## Perry Demonstrates Teachers' Aids At Lions Club Meeting

A very interesting and informative demonstration of the use of various mechanical teacher's aids for classroom and general instruction in the local school system was given by Supt. Cullen Perry at the Lions Club meeting Tuesday at noon.

Equipment demonstrated included a copying machine, an overhead projector and a visual reading projector. It was explained that the copying machine was used extensively by classroom teachers and office personnel for duplication of various forms and papers. The overhead projector allows teachers to project problems, assignments and various other materials on an overhead screen in full view of students for more efficient classroom instruction. The visual reader is used to increase the reading speed of a student.

# Pastor Resigns: Leaves Vacuum As If Pillar Has Been Removed

Dr. Ben H. Moore, who had served as pastor of the local United Presbyterian Church from November of 1943 until the present time, tendered his resignation effective Sunday, July 31.

Dr. Moore has served the local congregation and the community with fervor and zeal, accepting each responsibility with eagerness and enthusiasm, for the past twenty three years. His retirement will no doubt leave a vacuum in the church as if a giant pillar had been withdrawn.

Dr. Moore delivered his regular eleven o'clock sermon, which was followed by spreading of lunch at the noon hour Sunday. After the lunch hour, members assembled in the sanctuary where they heard Mrs. Jack Allen deliver a very touching and befitting eulogy of Dr. Moore's services and devotion to his church and congregation throughout the years.

A cash gift of \$1151.00 was then presented to the pastor by Mrs. Allen from the congregation, a token of their love and high esteem in which he was held. A beautiful tribute to a wonderful person was read in conjunction with the gift presentation, with all members forming a Friendship Circle and singing "Blest Be The Tie That Binds."

And, so ended the pastoral services of Dr. Ben Moore at the local church.

Following is the complete text of the eulogy as read from the pulpit by Mrs. Allen:

"In August, 1943, the resignation of Rev. M. L. Womack, who had served as our pastor for the previous fourteen years, created a vacancy in our pulpit. The church had just completed a wonderful meeting, led by Dr. Sam Jockel, that enabled us to withstand being

## Revival To Begin At First Baptist

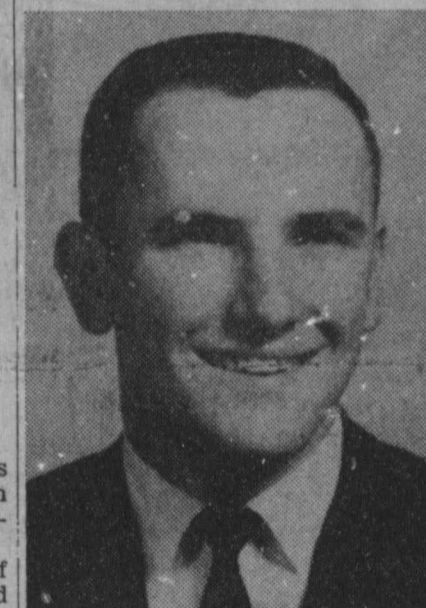
Revival services will get underway at the First Baptist Church Sunday, August 14, and will continue through August 21.

# 1967 Wheat Diversion Discontinued

## Reserved Seat Ticket Sales Procedure Altered

Reserved seat tickets for the 1966 football season will be available about August 15, according to announcement from school officials this week.

A change in the procedure of selling reserved seats in Mountaineer Stadium is being made this year, due to interest of the public in past seasons.

Plans for the coming season call for selling of the reserved seats for the five home games and the purchaser will receive a card which will admit him to the reserved section in the stadium. The reserved tickets are selling for \$1.25 for the season. Admission tickets to the game must be purchased at the gate for each game, and season tickets may be purchased before the first home game. District rules provide for general admission prices of \$1.25 per game, hence season tickets for five home games will total \$6.25.

It is hoped that the change in procedure will cause the reserved section to be more completely sold out. Two hundred tickets were printed for the 1965 season and only about half were sold. The new procedure will allow the flexibility of a football fan holding a reserved seat but not being forced to purchase a season ticket to hold it. The cost of admission will be spread out over the season, and this should be of benefit to many fans who have found the immediate cost of all tickets at one time too heavy.

