7.2 Million Grover's Vehicles Summary Registered

Senator Henry Grover, Republican from Houston, speaking to the meeting of the Republican Women of Harrison County held at Shadowood Lodge Friday gave his summary of the accomplishments and problems of the 62nd Legislative session. Grover said he thinks this session of the Legislature can be characterized by an excessive and often unnecessary amount of legislation introduced and passed, often acted on in haste in committee and on the floor, especially in the Senate. "Many Senators and Representatives are certainly going to be surprised when confronted by their constituents with certain features of much of the legislation that was passed," the Houston Senator said, "much of it having been passed in such a hurry."

Grover said that in his ten years as a member of the Legislature, never had he seen such hasty committee action and poor attention to the details of many of the bills passed in the Senate. The Houston Senator said that he thinks the public attitude toward State Government is that a thorough house cleaning is needed. "If the elections were held now I feel certain there would easily be a 50% turnover in Austin among elected officials and I hope the people will keep this attitude until election time next year," he continued.

Grover's name is very prominent in those mentioned for the Republican choice for the gubernatorial race. Having been in the Legislature for ten years, he has substantial political experience on which to draw, as well as a broad knowledge of state government. A former teacher in the Houston Public School system, he is presently on the staff of the Houston Baptist College.

"Also," Pittman continues, "these statistics are meaningful and underline the importance of the establishment of the Texas Motor Vehicle Commission created by the Legislature this year. Members of the Commission are expected to be appointed by the Governor within the next few weeks."

"At this rate of increase," Pittman predicts, "within a few years our motor vehicle registrations in Texas will reach the 10-million mark, and the manufacturers will be manufacturing new motor vehicles at the rate of 10-million per year."

Special Session Of Council Is Held

A special session of the City Council was called by Mayor Roy Edwards Tuesday evening. The purpose of the meeting was the retaining of professional engineering services for the construction of the proposed water line from the well sites one mile west of Plains to the City water tower on the south city limits.

The council voted to retain the services of Mr. J.J. Buddy Hewett P.E., of the engineering firm of Circle Cross Engineering of Lovington, N.M., on the terms outlined by Mr. Hewett at the regular session of the council, June 8th.

The council also voted to terminate the 1967 contract with the firm of Parkhill, Smith and Cooper of Lubbock and notify the firm of said termination.

The council also voted to lay the line three feet north of the center of the old county road which extends one mile west from the City section, 427, and divides sections 443 and section 426. It is understood that this right of way was granted to the City of Plains by the Yoakum County Commissioners Court.

City Manager Hugh Abercrombie reported that Mr. Ned V. Brooks, P.E., Regional Engineer, Environmental Health Services of the State Department of Health, had visited his office at the City Hall and that Mr. Brooks had inspected the City's Water system including the four wells now owned by the City.

Mr. Abercrombie quoted Mr. Brooks as saying that the cesspool at the Kerby place would cause no problem in the approval by the State Health Board provided that the cesspool was properly abandoned and chlorinated according to the Board's specifications.

No other official business was conducted. The meeting was adjourned at 9:00 P.M.

Grazing And Haying Date Extended

The State A S C committee has determined that the termination date for seasonal haying and grazing on set-aside acres is extended to November 1st, 1971. This means that farmers may plant approved crops on their set-aside acres and either graze or harvest the crops for hay. It is believed that with this November date farmers could well afford to plant a crop for grazing or haying and irrigate the crops where irrigation water is available. Farmers interested should check with the county ASC office.

COVER CROP PRACTICE: Funds are available for cost-sharing cover crop practices on cropland including set-aside acres needing protection from wind erosion. We understand that funds will be available under two programs. Under one program which pays the higher rate per acre and the acreage cannot be grazed. Under the other program pasturing consistent with good management is permitted. Farmers interested in these programs should file an application immediately.

Local 4-H Clubs Complete Chocolate Sales

The fund raising campaign that got under way on May 7th where Yoakum County 4-H Club members sold chocolate bars at \$1.00 each netted \$720.00 for the Texas 4-H Foundation. This money will be used to help build a State 4-H Club Educational Center on the banks of Lake Brownwood about nine miles northwest of the city of Brownwood.

Each county in the state was selling this special chocolate candy in the hopes of raising over a half million dollars which would get the project started. The proposed educational center is estimated to cost three million dollars when it is complete.

