

VETERAN'S Questions & Answers

Q — What Federal Civil Service Preference rights does the Post-Korean GI Bill give me? I had active duty from May 30, 1960 to June 1, 1961 and received an honorable discharge.

A — Five point preference in competitive examination for Federal Civil Service Jobs will be added to competitive examination scores of veterans discharged after January 31, 1955. (Ten points will be added for veterans with service connected disabilities or who hold a Purple Heart.)

Q — As a so-called "Six month Enlistee" am I eligible for benefits under the new GI Bill?

A — No.

Q — What part of my tuition of books and supplies does the VA pay under the educational provisions of the new GI Bill?

A — None. If you have been discharged from service and are attending school full-time under the new GI Bill, the VA pays you \$100 a month if you have no dependents; \$125, with one dependent; and \$150, with two or more dependents. The

rate is proportionate for 3/4 or 1/2 time. You pay for your own tuition, books and supplies.

Q — I am a serviceman with more than two years of service, but have less than 180 days since January 31, 1955. Am I eligible for educational benefits under the new GI Bill?

A — Yes. Two years of active service, any part of which was after January 31, 1955, qualifies you. But, you are eligible—month for month—for only that time you have served since that date.

Q — I am seeking some information as to how long one has to wear a uniform in the Army to be classified as a veteran? I have been told that a new law has been passed whereby a person wearing a uniform 24 hours is a veteran. I tried to join the Armed Forces several times during the First World War but was rejected. I was drafted soon afterwards. I was sent to Fort McKinley in Portland, Me., on October 21, 1918. I was given a discharge from the service on October 31. All the time I was wearing a uniform. Am I therefore considered a veteran?

A — To be considered a veteran of World War I you must have served at least 90 days of active, honorable service beginning April 6, 1917 and ending November 11, 1918. An exception is if you served with the U.S. military forces in Russia then the period ends April 1, 1920, unless discharged sooner because of a service connected disability.

Q — I was on active duty from August 19, 1957 to September 20, 1960. Am I eligible for hospital treatment?

A — Yes. All veterans discharged from military service, under conditions other than dishonorable, after January 31, 1955, will be eligible for admission to VA hospitals with the same general admission priorities as wartime veterans.

Q — Am I eligible for training under the new GI Bill?

A — If you served on active duty for a period of more than 180 days, any part of which occurred after January 31, 1955, served honorably, or served for any period after that date and was released from active duty for a service-connected disability.

Q — May I take flight training?

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A — No. A course in flying may be approved only if part of an over-all course leading to a degree.

Q — Does VA pay my tuition?

A — No. The Veteran pays his own tuition. VA pays monthly allowance directly to the veteran.

Q — Children of a deceased veteran may have some pension rights — do they forfeit these rights when their mothers (the veteran's widow) remarries?

A — Eligible children of a deceased veteran retain their pension rights after their mother remarries until they become 18, or 23 if they are going to school.

Q — Under the terms of the GI loan benefit, can a veteran mortgage his present home to obtain money for other expenses?

A — Only for improvement. GI loans are not available to pay doctor bills, buy furniture, etc.

Q — Is a member of the Reserves injured while on inactive duty training, eligible for disability compensation through the VA?

A — Yes. The law provides compensation for injuries incurred in line of duty by reservists during a drill or other period of authorized inactive duty training. Application should be filed with the nearest VA Regional Office, and should be accompanied by an official statement from the Unit Commander showing the date, circumstances, nature and line of duty status of the injury.

Q — I receive regular treatment and medicine from the Veterans Administration for my service-connected disability. I plan to travel overseas for about six months. Is there any way I can get medical care for medicines if I need them on my trip?

A — Yes. The Veterans Administration provides such care and medicines for service-connected

disabled veterans everywhere possible. Just contact the nearest U. S. State Department, Embassy, Consulate or Legation.

Wardens Tighten Grip on Violators

Enforcement follow through after a prolonged water sports safety educational campaign is reflected in the monthly Texas Parks and Wildlife Department arrest report.

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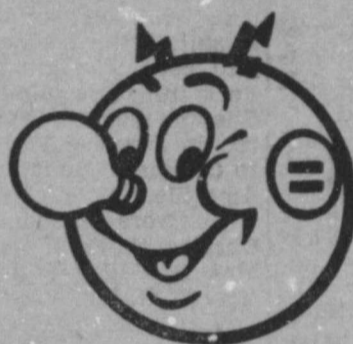

Savings Bonds Quiz

Question: Has there been some change lately in the limitation of purchases of Series E and H Savings Bonds?

Answer: Yes, you may now purchase up to \$20,000 (maturity value) of Series E Bonds, in any calendar year, and up to \$30,000 (face value) of Series H Bonds. Also the one calendar month's advance notice before redeeming Series H Bonds has been eliminated, except for bonds for payment during the month preceding and interest payment date, in which event the bonds would be paid in the following month.

Answer: President Johnson has said that the purchase of Savings Bonds not only strengthens the economy of the country but backs the attack of our fighting men in Southeast Asia.

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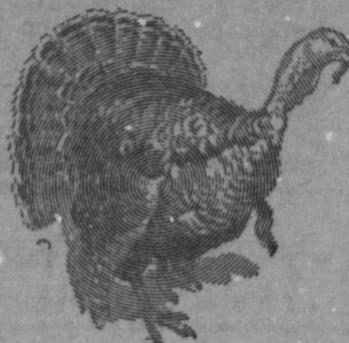

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P&WD SEEKS LAW SAVVY BY TEXANS

Ask a law enforcement specialist in the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department what is his principal concern over the big game season, and he probably will say hunter carelessness in not being informed on where and what to shoot and how many.

