All Local Incumbents Win In Primary Balloting In This Area Saturday

Coleman County voters decided to stay with the man in office in all races in the Democratic Party primary this past Saturday, May 7, as they balloted for all incumbents appearing on the ticket. In the only races involving candidates for positions in which there were no incumbents appearing on the ballots, the local voters followed statewide trends in showing a preference for Crawford Martin for state attorney general, and for Waggoner Carr as the Party nominee to face incumbent United States Senator John Tower in November.

In a race that had generated a great deal of interest, Coleman County voters favored Congressman Omar Burleson over challenger Eldon Mahon.

In the only county race that failed to include an incumbent, D. H. (Dave) Williams defeated T. Knox Campbell for the post of county school superintendent.

Oil Industry Plays Big Role In County Economy As State Marks Centennial

As Texas celebrates its 100th anniversary as an oil producing state, Coleman County shares in the development that made the Lone Star State the number one energy source for a booming American civilization.

In 1866, Lyne T. Barret—a man most history books forget—drilled the first Texas oil well near Nacogdoches, to a depth of 106 feet. In the 100 years that followed, the search for oil and gas spread to every county in Texas, and today, Coleman County is one of the 210 Texas counties—out of a total of 254—which produce oil and gas.

Barret, and other pioneer oil men in Texas, left a legacy for Coleman County that can be measured at approximately \$1,700,000 a year, according to statistics compiled by the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

During Texas' first century of oil production, a total of 29 billion barrels (29,000,000,000), approximately 61,700,000 barrels of oil has been contributed by Coleman County.

First oil production in Coleman County was in 1902.

The latest United States Bureau of Mines figures, for 1964, show Coleman County produced more than 2,100,000 barrels of crude oil that year, valued at \$6,300,000; and 10,800,000 cubic feet of natural gas, worth about \$1,400,000. The 1965 output was approximately the same, preliminary estimates indicate.

Coleman County ranks 107th among the Texas counties producing oil and gas, two places below the middle.

Payrolls, distribution of royalty checks to local landowners, new drilling ventures, and tax payments are some of the ways by which oil and gas revenue are injected into the Coleman County economy.

One of the most important "crops" harvested by Texas ranchers, farmers, and other landowners is the royalty interest from oil and gas operations. These payments are at the rate

4-H Club Horse Club Being Reorganized

The Coleman County 4-H Horse Club has reorganized for this year, according to Assistant County Agent Jerry Swift. Interested 4-H Club members must be enrolled in the Horse Club by Monday, May 30 to be eligible to participate in club activities.

Anyone interested should contact the County Agent's office, Swift said.

Santa Anna area residents who have a 65th birthday during 1966 will be protected by Medicare medical insurance at the earliest possible date only if the apply during the three months before they become 65.

Each person who becomes 65 on or after January 1, 1965 has a seven month period during which he may enroll for the supplementary insurance plan, but it becomes effective only after three months from the enrollment date. Thus, to be covered immediately after the 65th birthday, the sign-up must take place three months before the 65th birthday.

The state's top court refused to hear the Santa Anna case, noting that under state law the civil appeals court is the final authority in election contest suits. The action by the high court, in effect, upholds the decision of the 11th Court of Civil Appeals, which in turn upheld the decision of the 35th District Court, which found that no fraud, and no reasons for a recount or an examination of the ballots, existed, affirming the result of the election, in which approval of the bonds was expressed by Santa Anna voters, by a six vote margin in the case of the sewer improvements, and a nine vote edge in the water system improvement balloting.

Headstart Funds For Santa Anna

In a telegram to The Santa Anna News, United States Senator Ralph Yarborough revealed the approval of a grant of \$7,191 from the Office of Economic Opportunity to finance a preschool Operation Headstart program in the Santa Anna Independent School District this summer.

The two month program, for approximately 25 youngsters who will be starting in the first grade next fall, is designed to help prepare the future students for their first school experience. Tried here last summer for the first time, the program proved very successful. Superintendent of Schools Cullen Perry notes that the first group of Headstarters have become the best first grade class in his experience.

Two fulltime teachers will be employed with the Operation Headstart program this summer. The program will include orientation to the school, to the community, and to fellow students, along with general activities. Health services will also be a part of the program, with special attention to conditions that could effect the child's learning ability, such as visual problems. An advisory committee of parents will help to plan the program. Parents will also participate in orientation programs to assist them in preparing their child for the new adventure in school.

The two teachers and a part-time supervisor, to be named from the present staff, will be selected by the Board of Trustees of the Santa Anna Independent School District in the near future.

It is expected that the Operation Headstart program will start about June 13.

A rare Texas historical book has been republished by the Cross Timbers Press, of Brownwood.

"Twenty-five Years On The Outside Row" is the autobiography of Rev. Peter W. Gravis, a pioneer Methodist minister in Coleman County and the surrounding territory. The book was published in 1892, and only three copies are known to be in existence.

Coleman County Cotton Growers To Vote On Allotment Transfer Program

Cotton growers in about two thirds of the upland cotton producing counties in Texas, including Coleman County, will vote, during the period from May 16 through May 25 on whether to permit transfer of cotton acreage allotments to other counties in Texas by sale or lease. If, in any county, at least two thirds of the cotton producers casting votes favor the transfer arrangement, growers in that county will be allowed to transfer, by sale or lease, their allotments. These transfers must be between producers within one state—allotments cannot be transferred to other states.

Where the producers—two thirds of those voting at least, approve the transfer plan, they may transfer allotments to other counties for the periods of 1967, 1968, and 1969. This is in compliance with the Food and Agriculture Act of 1965.

On November 23, 1965, growers in 349 upland cotton producing counties in the United States voted to permit such allotment transfers. There are a total of 1,059 counties in this country eligible for such transfers if the producers approve. Only those counties which did not approve transfers in the first election will be voting this month.

For the first time, the referendum will be conducted by mail. Ballots will be sent to all cotton producers of record in the counties involved. Reason for the innovations of mail balloting, according to officials, is for the convenience of the grower, and to insure as large a vote as possible. All ballots must be in the office of the county ASC committee before closing time on Wednesday, May 25.

Remedial Courses Set For Summer

A program for students who failed to do well in the subjects of English and mathematics at Santa Anna High School will be offered again this year. These special courses are for students who have taken the courses involved, but who failed to do satisfactory work. They are not open to students who have not taken the courses.

Last year, the program was financed by charging tuition. This summer, the 20 program will be financed through a grant from the Federal government, under Title I of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act.

The Neighborhood Improvement Club, of Santa Anna, will not hold a meeting during May, according to an announcement this week by President Thomas Wristen, Jr., who explained that the regular meeting time, on the second Thursday of the month, would conflict with a concert by the Santa Anna High School Band. He said that other activities connected with the end of the school year would make it difficult to reschedule the meeting during May, and so it was decided to cancel this month's session, and meet at the regular time in June, which will be on Thursday, June 9.

Session Planned For New Students

A preschool roundup for all Santa Anna Independent School District children who will be starting the first grade in the fall of 1966 has been set for Monday, June 13. At least one parent of each child is urged to attend this meeting, with the child to be enrolled, according to Superintendent of Schools Cullen Perry. While the children are meeting elsewhere, under supervision of a teacher, a special session will be held for the parents, Perry said. He also noted that this meeting will be the preliminary session for the Operation Headstart program in Santa Anna.

The meeting will start at 2:30 p.m. and last about an hour. It will be held at the Santa Anna Elementary School.
