Mrs. Monroe and Mrs. Francis went to Amarillo last week and spent several days with a daughter and sister, Mrs. Clay Hillin.

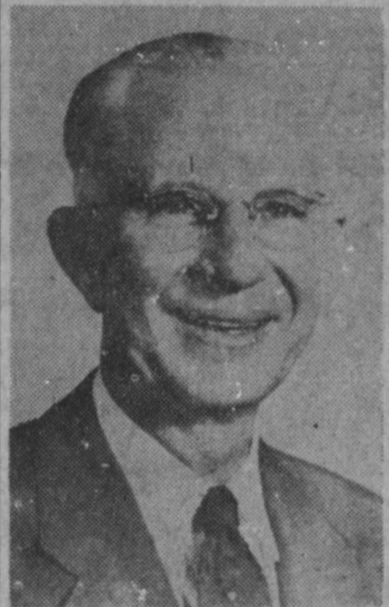
## Annual Meeting Set For SA Gin Members

Word was received here on Monday that Sue Kingsbery, a Santa Anna High School senior, has been named as a semi-finalist in the National Merit Scholarship testing program. Thousands of students take the NMS test during their junior year in high school and 16,000 high scoring students from throughout the United States are chosen as semi-finalists. Sue took the NMS test last January.

Upon completion of requirements and after taking a college entrance examination, semi-finalists are considered for college scholarships. Over 95 per cent of the semi-finalists acquire the finalist status.

## Dr. Ben H. Moore Honored Sept. 7

Members of the Santa Anna United Presbyterian Church joined with the Baird Presbyterian congregation for an anniversary observance September 7 celebrating the 50th year in the ministry of Dr. Ben H. Moore. Dr. Moore delivered the same sermon that he gave at the beginning of his career in 1919.

Currently serving as pastor supply of the Baird Church, Dr. Moore spent 22 years as pastor of the Santa Anna congregation.

The celebration at Baird included a fellowship dinner and presentation of a gift. Flowers for the sanctuary of the Baird church were given by the Santa Anna Presbyterians.

## Dr. Lightfoot Leaves Snyder For HPC Post

Dr. A. B. Lightfoot, a native of Santa Anna, has resigned as pastor of the Snyder First Baptist Church to accept a position as assistant to Dr. Guy D. Newman, Howard Payne College President.

In addition he will be director of the college's West Texas center.

A graduate of SAHS, Dr. Lightfoot attended Howard Payne, East Texas Baptist College, Hardin Simmons University, and Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary.

He served as pastor of churches in Colorado City, Fort Worth, Big Lake, and Odessa, and as superintendent of Missions for the Austin Baptist Association and the Permian Basin Association.

During his pastorate at Snyder, which began in 1963, the church has built five mission buildings and is assisting financially with three others.

Dr. Lightfoot is a trustee of Hardin-Simmons University and holds an honorary doctor of divinity degree from HPC.

Santa Anna High School Mountaineers took their first victory since 1967 when they defeated the Baird Bears on Friday night, 33-6. The season opener was played at Baird.

It was the Mounties game all the way, with first of six Baird fumbles recovered on the first play after the opening kickoff.

The first score of the game came in the second period when tailback Don Fitzpatrick went over the goal line from four yards out. The play was set up on a pass interception. Fullback Ronnie Pete Cooper kicked the extra point.

The next TD came in the same period and was made by quarterback Ricky Beal on an 8 yard carry. Santa Anna attempted a field goal from the 15-yard line in the second quarter.

In the second half Fitzpatrick made two touchdowns, one on a nine-yard carry and the other on a 35-yard run. Cooper booted an extra point on the first of the two. Beal also made a TD on a nine yard run and Cooper kicked the extra point.

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*In Our Opinion*

THE DEPARTMENT OF Health, Education and Welfare had its publicity people spend quite a bit of time explaining to those who howl about recent decisions which have taken some of the pressure off school boards who have been trying to satisfy them to no avail. They spend time and money trying to pacify a minority of people who don't think they are doing enough while they ignore a majority of the people who feel they have gone far beyond the letter and intent of the civil rights laws.

We don't know what it will take to convince those people that a majority of the people in the United States are pretty fed up with some of their antics.

When a Washington bureau can assume the authority that this one has, and cause as much confusion and disorganization as they have, then something is sadly wrong with our form of government. Where has the "government of the people, by the people, and for the people" gone?

I DON'T KNOW HOW MANY people watch TV, but they should listen to Paul Harvey on Channel 9 following the news each night.

He was particularly enlightening Monday night in a discussion of foreign aid. It seems that this country has been sending foreign aid to Thailand for many years, and it has amounted to several billion dollars. We have not expected any return from it, only that it would aid in the development of the country so that it could become self-supporting.

Well, what happens? The country builds up a surplus, and we get in a financial tight. So they loan us \$100 million on a short term basis at 6 per cent interest.

I wonder what would happen if we cut off a lot of the money we are sending abroad to "help" nations who claim they cannot help themselves.

