

COWBOYS BEAT CROSBYTON AT HOMECOMING

A packed crowd of hopeful Exes and expectant fans were caught up in the action Friday night, as the High-Riding Cowboys displayed a brilliantly executed offense and a defense that once again spelled the difference. Crosbyton brought a band of Chief to Cowboy stadium large enough to rattle the rock of Gibraltar, but the Cowboys never wavered in their quest for Victory number 3.

Super-knat Winn started the action by making the tackle on his own kick-off. He scattered feathers on the Chiefs 26 yard line. Three plays later the Cowboys started to work from the Chiefs 45 yard line. Tony Chandler crushed his way for a first down, then took a fake as Gary Livesay scampered 18 yards to the Chiefs 12. Three plays later

Livesay carried another 9 yards, good for 6 points with only 3:50 gone in the first quarter. Everyone thought the extra point attempt was good, but the officials ruled it off to the right. A stunned team lined up for a kick-off but apparently wasn't ready. An 86 yard run back tied the score 6 all. Crosbyton failed on their extra point. The Cowboys took control again by marching up the field. The Chiefs finally held and took possession. A key tackle by Guerry Randall set the Chiefs for a loss of 11 yards. A tough Cowboy defense allowed their only 5 plays on this series. A fine punt left Plains on their own 17 yard line. The offense couldn't put the puzzle together this time, and a short punt plus a 15 yard penalty carried the ball down to

the Cowboy 31. Crosbyton picked up a quick first down before the Cowboy defense decided to cut their braids. Sparked by a spine-tingling tackle by line-backer Shelly Simpson, the slaughter squad proceeded to make shambles of any immediate progress of the Chiefs. The ball changed hands one series with Plains holding Crosbyton to six tries. The Cowboys made one last drive before half time. Starting at their own 13 yard line, Plains paced off 8 yards in 13 plays, only to fumble on the 6 yard line with 15 seconds left. This drive saw some great moves by the backfield and exceptionally good blocking by an aggressive line, that was outweighed considerably. They formed a tight pocket that enabled sure-hand Lowe to connect

for gains of 17 and 18 yards. One of these passes was to tight end, Jerry Parrish. Parrish had to reach for the aerial, which enabled him to avoid immediate contact and picked up a needed first down. Crosbyton kicked to Plains to start the second half.

The Cowboys fumbled the ball on the second play from scrimmage at their own 27. The slaughter squad refused to let the Chiefs even dream of scoring as they pushed them steadily back. On the third play, Mighty Moore plundered the right side of the line and plastered a Chief. A fumble attack by the defense spurred the offense, as they initiated a drive that ended in the Crosbyton end zone. This drive was for 70 yards in 12 plays.

The extra point attempt failed, leaving the score 12-6 with 5:35 left in the third quarter. The Chiefs refusing to bow in defeat, paraded to the Cowboy 12 yard line before Mighty Moore once again rose to the occasion. After blocking a pass, Moore countered again and annihilated the quarterback to give Plains possession of the ball. The Cowboy score machine was temporarily out of commission, but the defense was on target. A penalty returned a Chief threat that went for 30 yards, leaving them faced with fourth and 22. Gary Livesay snared the next pass after Moore missed throwing the quarterback for a loss by the width of a flea's hair. Moore's tackle would have been a safety. The offense stalled. The defense allowed

the Chiefs one play before Bruce Lester stormed the quarterback for another fumble. The game was far from over, considering that both the Chiefs scores came from long opening field runs. Eddie Moore iced the cake with 45 seconds remaining by spilling the quarterback and creating a fumble. The Cowboys staled the remainder of the game to the delight of a packed crowd.

The Home Team played an outstanding game. I only wish I could elaborate on every play because each one viewed eleven young men giving 100%. This type of team work makes it hard to hit

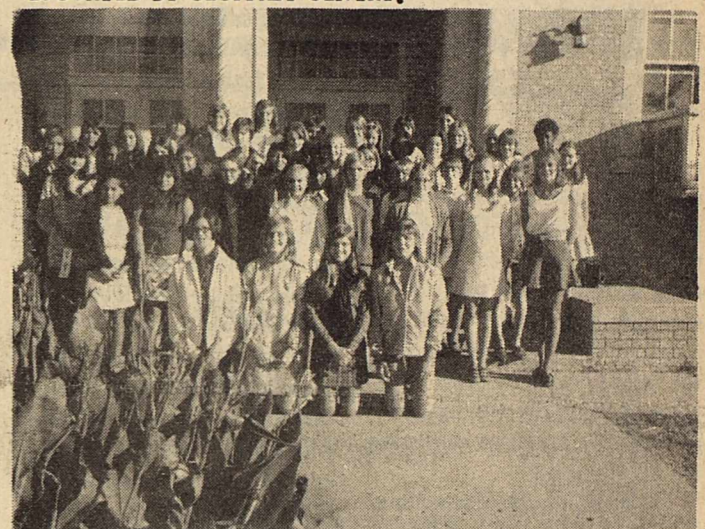
every highlight, since every man is a highlight. This is the type of team that draws respect from its fans.

The First Baptist Church of Plains contributed \$100.00, and the Tokio Baptist Church also made a donation.

