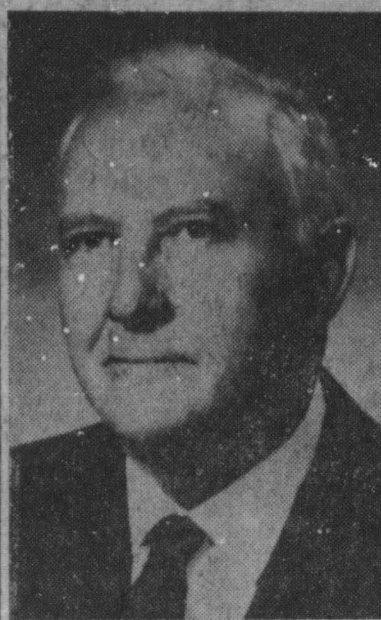

Dr. Woodward To Be Honored At Homecoming

Dr. Max R. Woodward of Sherman, a graduate of the class of 1919, will be honored Saturday as Santa Anna Ex-Student of the Year. He will be presented at the program at 4:00 p. m.

Dr. Woodward, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Woodward of Santa Anna, was born in Gatesville. He came to Santa Anna as a small child and attended school here through high school. He is a graduate of the University of Texas with a B. S. degree and received his M. D. from the University of Texas Medical School in 1925. His post-graduate education has been at Sherman Hospital, Sherman, Texas, Harvard Postgraduate School, Babies and Children's Hospital at Boston, Mass., and at the University of Vienna, in Vienna, Austria.

In 1932 Dr. Woodward founded the Woodward Clinic for Children at Sherman where he continued to practice since that time.

Among his professional memberships, Dr. Woodward has served as Chairman of the Section on Pediatrics of the American Medical Association, a past president of the Grayson County Medical Association, a past president and board member of the Texas Pediatric Society, and a recipient of the TPS Award of Merit for Distinguished Service in 1964.

He is a member of the Texas Medical Association and the American Medical Association of Vienna.

In 1954 Dr. Woodward was named a life member of the American Academy of Pediatrics, where he had served as State Chairman of the Texas Chapter, a District Chairman, and on the Executive Board for eight years.

Community and civic activities for Dr. Woodward include March of Dimes chairman, Chairman of Selective and Procurement Military Service, a Member of Crippled Children's Society, a Board Member of Child Guidance Clinic, and founder of the Sherman Well Baby Clinic.

Dr. Woodward is a member of the First Presbyterian Church of Sherman where he has served as deacon. He is a member of the University of Texas Alumni Association, Rotary Club, and the Phi Chi Medical Fraternity.

Dr. Woodward and his wife, the former Frances Drane, are the parents of two children, Mrs. Ray (Betsy) Johnson of Littleton, Colo., and Dr. John Woodward of Dallas.

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In Our Opinion

ONE OF THESE DAYS, it is going to dawn on our people that it pays to trade with our home-town merchants.

Granted, some things are not available locally, and we have to go elsewhere to buy them, but many like to go to some nearby place to buy things that are available locally, and taken item by item, they will not save any money.

Besides, believe it or not, it costs money to drive a car, and it is far more than the gasoline it burns.

Even if one could save a few cents, let's look at it this way. When someone in this community needs help, who kicks in to help them—local merchants, that's who. Then who supports our schools, our civic projects, and anything else that is in the interest of our town? Local merchants do.

Let's remember that the next time we decide to go elsewhere for merchandise we can buy at home.

IT IS HARD to knock one's own profession, but newsmen this day and time have some knocks coming.

Many times, in an apparent effort to beat other news media to a story, they are actually guilty of aiding and abetting a crime.

Recently a national news service sent out on their wires a story telling of coming demonstrations in Chicago and many other citizens of the nation—an open invitation for radical elements to join in and make the demonstration bigger.

And not only this, but publicity given to sit-ins, demonstrations, and riots actually gives the perpetrators an incentive to more activism.

Too many times, I fear, the publicity received by rioters and demonstrators encourage them to participate in more. This is probably especially so among younger groups. In our own generation, like every one since the beginning of time, the younger ones got into trouble every once in a while, but we couldn't take part in a demonstration at noon, then watch ourselves on the six o'clock news—because we didn't have television.

In the quest for publicity, it is conceivable that many take part in such things for just that purpose. It is highly possible that if such activities were ignored by the press, there would be far fewer participants.

IN RURAL AREAS, it seems to us, the youngsters are just better behaved in every respect. By rural areas we mean small towns of 5,000 population or less.

Who gets the credit for it we don't know, but the fact that in areas that small, most people know everyone else must have something to do with it. It is surprising how much influence is exerted when people who know you are watching. Most of us watch our behavior much more under these circumstances, and that includes oldsters as well as the young.

It is a common saying in a small town—don't do something you shouldn't if you don't want the whole town to know about it.



