Four Santa Anna Cagers Win All - District Honors

Receiving honorable mention for the team was Sue Kingsbery, forward. Vicki Jo was the highest scoring forward in the district this season, averaging 32 points a game. She is a junior and was an All-District choice last year. Willie Lee, also a junior, is on the All-District team for the second year.

Sue Kingsbery had honorable mention for All-District last year as a guard, and has the third-high scoring mark in the District this year, averaging 17 points a game. Sue is a junior.

All eligible voters in the school district are urged to go to the polls Saturday and cast ballots for the trustee election.

Site Option Accepted For New Post Office

Announcement has been made for plans for a new post office building in Santa Anna. The Post Office Department has accepted a site option offered by Homer Goodgion for the lots on the southwest corner of the Avenue B and North 3rd street intersection. The site is the present location of the homes occupied by Mrs. Lester Newman and Miss Tommie Tate. Mr. Goodgion stated that the two houses will be moved to other locations in town.

According to the Postmaster General, the new building will have over 2,000 square feet of floor space, with a large area for parking and postal vehicles. The building will be constructed under the Department's Lease Construction Program. While leased to the government the building will remain under private ownership and the owner will pay local real estate taxes.

Plans and specifications for the new building, as well as

bidding forms and other data, will be made available to the prospective bidders at an early date, at which time the Postal Department will advertise for bids.

The site option will be assigned to the successful bidder, who will purchase the land, construct the building and lease it to the department.

Most local people are looking forward to a new post office in a location off the busy main thoroughfare.

New FM Highway For Coleman Co.

FM Highway 1176 from Cross Roads (at Int. with FM 2302) south 5.1 miles to Int. FM 568 (old Comanche route) is contemplated as Coleman County's option in the current program of FM Highway construction proposed by the Texas Highway Department. This location runs from about 6½ miles NE of Coleman, South to 5 miles East of Coleman.

Deeds for required right-of-way have been prepared on the basis of economy and design requirements to utilize the present county road with additional width along its west side for the first 3 miles south of Cross Roads.

New south width right-of-way is being secured along the east side for the other 2.1 miles south to Int. FM 568. A pipeline along the east side of the county road for the full length as well as power and telephone lines contributed to the problem of establishing an alignment consistent with minimum utility adjustments.

Plans are virtually complete, and it appears that the proposed project may be placed under contract this year, with work directed by Erle C. Mayo, Sr., Spvg. resident engineer.

Any interested citizen-groups or government agencies may request that a public hearing be held respecting the route and design of the highway facility, as well as the social, economic and environmental effects of the design, Mayo said.