There is the major worry about assorted dates for hunting deer and wild turkey. Then there is the problem of orienting the gunner about what is a legal deer and what is a legal turkey.

In some areas, taking of bearded hen turkeys is allowed. In others hens are fully protected. Some hunters naturally have problems telling a hen from a tom, beard or not.

The spike buck or legal buck situation confuses some because of conflicting regulations.

The enforcement people also are wondering about possible confusion over the antlerless deer program that has been advanced as a means of balancing the herds, particularly as to overpopulation. A third deer tag is attached to the left side of the license, in addition to the two tags on the right side.

The tag on the left is labeled antlerless deer and is intended to be issued only as a bonus tag in the counties where a third deer is permitted as a means of cutting into the huge surplus. In other words the two tags on the right side of the license may be used for either buck or antlerless deer.

Law enforcement personnel stress that no antlerless deer may be shot except in areas where landowners issue permits. And these permits must be on the person of the hunter bagging the antlerless deer.

The Department is eager to inform all hunters because game wardens stand instructed that ignorance of the law is no excuse for breaking it regardless of the circumstances.

Texas Boasts Largest Ebony Tree in Nation

The big Texas ebony tree on the Santa Ana National Wild-

life Refuge is the largest of its kind in the nation, according to the Texas Forest Service, a part of the Texas A&M University system.

The certification was announced by the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife. The big ebony tree has a height of 40 feet, 3 inches and a crown spread of 40 feet, and its trunk is 19 feet, 10-3/4 inches in circumference.

The refuge is famous for the many species of birds found there. Thousands of bird-lovers make the trip to the refuge in Hidalgo County in south Texas each year. It is one of the few places in the nation where chachalacas — a chicken-sized bird — are found.

HEALTH AND SAFETY TIPS FROM THE AMERICAN MEDICAL ASSN.

Back Injuries

With the approach of the 1966 football season, the American Medical Association's Committee on Medical Aspects of Sports again reminds coaches and trainers and parents of players to be wary of the athlete who has continual or recurring back pains, even if the pains aren't disabling.

Serious disabling injuries of the back are unusual in sports among persons who have a sound spine to begin with. Contusions of the muscles, strains of the ligaments and even fractures of various aspects of the lumbar vertebrae ordinarily heal under medical supervision with no persistent disability in from two to six weeks. If disability persists beyond six weeks, the physician will search for some underlying defect in the spine or its juncture with the sacrum.

Congenital defects of the spine are rare and might not be detected. Unless they produce obvious external signs they aren't ordinarily recognized during childhood. During adolescence, however, heavier stresses are placed on the spine by the greater size and weight and more strenuous activities of the individual. When the boy or girl becomes active in athletics, pain in the back or spasm of the back muscles may appear for the first time.

Unless there has been a history of injury these difficulties are often discounted as "back strain" or "growing pains." Continuation of athletic activities, especially contact sports such as football, may then result in an injury which becomes

chronically disabling because of the underlying defect.

The AMA declared that the only way to prevent serious chronically disabling back conditions in young athletes is by detecting and rigidly excluding those who have significant birth defects of the spine from sports which pose a high risk of injury to the back. The significance of a defect can only be determined by medical evaluation. This can be done, first, by requiring a preparticipation health examination including a careful history of all candidates for these sports. Any history of frequent back symptoms demands a further examination, including x-rays. Significant limitation of forward or side bending or pain produced on straight leg-raising provides evidence of possible disorders.

Excluding such individuals from sports with a high risk factor may seem harsh when the player is able. But counting on such a player for continuing

service can have disastrous results, both to the team which risks losing his services at a crucial period in the season, and to the individual who risks disabling injury.

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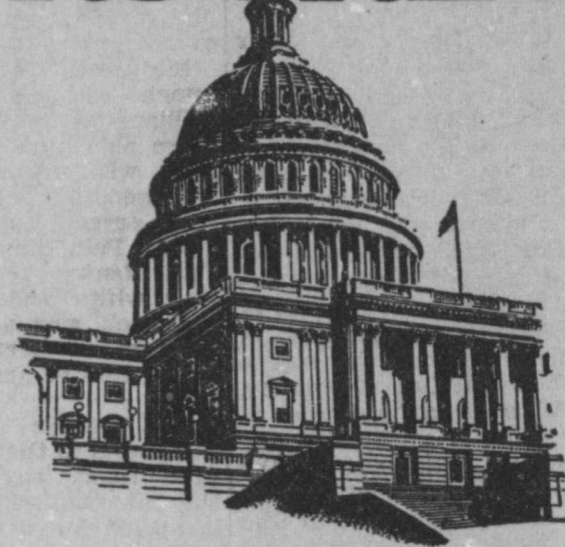

SUPPLEMENTAL FEEDING OF BEEF COWS

Supplemental feeding of beef cows during the winter paid in only 2 of 6 years in a study at Texas A&M University's Experimental Ranch located near Throckmorton. Dr. W. J. Waldrip, who had charge of the tests, said the condition of pastures has a great deal to do with whether or not supplemental feed is needed. He recommends a deferred rotation system of grazing. The tests show that deferred rotation not only improves range conditions but also produces more beef per acre.

TRAGIC GUN DEATHS EMPHASIZED BY P&WD

This is the sordid side of the fall hunting season; the side nobody like to talk about. But the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, committed to a broad public service program, has a duty to perform. With all its game management facilities, it realizes fully that it can do nothing for a wounded or dead hunter.

So the Department cautions sportsmen about the horror side of hunting that, fortunately, because of safety adherence, affects a comparatively few.

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
