## Desegregation Scheduled Here Says School Board; To Start Next Term

The Board of Trustees of the Santa Anna Independent School District, meeting Monday, February 8, voted unanimously for complete integration of local school facilities.

The Board voted to adopt the resolution presented (printed last week in The Santa Anna News).

The resolution adopted by the Board said in part: "Now be it resolved by this Board of Trustees of the Santa Anna Independent School District, Santa Anna, Texas, that . . . no person residing in the Santa Anna Independent School District shall, on the ground of race, color, or national origin, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination un-

der any program or activity . . ."

Although the resolution states that this will be the policy of the local school district "from this date forward," it is not expected that actual integration of the Santa Anna schools will commence until the fall semester this year. According to Cullen Perry, Superintendent, all County schools now have their academic programs underway, and a switch of students at the present time would not be beneficial to either the students or the schools involved.

The resolution makes several points concerning the complete integration of local facilities:

That "full and complete desegregation of all school units operated by the Santa Anna Independent School District shall be the established policy."

That there shall be no separation of students based on race, color, or national origin."

That there shall be no separation on rights to transfer from one attendance area to another because of race, color, or national origin.

"That no segregation in school transportation . . . shall be permitted."

"That no variation of instructional pattern or academic standard shall be made."

Failure to comply with Federal antidiscrimination measures would result in the loss of all Federal financial assistance by the District. This amount totalled more than \$17,000 during the last school year.

Candidates may file with the Superintendent, with the secretary of the Board of Trustees, or with the County Judge.

The show, which is an annual event, will draw entrants from all District 9A schools, as well as most of the other high schools in the area.

Admission will be 50 cents for adults and 25 cents for students. Donation for the March of Dimes will also be accepted.

## Bond Election Set For February 26; To Finance Water, Sewerage Work

Final preparations for the bond election covering a new bond issue of about \$260,000 plus an additional \$100,000 to retire outstanding bonds, were made by the Santa Anna City Council in regular meeting, Friday, February 5.

As explained by Curtis Adrian, who was selected as fiscal agent for the City in the management and sale of the bond issue, the \$260,000 would cover construction of improvements and additions to the Santa Anna water and sewerage systems. The \$100,000 is for the refinancing of that amount of current outstanding bonds issued by the

City in the early 1950's.

The outstanding bonds carry the condition that no additional bond issue may be made by the City until these are retired. The first legal retirement date, the date on which the bonds may be called in by the City, is April 1, 1965. These bonds will be called in by the City, with the funds for their purchase coming from the \$100,000 portion of the proposed issue.

Fiscal agent Adrian, who represents the First Southwest

Company, of Dallas, a leading investment firm, advised that the most economical method of disposing of the bonds would be through the Federal government, which will loan the City the amount required, accepting the bonds as collateral, with an interest rate of four percent. Public or private sale of the bonds would probably require from 4.5 percent to 4.75 percent interest, Adrian said. Under law, the bonds must be offered to the public, and if they are not purchased at four percent interest or less, then the government is allowed to accept them as collateral against the loan. Repayment period will be from 33 to 40 years.

The bonds issued will be revenue bonds, which contain a clause stating that they cannot be paid for, either principal or interest, by tax monies. Payment of the bonds will be from funds derived from utility charges. It was stated that a relatively small increase in rates will be adequate to cover this requirement. The additional connections to water and sewer service made possible by the additional construction in the system, will be adequate to pay for the bonds. It was estimated that the minimum rate for sewer service will be increased to \$1.75 or \$2.00 per month, from the present rate of \$1.00. The rate increases will be designed to affect the small users as little as possible. With a large number of retired persons living in Santa Anna, the Council stated its desire to raise rates for these users as little as possible.

Another topic receiving considerable discussion at the meeting concerned the type of sewerage treatment plant to be built. The two types, one using oxidation ponds (such as that located in Coleman on the Santa Anna highway) and the other using the artificial oxidation method, were discussed. The second type, although more modern and requiring less upkeep, is more expensive. The oxidation pond type, and older method, has the drawback of odor. The Council, considering this factor along with the greater versatility of the second type, decided against the older oxidation pond method in favor of the forced oxidation plant.

The election was set for Friday, February 26. Balloting will be at the City Hall Building, on the corner of North Second Street and Avenue A.

## Meetings Set To Explain Bond Issue

Several meetings have been proposed and planned by proponents of the proposed bond issue that will be voted upon by the citizens of Santa Anna on Friday, February 26.