Season tickets and reserved tickets are being prepared in a different format which will reduce printing costs since season tickets will not carry seat numbers. Seat numbers will be on the reserved seat ticket.

Tickets are being put on sale by the Athletic Department of the school.

During World War II he served with the Red Cross in overseas duty.

## Forms For N.Y.C. Program Ready

Forms are ready for high school students who are 16 years of age or older to make application for work during the 1966-1967 school year, under the Neighborhood Youth Corps, according to an announcement from the office of Supt. Cullen N. Perry this week.

During the new school term Coleman County has been combined with fourteen counties to operate N. Y. C. programs under the sponsorship of the San Saba School Board. This has reduced the number of students who can be approved locally to three, and even they must qualify on an economic basis in competition with applicants from the entire fourteen counties.

Application forms are available from 3:00 a. m. to 5:00 p. m. at the school office. They must be completed and returned not later than Tuesday, August 23, in order that they may be mailed to San Saba for analysis and approval. Local school personnel have no authority for approval of applications under this new organization, Perry stated.

The work program will begin on Tuesday, September 6. Students may work ten hours per week at the rate of \$1.25 per hour. Travis Shaw of San Saba is the N. Y. C. Coordinator for the 14-county area.

Basis for determining eligibility to be employed under the new N. Y. C. programs may be obtained by contacting local school officials.

## Entire Allotment Can Be Planted

When the Department of Agriculture recently announced an increase in the 1967 wheat allotment, it was also announced that there would be no diversion program for 1967.

In 1967, a producer can plant his entire allotment — without any diversion — and be eligible for certificates and a price-support loan.

It was pointed out that wheat growers participating in the 1967 wheat program will again be guaranteed full parity on the part of their wheat crop which is allocated for domestic food use. For each participating farm, this will be the projected production on 40 percent of the wheat allotment.

The domestic marketing certificates, available on this "domestic" wheat, will be valued at the difference between full parity as of July 1, 1967, and the \$1.25 loan value announced for the 1967 crop. (The certificate value for the 1966 crop is \$1.32 per bushel.)

Since there's no diversion program for wheat for the 1967 crop, it is important for farmers with small wheat allotments who have been diverting all or a part of their wheat allotment for payment to remember that diversion payments are no longer available and no income can be derived from the wheat program in 1967 unless the crop is planted.

The Lone Star executive added that the properties are being served by the company's Ballinger pipeline district and operated as a part of the Brownwood District in the West Texas Region of Lone Star's general division of distribution.

Travis Bohannon, formerly with Coleman Gas Company, will be in charge of Lone Star's distribution operation in Coleman and Santa Anna.

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## AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE...

Washington, D. C.—The news media shouts daily the crisis in our large American cities. In most issues of every newspaper is the report of racial strife, rising crime rates, the threat of air and water pollution, inadequate transportation facilities, overcrowded schools and hospitals and low treasuries.

Funds to provide needed services to the great population is an increasing challenge for city governments, and the natural result is for them to turn in desperation to the Federal Treasury for their money sources.

In the meantime, cities and communities aggressively compete with one another for new industry to provide jobs for their burgeoning populations and to generate new tax revenues. Cities of high industrial development work with business leaders to hold the business-industrial base which they already have, and to broaden it.

There are no answers in sight to the bulk of problems faced by our great cities, but it is apparent that millions of residents of the great metropolitan areas desire improvements in the quality of their living. Many of these people were attracted to the city in the first place because the economic opportunities in

the rural and small towns appeared to be less and less attractive.

The fact remains that there should be increasing opportunity in such places as our great Central West Texas area. It should attract new business and industry on which a regional economy can be greatly strengthened. We have the people, the community leadership, the climate, the transportation structure, recreational facilities which afford a pleasant life of friendly cities and towns where families can put down roots and feel at home. We have the rich mineral and agricultural resources which provide the essential raw materials for numerous industrial enterprises.

