## Postmaster Gregg Urges Early Holiday Mailing

"Don't take a chance on disappointing someone you love—send your gift parcels and cards early enough to insure their delivery before Christmas—not after," Postmaster John C. Gregg advised this week.

"On the day after Christmas a post office building can be the most depressing place in the world," the Postmaster added, "if it still contains a mountain of messages of love and cheer that didn't make it because they were mailed too late."

Such disappointments can be avoided if Christmas mailers will observe the following mailing schedule:

To foreign countries, including South and Central America, Africa, the Far East, all gift parcels should be mailed as soon as possible and it would be wise to consider air mail for these parcels. Mail to Canada and Mexico should be mailed by regular mail no later than December 5 or by air mail no later than Dec. 10.

Gift parcels going to distant states should be mailed by December 5. Parcels going to local and nearby areas should be mailed not later than December 13.

The name and address of both the sender and addressee should be enclosed in each gift parcel to permit identity in case of damage or loss of the outside address label. The outside label should be placed on only one side of each parcel.

Greeting cards going to distant states should be mailed not later than Dec. 10. Cards going to local and nearby areas should be mailed by December 15.

Gregg also emphasized the importance of using ZIP codes and adding a return address to all Christmas mail. It takes only a couple of extra seconds, but pays big dividends. ZIP codes enable postal employees to sort and handle the mail faster. A return address insures that mail that can't be delivered because of an illegible or incomplete address will be returned to the sender.

"A return address might not seem important," Mr. Gregg noted, "but last year over 32 billion pieces of mail went to postal dead letter branches because the mailing address couldn't be read and there was no return address on the envelope. If you estimate the worth of each of these pieces at 25c, including postage, postal customers lost over \$7.5 million last year to dead letter offices. And none of this would have happened if the envelope had contained a return address."

The Santa Anna City Council met for the regular monthly session at the city hall on Thursday, Nov. 6. Mayor Thomas Wristen presided at the meeting which was attended by all councilmen except Jack Allen.

Minutes of the October meeting were read and approved.

The request for a rate increase by the Lone Star Gas Co. was read and approved on the first reading. The request will be acted upon within 60 days, which will delay the increase in Santa Anna until about January 1.

The Council voted to rent office space in the city warehouse to George Epperson, a Coleman barber. The new business will be in the office west of the one formerly occupied by Ford Barnes.

The parking lot at the former location of Carl Autrey's used car lot will be extended and space rented to residents of the downtown apartment building.

The next meeting of the City Council will be held on Thursday, Dec. 4.

## Local Man Has V'Nam Injuries

Capt. Sherman Stearns, the son of Mr. and Mrs. G. K. Stearns of the Trickham community, was injured in Viet Nam last Thursday and is being sent back to the states this week.

According to a report from Mrs. Sherman Stearns, Capt. Stearns was hit by shrapnel from an exploding hand grenade that was thrown where he and three other soldiers were entrenched. All four of the men were injured in the explosion, with Capt. Stearns receiving shrapnel wounds in his legs. The shrapnel has been removed and there is apparently no bone damage, according to the report.

Capt. Stearns is to arrive in the states today (Thursday) and will be treated in the Ft. Hood hospital.

Capt. Stearns has been in Viet Nam since December of last year serving as a senior military advisor in the Bien Xinh province.

*In Our Opinion*

TO MOST OF WE COUNTRY PEOPLE the Cosa Nostra means very little. We have heard the word, but few of us really know the extent of its operations.

But to many people in America's largest cities, it is much too real.

What it really is would appall most of us. It is a national syndicate of crime, delving into every racket that is known to the criminal, ranging from protection rackets to prostitution, infiltrating everything from union labor to legitimate business.

Many times people who pose as "pillars of society" are actually brutal, ruthless killers, possessing little human compassion and no social conscience.

La Cosa Nostra means, literally, "our thing" or "our business," and the mob's business is violence. Violence is used in subduing rebellious union members, fighting competition in legitimate industry, eliminating witnesses and informants, collecting on gambling and loan-sharking debts, seizing control of certain forms of business, removing rival mobsters, and enforcing discipline within its own ranks.

Many of us think of gamblers and racketeers in the Hollywood fashion of gruff but warmhearted bumbler who wear loud ties and possess funny nicknames, but you may dismiss that idea right now.

What is warmhearted about a loan-shark victim handcuffed to a basement pipe and beaten savagely because of a delinquent debt; or a suspected informant impaled on a meathook and tortured to death; or two rival mobsters chopped to death with a hatchet and a third thrown alive into a flaming furnace; or a young husband strangled and mutilated because he would not surrender his wife to a racket boss smitten with her?

