## SHOWMANSHIP WINNERS

Three Young livestock exhibitors were named as tops in the field of presenting their livestock to the judge. They were honored at the awards program just prior to the sale Saturday afternoon.

Gary Livesay was selected as the best lamb showman and he received the award made possible by Mr. G. D. Cleveland. Dale Cleveland received the beef calf showmanship award donated by Mr. Johnnie L. Fitzgerald.

Kreig Blount proved himself capable of earning two showmanship awards. First, he was selected as the best swine showman of the 1971 show and received the swine showmanship award donated by Dr. Berrie Squires. Next, he was selected to receive the coveted Rusty McGinty Memorial Award. To be eligible for the Rusty McGinty Memorial Award, an exhibitor must exhibit animals in at least two of the three divisions of the show and his ability

as a herdsman and caretaker are also considered. This award is made possible by Mrs. Alma Lynn McGinty and her daughters, D'Lois and D'Lynn. The name of Kreig Blount will be added to the list of previous winners on the beautiful Wall plaque, which will be displayed in one of the prominent business places in Yoakum County. For the next twelve months, it will be on display at the Plains State Bank.

## LIVESTOCK SHOW RESULTS

Tommy Box, Mike Cheatham, David Guetersloh and Tommy Crooks exhibited Champions in the 19th Annual Yoakum County Junior Fat Stock Show. Dale Cleveland and Kreig Blount exhibited the two Reserve Champions.

Tommy Box, son of Mr. & Mrs. Tom Box, exhibited the Grand Champion Calf. His 853 pound Angus received a slap on the back last Saturday morning from Dr. Charles Smallwood, the judge of the beef calf division. The Reserve Champion calf was a 942 pound Hereford exhibited by Dale Cleveland. Dale is the son of Mr. & Mrs. G. W. Cleveland.

In the judging that took place Friday afternoon, David Guetersloh, son of Mr. & Mrs. Roy Guetersloh was the exhibitor of the Champion Fine Wool Lamb. His 92 pound fine wool lamb was the winner of the Heavy Weight Fine Wool Class. Tommy Crooks, son of Mr. & Mrs. M. B. Crooks, exhibited a 90 pound Dorset lamb that won first in the medium weight mutton class and was later named the Champion Mutton Lamb of the show. Mr. Thomas Neely of Lubbock was judge of the lamb show.

Immediately following the lamb show, Mr. Paul Gross of Big Spring placed seven classes of barrows. He selected a Hampshire barrow owned by Mike Cheatham as the Grand Champion barrow of the 1971 show. Mike is the son of Mr. & Mrs. Leon Cheatham. The 235 pound Hampshire was the winner of class number 7 and was bred on the Cheatham farm.

The Reserve Champion Barrow was a Duroc exhibited by Kreig Blount, Kreig is the son of Mr. & Mrs. Kenneth Blount. He and his father are breeders of registered Duroc hogs and the 215 pound Reserve Champion was one of their pigs.

## Debbie Addison Wins Beef Calf Contest

The beef calf gain contest was won this year by Debbie Addison because her Hereford calf named Flaming Arrow gained 643 pounds between the 3rd Saturday in May and the weigh-in day last Friday morning. Flaming Arrow was one of two calves fed this year by Debbie. Both calves were bred by her father, Claude Addison.

On May 16, 1970 Flaming Arrow weighed exactly 300 pounds. On February 19th, his weight was 943 pounds. His average daily gain for the 279 feeding period was 2.3 pounds.

Two other calves were crowding the winner. A Hereford calf named Wonder Boy, bred by Fitzgerald, stood in second place in the contest with a gain of 626 pounds. In third place this year was Dale Cleveland with a Hereford steer named Muley. He had a gain of 625 pounds. He was bred by Glenn Cleveland and was the Reserve Champion steer of the 1971 Calf show.

The award received by Debbie Addison was donated by Farmers and Ranchers Commission Company of Lubbock, who was represented last Saturday at the Awards Program by Mr. R. M. Jones.

The methods of feeding beef cattle for a show have changed from the time this gain contest

was started and the young feeders are trying to keep their animals from carrying any excess fat covering. A calf that can place high in a gain contest and also place high in the show is bound to be the kind of cattle that producers like to raise.

The three calves mentioned here all placed well in their respective classes. Dale's calf was later named Reserve Champion. Flaming Arrow, the winner placed 5th and Wonder Boy was 6th. All three of the calves were in the heavy weight class where 17 animals were competing.

**WHO ARE THEY?**

Professional men who by thorough education and training have qualified themselves to furnish engineering services to the public.

In Texas, there are over 26,000 such professionals who are both technically and legally qualified through state registration as *Professional Engineers*.

**WHAT DO THEY DO?**

Above all else engineers are *problem solvers*. The basic truths, discovered by physical scientists, are translated by engineers into methods and processes of using the materials and forces of nature to serve man.

