We suffered through a pretty rough time last Sunday at the hands of some law officials in Coleman for a minor traffic offense, which we were given to understand by a deputy was a result of the editorial that was published in this paper last week. This is a poor way to try to influence the press, since most weekly newspapermen have much in common with the mule—strong back, weak mind, and stubbornness—but the circumstances lead us to believe that this is what happened.

If so, we are not the first newsman to be persecuted for trying to do his job, nor will we be the last. We know that any time we speak out on a problem with a controversial nature, we are risking retaliation of some sort or another, usually in the form of the advertiser who refuses to support a paper that does not think exactly as he does, failing to see that he has to limit freedom of the press by his attitude and actions. We have always said what we think needs to be said, although in many instances it has been with considerable concern about the repercussions. This is our job. As we have often said in this paper, we don't pretend to think that we are always right, or that our answers are always the right answers—but if we start some thought about the problems, we have served our purpose.

We have to admit that we provided the perfect opening for what happened Sunday. We have been devoting so much of time to this paper that we neglected to take care of certain personal responsibilities, but we feel the way in which the incident was handled leaves much to be desired. The press and public officials can either cooperate, or they can feud. We have witnessed some of the problems that have arisen in other communities when such feuds get started, and they are mutually damaging. The press can be one of the most important partners of the public official in doing his job, and the officeholder can be of great assistance to the newspaper in the paper's effort to bring the important news to its readers. We have enjoyed such a relationship with most of the elected officials hereabouts, and we hope that this continues, but we reserve the right to say whatever we feel needs to be said, whether right or wrong.

We encourage debate on any position taken in this paper, and are happy to print any views that may be submitted to us, particularly if they disagree with us, since we want our readers to get every side of a question. And if anyone feels that we have printed anything untrue or unfair, there are laws through which that person can seek redress. We not only suggest, but we urge anyone who thinks we have published anything untrue or unfair about them to file libel action against us and let the courts decide. This is the proper way. We are positive that we have never libelled anyone, but if we had, we would be the first to want the situation corrected.

Now we will probably be sued by some other newsman who didn't like our comparing him to a donkey earlier in this tirade. We will just have to tell him, too, that we just have to call 'em like we see 'em, and that we will continue to do so.

But the next time we comment about affairs in some other County town, it is going to be Whon. Fewer people to get mad at you down there.

Week before last, in this column, we tried to carry an item about a typographical error from the paper at Rising Star, but we had so many typos in the item that it came out pretty incomprehensible. In case you are wondering, the item told about an advance report in the paper concerning a minister's sermon, which was to have been on "The Secret of Power," but due to the gremlins that infest newspaper shops (called type lice, by the way), the sermon topic was printed as "The Secret of Poker." The minister reported an alltime high in attendance.

Really wasn't all that funny, was it? We have poor planning around our office. When we make an error in the paper, it is just confusing, rather than being something funny we could use in this column.

Announcement has been made of new newspaper inks, called Pure-Aroma inks, that contain a scent as well as color. Thus, if you are running a large ad for new cars, you use the "new car scent" ink (no kidding).

We can't see anything so new about this. People have been telling us that our newspaper smells for a long time.

## BIG DOINGS SET IN SANTA ANNA THIS WEEKEND

### Santa Anna Schools Receive \$23,480.05 For New Educational Programs Here

The Santa Anna Independent School District has been okayed to receive \$22,423.85 under Title 1, and \$1,057.20 under Title 2 of the Federal government's Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965.

The Title 1 portion of the program is established to provide funds to add special and remedial teachers to assist students who need additional work in one subject or another. In Santa Anna, the funds will provide for three additional teachers, and four teachers aides.

One of the new teachers will work with the first four grades, one with the fifth through the eighth grades, and one in high school. The four teachers aides will assist teachers by doing the detail work, leaving the teachers free to teach.

Of the total grant under the Title 1 program, approximately \$4,000 will be used for supplies and equipment, about \$15,000 for salaries, and the remainder for incidental expenses.

Superintendent of Schools Cullen Perry says that a preliminary survey indicates that there are 112 students in the local school system needing remedial work in one or more subjects.

The Title 2 grant is for the purpose of financing additions to the school libraries, and for purchasing additional textbooks and other printed teaching material.

Under provisions of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965, the funds

from the Federal government may not be used to finance existing programs, but must be used to provide additional educational opportunities not now available in the school system.

Perry said the program will get underway here as soon as the required personnel are hired. Licensed teachers will be required to fill the three remedial teaching posts. The teacher aides will be required to be high school graduates. Perry said it would be preferable if they could type. Preference will be given to persons who may have some college credits in education, if any of the applicants possess such college experience. Perry said that anyone interested in applying for the remedial teacher or the teacher aide positions should contact him. Applications for both types of position are being solicited, he said. The remedial teaching positions will pay state scale for teachers, and the teacher aide positions will pay ten dollars per day.