Yoakum County 4-Hers sold 1,790 bars of chocolate during the campaign. They reported that the people were very generous and acted like they were very glad to help with this drive for funds. The 4-H Adult leaders did an excellent job of getting the candy distributed to the 4-H members and collecting the receipts. Mrs. Tom Box was chairman of the chocolate Sales Committee and the principle adult leaders who worked on this project were: Mr. Claude Addison, Mr. G.W. Cleveland, Mrs. Clyde Boomer, Mrs. Claud Bowers, Mr. Kenneth Blount and Mrs. Harry Richardson.

When the campaign was completed it turned out that Debbie Addison was the top salesman. She sold 193 bars. Ranking second was Glenn Boomer who sold 120 bars. Third in line was Randy Crawford with a sale of 75 bars. Members who sold 60 or more bars were: Sue Ann Bales, Robbie Blount, Tim

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and six persons injured. The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first five months of 1971 shows a total of 22 accidents resulting in no persons killed and 20 persons injured.

Verbally Attacked!!!

The Special session of the City Council, Tuesday night proved to be a stormy and trying session for the editor. He was first accused of printing biased, inaccurate, and one-sided news of the City's activities, a continuation of the continuous gripes uttered by Mr. Smith for the past several months. Mr. Smith was offended by the cesspool joke printed in last week's issue and openly declared a joke. The sticker that the Kerby well was drilled closer to a cesspool than the required distance set forth in the State Board of Health regulations. These regulations were in the City Hall, available to all councilmen and had been openly discussed by the Council. Though the cesspool could have been abandoned properly before the well was drilled, it was not. It cannot obstruct the use of the well if properly abandoned before the well is put in to service. Nevertheless, the violation has been committed. The truth of this was evidenced as late as the meeting time Tuesday night by the presence of both the well and the cesspool. Later in the meeting, Councilman F.W. Graham interrupted the proceedings of his own legislation with a vociferous attack on the editor in equivocal phraseology hardly becoming the dignity of the position he was filling. The tirade was entirely and completely irrelevant to any of the proceedings of the meeting. The Editor refused to be drawn into a controversy and stated that he would stand on his own publications. Any interested person wishing to clarify the veracity of the news printed in the Plains Review regarding the improvements conducted by the City may find confirmation in the statutes of the State of Texas and the minutes of the council meetings at the City Hall. We hope that the retaining of a registered engineer by the City will help to rectify the actions of the past and clarify those of the future. Plains needs the quality water available obtainable by proper procedure.

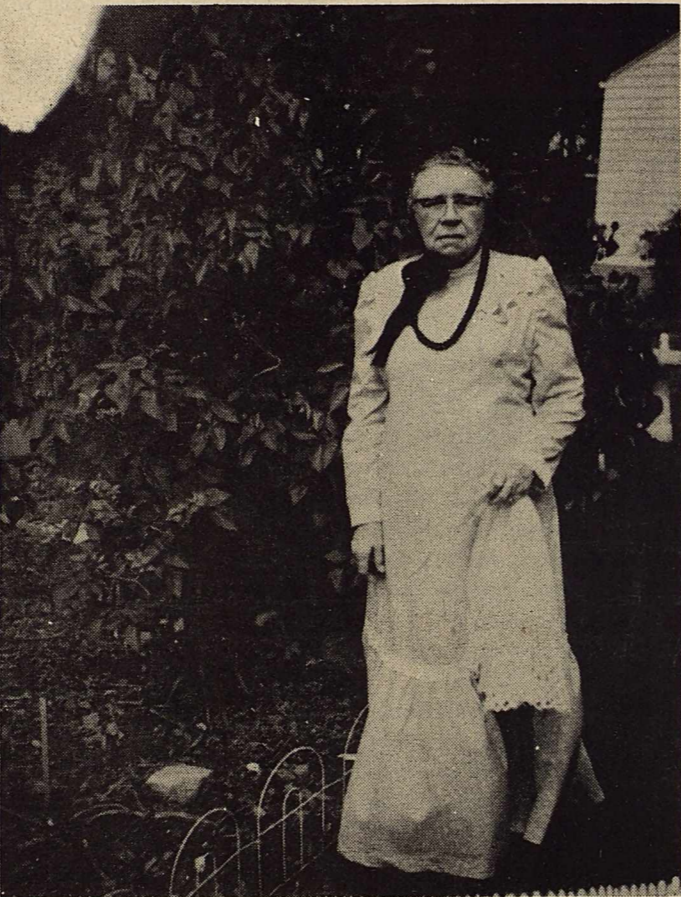

Legislative Report

The State Legislature this session reached one of its all-time lows by bottling up legislation in the Rules Committee for 135 days and then trying to pass hundreds of bills within a matter of several days. This procedure left little or no time to study and evaluate each bill and contributed to a haphazard manner of enacting the laws. Most of the members had no idea what the bills contained or the effects of the legislation they blindly accepted.

