The objective of this meeting was to establish guide lines to govern application of harmone-type herbicides to crop

No bond or permit will be required for making applications of hormone-type herbicide with ground equipment. It is the recommendation of this committee for Yoakum County farmers to use only ground equipment for the application of hormone-type herbicides. Buy chemicals from reputable dealers, and get a good quality material for most effective results. This committee desires to make an all out effort to educate the users of hormone-type herbicides to the potential of 2, 4-D, and 2-4-5-T whether good and/or bad. Be sure you are right in putting hormone-type herbicides down, if in doubt DON'T! If you do, follow directions that are read from the label on the material.

A person is just as liable for misuse of chemicals, whether County is under herbicide law, or whether it isn't.

Lets take care of our own needs and regulations before an outside agency comes in to control it for us.

We need to check alternative possibilities, and use the type of chemical that gives best control without a drift probl-

When you do use hormonetype herbicide make sure that conditions are right, such as follows: temperature 70° or below, wind velocity under 5 miles per hour, low volatility material, pressure on nozzles 18# or less, 15 gallons of water to acre and in accordance to manufacturer recommendation on material used, wind direction will be

to the opposite of nearest cotton, humidity, as high as possible; use ground rigs with directed type spray, not fogger type; recommended height of boom, no higher than 24 inches with nozzles not to exceed 40 inches apart; or such distance that gets proper

Rangeland: For rangeland use adequate precaution in all apraying. Most of the time this spraying is before cotton comes up. Most of rangeland is not in close proximity to cotton land.

If aerial application is used in any case, whether cropland or rangeland, use extreme precaution.

Always use good judgement and be aware of the possibility of damage to your neighbor s crop. Thus avoiding any possibility of a law suit which could sever friendships not to mention damage to financial condition.

Certification Of Wheat Acreage

Wheat acreage may be substituted for grain sorghum or cotton for allotment or base history purposes under the 1971 farm program. This makes it especially important that all farmers who have wheat planted and all farmers who have a wheat allotment whether they planted wheat or not certify their acreage not later than May 3rd. Wheat not certified by the above date cannot be counted for these

Wheat planted but destroyed by drouth, sand or other abnorman weather disaster will qualify if supported by execution of Form ASCS-574, Request for Acrea ge Credit: These requests should be made as soon as possible. File requests before wheat is plowed under, but in no event later than the Final Certification

Weather conditions later in

this acreage of wheat would be needed to prevent a reduction in your cotton allotment, feed grain base, or wheat allotment.

Wheat Acreage should be measured and the exact acreathe year might cause you to change cropping plans so that ge turned in not later than May 3rd. Don't forget this final May 3rd date if you have

Set -aside acres may not be harvested in any manner and not grazed between April 30-October 1 in Yoakum County. Since grazing dates vary between counties, farmers that have farms in other counties should check with their county ASC office where the farm is located.

Producers that wish to leave small grain for cover on setaside or normal conserving acres must file intentions in writing prior to May 1.

#### EDITORIALS

#### Texas Water Plan

There is always an abundance of frightening expressions and superlative slogans for any preposterous proposition when it is necessary to hoodwink the public into voting affirmatively for its passage. There are many people, (in fact too many) across the state that could not see the feasibility of transfering water from the mouth of the Mississippi river to the high plains of Texas. Neither could they see the sensibility of placing the billions of dollars requested at that time, when the amendment was submitted at public election, at the disposal of the Texas Water De velopment Board when the water had not been provided for nor permission granted or agreements made for right of way for canals across neighboring states which would

It is extremely doubtful that such right of way would be obtainable other than under federal compulsion or prohibitive cost. The proponents of the use of the inter-coastal canal are either confident in their ability to deceive the residents of west Texas or unaware of the fact that inter-coastal, from where it enters the Mississippi river, across Louisiana and Texas is strictly a salt water canal, besides being a commercially navigable passage.

On August 5, 1969 Am endment number two of the nine amendments presented the voting public was thoroughly defeated. This amendment provided for the issuance of 3,600 billion dollars of bonds supposedly to be matched by the Federal Government by 6,400 million dollars to be furnished to the Texas Water Development Board for the purpose of transferral of water from the Mississippi river at some point below New Orleans, La. by a purported system of canals, lakes and hydraulic lifts to the high plains of Texas. In some places this would be approximately a 4,000 foot lift.


This money was to be turned over to the Texas Water Development Board to be expended at their discretion with virtually no governmental control. The slogan then was, "2020 or Bust". The year of 2020 being the date of comptetion for the project. An editorial in the July 31, 1969 issue of the Plains Review, thoroughly discredited the whole proposition, described it as a political boondoggle and called for its defeat. The Plains Review stuck out like a sore thumb all over West Texas as the only newspaper in West Texas to oppose the proposition.

Last Friday Harry Burliegh of Austin, head of the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation in Texas, in a discussion of the project described the opposition as "tough dragons". And stated that the dragons include the Federal Government. We would like to state here that if there are not enough "sane dragons" in the State of Texas to defeat this most tremendous and preposterous project we hope there are enough in the Federal Government to furnish the necessary support.

If the money required to finance this monstrosity were used as assistance to the scientific development projects of the industries who are working feverishly on desalination of saline and brackish waters, Texas water problem would be solved in far less than 50 years, and economically. Desalination on a comparatively small scale of severely brackish water can now be done. It was proven be the "Permasep" division of the E. I. Du Pont Co. in a test project at Plains, Texas last year.