### TAKES PRECEDENCE

### Verdict In Bond Vote Appeal Due This Week Or Next

Hearing on the appeal of the suit contesting the results of the recent water and sewer bond election was held in the 11th District Court of Civil Appeals, in Eastland, on Friday, November 12.

The oral arguments presented by attorneys for the city and for the group of citizens who are appealing the decision in 35th District Court upholding the validity of the election, were based on the briefs filed by both sides in the case.

State law requires that election contest cases take precedence over most others. The clerk of the 11th District Court of Civil Appeals said that it was expected that the decision would be returned this coming Friday, November 19, or the following Friday. All decisions of the appeal court are announced on Friday.

### Chili Supper, Turkey Shoot, Talent Show Set

The upcoming weekend, Saturday and Sunday, November 20 and 21, will have a full slate of activities for anyone in the Santa Anna area.

Starting things off, on Saturday, will be the second annual chili supper, sponsored by the Santa Anna Volunteer Fire Department, to raise funds for their yearly Christmas basket program.

The firemen will start serving at 8:00 a.m., and in case anyone is not in the mood for chili at 8:00 in the morning, they can have coffee and doughnuts. Chili will be served all day, until 6:00 p.m., and all the chili you can eat will cost one dollar.

Saturday is the day marking the official opening of the Christmas season in Santa Anna. The first drawings for prizes will be held on this day, and will continue on each Saturday throughout the Yule season. Prizes this year will be varying amounts of script, good as gold for purchases in any of the participating businesses (for a list of the Santa Anna firms taking part, see the advertisement in this issue of the paper).

The drawing will be held on Wallis Avenue, in front of the Santa Anna Lions Club building, where the firemen's chili supper will be going on.

The drawings will be held using tickets received by shoppers from participating merchants and deposited in the boxes provided for that purpose in each of the stores.

Another area event set for Saturday is the annual community Thanksgiving get together at Shield, beginning at 7:00 p.m., in the Community Center. After the meal, 42 games will be in progress. Everyone is invited to this community celebration, and everyone attending is asked to bring some food, dominos, and/or card tables.

### Jaycees Set Major Meeting Thursday

The Santa Anna Junior Chamber of Commerce will hold an important meeting Thursday, November 18, in the Santa Anna Lions Club Building, beginning at 8:00 p.m., according to Max Eubank, local Jaycee president.

Purpose of the meeting will be to work on final details of the Jaycee Turkey Shoot, scheduled for Sunday, November 20.

Eubank asked that all Santa Anna Jaycees make special effort to attend this meeting.

Anna area residents who want to get a turkey at a minimum cost for Thanksgiving, will want to participate in the Santa Anna Junior Chamber of Commerce Turkey Shoot. Several fine, fat turkeys, just right for Thanksgiving, will be awarded to a number of lucky people. Local sharpshooters will have a chance to test their shooting eyes in a number of types of competition.

There will be trap shooting for shotguns of all sizes, up to 12 gauge. There will be target shooting divisions for 22 caliber rifles, large caliber rifles with telescopic sights, large bore rifles with regular iron sights, .22 caliber pistols, and large caliber pistols.

Shooting is scheduled to start at the site in the gap between the two halves of Santa Anna Mountain, on the Norman Pautsky property, at 1:30 p.m.

There will be concessions on hand. Even persons who do not plan to shoot are invited to come out and watch.

Entry fee in the competition is one dollar for each division entered. Funds from the Turkey Shoot will go to the Jaycees' continuing program of civic improvement. Current project is to construct a permanent curbing on the track at Santa Anna High School, to make the local school eligible for district track meets and other sanctioned competition.

Saturday evening, beginning at 7:30 p.m., the Santa Anna Lions Club will present a talent show, with Fred Gray as master of ceremonies. Among the performers already lined up, according to director Gail Allen, is Jimmy Benton, piano solo; a girls duet from Brooksmith; Albrus Hayes, a magician from Fort Worth; a duet composed of Beth Trick and Leanna Pollock; a vocal solo by Jimmy Eubank; a twirling routine featuring Marguarite Horner, Sonja Neff, and Sherry Thompson; a combo headed by Calvin Bailey, called the Cabritos; a vocal duet by Darlene and Eddie Jones; a tap dance routine by Jay Lynn Moseley; and a 30 member tumbling act from Southern Union College, at Keene.

More talent can be use din the program, and anyone interested should call Mrs. Allen right away.

Admission to the talent show will be 50 cents for adults, and 25 cents for students.

Following the chili supper, the scene will shift to the Santa Anna High School auditorium, where the Santa Anna Lions Variety Show begins at 7:30 p.m.

### County 4-H Science Meeting Thursday

The new Science in 4-H Project will be discussed on Thursday, November 18, at 7:00 p.m., in the Club Room of the Coleman County State Bank.

