## New Bids To Be Asked On Sewer, Water Projects Here

The Santa Anna City Council has decided to readvertise for bids on the construction of the improvements to the local sewer and water systems, it was disclosed here Wednesday.

The action is a result of the 15 month delay in starting the project caused by legal action brought by a group of local citizens, seeking to block results of a bond election approved by the voters in February of last year. While the election contest suit, was being fought through the courts, all the way to the Texas Supreme Court, the cost of construction materials and labor has risen drastically, so that the project that would have had adequate financing 15 months ago now faces a deficit of more than \$30,000.

Acting on the advice of the firm of consulting engineers that is handling the project for the city, the Council decided to re-advertise for bids, setting the projects up in a slightly different manner, in hopes that the cost to the city will be reduced, without the necessity of reducing the aims of the original program.

Under the bid specifications originally advertised, both the water system and sewer system portions of the contract were to have been handled by the same firm, with one bid covering the entire project. When the bids were opened, on Tuesday, May 17, it was found that the costs of the two projects would exceed the amount originally planned by more than \$30,000. The excess cost could be met by one of several possible actions—the scope of the projects could be reduced, serving fewer local residents than had been originally planned; or the quality of the construction could be reduced; or more funds could be provided. In an effort to prevent the need for any of these possibilities, it was decided to advertise for bids again, and this time to set up the project so that the water system improvements and the sewer improvements will be two separate projects, and the contractors

can bid on one or both of these projects.

The four bids received on the past Tuesday ranged from a high of \$487,847.75 to a low of \$318,579.40. Low bidder was Anderson Construction Company, of Abilene.

Anderson's bid was low overall, but another bidder offered a lower price for the water system segment of the project. This and the fact that at least four other firms had expressed interest in bidding on the water system portion of the job alone, motivated the decision to ask for new bids, with each portion of the project to be offered for separate bids.

Other bidders on the project, in addition to the Abilene firm, were Clyde Smith Construction Company, of Austin, \$337,415.95; K. A. Sparks Construction Company, of Hamilton, \$353,047.85; and Zack Burkett Construction Company, of Graham, with the high bid of \$487,775.85.

Although the Smith bid was approximately \$19,000 higher in total than the low bid, this firm bid about \$10,000 less on the water system part of the job than did the Anderson firm.

The specifications and bid information is now being revised by the city's consulting engineers, the National Engineering Company, of Austin, and bids will be advertised as soon as possible, according to Jake Oliver, who is handling the Santa Anna project.

In an interview with The News Bill Anderson, of the Abilene contracting firm, estimated that it would take almost all of the 270 days allotted in the contract to complete the job. The actual time will depend on the type of subsurface the contractors find when they begin excavation (a large amount of rock will result in longer excavation time), and the type of weather the contractors encounter.

The City Council met in two called sessions on Tuesday, to decide what to do in the face of the higher than expected bids. The decision to readvertise for bids was made Wednesday, after telephone conferences with the engineers, in Austin.

It is expected that it will require approximately 30 days for

the final contract to be approved by Federal officials in Fort Worth, and about that long for enough materials to be delivered for the contractor to begin work, so that with the smallest possible delay in advertising for new bids, it will still be late summer before construction could begin. This will place the expected completion time early next summer.

## Livestock Survey Cards To Be Sent

Santa Anna Acting Postmaster John C. Gregg reminds rural postal patrons to be on the lookout this week for the June Livestock Survey cards. Next week, carriers on rural routes will leave survey cards in a sampling of the boxes along their routes.

The United States Department of Agriculture bases its livestock and poultry estimates on the replies to this survey, Gregg explained, noting that it is important for everyone who receives one of the survey cards to fill it out and return it to the route carrier by leaving it in the mailbox. This is the method used by Department of Agriculture statisticians to obtain a representative sample of the area's livestock and poultry holdings.

Rural carriers assisting in the survey next week will be M. L. Guthrie, Jr., on routes 1 and 2; Ann Allen, on the Rockwood route; and D. H. Moore, on the Trickham and Whon routes.

After being returned, the survey cards will be sent to Cary D. Palmer, Texas State Agricultural Statistician, in Austin. After adding and analyzing the information from these cards, Department of Agriculture statisticians will be able to estimate the state's milk production, the calf and pig crops, the lamb and wool crops, and the number of hens and pullets.