If this fantastically extravagant Governor and Legislature cannot finance the State without searching every nook and cranny for taxable item and threatening the people of Texas with personal and/or corporate income tax where would they find finance for this "Dragon Food"? Some where, somehow, here must be found a way to stop this insane spending and drain on the tax payers pocket books.

It may require a law that all tips on the best and surest buys on the stock market that are furnished the high officials in Austin be furnished all taxpayers simultaneously.

Today's Subject: The Appeal of Drugs to Teens

Here are some of the reasons given by youthful drug users for taking drugs, in a series of national surveys of young peo-

- ple in the high school-college age groups: 1. It is a way of "hitting back" at parents - getting even with them for the 1001 things parents do and
  - make their children do in the growing-up process. 2. Taking drugs is a means of feeling love - love in general terms, not physical necessarily - drugs are a way of returning to the basic fundamentals of life.
  - 4. Some students said they felt drug experimentation was in this modern day, a means and part of grow-
  - 5. Many said words to the effect that it was enjoyable to see their parents get upset about something genuinely. In short, taking drugs seems a method of telling the "old man" to go to hell with his hypoc-
  - 6. There were those who gave the excuse that drugs were a release from daily tensions and the heavy demands of school work and offered relief from frustrations and the feeling of defeat!

Naturally, to combat the drug problem, we must know facts about drugs, but perhaps even more important is knowing some of the basic reasons why youngsters are using drugs in this beautiful land of opportunity we call America. The above reasons are only a small fraction of the entire list, I am sure, but will give us all food for thought within our own personal family situations.

In trying to analyze drug misuse we must certainly bear in mind that children today are raised in a chemical society. They have come to know, from infancy, they can go to the doctor and get a shot for this ailment and a pill for that; it follows then that there is a good reason why children have built the impression they can be doctored chemically for any physical or emotional problem. And, let's not forget the influence of t.v. Wouldn't a child easily come to feel that there is a chemical

cure for everything by watching t.v. commercials? 

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#### Controlling Weed With Chemicals

A great deal of interest has been shown recently in regard to chemical weed control. Most of this interest has been generated because of some incidents in 1970 where the use of chemicals caused some unwanted effects on susceptible crops for several miles from the treated area. To be more specific, the chemical used was 2, 4-D and the susceptible crop was cotton. All through the 1971 growing season, Yoakum County residents will be subjected to an intensified educational program designed to help them to do a better j ob of weed control and prevent injury to desireable plants.

Most of the grain sorghum producers in Yoakum County have recently received a publication from the County Extension Office called a "Production Guideline for Grain Sorghum" or "Keys to Profitable Grain Scrahum Production in the Southern High Plains Plains". On page 5 of the publication there are some recommendations for weed control in Grain sorghum. This publication recommends the use of 2, 4-D after the crop is 6 inches tall and before flowering. It lists such precautions as using a salt formulation with a low vapor hazard and to use all precautions against spray drift. This publication recommends the use of Banvel to control broad-leaved weeds in grain sorghum and the period for use of this chemical is limited to 10 to 25 days after sorghum emergence. It further states that Banvel, used at recommended rates, is less hazardous than 2.4-D to near-

by broadleaf crops. This is the time of the year when home owners are wanting to control unwanted weeds and grasses from their lawns. Broad-leaf weed s can be controlled in lawns with several different chemicals. Some chemicals used for lawn weed control are 2,4-D, MCPA, Banvel and Silvex. Each of these chemicals are to be used with extreme caution. The fumes from these weed killers may drift and cause injury to shrubs and flo wers. Close attention should be paid to the label instructions and none of the none of the safety rules for applying herbicides

should be overlooked. 2,4-D is the chemical that is likely to be most readily available, and it may be on the dealers shelf under one of several trade names. For dandelion control, good resu-Its may be obtained by using 2,4-D as a spot or individual plant treatment. The 2, 4-D material is mixed with water according to label instructions and the solution applied to ea each individual plant. It may be applied with a cane applicator or a sponge attached to the end of a stick.

Best results will be obtained by using 2, 4-D in the early spring or late fall when temperatures are between 70 and 85 degrees. Higher temperatures not only increase the hazard of drift, but it causes a tip kill on the dandelions before the material can penetrate to the entire root system, and the plant comes back again. It must be remembered that dandelions will continue to appear because new plants will come from seed. A bad infestation of dandelions required six to ten treatments each year for about three years.

Almost all herbicided will cause some injury to the grass. Well established grasses will usually overcome the injury and regular irrigations coupled with frequent fertilizer applications will shorten the recov-

Raisin Coconut Torte

WONDERFUL RAISIN COCONUT TORTE 34 cup dark or golden raisins 1/2 cup flaked coconut

4 egg whites

1 cup graham cracker crumbs 1 teaspoon rum (or vanilla)

1 teaspoon vanilla 1 cup whipping cream 1 tablespoon powdered sugar

Chop raisins lightly. Reserve 1/4 cup. Beat egg whites with salt until barely stiff. Gradually beat in sugar. Fold in crumbs, coconut, 1/2 cup raisins and vanilla. Turn into greased 9-inch layer cake pan with removable bottom. (Line bottom of pan with circle of foil, if you do not have a pan with removable bottom.) Bake in moderate oven (350°F.) about 30 minutes. Cool thoroughly. Cut into wedges. Whip cream until stiff. Fold in remaining 1/4 cup chopped raisins, powdered sugar and rum. Serve over torte. Makes about 8 servings