The age old problem of water continues to be exactly that—a problem. But this handicap can and will be overcome because of pure old necessity.

The great Central West Texas area offers unlike any other area in the State and, in fact, unlike any other area anywhere in the Country, which has other resources to go with a place to expand.

The State Water Development Board, now in the process of holding hearings over the State, has said that Central West Texas and West Texas are not to share in the distribution of water within the State, but, rather, must look outside the

State's borders for its water supply. With this suggestion and recommendation we can not agree.

Estimates of population as a basis of need were developed by a survey made by the University of Texas, which showed our immediate area not to be sharing in the increase in population as compared to other parts of the State. As was said to the Water Board holding its hearing in Abilene on July 18, it is a matter of which comes first, the chicken or the egg. It is surely true that if we do not have water as a primary consideration along with other resources, our population and economic advances may not compare favorably with other areas in the State, but with water and the other natural advantages we have to offer, our area should advance and expand beyond the percentage ascribed to certain other areas.

The bidding for industry is already highly competitive between localities and will doubtless become more so. Not only is it competitive between neighboring communities, but it is competitive between regions and States. Some cities and towns have voted tax exempt bonds to provide facilities to attract industries, which has brought loud complaint from areas in the North and East from which industry is invited to move.

On the other hand it is possible that Congress may, in a year or two ahead, consider some form of incentive plan to assist new plant construction in the more rural and small town communities. Legislation may be proposed, providing Federal Income Tax incentive for such development, although there is no doubt it will draw opposition from Representatives from the large cities. There is precedent for it, set some years ago by Congress in approving legislation to help disperse industries as prime targets in the event of nuclear attack. This theory could be applied to our normal economy.

Local leadership and dedication to future development is the first prime ingredient for success.

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## Flood Spices Act For Garner Park

Some state parks have everything even to a veritable Hollywood staged flash flood.

That would be Garner State Park which didn't need the embellishment for its reputation as one of the favorite places for people to go and have fun.

The latest episode, with a happy beginning and end, reflects modern teamwork of state agencies, according to Donald Oliver, regional park ranger temporarily handling Garner affairs.

On a week end morning the State Highway Department alerted Oliver that heavy rains in the headquarters of the Frio River, which roars benignly through the wooded park, would cause a substantial rise in the river.

Oliver noted the dripping trees from a light shower, observed the tranquil clear-water stream and the happy campers along its bank.

ZOWIE! The friendly advisers had added that the rise would be six feet and the time would be 2 p.m.

The Ranger and his staff notified the unbelieving guests they had five hours to quietly fold their tents, pack up their equipment, move back up on higher ground and enjoy the water show.

Garner, the first state park ever to approach the 1,000,000 annual visitation mark, had its usual thousands. And they joined the river bank evacuees, all very skeptical, what with the sun shining and the birds singing and the air very fresh from the dainty shower.

But the highway folks had calculated well what would happen when up to seven inches of rain cascaded down the barren canyons. Almost on the dot at 2 p.m. here came a modest wall of water, about like a boat wake, said Oliver. Slowly the stream climbed six feet, covering the bank camp area. Nobody even got their feet wet. Soon the river was blue and clear again, back where it had been before the deluge. And the fishermen were smelling up the shaded area frying catfish that hadn't bitten good since the spring rains.

## South Zone Dove Hunters Get Break

South Zone hunters will again open the mourning dove season just preceding the peak population of this popular feathered migrant, according to E. A. Walker, director of wildlife services for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

He said this was assured when the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission set September 24 as the opening South Zone date.

Walker pointed out that the Department had collected considerable data on the mourning dove population trends during the last five years and the Department's recommendation for the early opening date to the Commission was based on this material.

The season on mourning doves will be the same as last year in the North Zone.

Dates are September 1 through October 30 for 60 "half days" of shooting. The South Zone

season will run from September 24 through November 22, except in those counties having a whitewing season where it will be September 3, 4, 5, 9, 10, and 11, and September 24 through November 16.

