SPORTS AFIELD

Everyone talks about water pollution but not one person in ten knows what it is, where it comes from or exactly how it does the harm it does even though it is becoming increasingly apparent that unless we fight pollution, we will die in ever increasing numbers. Most politicians are presently using confused and punitive boat anti-pollution laws as smoke screens to hide behind while the real polluters go unchecked.

Plenty of places need boat antipollution legislation. Plus tax assistance to ensure compliance and enforcement to make it stick.

What lies ahead (if the nation's pollution control indeed supersedes the rate of demands upon it) is a flexible approach. Right now boat antipollution laws are products of panic at best and political footballs at worst. Flexible laws similar to game laws are needed.

On small waters where any B O D (Biochemical Oxygen Demand) or nutrient excess would be harmful, holding tanks should be required. Marina operators should be given tax incentives to install the necessary pump-out equipment.

On larger moving waters where BOD levels can be tolerated and nutrients might even be beneficial, machinator-chlorinators should be allowed.

On rivers, sounds and oceans which at present receive the raw or partially treated effluent of millions, and will continue to receive it for years to come (big-city clean-up time-tables are well into the 1970s), it is both punitive and useless to require elaborate treatment by boaters.

According to Zack Taylor, Boats Editor of Sports Afield Magazine, the flexible approach should extend to the boats themselves. On smaller boats below 22 feet, where a toilet is an emergency device, they should be tolerated since their effect will be insignificant.

In marinas, where large numbers of people live aboard their boats and clean shore facilities are offered, no discharge of any kind should be permitted.

On interstate waters through which cruising boats normally travel, out-of-state vessels should be exempted from restrictive laws requiring one

device or another, at least for short periods.

Finally, an enforcement arm should be funded to make sure sensible laws are obeyed. In most places at present, however, the money would be better spent upgrading local sewer systems.

For boaters, honestly attempting to make sense out of the situation, a number of sources offer information. Both the American Boat and Yacht Council, 420 Lexington Avenue, New York, New York 10017, and the National Sanitation Foundation of Ann Arbor, Michigan, have excellent study material. If you wish to know what other states are doing, the Boating Industry Association, 333 No. Michigan Avenue, Chicago, Illinois 60601 attempts to keep track.

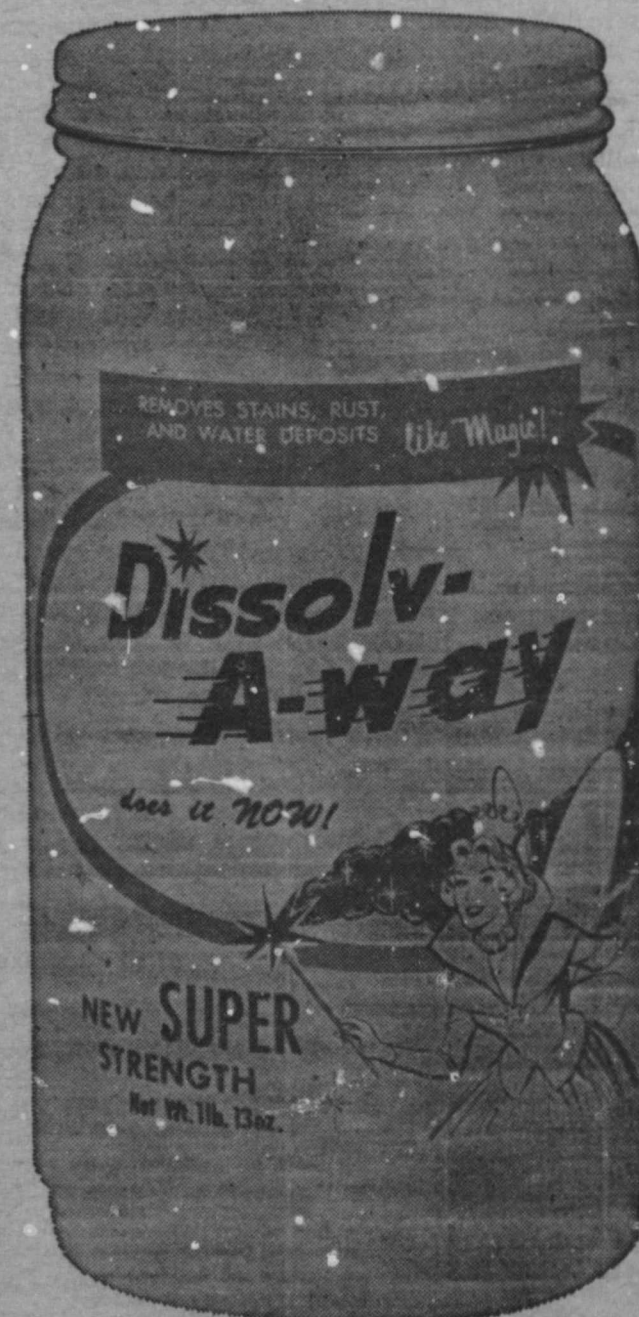

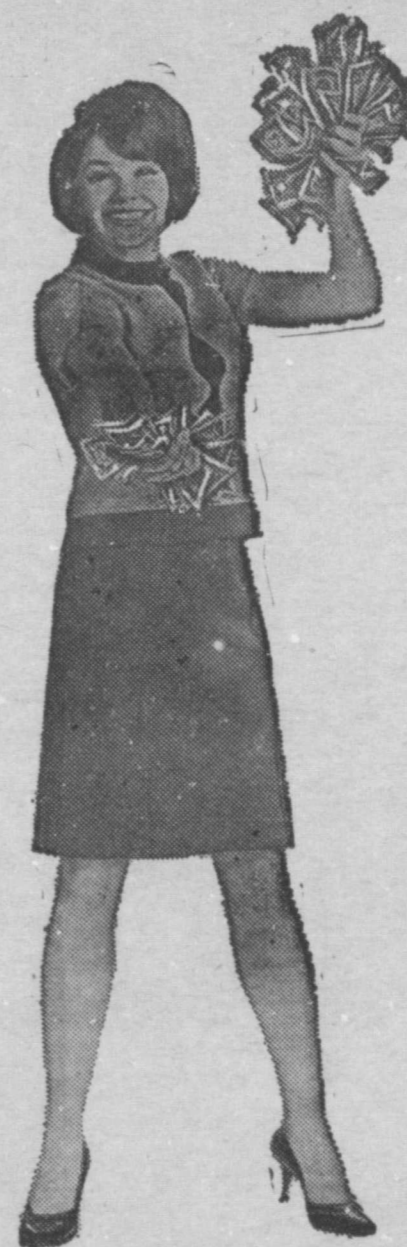
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ACCENT ON HEALTH

You may need medical advice about the food you eat, the exercise you should take, and other habits which can help or hinder you in your search for good health.

Even if you are already under treatment, perhaps it has been too long since your last visit to the doctor. Your condition may have changed for the better or worse.

Perhaps your regimen needs to be changed or your medicines - if you are taking any - need to be readjusted in dosage or kind. Not all medicines are to be taken indefinitely.

Also, new diagnostic aids and medicines are now available which the doctor may want to prescribe.

Perhaps you had an illness and overcame it. It is possible the condition could recur.

One big advantage of a complete physical examination at regular intervals is the knowledge that you are in fit physical shape. If you have an illness, it is consoling to know that everything possible is being done to keep it under control.

There is no set schedule of how often you should have a check-up, but it should be regular. Let your doctor set the schedule for you. At the end of the examination he can suggest the time for the next check-up.
