Kilgore of McAllen will head an advisory committee of the Texas Water Commission. Committee will draft a new longrange water planning program.

A series of water conferences already are underway in Austin. Four groups of water users are being called in for comments, suggestions and help. They are the state, Federal and local water agencies; the cities; the industrial and oil-gas groups; and the largest group, users of water for irrigation.

Chief Engineer John Vandertulip is outlining to the four groups a program for developing a water plan to meet Texas' growth needs to the year 2020.

Plans will be ready by the fall of 1966, if the Legislature provides the money recommended by Governor Connally.

**ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES**

Attorney General Carr branded unconstitutional a section of the tax law providing for cigarette tax payments to the State Treasurer.

He noted that the law calls for the Treasurer to ship cigarette stamps, or a set meter for use in stamping cigarettes, without receiving payment in advance.

Carr declared it improper lending of state credit. Thousands of dollars are lost under present practices, he said.

**SHORT SNORTS**

State Securities Board granted 17 applications to sell \$17,500,000 worth of securities this week.

Agriculture Commissioner John C. White has given farmers in a 44-county East and Central Texas area until December 15 to clean their fields of cotton stalks.

## Peace Corps Tests On Pearl Harbor Day This Month

For the first time in history, the Peace Corps is giving its nationwide placement test on a weekday — Monday, December 7. The usual second Saturday in the month isn't possible because of the Christmas rush at the Post Offices where most Peace Corps tests are held. The next best available date happens to fall on Pearl Harbor Day. That infamous day 23 years ago which sent Americans off to war, will this year be commemorated by thousands of Americans offering two years of their life in the cause of peace.

In this area, the Peace Corps Test will be given in Abilene (room 5, Federal Building), and San Angelo (room 324, Federal Building). It will begin at 3:00 p.m.

The noncompetitive aptitude test will take about one and a half hours. Applicants should bring a completed Peace Corps Questionnaire along if he has not yet filed one. The General Aptitude Test is timed for exactly half an hour. The same time is spent on the "Modern Language Aptitude Test." The latter gives the Peace Corps an idea of the testee's aptitude to learn a new language. (For this, the applicant does not need to know a word of a foreign language.) If a knowledge of French or Spanish is claimed, a language achievement test will be administered.

There is no failing of the test. The Peace Corps evaluates test scores, Questionnaire, and character references all together. If the result qualifies the applicant to complete the intensive training program and to be an effective Volunteer overseas, he will be invited.

The next cycle of Peace Corps training starts in February — and there is still time if the December 7 test is taken. The major training for 1965 will take place in the summer and it is certainly not too soon to apply for that, according to Peace Corps officials. Questionnaires are available at most Post Offices and college placement offices, or by writing Peace Corps, Washington, DC, 20525. American citizens over 18 are

eligible to take the Test. Both members of married couples must apply, but they may have no dependents under 18. A college degree is not required.

## Helen Gregg Dies In Auto Accident; Rites Held Monday

Miss Helen Louise Gregg, 20-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Burton Gregg, of San Antonio, and a granddaughter of Mrs. J. J. Gregg, of Santa Anna, died about 2:00 a.m. Thursday, November 26, about eight hours after she suffered critical injuries in an automobile crash three miles south of Marble Falls. Miss Gregg was a junior student at Texas Christian University in Fort Worth and was on her way home to spend the Thanksgiving holidays with her parents.

Another TCU junior co-ed, Miss Patricia Diane Bump, 21, also of San Antonio, a passenger with Miss Gregg, and going to spend the holidays with her parents, died instantly when the small car they were riding in crashed almost head-on with a pickup truck about 6:00 p.m. Wednesday.

Funeral services for Miss Gregg were held at the Westlawn Christian Church in San Antonio at 10:30 a.m. Monday, November 30. Burial was in the Fort Sam Houston National Cemetery, under the direction of the Alamo Funeral Home. Rev. W. W. Jones, minister, and Rex Mix, ministerial student at TCU, were the officiating ministers. TCU students were pallbearers.

Miss Gregg was born November 18, 1944, in San Antonio. She was a graduate of Thomas Jefferson High School and was in her third year at TCU. She was well known in Santa Anna, having visited here many times with her parents. She normally spent several days here each summer with her grandmother.

Besides her parents, Miss Gregg is survived by one brother, Joseph Jackson Gregg III; both grandmothers, Mrs. Charles Watson of San Antonio and Mrs. J. J. Gregg; a number of aunts, uncles and cousins.