It is about time we stopped being Santa Claus to every cry from every corner of the earth, and started thinking about ourselves for a change. We have cut our domestic spending, but we haven't cut foreign aid, and it is doubtful if a single nation would return the favor, when we need help.

In fact, if our creditors demanded full payment of what we owe, we couldn't pay it—we would be bankrupt.

THE LEGISLATURE did in six days what they couldn't do in a regular session and a 30-day special session.

Could this be a good example of what happens when the folks back home let them know what they want?

A LETTER to the editor of the Amarillo Daily News is so good we have to pass it on to you. It was written by J. L. Harris of Bartlesville, Okla.

"Do you remember when . . .

"Attending college was a privilege rather than a right?

"The personal income tax was a nuisance rather than a burden?

"The Supreme Court protected society rather than the criminals?

"We entered a war to win it?

"Our flag was respected at home and abroad?

"A father went on welfare only out of desperation and got off it as soon as possible?

"Charity was a virtue rather than a big business?

"We could laugh at jokes about the Irish, Negroes, Jews or Swedes without being considered bigots?

"U. S. Grant was the name of a president rather than a federal handout?

"The doctor's first question was 'Where do you hurt?' rather than 'do you have insurance?'

"Giving aid to the enemy was treason. Now it is federal aid."

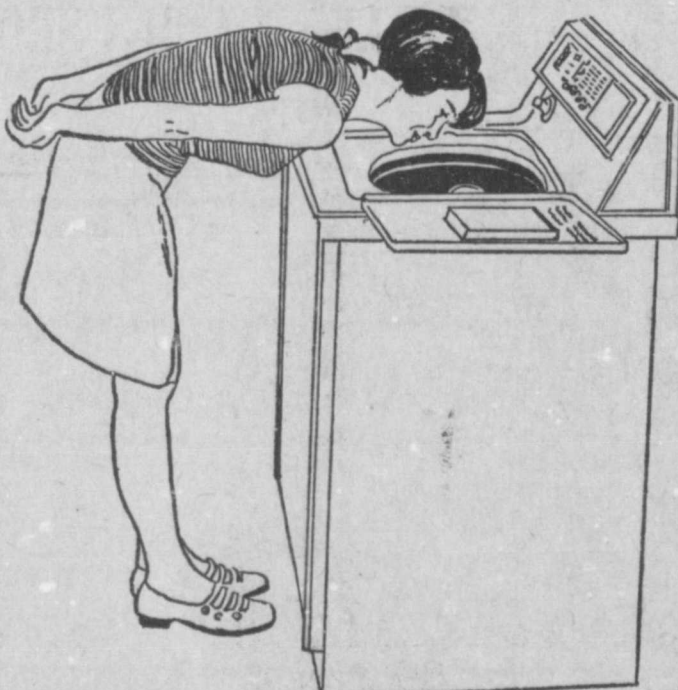

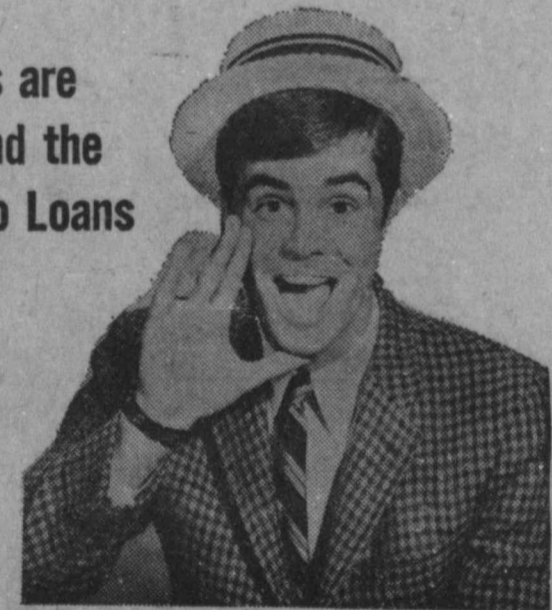

**A BRIEF HISTORY OF MY MINISTERIAL CAREER**

(By Ben H. Moore)

I attended Daniel Baker College from 1910 to 1914, graduating with a Bachelor of Arts degree as valedictorian of my class.

I went through college with the ambition to study medicine and become a medical missionary in some Spanish-American field. To this end, I took all the science courses offered, studied Spanish and Bible, as well as other required courses.

Realizing I would have to work my way through medical school as I had through college, I took educational courses as electives to acquire a teacher's certificate in order to teach a while to earn money to clear up a loan obtained from the Presbyterian Board of Christian Education.

After graduation I obtained a position teaching science and Spanish in Wesley College, a Methodist Junior College in Greenville, Texas. I taught for two years then became head of the Spanish department at Cleburne High School. I found teaching such an interesting vocation that I decided to give up the idea of becoming a medical missionary and become an educational missionary.

With this in view I applied to the Presbyterian Board of Foreign Missions for an appointment to some Spanish speaking mission field. I received an appointment to Coyo Achan Boy's School in Mexico City.

