Barbecue Ideas

Summertime is barbecue time! Everyone knows that, but did you know that Haitians used to sleep on their "barbecues!"

The word as we know it seems to have its origin in a Haitian term, "barbocoq," from the Spanish meaning "a rude framework of sticks set on posts... whether for cooking or sleeping."

Another origin possibility might be from the French "barbe-aguue," meaning "from snout to tail", this term referring to a whole animal roasted or broiled in its entirety for a feast, or the feast at which such meat is served.

No matter where it came from the institution of the American barbecue has become a tradition. Whether it was the Indians who propped a carcass upon a stick platform and roasted it, or a family who tantalizes the neighborhood with the smells of barbecued burgers, the outdoor cooking method does something to the flavor of anything prepared in this way.

In recent years, the outdoor preparation of meals has become increasingly popular, and the principle of the elegant barbecue feast has been simplified to fit the smallest suburban yard. The home barbecue varies from a hooded or open portable grill to an elaborately constructed fireplace with ovens and flues.

And whichever method you prefer, the array of meat available for outdoor cooking goes beyond steaks and hamburgers to include chicken, turkey, chops, kabobs, sausage products, rotisserie roasts, and frankfurters, plus any other high quality meat that is satisfactory for dry-heat cookery.

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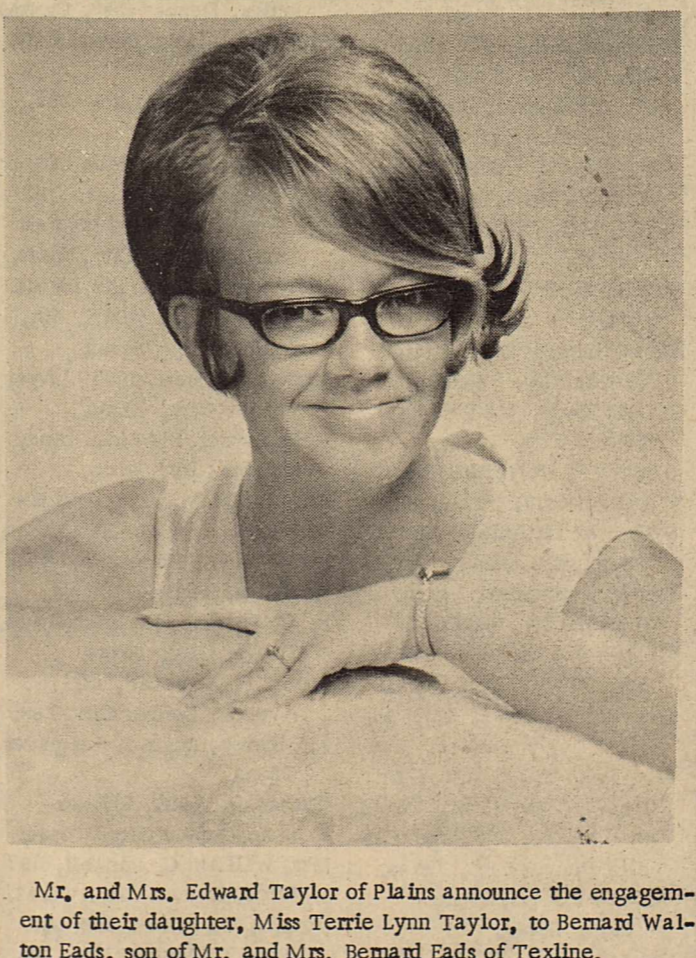