Shooting hours for both species will be from noon to sunset. The daily bag limit for each species will be 12 birds each and the possession limit after the first day will be 24 birds of each species.

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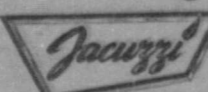

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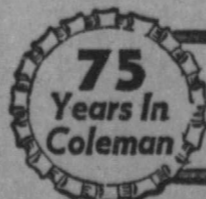

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWELVE ON THE BALLOT**

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966. HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 48 proposing an Amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing the method and manner for dissolution of hospital districts created under Article IX of the Constitution.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 9, Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows: "Section 9. The Legislature may by law provide for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of hospital districts composed of one or more counties or all or any part of one or more counties with power to issue bonds for the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of buildings and improvements and equipping same, for hospital purposes; providing for the transfer to the hospital district of the title to any land, buildings, improvements and equipment located wholly within the district which may be jointly or separately owned by any city, town or county, providing that any district so created shall assume full responsibility for providing medical and hospital care for its needy inhabitants and assume the outstanding indebtedness incurred by cities, towns and counties for hospital purposes prior to the creation of the district, if same are located wholly within its boundaries, and a pro rata portion of such indebtedness based upon the then last approved tax assessment rolls of the included cities, towns and counties if less than all

the territory thereof is included within the district boundaries; providing that after its creation no other municipality or political subdivision shall have the power to levy taxes or issue bonds or other obligations for hospital purposes or for providing medical care within the boundaries of the district; providing for the levy of annual taxes at a rate not to exceed seventy-five cents (75c) on the One Hundred Dollar valuation of all taxable property within such district for the purpose of meeting the requirements of the district's bonds, the indebtedness assumed by it and its maintenance and operating expenses, providing that such district shall not be created or such tax authorized unless approved by a majority of the qualified property taxpaying electors thereof voting at an election called for the purpose; and providing further that the support and maintenance of the district's hospital system shall never become a charge against or obligation of the State of Texas nor shall any direct appropriation be made by the Legislature for the construction, maintenance or improvement of any of the facilities of such district.

Provided, however, that no district shall be created except by act of the Legislature and then only after thirty (30) days' public notice to the district affected, and in no event may the Legislature provide for a district to be created without the affirmative vote of a majority of the taxpaying voters in the district concerned.

The Legislature may also provide for the dissolution of hospital districts provided that a process is afforded by statute for:

- (1) determining the desire of a majority of the qualified voters within the district to dissolve it;
- (2) disposing of or transferring the assets, if any, of the district; and
- (3) satisfying the debts and bond obligations, if any, of the district, in such manner as to protect the interest of the citizens within the district, including their collective property rights in the assets and property of the district, provided, however, that any grant from federal funds, however dispensed, shall be considered an obligation to be repaid in satisfaction and provided that no election to dissolve shall be held more often than once each year. In such connection, the statute shall provide against disposal or transfer of the assets of the district except for due compensation unless such assets are transferred to another governmental agency, such as a county, embracing such district and using such transferred assets in such a way as to benefit citizens formerly within the district.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment providing the method and manner for dissolution of hospital districts."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment providing the method and manner for dissolution of hospital districts."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 33 proposing an Amendment to Section 6, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, to authorize state participation in programs financed with funds from private or federal sources and conducted by local level or other private, nonsectarian associations, groups, and nonprofit organizations for establishing and equipping facilities for assisting the blind, crippled, or otherwise physically or mentally handicapped in becoming gainfully employed, for their rehabilitation or restoration, or for providing other services essential for the better care and treatment of the handicapped.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 6, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 6. (a) No appropriation for private or individual purposes shall be made, unless authorized by this Constitution. A regular statement, under oath, and an account of the receipts and expenditures of all public money, shall be published annually, in such manner as shall be prescribed by law.