A mass meeting will be held in the auditorium of Santa Anna High School at 7:30 p.m. on the evening of Tuesday, February 23. Engineers and fiscal advisors for the City will be on hand to explain the construction to be financed by the bond issue, and the financial aspects of the bonds themselves. There will be films, exhibits, demonstrations, and a period for questions from those attending. All interested persons are urged to attend this meeting to learn the true facts about the proposed issue, a spokesman for the City said.

Members of the engineering firms handling the project, and the financial house that is handling the bond issue, are available to appear before meetings of clubs and organizations. Groups wishing such a speaker should contact Mrs. Pauline Garrett, City Secretary.

## No Tax Increase Due From Bonds

"Revenue bonds cannot be paid for from tax funds," said fiscal agent Curtis Adrian in explaining the bond issue proposed by the Santa Anna City Council. "The issuance of these bonds will not in any way effect the present tax structure of the City of Santa Anna or the taxes paid by its citizens."

The bonds will be paid off from funds derived from the operation of the water and sewerage systems. "Therefore, the actual users of the improvements will be those paying for them," Adrian noted, "and in direct proportion to the amount of use. This way, even transients who are living in the City for only a few months help pay for the bonds through their utility payments, whereas if these were tax bonds, the property owners would foot the entire bill and the transient resident would pay nothing."

## Voter Requirements For Bond Election

Who will be eligible to vote in the election for the proposed bond issue to provide funds for the improvement and enlargement of the Santa Anna water and sewer systems? According to authorities, the following will be required for voting:

**POLL TAX:** The voter must have current poll tax receipt or be eligible for an exemption. Voters over 60 years of age are exempt.

**RESIDENCE:** The voter must have resided in the State of Texas for one year, and in the county for six months, prior to the date of the election, to be eligible.

**PROPERTY OWNERSHIP:** The eligible voter must own property, real or personal, that is listed on the tax rendition rolls of the City of Santa Anna.

## Santa Anna Jaycees Organize, Elect Officers At Thursday Night Meeting

Despite conflict from City Council meeting and a surprise National Guard drill, the required number of members, a total of 25, were on the rolls so that the local club could be started.

Elections were held, with the following officers being chosen: Max Eubank, president; Jerry Clark, internal vice president; L. J. Clark, external vice president; Brown Brooke, secretary; Earl Ray, treasurer; and Rufus Cobern, Fred Gray, and Bob

Parker, directors.

Next meeting of the newly organized club will be Thursday, February 11, at 7:30 p.m. in the Santa Anna Lions Club Building. All young men in the area (including Coleman) are invited to attend this meeting.

## County Guard Unit Has Alert Thursday

At approximately 6:30 p.m. Thursday, February 4, local National Guardsmen were alerted in a surprise practice alert. These alerts are held frequently to test the alertness and readiness of Guard personnel. Captain Billy J. Harvey, local Guard Commander, was notified through the command channels, about 6:30 p.m., and within about an hour approximately half the members of the local unit reported to the Armory, in uniform, with field gear. This percentage is a real good turnout, considering that this was unannounced thing, and also the fact that several local members live some distance away, making their notification impractical for a practice alert.

Guardsmen are required to report for duty, when these practice alerts are called, just as if they were "for real." Each man brings his personal gear, field gear, and reports in uniform. The unit checks loading lists, posts security guards, and performs some sort of mission, or training, as required by higher headquarters. An officer from battalion headquarters at Brownwood is sent to check and observe the success and operation of the local units. Captain Roy G. Muckelroy, who once commanded the Santa Anna unit, was sent to observe operation and conduct of the local units during this practice alert.

These practice alerts are just another step toward a better prepared, and ready link, in the chain of the nation's defense team.



Mayor Barnes introduced a resolution and order. Alderman Moore moved its adoption. The motion was seconded by Alderman Yarbrough. The motion carrying with it the adoption of the resolution and order, prevailed by the following vote:

The RESOLUTION AND ORDER is as follows:

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Santa Anna, Texas, deems it advisable to issue the bonds of said City for the purposes hereinafter mentioned, therefore,

### PROPOSITION NO. 2

"SHALL the City Council of the City of Santa Anna, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of said City in the amount of TWO HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$200,000), maturing serially in such installments as may be fixed by the City Council, the maximum maturity being not more than FORTY (40) years from their date, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed SIX PER CENTUM (6%) per annum, for the purpose of constructing improvements and extensions to the City's Sanitary Sewer System, to be issued in accordance with and secured in the manner provided in Articles 1111-1118, both inclusive, of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, as amended, each bond to be conditioned that the holder thereof shall never have the right to demand payment of said obligation out of funds raised or to be raised by taxation, and secured by a pledge of the net revenues from the operation of the City's combined Waterworks and Sanitary Sewer System?"