This project is closely related to civil defense. It explores, on a small scale, the effects a nuclear attack could have on our plantlife. It is a nontechnical approach to learning about seeds and plant development, also. Interested boys and girls can set up these experiments with very little supervision, according to Doris Froehling, Assistant Coleman County Home Demonstration Agent.

However, during the meeting information will be distributed and discussed with all interested boys and girls. They will plan the work with the seeds. At future meetings, the 4-H'ers will compare observations from their experiments with one another.

All parents and 4-H'ers are should attend, Agent said.

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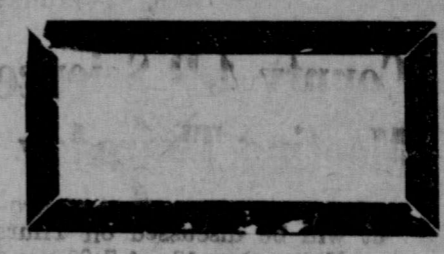

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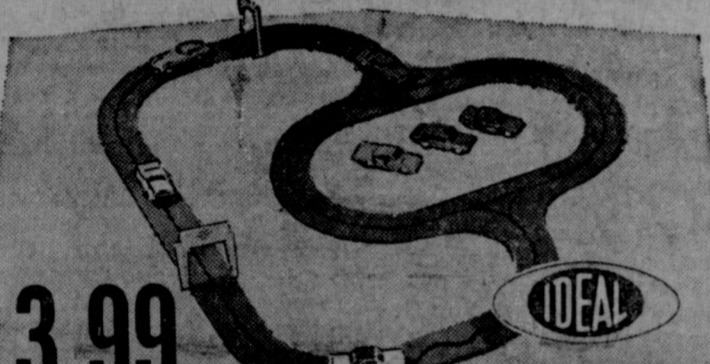


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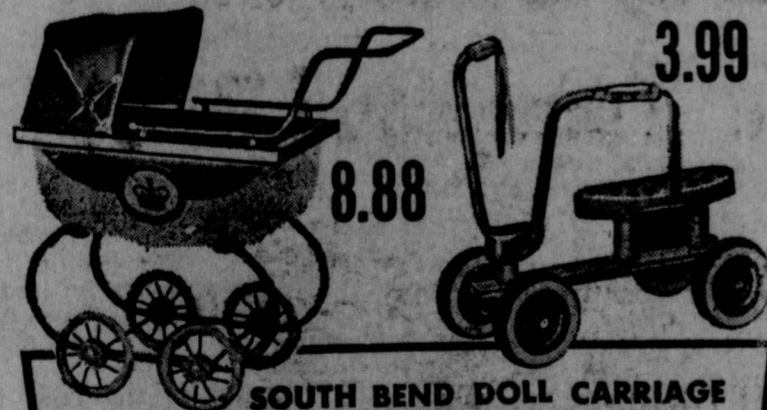

## Mountaineers Climb Out Of Cellar With 14-8 Upset Over Early Friday

If the Santa Anna Mountaineer football team could have played their first and last games of the season, and forgotten about the eight games in between, they would have had a heck of a good season. The local footballers took their final contest, in a mild upset (the Abilene daily newspaper had them two point underdogs), over the Early Longhorns, in Early Friday night, by a score of 14 to 7.

As it was, even counting the eight intervening games, the Mountaineers could be said to have had a successful season, coming back from a winless season last year to end up with a percentage of .200 for the 1965 go-round.

In several games this year, the Mountaineers have led in all the important statistics except the most important—the final score. This pattern was reversed in the Early game, with the Longhorns taking first down, total offense, and passing honors. However, the Mountaineers ended up with the most points on the scoreboard, and that is what wins the cigar—and in this case allowed the Santa Annans to escape the district cellar.

All of the scoring took place in the first half, with the Longhorns striking the first blow. The Mountaineers out-stageded themselves when a surprise quickkick on third down during the first series of downs, went only two yards, giving the Longhorns possession on the Santa Anna 49 yard line. Taking good advantage of this stroke of fortune, the Earlies used 11 plays to march for the score, with Rickey Kemp going in from the five. Kemp ran for the two point

conversion, made that too. Early 8, Santa Anna 0.

Late in the first quarter, the Longhorns had another chance. But generous to the end, the Early quarterback gave the ball back as he tossed a pass that was intercepted by the Mountaineers, on the final play of the 1965 football season.

The Longhorns led in the first down department, 14 to 10, with a large part of that total coming in the third quarter. The Santa Annans held a slight edge in Mountaineers forced their opponents to punt, taking over on the Early 48. It took the Santa Anna footballers only eight plays to reach paydirt, moving on the running of Eugene Davenport and Eddie Jones. Gary Rider went the last 15 yards for the counter. A pass attempt for the two pointer, from quarterback Roy Joe Harvey to Rider, was over the receiver's head in the corner of the endzone. Early 8, Santa Anna 6.