(b) State agencies charged with the responsibility of providing services to those who are blind, crippled, or otherwise physically or mentally handicapped may accept money from private or federal sources, designated by the private or federal source as money to be used in establishing and equipping facilities for assisting those who are blind, crippled, or otherwise physically or mentally handicapped in becoming gainfully employed, in rehabilitating and restoring the handi-

capped, and in providing other services determined by the state agency to be essential for the better care and treatment of the handicapped. Money accepted under this subsection is state money. State agencies may spend money accepted under this subsection, and no other money, for specific programs and projects to be conducted by local level or other private, nonsectarian associations, groups, and nonprofit organizations, in establishing and equipping facilities for assisting those who are blind, crippled, or otherwise physically or mentally handicapped in becoming gainfully employed, in rehabilitating and restoring the handicapped, and in providing other services determined by the state agency to be essential for the better care or treatment of the handicapped.

"The state agencies may deposit money accepted under this subsection either in the state treasury or in other secure depositories. The money may not be expended for any purpose other than the purpose for which it was given. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Constitution, the state agencies may expend money accepted under this subsection without the necessity of an appropriation, unless the Legislature, by law, requires that the money be expended only on appropriation. The Legislature may prohibit state agencies from accepting money under this subsection or may regulate the amount of money accepted, the way the acceptance and expenditure of the money is administered, and the purposes for which the state agencies may expend the money. Money accepted under this subsection for a purpose prohibited by the Legislature shall be returned to the entity that gave the money.

"This subsection does not prohibit state agencies authorized to render services to the handicapped from contracting with privately-owned or local facilities for necessary and essential services, subject to such conditions, standards, and procedures as may be prescribed by law."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing assistance to the blind, crippled, or otherwise physically or mentally handicapped, in the form of grants of public funds obtained from private or federal sources only, to local level or other private, nonsectarian associations, groups, and nonprofit organizations for establishing and equipping facilities to assist the handicapped in becoming gainfully employed, for their rehabilitation or restoration, or for providing other services essential for the better care and treatment of the handicapped."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing assistance to the blind, crippled, or otherwise physically or mentally handicapped, in the form of grants of public funds, obtained from private or federal sources only, to local level or other private, nonsectarian associations, groups, and nonprofit organizations for establishing and equipping facilities to assist the handicapped in becoming gainfully employed, for their rehabilitation or restoration, or for providing other services essential for the better care and treatment of the handicapped."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Or if said voter shall have lost or misplaced said tax receipt, he or she, as the case may be, shall be entitled to vote upon making affidavit before any officer authorized to administer oaths that such tax receipt has been lost, and by substituting therefor the following language: "and provided further, that any voter who is subject to pay a poll tax under the laws of the State of Texas shall have paid said tax before offering to vote at any election in this State and hold a receipt showing that said poll tax was paid before the first day of February next preceding such election. Or if said voter shall have lost or misplaced said tax receipt, he or she, as the case may be, shall be entitled to vote upon making affidavit before any officer authorized to administer oaths that such tax receipt has been lost. Such affidavit shall be in writing and left with the judge of the election. The husband may pay the poll tax of his wife and receive the receipt therefor. In like manner, the wife may pay the poll tax of her husband and receive the receipt therefor."

Sec. 6. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 24 proposing an amendment to Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section thereto, Section 2a, to provide for voting on electors for President and Vice President, and on all state-wide offices, questions or propositions by persons qualified to vote in this State except for meeting county or district residence requirements, and to provide for voting on electors for President and Vice President by otherwise qualified United States citizens who have moved into or out of the State preceding a presidential election.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended by adding a new Section thereto, Section 2a, to read:

"Section 2a. (a) Notwithstanding any other provision of this Constitution, the Legislature may enact laws and provide a method of registration, including the time of such registration, permitting any person who is qualified to vote in this State except for the residence requirements within a county or district, as set forth in Section 2 of this Article, to vote for (1) electors for President and Vice President of the United States and (2) all offices, questions or propositions to be voted on by all electors throughout this State.