This same situation occurred last session when two questionable banking bills slipped through. The resulting scandal and the involvement of state officials has cast a shadow over the members of this government. As yet there has been no satisfactory explanation of the stock case and the investigating committee appointed by Mutschner himself has made no report.

The final appropriations bill was written by 10 members in secret meetings, a clear violation of the rules which Speaker Gus Mutschner chose to ignore. The bill was presented to the House on an accept-all or reject-all basis and contained additional \$24 million expenditures not in the original version of the bill.

Two-thirds of the House members felt the appropriations bill and the increased expenditures were not even important enough to question. They voted to end debate on the measure after only 30 minutes. You might like to know how some of your tax money will be used. 1. The governor's salary will increase from \$55,000 per year to \$63,000 by 1973.

2. \$150,000 of your tax money will go for a state park in Rep. Hearty's district. Hearty is chairman of the Appropriations Committee.

3. The LBJ Park near the Johnson ranch will be equipped with "guests" cabins and a pitch and putt golf course. This will take one million of your tax dollars.

Grants For Fiscal Year

AUSTIN-- South Plains Association of Governments, Lubbock, was one of 21 regional councils awarded criminal justice planning grants for Fiscal Year 1972 by Governor Preston Smith Friday. The amount is \$20,000.

The awards, totaling more than \$545,000, were approved on recommendation of the Texas Criminal Justice Council, which oversees state law enforcement planning and administers funds from the U.S. Department of Justice under the Omnibus Crime Control Act.

The South Plains grant will be used in implementing action projects outlined in previous plans and in updating the comprehensive five-year criminal justice plan for the 15 counties of the South Plains State Planning Region.

Professional criminal justice planning services will be furnished to each unit of local government in all 15 counties, with the association serving as a regional clearing house.

These counties are Bailey, Lamb, Hale, Floyd, Motley, King, Kickens, Crosby, Lubbock, Hockley, Cochran, Yoakum, Terry, Lynn and Garza. To supplement the \$20,000 grant, the association will contribute \$2,222 to the criminal justice planning budget.

Make Father's Day A Feast Day

Are you in a quandary about how to show your appreciation to Dad this Sunday? Well, it's no secret that the way to a man's heart is to appeal to his appetite.

Beef is an excellent source of many essential food nutrients. It is rich in protein, iron and B vitamins. Beef is just the food Dad and your family need to carry them through the hot summer months when they are working outside, enjoying their favorite sport or just relaxing.

Treat the whole family to one of the most favored of beef cuts -- steak. You will see Dad's face light up when you prepare the tender, juicy cuts under the broiler.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Consumer and Marketing Service recommends that you select 1- to 2-inch steak from the rib, short loin or sirloin. For delicious eating, these cuts should have little connective tissues and some marbling of fat through the meat.

Preheat the broiler and grease the broiler rack slightly. You can slash the edges of the fat to prevent curling. Then, season to taste and place the steak about 4 inches below the heat.

Broil until the top of the meat is browned, season, then turn and broil on the other side. After turning the steak broil meat only half as long on the bottom as broiled on the top side.

The length of time that the steaks should remain under the broiler depends on person's taste as well as the broiler. A general rule would be to broil a 1-inch steak for a total of about 10 minutes for a rare steak, about 15 minutes for a medium one, and about 20 to 25 for well done.

For steaks that are 1 1/2 inches thick, the total broiling time for rare is about 15 minutes; for medium, about 20 minutes, and for well done, 25 to 30 minutes. The total time for broiling 2-inch, rare steaks is about 25 minutes. Medium steaks take 35 minutes and well done steaks take 45 to 50 minutes.

Maybe Dad has a particular weakness for barbecue. And who could blame him? The tantalizing aroma, the heavenly taste, and plain fun of a barbecue add to the allure of outdoor cooking.

Here is a recipe for TART BARBECUE SAUCE. Combine 1 cup each soy sauce and salad oil, and 3/4 cup lemon juice. Mix to blend and add 1 split garlic clove. It makes 2 1/2 cups and may be brushed on the beef during cooking or used as a marinade.