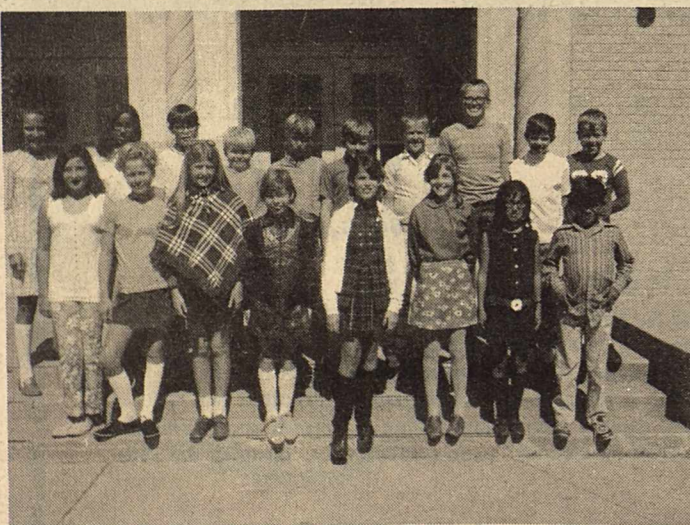
YOAKUM SWCD NEWS

The frost has again stopped the growth of all summer plants which means it will be next year before any soil cover will be grown except small grain. The question is what are YOU as a steward of the land going to do with what is on the land now. Will you spread, chop, disk or in some way destroy the cover and leave the land BARE and hope it won't BLOW away. If you are one of those that ALWAYS hope it won't blow and that you can leave the land smooth, bare and subject to all the erosion nature can bring upon it we would remind you that it is only natural for the land to have a vegetative cover except in the desert. Each year the crops in Yoakum Soil and Water Conservation District that are grown for sale either as grain, fiber, or food for livestock or humans produces some cover for the soil after the crop has been harvested sometimes lots and sometimes only a small amount. Grain Sorghum the crop that is planted on more acres than all the

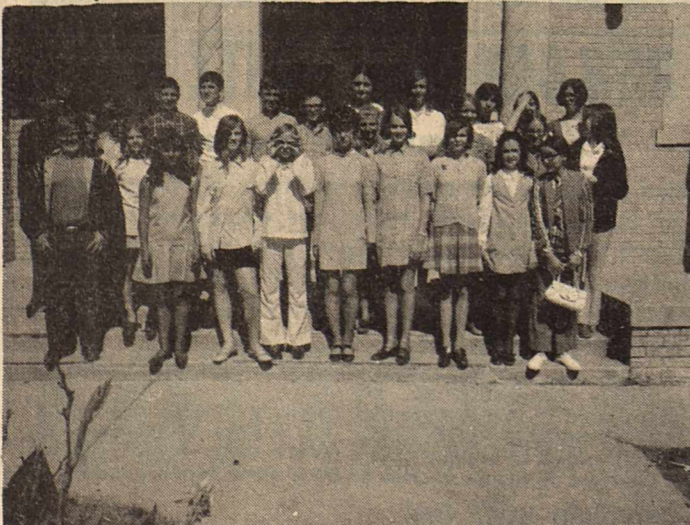
others put together produces a very good cover even when planted in 40" rows and when planted in narrow rows, 20" or 30" it does the best job of all of holding both soil and moisture. Did you ever stop to think that when you let your soil blow you LOOSE soil, Moisture, Plant Food and Organic matter that reduces production, cost you money and causes discomfort to those who breathe your loss. It is not possible to stop all dust but we must stop all that is possible.

CHDA★ Says...

Crushed patents, a favorite fabric for rain garments and sportswear, requires special techniques for sewing. A pattern with few seams makes it easier to manipulate the vinyl-type fabric. Raglan or kimono sleeves are easiest, but some of the crushed patents are soft and pliable enough to sew-in sleeves.

The pattern should be altered to fit before the garment is cut. Seams cannot be left out without damage to the fabric. When fastening the pattern to the fabric, place pins in seam allowances only or tape the pattern to the fabric. Cut with sharp shears. Mark darts seamlines and other construction details with chalk or a pencil on the wrong side of the fabric. Use a grease pencil when making markings on the right side. These can easily be wiped off.

A medium-sized machine needle and 10 or 12 stitches per inch are satisfactory for top stitching on crushed patents. A piece of tissue paper

placed between the shiny or right side of the fabric and the feed-dog of the machine prevents damage to the fabric when stitching. The tissue paper can easily be torn away when stitching is completed.

Finger press seams and darts, unless the label on the bolt or roll of crushed patent states that the fabric can be pressed with steam or a warm iron. Both zippers and buttonholes can be used on crushed patents. The centered application makes a flat zipper closing.

Hems can be top stitched or slip stitched in place to the backing of the fabric. Follow the fabric manufacturer care recommendations for cleaning. Some vinyl-like fabrics can be hand-washed, while others need to be wiped clean with a damp cloth. If linings are used in the garment, they should require the same care as the outer fabric.

Mrs. Hugh Snodgrass were dismissed from the Brownfield General Hospital Friday. She continues to improve.

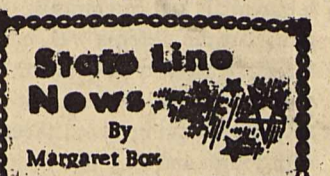
