EDITORIAL

We Are All Murderers

The state legislature is debating a measure aimed attending capital punishment in the state of Texas.

This is a measure that should be enacted into law. The movement away from the death penalty has been steady. All of the more enlightened nations of Europe no longer have the death penalty (only France and Spain retain it). Many states in this country have abolished this leftover from the Dark Ages, and more and more states each year are doing away with it.

There is only one argument advanced in support of the death penalty-the claim that it is a deterent to major crime. This has been proved untrue. There are many instances of two of our states located side by side, with much the same type of population, one of which does not have the death penalty and the other of which does. Invariably, there will be no difference in the major crime rate of these two states, and if there is a slight variation, it usually shows up as a lower crime rate in the state Editor:

without the death penalty. In England during the 17th century, pickpocketry was a crime punishable by hanging. The executions in those days were public, and great crowds turned out to view them. And where were pickpockets most active? In the crowds watching the hanging of some convicted pickpocket! (Children were often executed in England under the laws then in effect-and things have not improved much, since a 15 year old boy was recently

sentenced to the electric chair in Alabama). There are many good reasons to abolish the death penalty. From the standpoint of morality, there is no excuse for the taking of human life unnecessarily. In the Ten Commandments we read: "Thou shalt not kill." This is an absolute command. It does not say: "Thou shalt not kill, unless the victim has been communities the professionals,

Will it require some other martyr before the people of Texas homes they hear little besides likewise do away with this legalized murder? Not if the measure now in the legislature is made into law.

Add up the arguments on each side. Those that favor capital punishment maintain that it has a deterent and exemplary effect. This has been proven to be untrue. On the other hand, we find that capital punishment is in opposition to the basic Christian ethic (Jesus countermanded the old law of "an eye for an eye, and a tooth for a tooth in Matthew 6:38-39). We also find human justice, which is subject to error, meting our punishment that is absolute, that allows no room for error. We are proud of the progress we have made in becoming a civilized people, and yet we retain this legalized murder, this punishment some two years behind. that belongs in the law of the jungle rather than in the law of a modern state.

The state condemns the convicted man to the electric chair, and the state pulls the switch. And the state is you and from this fate. It is a local action every other citizen. Every time a man dies at Huntsville, we are responsible. Until we abolish capital punishment, we will all be