SECTION 2: That said election shall be held at the CITY HALL, in the City of Santa Anna, Texas, and the entire City shall constitute one election precinct.

SECTION 3: That the following named persons are hereby appointed officers of the election, to-wit:

JOE BAKER, Presiding Judge  
 LEE HUNTER, Alternate Presiding Judge

If the regularly appointed Presiding Judge is unable to serve at the election, the Alternate Presiding Judge therefor shall serve as Presiding Judge. 

**EDITORIAL**

**Highroad To The Future**

A few months ago, the voters of Santa Anna demonstrated that they are overwhelmingly behind any program that will mean the improvement and progress of the City, when they voted by a large margin to allow the City to sell land in old Ranger Park for the construction of the new medical center. Now construction has begun on the hospital and clinic building, a \$300,000 addition to the progress of Santa Anna.

Now the voters are again being called upon to help their City move forward. The City Council, in a bold step into the future, has authorized an election on approximately \$260,000 worth of bonds, the revenue from which will be used to improve and update the present water system, adding new and needed lines and completing the third filter unit at the water processing plant, and improving and extending the sewer lines and adding a new sewer plant. This move is necessary if Santa Anna is to grow. More promising cities in the Southwest have been blighted because of lack of adequate water for private and industrial use than for any other reason. And many of the present citizens of Santa Anna do not now have city sewer service, something that any respectable city should be able to furnish to all residents, and there will be no facilities of any kind to serve an increasing population unless additional facilities are constructed.

There are several facts about this proposed bond issue that every citizen should know. Here are a few:

Santa Anna will have to improve its sewer system. There is no choice about this. The City has been on the verge of having its present system condemned by the state public health department for more than ten years. This condemnation will come within the near future unless improvements are made. It will be more economical and of greater benefit to the City to carry out these improvements at the present time than to have to do this under pressure of imminent condemnation by the state. The old saying that "a stitch in time saves nine" is very appropriate in this situation.

Santa Anna must be able to offer adequate water and sewer service to new residents if it is to grow, and if it does not grow, it will wither and die like many of the smaller cities, once booming but now dying, that one can find within a short drive of here.

The proposed bonds are revenue bonds, and contain, as a condition of sale, that they cannot under any circumstances be repaid from tax monies. Therefore, the passage of the proposed bond issue cannot in any way raise either tax rates or tax evaluations.

Repayment of the bonds will be through revenue derived from the utility fees paid by users. There will be a small increase in water and sewer rates. Santa Anna's rates are now so low that even with this increase, they will be much lower than most of the surrounding cities and towns. The increases will be on the top end of the user scale, for the most part, so that the small users of water will not notice an appreciable increase in rates.

The passage of the bond issue will pour many thousands of dollars into the local economy, as construction of the new sewer and water systems provides jobs for many local workers.

We feel that this bond issue will pass by an overwhelming margin, because we feel that most of the citizens of Santa Anna are interested in progress for their City. It is up to each of us in the days leading up to the election, to let other people know how we feel, to encourage everyone to vote for progress, and it is up to each of us to cast our own vote for the future of Santa Anna and the surrounding area.

Santa Anna has long been known to have great potential. For years the City has paused on the edge of the path to progress. Let's now get on the road to the future, and help make our City the great community we know it can be.



**BUILDING HIGHEST**

Building shattered all records during 1964. Total permits issued in the state came to \$1,600,000,000 or seven percent more over 1963, according to UT's Bureau of Business Research.

Bulk of the increase came from a 25 percent gain in non-residential buildings, principally industrial structures which were up a sensational 92 percent.

Home building authorizations dropped three percent, while permits for alterations and repairs were up two percent.

Nonmetropolitan areas led the construction surge with a 30 percent gain over the previous year. Metropolitan areas gained only three percent.

The city with the biggest gain was Longview. Other big gains were shown in San Angelo, Lubbock, Tyler, Fort Worth, Odessa and Irving.

**State Capital NEWS**

Governor John Connally's alternate teacher pay proposal has drawn fire from the Texas State Teachers Association. And Connally has reciprocated!

Connally wants less of an immediate pay raise than the \$45 a month the teachers ask. He wants to set up a 10 year program for steady and regular increases which in time would amount to greater rewards for more experienced teachers.

House Speaker Ben Barnes and Representative George Hinson, of Mineola, who is sponsor of the TSTA-backed "\$45 in '65" program, has called for a cooling off period. Compromise seemed unlikely due to strong feelings on both sides.

State Senator Jack Strong, of Longview, and Representative W. S. Heatley, of Paducah, chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, introduced the Governor's 10 year pay plan with substantial support. Among sponsors of the two bills are 17 House members who endorsed both measures.