Taking the kickoff, the Longhorns moved to the midfield in four plays, but a penalty set them back to their own 45, and headsup defensive effort on the next play moved them back 10 more yards, to their 35. A punt carried to the Santa Anna 40. Using a combination of Makuta-Rider-Jones-Rider-Jones, the Mountaineers used just five plays to score, with Jones going in from the 27. Rider tried to gallop over with the two bonus points, but he failed to make it. Santa Anna 12, Early 8.

The second half was a defensive battle, with the Longhorns having the best of the statistics in the third quarter but unable to push the ball across. Most excitement in the final half came with seconds remaining in the game, when both teams decided to celebrate Christmas a little early in Early, giving the ball away at every opportunity. The Mountaineers fumbled with the Longhorns recovering. A couple of plays later, Early returned the favor as a Longhorn back was hit hard on a pass and pitchout play, jarring him loose from the ball. The crowd, feeling that the game was wrapped up, began to head for the exits, but the spirit of giving was still alive on the field, and the Mountaineers fumbled on their second play from scrim-

rushing yardage, 210 to 203. Early led in the passing department, gaining 33 yards on six completions in 11 tries. The Mountaineers tried the aerial route twice without a completion. Santa Anna lost the ball twice on fumbles, one time more than their opponents, with all three miscues coming late in the game. The Mountaineers punted four times, averaging 25 yards per boot, including the two yard quickkick early in the contest. Early kicked three times for an average of 30 yards. The Santa Anna squad drew only three penalties, totalling 35 yards, and Early was punished seven times for 65 yards, in a cleanly played game.

With Goldthwaite moulting Marble Falls, as expected, the final picture in District 9A. The Eagles on top with a perfect 4-0 trailed by Burnet in the second slot, with a record of 3-1. Marble Falls in third place with a 2-2 record. Santa Anna fourth with a 1-3 mark, and Early in the cellar (where the preseason experts picked the Mountaineers to end up) with a record of 0-4 for district play.

Goldthwaite will meet the District 10A winner, DeLeon, in Brownwood, Friday night at 7:30. DeLeon is the only team that gave the Eagles a scare this year, with Goldthwaite emerging on the long end of a 14-8 score. The Eagles have been vying with Three Rivers, in South Central Texas, for the top rating in the polls all year, but it will take the last game of the season to determine which is best, if both get that far, since the two teams are in separate halves of the elimination bracket.

## A Team Loses, B Wins At Mozelle

The Santa Anna High School girls basketball team returned the recent visit by the Mozelle hoopsters, as the A team lost, 37-23, and the B team won, 22-17, Tuesday, November 9.

The B team game saw the Santa Annans go ahead by a 7-5 margin in the first quarter, and extend their lead to 12-7 at halftime. The Santa Anna girls pulled farther into the lead during the third period, outscoring their opponents 6 to 3 to take a 18-10 lead. The Santa Anna crew then held off a strong Mozelle rally in the final period to grab the win. Leta Pollock, of Santa Anna, and Wilson, of Mozelle, tied for scoring honors, with 11 each. Sherry Tompson tallied six points for Santa Anna, and Cleta Pollock scored five.

In the varsity tilt, Mozelle jumped off to a 12-4 lead in the first quarter, and led the rest of the way. Jamison, of Mozelle, led the scoring race, with 17, followed by teammate Simon-ton, with 11. High scorer for Santa Anna was Loretta Broadway, with 10, followed by Lois Simmons, with six, Jean Robinson, with four, and Helen Pinston, with three.

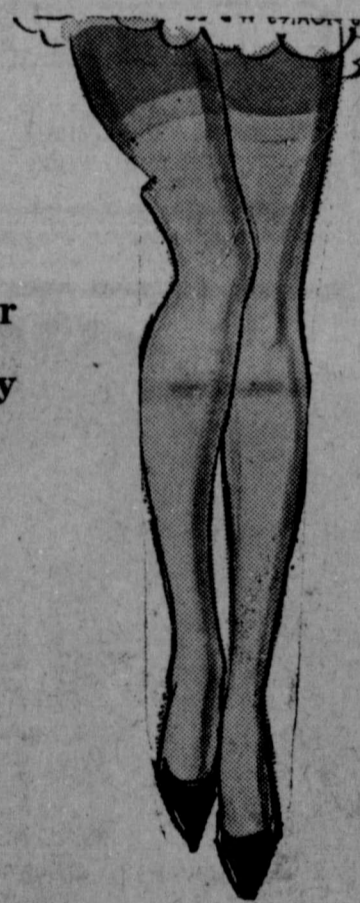

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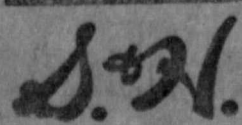
