Farmers Given Alternatives For Storm Damaged Cotton

A large storm accompanied by heavy washing rains and hail hit portions of Yoakum County causing heavy damage to cotton this past week.

County Extension Agent David Kight says farmers are now faced with a tough decision on whether to replant cotton or shift to an alternate crop.

"In some cases, farmers still have time to replant to cotton if they use faster maturing varieties and cultural practices that encourage earliness," he believes. "In some areas, however, growers are already looking for alternative crops."

Among alternative crops, farmers might consider for replanting are grain or forage sorghum, soybeans and sunflowers.

Cotton producers who incorporated Treflan or similar preplant herbicides have generally eliminated the possibility of growing sorghum on that land this year. Even if they used a pre-emerge herbicide, Kight says, they would be running a risk to plant sorghum. The surface-applied chemicals can be leached into the soil by rainfall, though the depth of penetration varies with the type of herbicide and texture of soil and amount of rain.

To circumvent the problem on the heavier textured soils, a buster planter set to display the top four to five inches of soil can establish a seed furrow in herbicide-free soil, the Extension agent recommended.

Hybrid selection is also an important consideration. Medium-late maturing hybrids can still be planted throughout the area. However, the early maturing hybrids are usually a better choice for the dryland areas south of Lubbock.

Producers are cautioned that late sorghum plantings will be susceptible to midge damage, they should be prepared to check for damaging infestations and to apply insecticides if needed.

Sunflower also constitutes a good alternative crop, Kight suggested.

Federal Law To Be Explained

Darrell Krener of the U.S. Department of Labor will meet with interested persons at 8 p.m. Tuesday, June 25 in the Plains cafeteria.

Sponsored by Yoakum County Farm Bureau, the meeting has been set to acquaint persons with the federal law which requires employers, agricultural associations, farm labor contractors and their employees to observe certain labor standards when employing migrant and/or seasonal farm-workers.

Some contracts are being offered at this time.

This crop is tolerant of the "yellow herbicide" and can be planted as late as 100 days prior to the first normal frost date and still mature a seed crop. June plantings have a yield potential of approximately 500 to 1,500 pounds per acre, depending on soil type, growing conditions, fertility and moisture availability. A publication outlining planting rates and other cultural practices may be obtained at the county Extension agent's office.

Kight noted that soybeans are frequently used as a replacement for hail-damaged cotton in irrigated areas. This crop is also tolerant to the preplant incorporated cotton herbicides and can be planted over a wide range of dates.

Pointing to results of a four-year study conducted by researchers at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research Center at Lubbock, he says that good yields may be obtained from late June to early July plantings.

"Since soybeans are sensitive to day length," he adds, "late plantings result in short stalk growth of all varieties and the combines miss a good portion of lowest seed pods. This problem can be partially circumvented by the use of varieties that fall into the late Group IV and Group V maturity groups.

Cultural practices which encourage stalk growth in late plan-

Toll Service Change Noted

Romain Telephone Company announces long distance dialing changes to be effective June 20, 1985.

After implementation, Zero-plus (0+) dialing will be available. Zero-plus (0+) dialing will enable you to dial a credit card or other operator handled call with increased speed and efficiency. The dialing format will be -- Dial 0 + Area Code (if other than 806) + telephone number. The operator will come on the line and ask for the necessary information to complete your call.

In order to make the necessary change and provide the new service the Toll Identification equipment was replaced. This replacement has eliminated the requirement for Circle Digit dialing on long distance calls. It will only be necessary to dial 1 + Area Code (if number to be reached is not in the 806 area) + the telephone number. tings include higher seeding rates (65 to 70 pounds of good quality seed per acre), planting a single row per bed and early irrigation.

"It is especially important to avoid periods of moisture stress in late planted beans," he emphasized.

"Selecting an alternate crop is always an unpleasant chore," Kight observes. "Fortunately, there are crops such as grain sorghum, sunflower and soybeans which can be planted relatively late in the season to partially compensate for the loss of the primary crop."



1 c sugar
1 c flour

The Lucas Oil well at Spindletop, Texas ran wild for nine days when it began operating in 1901.



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


Single, Robert was born in Pear-sall and attended school in Lorenzo. His hobbies are hunting, fishing, traveling and visiting with his parents and friends.

From The Superintendent's Desk

Some of my friends ask the question "Andrews, what do you do at school during the summer since there are no kids?" My response is that we, just as farmers, plant a crop and wait until harvest.

The summer is, administratively speaking, one of the busiest times of the year. We look at summer work in three areas: transportation, maintenance, and administration; and within the administration area we look at finance, personnel, and curriculum. During the next six weeks, I will be addressing each of these areas to better inform you of school operations.

This week I will talk about transportation. The average person thinks only of buses and transporting students to school. Our school has twenty-six vehicles, three tractors and two riding lawnmowers. Of the twenty-six vehicles thirteen are buses, three are vans, seven pickups, two cars and one dump truck.

We have a fourteen point check system with which to inspect all vehicles each summer to make sure that they are mechanically safe for a new school year. Robert Rios is responsible for this area and does a very good job.

We travelled a total of 171,726 miles with our vehicles this past year, with 49,991 of those miles being for extra-curricular activities. The actual cost per mile travelled is \$1.198. We purchased 25,908 gallons of gasoline during the 1984-85 school year. We operate four bus routes daily and transport approximately 150 of the 500 students enrolled in Plains schools.

So as part of our summer duties in the transportation department, each vehicle will receive the annual inspection of brakes, tires, electrical system, plugs, points, seat repair, and many other minor checks too numerous to mention.

I hope this information has been of interest. I will continue to address the summer duties and responsibilities in each area mentioned. We feel you, as members of our community, are interested in your school and so we will continue to report on school matters and activities as appropriate.