AUSTIN — Will legislative redistricting force another special session of the legislature this year?

Nobody knows for sure, although rumors have been hot on the subject. Observers, including Gov. Preston Smith, have indicated they doubt re-apportionment will demand emergency attention of the lawmakers.

Issue is before a three-judge federal court in Houston. Plaintiffs claim that population variance of 24.2 per cent between smallest and largest Texas legislative individual districts, not county-wide.

Court, in spite of some reports to the contrary, has not scheduled the case for hearing.

An Indiana case involving the validity of multi-member legislative districts is on appeal to the U. S. Supreme Court.

Governor Smith recently noted that 1970 census figures will be available in less than a year and that the new head count will provide a more reasonable basis for re-apportionment than the 10-year-old census.

Filing deadline for legislative candidates is next February. So if the court is going to order immediate redistricting to affect 1970 elections, it is presumed that the decision would be handed down well before the end of this year.

Naturally the longer the court delays its decision, the closer looms the new census tabulation.

INSURANCE RAISE LIKELY
 A quick decision of the State Insurance Board is expected to jack up auto insurance premiums at least 9.9 per cent.

That, in effect, was the recommendation of the governor's study committee on rates. Board originally proposed an 11.4 per cent boost. Industry wanted 5.6 per cent more than that.

A last-minute flurry of controversy raised the question as to whether the committee had been misled by exaggerated statistics on auto accidents.

Also in controversy was in-

urance agents' commissions. Committee recommended 18 per cent, which Chairman Price Daniel specified as "average."

F. Darby Hammond, executive director of Southwestern Insurance Information Service, released a blistering attack on the committee's report. He called it not only an insult to auto insurance companies but a disservice to the insurance buying public. "There is no way," said Hammond, "that forcing companies to continue operations in the red will not eventually harm the public."

As to statistics, Hammond says that the Insurance Board does not use Department of Public Safety figures as the basis for determining costs. It uses claims paid. DPS doesn't get reports on all accidents.

Committee has no control over what the agents receive as their commission, Hammond pointed out.

SCHOOL MONEY — Texas school board members have been hit hard in making budgets this fall, when the major part of the teacher pay raise package takes effect.

Local share of the teacher pay raises — 20 per cent — must come out of local tax revenues on property, the only source of local school funds. Texas Association of School Boards, meeting in Austin, has asked for help.

A resolution adopted at the meeting requested the Texas Education Agency to make a study as to other ways in which school districts might raise money for the local share of school operations.

SAFE DRIVING — Governor Smith says the Federal government has given the state \$1 million to help finance the State-wide Driver Education Project. Governor's Traffic Safety Fund is providing \$1.8 million for support of the program and the school districts are contributing \$4.5 million toward the remaining costs.

Smith said "last year, we reached only 36 per cent of the eligible students, but I hope that with the acceleration of the program this percentage will increase until all eligible

students receive this training."

CITY SALES TAX — City sales tax allocations, made by State Controller Robert S. Calvert, show substantial gains over the same quarter of a year ago. Cities with the tax, including 185 new ones from a year ago, received \$27.9 million compared to the \$20.8 million for the period ending June 30, 1968.

Biggest receipts were by Houston (\$6.2 million), Dallas (\$5 million), San Antonio (\$2.1 million) and Fort Worth (\$1.8 million). Income to these four cities represents well over half the state's total.

Adult Education Classes Offered In Coleman Co.

Evening classes in Adult Basic Education will begin Thursday night, October 2, 1969. The classes are mainly for people with less than high school education, and are for all residents of Coleman County.

Level One is the beginning class for people who need to learn the basic subjects such as reading, writing, English, and arithmetic. This class will start at a very low level and increase in difficulty with the progress of the students.

Level Two, the intermediate level, will study reading, history, arithmetic, English, spelling and building on all basic skills.

Level Three is primarily for persons with as much as a ninth grade education. This level will prepare students to take the G. E. D. test in order to receive a high school equivalency diploma issued by the Texas Education Agency.

Adult Education Classes are being offered this year to anyone interested in learning or reviewing in each particular area. Classes scheduled are in bookkeeping, clerical office practices, and two classes of typing. There will also be a high school review of mathematics and a review of English and social studies.

Personnel this year include: Mrs. Charlotte Strawn—Level One; B. J. Willis—Level Two; Glynn Mitchell—Level Three, mathematics, English, and social studies; Mrs. James Russell—typing and bookkeeping; and Mrs. Don Starnes—typing and clerical office practices.

Classes will meet each Tuesday and Thursday evening from 7:30 to 9:30 at the Coleman Multi-Purpose Center, formerly Humphrey High School building.

All classes above Level Two will be one hour classes, and each individual can choose any two classes being offered. It is stressed again that the classes are for any person desiring to gain more