The information from this survey will be available to livestock and poultry producers as a guide in making marketing and other decisions affecting their business.

The Coleman County 4-H Horse Club will accept members for the current year until Tuesday, May 31. All former members must sign up again this year. To be eligible, the applicant must already be a member of a regular 4-H Club in Coleman County.

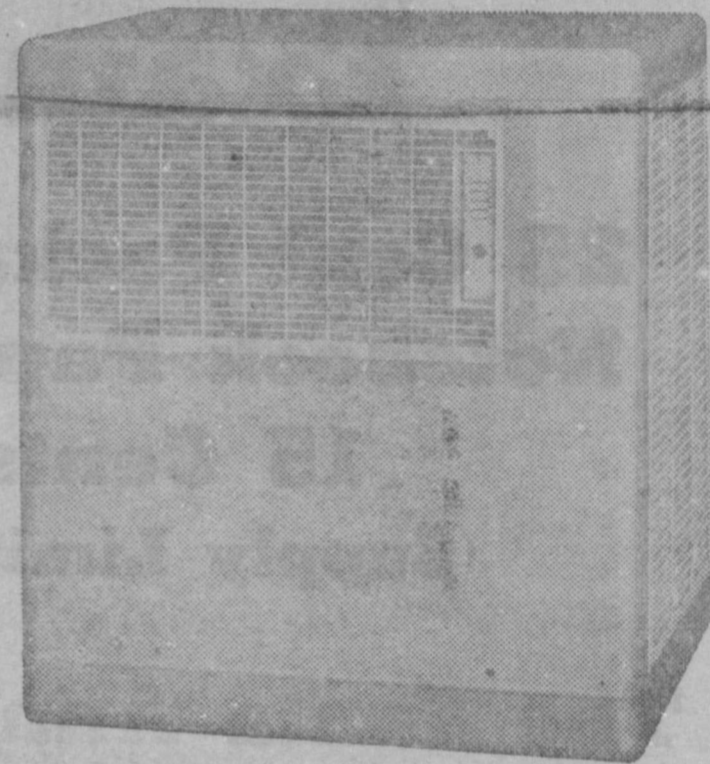

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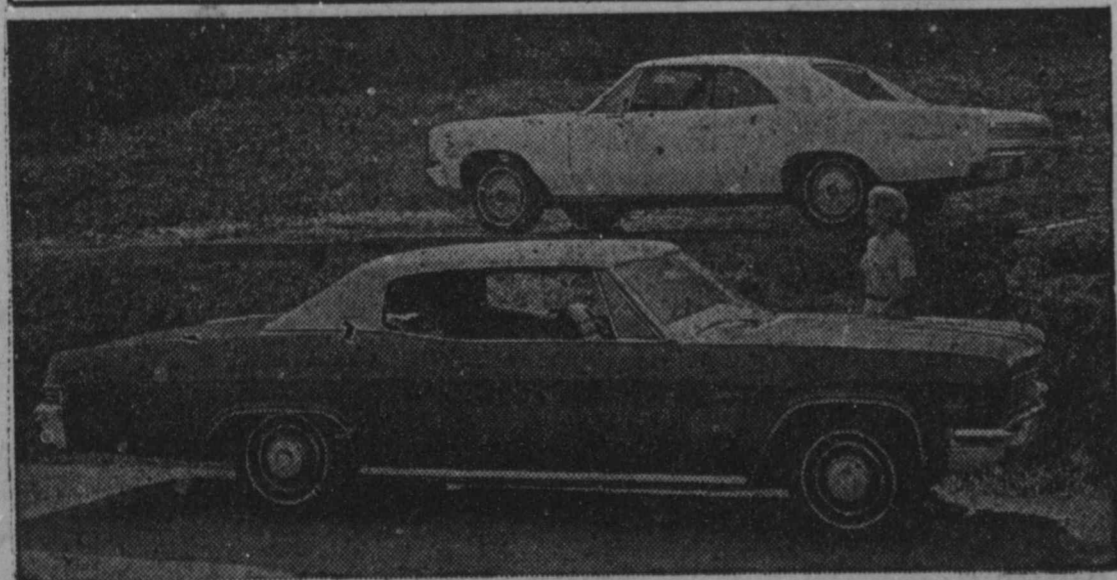
