

With the simplest of instruments, beautiful forms, designs, and figures of animals and people can be carved out of soap. Soap is nexpensive; it has the translucent quality of alabaster; and its softness makes it responsive to the touch of a good blade. Soap sculpture is a hobby that is always fun.

The best soap to use has a fine, even texture that will allow you to carve the most delicate details. A white floating soap has the

important that you use a fresh cake of soap. An old cake may have a brittle surface, and one that has been used for washing is sure to warp later.

The first step is to smooth off the lettering and any other projections on the soap with a singleedge razor or a paring knife. The knife can be an ordinary kitchen knife with a 3-inch blade that comes to a point. A paper clip, with its rounded end, is a useful tool for scooping out small bits of soap.

Before you begin, make a sketch of the figure you want to carve. A simple subject is best at first. Trace the outline onto the soap with the knife-point. Make a deep outline, but if you try to cut through the whole cake at

If you have patience and work slowly, you won't have the discouraging experience of having your soap break. When you've finished carving, hold your sculpture under warm water briefly; then smooth it with your finger.