And we could go on and on with shocking acts of brutality that is common among the hoodlum crowd in the bigger cities.

Fortunately, organized crime is receiving more and more exposure. This is good, for it helps to dispel some of the myth that has grown up about mob life in the past. But we still have a long way to go.

Although federal, state and local law enforcement agencies throughout the nation are engaged in a constant struggle against the underworld, little headway will be made without the full cooperation of an alert and dedicated people, and that people will never be dedicated as long as they think of organized crime as a "harmless, streetcorner bookmaker" and the 25-cent numbers bet.

Only when we view organized crime in its proper perspective will the campaign against it proceed, with everyone united in a determination to clean up this evil as rapidly and effectively as possible.

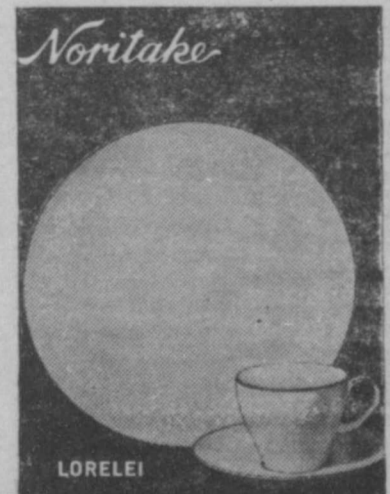

### NOTICE AFFORDING OPPORTUNITY FOR PUBLIC HEARING CORRIDOR AND DESIGN

The Texas Highway Department is planning the improvement of U. S. Highway 67 from the Runnels County Line, East to 0.6 miles East of Valera. The proposed highway project will pass through the towns of Talpa and Valera.

The recommended route is along the existing route of U. S. 67. A minimum of 120 feet of right-of-way will be required throughout the rural sections. A minimum of 100 feet of right-of-way will be required in the town of Talpa, and a minimum of 80 feet in the town of Valera.

There will be additional right-of-way required in Talpa or Valera. The rural section will require that approximately five and one half acres additional right-of-way be acquired on the north side of the present right-of-way.

There will be no displacement of families or businesses.

Plans provide for rebuilding the existing highway to modern design requirements with two 13 foot lanes and two nine foot paved shoulders. Work is to be scheduled such that traffic will be carried on a portion of the present pavement or paved detours throughout construction.

Maps and other drawings showing the proposed location and geometric design and any other information about the proposed project are on file and available for inspection and copying at the Resident Engineer's Office at Coleman, Texas.

Information about the tentative schedules for acquisition of right of way and construction can be obtained at the Resident Engineer's Office on or before 27 November 1969.

Any interested citizen may request that a public hearing be held covering the social, economic and environmental effects of the proposed design or corridor route for this highway project by delivering a written request to the Resident Engineer, Texas Highway Department, P. O. Box 382, Coleman, Texas 76834 on or before 27 November 1969.

In the event such a request is received, a public hearing will be scheduled and adequate notice will be publicized about the date and location of the hearing. 45-2t

# STATE Capital NEWS

By VERN SANFORD

**AUSTIN** — Prospects of whopping new tax bills may face Texans in 1971, 1973 and 1975 and a critical housing shortage within the next decade is likely.

Texas Research League heard the bad news at its 17th annual meeting here.

James W. McGrew, new Executive Director of the League and one of the state's top fiscal authorities, warned of the coming "decade of tax crises" like that of 1950's.

McGrew sized up the 1971 tax bill as at least \$270 million and maybe as much as \$400 million. Furthermore, he predicted, a bigger one will be in store two years later and one not quite so big in 1975.

Standby sales tax (now at four and a quarter per cent in many areas) may be near its "political limitation". Implication was clear that new trails will have to be blazed.

Gov. Preston Smith said half the state's 2,803,000 housing units are "inadequate or substandard." He requested the League to study the problem and come up with recommendations as to the state's role in the housing field.

Housing shortage may reach "crisis proportions" in two years, Smith told League members. Needs over the next decade, he forecast, will demand \$1.5 billion worth of construction a year in Texas. Within the same period, he said, housing will have to be found for 875,000 new Texas families, and slums and overcrowding must be eliminated.

Greatset prospect for solving problems of slums, contended the governor, lies in "effective programs of governments to assist slum residents in becoming home owners." Public housing and rent supplements, he maintained, "tend to isolate, segregate and spotlight the poor, while providing no long-range changes in their situations."

Smith suggested a statewide building code may be needed and State Housing Authority may be helpful to coordinate efforts of the U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development with local governmental units.

**BALLOT SPOTS PICKED** — Proposed constitutional amendment to legalize the sale of liquor by the drink will be in the second spot on the Nov. 3, 1970, general election ballot.