(b) Notwithstanding any other provision of this Constitution, the Legislature may enact laws and provide for a method of registration, including the time for such registration, permitting any person (1) who is qualified to vote in this State except for the residence requirements of Section 2 of this Article, and (2) who shall have resided anywhere within this State at least thirty (30) days next preceding a General Election in a presidential election year, and (3) who shall have been a qualified elector in another state immediately prior to his removal to this State or would have been eligible to vote in such other state had he remained there until such election, to vote for electors for President and Vice President of the United States in that election.

(c) Notwithstanding any other provision of this Constitution, the Legislature may enact laws and provide for a method of registration, including the time for such registration, permitting absentee voting for electors for President and Vice President of the United States in this State by former residents of this State (1) who have removed to another state, and (2) who meet all qualifications, except residence requirements, for voting for electors for President and Vice President in this State at the time of the election, but the privileges of suffrage so granted shall be only for

such period of time as would permit a former resident of this State to meet the residence requirements for voting in his new state of residence, and in no case for more than twenty-four (24) months."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment permitting persons qualified to vote in this State except for the residence requirements in a county or district to vote for Presidential and Vice Presidential Electors and for all state-wide offices, questions or propositions, and permitting citizens of the United States recently arrived or departed from the State to vote for Presidential and Vice Presidential Electors."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment permitting persons qualified to vote in this State except for the residence requirements in a county or district to vote for Presidential and Vice Presidential Electors and for all state-wide offices, questions or propositions, and permitting citizens of the United States recently arrived or departed from the State to vote for Presidential and Vice Presidential Electors."

For the purpose of constructing, equipping, or acquiring buildings or other permanent improvements to the Texas A & M University System, including Texas A & M University, Prairie View Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas at Prairie View, Tarleton State College at Stephenville, Texas Agricultural Experiment Stations, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas Engineering Experiment Station at College Station, Texas Engineering Extension Service at College Station, and the Texas Forest Service, the Board of Directors is hereby authorized to issue negotiable bonds or notes not to exceed a total amount of one-third (1/3) of twenty per cent (20%) of the value of the Permanent University Fund exclusive of real estate at the time of any issuance thereof; provided, however, no building or other permanent improvement shall be acquired or constructed hereunder for use by any part of the Texas A & M University System, except at and for the use of the general academic institutions of said System, namely, The Main University and Texas Western College, without the prior approval of the Legislature or of such agency as may be authorized by the Legislature to grant such approval. Any bonds or notes issued hereunder shall be payable solely out of the income from the Permanent University Fund, Bonds or notes so issued shall mature serially or otherwise not more than thirty (30) years from their respective dates.

"The Texas A & M University System and all of the institutions constituting such System as hereinabove enumerated, and The University of Texas System, and all of the institutions constituting such System as hereinabove enumerated, shall not receive any General Revenue funds for the acquiring or constructing of buildings or other permanent improvements, except in case of fire, flood, storm, or earthquake occurring at any such institution, in which case

an appropriation in an amount sufficient to replace the uninsured loss so incurred may be made by the Legislature out of General Revenue funds.

"Said Bonds are severally authorized to pledge the whole or any part of the respective interests of Texas A & M University and of The University of Texas in the income from the Permanent University Fund, as such interests are now apportioned by Chapter 42 of the Acts of the Regular Session of the 42nd Legislature of the State of Texas, for the purpose of securing the payment of the principal and interest of such bonds or notes. The Permanent University Fund may be invested in such bonds or notes.

"All bonds or notes issued pursuant hereto shall be approved by the Attorney General of Texas and when so approved shall be incontestable. This Amendment shall be self-enacting provided, however, that nothing herein shall be construed as impairing any obligation heretofore created by the issuance of any outstanding notes or bonds under this Section by the respective Boards prior to the adoption of this Amendment but any such outstanding notes or bonds shall be paid in full, both principal and interest, in accordance with the terms of such contracts."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment withdrawing Arlington State College from participation in the Permanent University Fund."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment withdrawing Arlington State College from participation in the Permanent University Fund."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the constitution and laws of this state.