In the meantime, I had married and had two small children, a boy and a girl. The Mission Board advised me in the spring of 1918 to postpone my going to the mission field for a few years until my baby son was older. Accordingly, I accepted a position as superintendent of a school in a small town in North Texas.

I was spending the summer of 1919 working with a threshing crew near this town. One hot summer day I suffered a sun stroke and had to be carried home. I lay in bed for three days, and all I could think about was the fact that I was trying to find a substitute for my real life's work—the gospel ministry. I fought the battle out and surrendered to the Lord's will and made up my mind to enter the ministry and attend a theological seminary for the required three year course.

At that time I was a member of the Anglin Street Presbyterian Church at Cleburne, and had been ordained as an elder in that church. I returned to Cleburne, had a conference with my pastor,

the Rev. George N. Thomas, who told me he had felt for sometime that I was dodging my real life's work. He invited me to preach my first sermon from his pulpit the following Sunday, which was September 7, 1919. I accepted his invitation, preached the sermon, met with the Session following the service, was received under the care of the Session as a candidate for the ministry and recommended to the Presbytery of Fort Worth.

During the following week I went with my pastor to the Presbytery meeting at Flower Mound Presbyterian Church where I was to my consternation elected as moderator of the three-day meeting. During the meeting I was received under the care of the Presbytery as a candidate for the ministry in the Presbyterian Church, USA.

After the meeting adjourned I left my family with my wife's mother and father and went to Cincinnati, Ohio, to enter Lane Theological Seminary. During my first year in the seminary I taught two Spanish classes in the night session of Hughes High School and supplied the pulpits of two United Brethren Churches, 15 and 20 miles out of Cincinnati on an Interurban line.

During my second and third years in the seminary I served as pastor of the Masco, Ohio, Presbyterian Church, 20 miles north of Cincinnati.

After graduation I accepted a call to Bethany Presbyterian Church in Muskogee, Okla., where I was ordained in June 1922. I served this church for two years and then accepted a call to be student pastor of the New Mexico A & M College at Mesilla Park, near Las Cruces, N. M. This period of service was followed by a pastorate at Rogers, Ark. Then one at Little Rock, Ark. From Little Rock I returned to Texas where I served for three years at Brady, then four years at Smithville, Texas. From Smithville I went to the Austin Avenue Presbyterian Church, Brownwood, in 1935. There I served as pastor of the church and taught in Daniel Baker College to pay the expenses of my oldest son and daughter who were in Daniel Baker.

In 1939 I went with Daniel Baker full time as vice president. During this time I traveled for the college, raising money and soliciting students. In this capacity I preached in Presbyterian Churches all over Texas.

By 1943 it became impossible to travel for the college be-

cause of gasoline and tire rationing due to the Second World War. Dr. S. E. Chandler retired as Bible teacher that year and I succeeded him in that capacity.

In the meantime I had reorganized the Presbyterian Church as Mason, Texas, in 1941 and was supplying that pulpit two Sundays each month.

On Sunday, October 31, 1943 I began serving the Santa Anna Presbyterian Church the other two Sundays each month. This program I continued until May 1951 at which time I left the Mason Church after 10½ years so they could have a fulltime ministry and began to give Santa Anna my full time.

During the summer of 1941 I had taken a temporary leave of absence from Daniel Baker College and served as interim pastor for the First Presbyterian Church of Midland, Texas. The pastor they had called was installed in October 1941 and during the years of 1942-46 I took my vacation in August of each year and supplied the Midland Church during that month while their regular pastor was on his vacation.

When I resigned from Daniel Baker College at the close of school in June 1945 I moved out to my ranch near May and continued to serve Masco and Santa Anna churches, driving my car 100 miles two Sundays a month and 45 miles on two Sundays.

I resigned the pastorate of the Santa Anna Presbyterian Church July 31, 1966 after having completed and dedicated a new church building. I had served that church for 22 years, 9 months. I had reached the age of 73 years and felt that I needed to rest and they needed a full time resident pastor, so I stepped out and they called Richard Wood.

My retirement has been a huge joke. I have been constantly called upon to supply vacant pulpits all over this part of Texas. I finally decided it would be no harder to settle down to a regular Sunday appointment than to be driving here and there from Sunday to Sunday so I agreed to serve the Baird Church as supply pastor, on a temporary basis, in August 1967.

In the meantime I have been preaching one Sunday night each month for the Waldrip Presbyterian Church for the past 22 years.

To sum it all up I have served as pastor or supply pastor or temporary supply

pastor in 14 different churches during my 50 years in the Presbyterian ministry, September 7, 1919 to September 7, 1969.

Another item that might be of interest is that fact that while I was a Brady I was invited to deliver the com-

mencement address to the 1930 graduating class of Daniel Baker College. At that exercise I had the honor of receiving the Doctor of Divinity degree from Daniel Baker as the first graduate of the school to receive this honorary degree.

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