Here's how drawings for other ballot places by Secretary of State Martin Dies Jr. came out last week:

No. 1 — Provision for removal, censure or retirement of appellate court judges and justices of the peace by a new Judicial Qualifications Commission.

No. 3 — Uniform method for assessing farm, ranch and forest lands on a capability to produce basis.

No. 4 — Making the State Building Commission a three-member appointive agency.

No. 5 — Authorizing counties to issue road bonds up to a fourth of assessed valuation on vote of taxpayers.

No. 6 — Increasing value of homesteads exempt from forced sale.

No. 7 — Providing for consolidation of local government functions and interagency contracts for performance of governmental services.

**DISAPPOINTING LEASE SALE** — School Land Board got disappointing results from its sealed bid oil and gas lease sale on public school lands.

High bids averaged only \$36 an acre, lowered by the \$15.52 per acre average of over 16 thousand acres leased in El Paso County where there is no oil or gas production.

Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler said the indications from Congress that the 27.5 per cent depletion allowance will be cut undoubtedly hampered bidding. Also, sales scheduled for Louisiana and heavy spending on Alaskan leases cut the bids.

Of 770 tracts offered, only 184 drew bids. Total high bids were \$4,113,468.6.

**COURTS SPEAK** — Supreme Court split six to three in upholding the constitutionality of the controversial Saturday-Sunday closing laws. Chief Justice Robert W. Calvert wrote the dissenting opinion, contending that the statute prohibiting the sale of 46 items on consecutive days of weekends should be knocked out.

High Court granted a writ of error and agreed to hear oral arguments on December 10 on Houston landowners' complaints that the YMCA should not be allowed to erect a building in Houston Post Oak Estates subdivision where lots are a minimum of three acres in size.

Supreme Court rejected the appeal of a Dallas man who claimed part interest in vast holdings of oil-businessman J. D. Wrather Jr.

Reversing an intermediate court and affirming a trial court, the state's top civil court held that neither party in a Gregg County auto accident case was entitled to damages.

Court of Criminal Appeals affirmed a 30-year sentence of black militant Lee Otis Johnson of Houston, convicted of possession of marijuana after he gave a "cigarette" to an undercover police agent.

U. S. District Court in Tyler ruled that a teacher cannot be dismissed from a job because of political activity.

### SHORT SNORTS

Governor Smith received a \$500,000 check representing the federal government's share of the purchase of a 1,950-acre Galveston State Park (formerly the Maco Stewart Ranch) with matching funds to come out of the \$75 million state park bond issue.

Dr. B. B. Vail Jr., veterinarian in charge of screwworm eradication program in Texas told the Animal Health Commission that this year may set a record low in screwworm cases — 159 reported this year, against 9,268 reported last year.

Mrs. Lyndon Johnson has established a cash award of \$1,500 to go to the Texas Highway Department foreman who has contributed most to the aesthetic pleasure and recreational opportunities for the motoring public; award will be made in September, 1970, at the Lydon B. Johnson State Park.

## ASC NEWS...

The U. S. Department of Agriculture, on October 31, 1969, announced 1970-crop upland cotton price-support loan and payment rates.

The national average price-support loan rate for middling one inch cotton at average location has been set at 20.25 cents per pound for the 1970 crop. Price support loans available to program cooperators for different individual qualities will be based on the middling one inch rate. This is the same rate as that applicable to the 1969 crop.

The price support payment rate to program cooperators has been established at 16.80 cents per pound. This payment is in addition to the loan to provide producers at least 65 per cent of parity on cotton produced within the acreage permitted under the program. The payment is made to cooperators on acreage planted within the domestic allotment which is 65 per cent of the total farm allotment. The 1970 rate compares to a 1969 program price-support rate of 14.73 cents per pound.

This announcement, along with previous determinations, gives cotton producers basic information on next year's program prior to a mail referendum, December 1-5, on 1970-crop cotton marketing quotas. In the referendum, at least two-thirds of the upland cotton growers voting must approve marketing quotas before the essential features of the program can go into effect. If more than one-third of the growers vote "no," the only cotton program will be price support at 50 per cent of parity for growers who do not exceed their acreage allotment.