They design bridges, roads and structures—familiar to all. They also design countless electrical and other gadgets of our society, some too small to see or feel. They delve into chemical processes, mechanical principles and numerous other areas to provide us with our essential services and a multitude of products. Texas universities grant engineering degrees in 18 different fields.

**HOW AM I AFFECTED?**

The Texas Legislature, to protect the public health, safety and welfare, passed the *Texas Engineering Practice Act*. This Act established procedures for engineering registration through combinations of education, examinations and experience. It helps you recognize *qualified engineers*. Only a legally licensed person may practice, offer to practice or publicly identify himself as an "engineer."

The Act prohibits individuals and companies from using engineering terms and titles in names or advertising media unless actively supplying engineering services performed by licensed engineers. It requires all *local officials* to utilize licensed engineers for engineering phases of all public works—buildings, schools, hospitals, water and sewer systems.

It provides for civil and criminal action to insure compliance in the public interest.

**PUBLIC NOTICE**  
**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**  
**NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR 5)**  
Special Election May 18, 1971

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Section 51-a, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be deemed expedient, for assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws as they now read or as they may hereafter be amended, providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, and for the payment of assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and other services to or on behalf of:

- (1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or noncitizens who shall have resided within the boundaries of the United States for at least twenty-five (25) years;
- (2) Needy individuals who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps;
- (3) Needy blind persons;
- (4) Needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children.

"The Legislature may prescribe such other eligibility requirements for participation

in these programs as it deems appropriate.

"The Legislature shall have authority to enact appropriate legislation which will enable the State of Texas to cooperate with the Government of the United States in providing assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of needy persons, in providing rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws making matching funds available to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, to accept and expend funds from the Government of the United States for such purposes in accordance with the laws of the United States as they now are or as they may hereafter be amended, and to make appropriations out of State funds for such purposes; provided that the maximum amount paid out of State funds to or on behalf of any needy person shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; provided that the total amount of State funds paid for assistance grants for needy dependent children and the caretakers of the children shall not exceed Fifty-Five Million Dollars (\$55,000,000) during any fiscal year.

"Provided further, that if the limitations and restrictions herein contained are found to be in conflict with the provisions of appropriate federal statutes, as they now are or as they may be amended to the extent that federal matching money is not available to the State for these purposes, then and in that event the

Legislature is specifically authorized and empowered to prescribe such limitations and restrictions and enact such laws as may be necessary in order that such federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care for or on behalf of needy persons.

"Nothing in this section shall be construed to amend, modify or repeal Section 31 of Article XVI of this Constitution; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision. Nothing herein shall be construed to permit optometrists to treat the eyes for any defect whatsoever in any manner not to administer or to prescribe any drug or physical treatment whatsoever, unless such optometrist is a regularly licensed physician or surgeon under the laws of this State."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on May 18, 1971, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment removing the limitation on the total State appropriations for assistance grants for the needy aged, the needy disabled, and the needy blind, and setting a limitation on total State appropriations during any fiscal year for assistance grants for needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children."

**PUBLIC NOTICE**  
**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**  
**NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (HJR 21)**  
Special Election May 18, 1971

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XVII, Section 1, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 1. The Legislature by a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each House, to be elected by yeas and nays on the journals, may propose amendments to the Constitution, to be voted upon by the qualified electors for members of the Legislature, which proposed amendments shall be duly published once a week for four weeks, commencing at least three months before an election, the time of which shall be specified by the Legislature, in one weekly newspaper of each county, in which such a newspaper may be published; and it shall be the duty of the several returning officers of said election, to open a poll for, and make returns to the Secretary of State,

of the number of legal votes cast at said election for and against said amendments; and if more than one be proposed, then the number of votes cast for and against each of them; and if it shall appear from said return, that a majority of the votes cast, have been cast in favor of any amendment, the said amendment so receiving a majority of the votes cast, shall become a part of this Constitution, and proclamation shall be made by the Governor thereof."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on May 18, 1971, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing that the Legislature may propose an amendment of the Constitution at any session of the Legislature."

**Play To Be Presented In Plains By Eastern N.M. University**

"The Elves and the Shoemaker," a play for the young at heart, will be presented by the department of theatre at Eastern New Mexico University as the 17th annual Children's Theatre Tour.

The tour itinerary will include: Plains, Texas on March 2nd at 2:00 p. m., in the Plains High School Auditorium.

A cast of 13 student actors go on tour beginning March 1 for 14 performances in 10 Eastern New Mexico and West Texas cities. Last year, the theatre department presented "The Apple Kingdom" to more than 12,000 public school youngsters in the area.

**Larry Hood, Patrolman To Leave Plains**

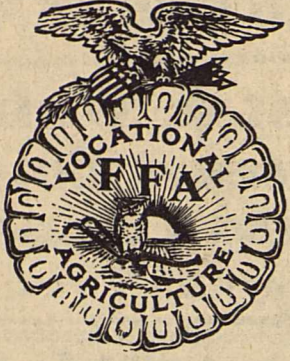