Teachers complain the Connally program offers too little, too late. They charge it would put 70 percent of raises on local school districts.

Connally produced figures showing cost of the 10 year program at \$40,200,000 for the next biennium. He said the state would pick up \$32,100,000 of the tab and local districts \$8,000,000. His financing plan suggests that local school boards start paying a share of the cost of textbooks and teacher retirement, now paid wholly by the state.

Connally believes his program would maintain the 80-20 cost ratio between state and local districts.

Meanwhile, teachers launched a campaign for their \$85,000,000 salary adjustment program (geared to an additional \$68,000,000 state outlay for the biennium).

Pressure is intense on legislators, both from the Governor's office and from the teachers back home. Mail is piling high on lawmakers' desks.

Speaker Barnes said it will be three months before the Legislature can even consider a teacher's pay raise, since it has to pass the complicated appropriations bill first.

An all-out war would injure all educational efforts under consideration, Barnes emphasized. **REDISTRICTING RESOLUTION PASSED**

Both houses of the Legislature overwhelmingly adopted a resolution calling for a Federal Constitutional convention to permit one legislative chamber to be apportioned on factors other than population.

Thirty four states must adopt the identical proposal before Congress has to consider calling a convention on a specific amendment. Three fourths of the states must ratify any amendment thus submitted.

At least half a dozen proposals for congressional redistricting have been filed so far, plus bills for Senate redistricting and House redistricting.

Representative Gus Mutscher, of Brenham, told his House Committee on Congressional and Legislative Districts that he will canvass all representatives for their views on reapportioning the state.

House members are trying to work out a cooperative House redistricting plan, taking into consideration those who do not plan to run next time and those who plan to run for other offices.

Other two congressional and senate redistricting jobs will not be settled so amiably. As one legislator put it, "It's going to be a mean session."

**TAX BILL PUSHED**

Representative Ben Atwell, of Dallas, chairman of the House Revenue and Tax Committee, is pushing a bill to raise \$15,300,000 under present tax laws.

Bill would repeal sales tax exemption on farm machinery and telephone and telegraph service; revise inheritance tax laws; repeal chain store tax (\$7,200,000 loss) and theater admission tax (\$1,200,000 loss); and grant a tax exemption for natural gas used in exploration and production in the same field where it is produced.

Serious consideration of tax bills must await passage of the general appropriations bill, Atwell said.

**GOVERNOR'S PROGRAM INTRODUCED**

Most of the Governor's program already has been intro-

duced in some form in one or both houses.

Bills or constitutional amendments filed would:

Set up an 18-man coordinating board over the state system of higher education.

Repeal state property and poll taxes;

Establish a State Department of Mental Health;

Tighten driver license laws; Provide four year terms for state officials;

Combine the Migrant Labor Council with Texas Good Neighbor Council;

Insure equal legal rights for women;

Establish a \$10,000,000 college building fund;

Set up a college student loan fund;

Create a Fine Arts Commission;

Revise the Texas election code; and

Free the Texas Water Commission for water rights administration and make Texas Water Development Board responsible for all water planning, financing and development activities.

**SHORT SNORTS**

Bill authorizing the State Railroad Commission to order pooling of separately owned oil and gas interests in standard proration units has cleared the Senate Oil and Gas Committee.

Senator D. Roy Harrington, of Port Arthur, is author of a bill to establish a Texas mediation service for voluntary settlement of intrastate industrial labor disputes.

Updating of workmen's compensation law is proposed in a bill by Representative David G. Haines, of Byran.

Parks and Wildlife Department reports that 1964's record number of hunters had only 10 fatalities, a decrease of eight from 1963.

Continued storm activity in the Plains area and in the north central part of the state contributed to a 4.0 percent statewide average increase in fire and allied insurance last year, according to the Board of Insurance.

### Tips From The TACKLE BOX

Clip sinkers onto your line through a woman's hairpin. If the sinker gets hung on the bottom, a slight pull will open the wire, leaving the sinker behind. But you can rescue the rest of the rigging.

For catching bluegills and other small fish, improvise a lure by wrapping a pipe cleaner around a long-shank hook. Nifty on a fly rod, or even a spinning rod when a split-shot sinker is added to the line.

Tie a bell-shaped sinker, a small one, on the zipper of your hunting jacket and you won't have to remove gloves to open or close.

Tie a plastic bag over your reel before you store it away. Keeps dirt out, oil in.

A handy carrier for transporting matches in your pocket can be made by slipping an empty 12 gauge shotgun shell over an empty 16 gauge shell. It also is semi-watertight.