The carryover of upland cotton as of August 1, 1970, is expected to fall to the low-

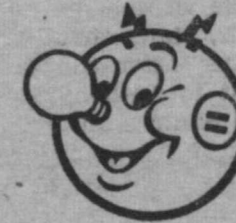
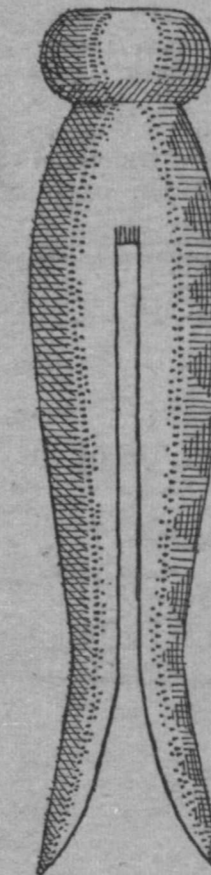

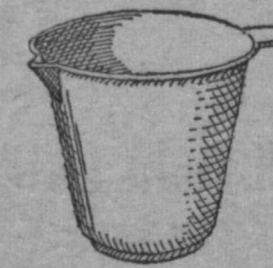

## LEADAY NAMED FOR PROMINENT COLEMAN COUNTY PIONEERS

William H. Day was a young man when he enlisted in Capt. Wm. A. Pitts' Co., 1st Regiment Texas Mounted Riflemen, at Camp Colorado on July 1, 1861, which was the start of the Civil War; this was changed to 1st Texas Cavalry, C. S. A. By October, he was on detached service at Mason as a teamster, and when the one year enlistment was up he began gathering cattle for the Confederate government, delivering the herds at Alexandria, La. When the Confederacy collapsed at the close of the war, in 1865, he was Mason with a large sum of Confederate money, now worthless. He had graduated at Cumberland University, Va., with a degree in engineering, but he saw the great future in cattle and Texas land. He worked with a commission firm in New Orleans, and with his sister's husband, J. M. Driskill, of Austin, he bought great herds and trailed them to Kansas in 1869 and 1870. A temporary slump in cattle prices led him to butcher a herd at Denison and ship the meat to the north in refrigerated cars.

He remembered the fine lands in Coleman County, and when Fort Bend and Brazoria Counties put their Coleman County school lands up for sale, he bought every acre for which he could get financing; his headquarters was on the Colorado, near the mouth of the Concho, and Rich Coffey ranched not many miles to the west. A pioneer in wire fencing, his first venture was fencing a pasture of some 7500 acres, called the Redwire pasture to this day because of the color of the wire.

As adjoining lands became available, he bought them; the price was usually \$1 per acre, and through the real-estate partnership of McCord and Lindsey he bought 2000

acres, making his Coleman County holdings 47,000 acres. To obtain ready money to pay for his land, he trailed most of the cattle he bought to Kansas; assembling the great herds at his ranch, he separated them into trail herds of about 2500 head each and drove them northward. He averaged two herds per year for five years.

In 1879 he married a cultured young lady who lived in Denison and was a teacher of music there. He was extremely well-off by this time, and was able to provide her with fine carriage and horses, beautiful clothes and luxuries almost unknown on the frontier. A daughter was born to them a year later, and his wife was becoming devoted to his land its opportunities, their future seemed very bright.

But in April of 1881, Day was gathering a large herd of cattle for the trail, holding them in a pasture near the ranch-house. A stampede occurred and he mounted his horse and rode hastily to stop them before they became entangled in the fences or ran for miles. The horse stepped into a prairie dog hole and fell, the saddle-horn striking him in the abdomen. This was on April 1, and he died of the injury on June 14 and was buried in the Coleman cemetery.

His young widow held on to her land tenaciously, displaying a judgment and business acumen that were remarkable in that day, when women were thought to be incapable of managing property. Her records and correspondence are marvels of detail and accuracy, and she took every opportunity of buying and selling, of rising or falling prices, of trailing cattle and of improving her holdings. In later years she was married to a man of integrity and fine character, Capt. J. C. Lea, and the headquarters place became a small town named Leaday. The daughter grew up and was married to Tom Padgett, of a prominent Waco family, and their only child, James, still owns a large part of the ranch.

### Livestock Survey To Be Conducted

Foy I. Brown, chairman of the local Technical Action panel, states that during the last half of November (some 40,000 Texas ranchers and farmers will receive a livestock survey questionnaire from Cary Palmer, State Statistician for the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. This is a joint endeavor of the Texas Department of Agriculture and the Statistical Reporting Service, US DA, to provide a program of county estimates for Texas.

In Texas there are 254 counties, and each farmer and rancher in each county is an important part of the state's agriculture. Their reports are needed to provide accurate estimates for Texas cattle, hogs and chickens. Another survey on sheep and goats will be made in late December.

Mr. Brown urges each farmer and rancher to fill out his questionnaire carefully and return it promptly in the self addressed envelope to the Agricultural Statistician. This will do much to provide the accurate data needed for the state.

County data bulletins for 1968 are now available by writing the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, Box 70, Austin, Texas.