If you are on a hamburger budget, but want to prepare a special treat for Father's Day, there are a number of economical dishes that you can prepare. Try GROUND BEEF SUPPER DISH.

You will need 1 cup coarsely chopped onions, 2 tablespoons fat, 1 pound ground beef, 3/4 cups each diced celery and water, 1/4 cup each chopped celery leaves and chili sauce, 1/2 teaspoon basil, 1 teaspoon salt, and 1/8 teaspoon pepper.

Cook onions in hot fat until they are soft. Add the ground beef and brown. Add all of the remaining ingredients, cover the casserole dish and simmer for 30 minutes. Thicken with flour and water paste, if necessary, and serve over hot noodles or rice. This tempting dish will serve 4.

4-H Swine Growers Provide Quality, Low-Calorie Produce

SPECIAL - Today when everyone is "thinking thin," many people avoid pork in their diet even when they enjoy its succulent taste and inviting texture.

They needn't! Today's hogs are not at all the same as the animals of a few years back.

"In fact, today's hogs yield just half the lard of those 20 years ago. And a 3½-ounce pork chop now has only 240 calories, compared with 377 two decades ago," according to the Cooperative Extension Service.

There are over 106,000 youths between the ages of 9 and 19 who are helping provide this high-quality pork for America's table. They are the young people enrolled in the national 4-H swine program sponsored by Moorman Mfg. Co., Quincy, Ill.

The swine program, supervised by the Cooperative Extension Service, gives young men and women the opportunity to learn about breeding, nutrition, research and marketing of hogs. They also may make a profit when they market their animals.

This year's National Pork Queen, Miss Patricia D. Cline, 20, of Pleasant Plains, Ill., worked nine years in the 4-H swine program. She and her older sister maintained a herd of purebred Spotted Poland Chinas until Patricia entered college with profits from the hog projects.

Topping the list of incentives and recognition offered by Moorman Mfg. Co., national 4-H swine program donor, are six \$700 educational scholarships, an increase of \$100 each over the previous year. 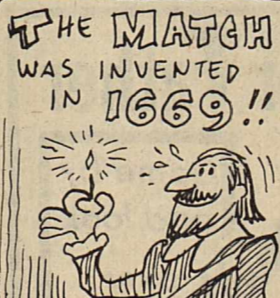
'TEXAS' Opening To Honor Mayors

OUTDOORS IN TEXAS

BY VERN SANFORD

In this era of booming outdoors adventures, newspapers-weeklies as well as dailies--seek good photographs of their readers and their outstanding catches. Editors are just as anxious as the hunters or fishermen to see these pictures printed.

Unfortunately, a goodly number of such photos, often taken of truly outstanding fish or game, are rejected. In most instances rejection was due to the poor quality of the pictures.

Most newspapers prefer photos taken by their own staff photographers. But fishing and hunting are sports of unusual hours, to say the least, so staff photos are impractical. Outdoorsmen, proud of their trophy fish and game, usually have a buddy take a pix of them or have a commercial photographer do the job.

Problem with many commercial photographers is that they usually don't have prints ready for a week, perhaps even longer, unless a premium fee is paid. Unfortunately, the news value of a picture lessens with the passage of each day.

The buddy-snapped photo, rushed to the corner drug store, can be back in your hands in 24 to 36 hours. This is not enough time loss to kill the news value of the picture. Even so, the photo may still be rejected.

Usually the reason for rejection is the matter of a photo lacking contrast, being out of focus, or being taken from too great a distance.

If you have a buddy take the picture, keep the following points in mind:

1. Have him move in close so that you and your trophy fill the view finder on the camera. Too much background and extraneous scenery only detract.
2. Have him focus the camera sharply. If the camera is a fixed-focus model, step off a distance of about nine or 10 feet and you will be in reasonably good focus.
3. Avoid cluttered backgrounds. Preferably use a cloudy sky or water.
4. Trophy catches and kills usually come once in a lifetime. Treat the occasion as such by keeping in mind that film is inexpensive. To be sure, shoot up the whole roll of film at different exposures. Better still, make it two rolls . . . at different distances, with different exposures (both lens openings and shutter speeds).
5. When you take the picture to the newspaper office, take the negatives, too. A good newspaper photographer often can do some "doctoring" in the darkroom and come up with a print that's excellent for publication.
