

The Cowgirls advanced to the finals with a 15-0, 15-12 victory over the Latexo Tigers. They recorded twenty-seven kills in the semi-final match. Individual statistics include: Lydia Jimenez, four kills, one ace; Marsha Farnham, three kills, two blocks; Karen Cobb, seven kills, one ace; Lynda Jimenez, six kills, one ace; Heather McGill, four kills, one ace; and Melissa Welch, three kills, one ace. Leading servers were Melissa Welch and Heather McGill with nine and seven service points, respectively.

Plains held a 10-8 lead in the first game of the championship match against Bronte but the Longhorns came back with five consecutive points for 13-10. A Bronte net violation forced a side out and the Cowgirls put one more point on the scoreboard before Bronte won the first game, 15-11.

Holding Bronte to only two points, the Cowgirls won the second game to tie the match up at one game each. After the three minute time out between games Bronte regained their momentum. They came back strong to take the match by winning the third game 15-4. The

Cowgirls ended their 1987 season with 23 wins and 10 losses. Individual statistics in the championship match were: Marsha Farnham, three kills, four blocks; Heather McGill, one kill, one ace; Karen Cobb, four kills, one ace; Lydia Jimenez, two kills, two aces; Bertha Gonzales, one ace; Melissa Welch, two kills; and Lynda Jimenez, three kills, two aces. Heather McGill recorded seven service points followed by Melissa Welch and Lydia Jimenez with six points each.

Cowgirls' Melissa Welch, Lynda Jimenez and Lydia Jimenez were selected to the Class A All State Tournament team preceding the presentations of team medals and trophies.

Commissioners Court

Yoakum County Commissioners Court met in special session Nov. 16 with all members present.

Approval was given for the transfer of funds for the payment of accrued interest on time warrants.

Dr. Black, director of South Plains Health Department, discussed need for an additional health nurse for Yoakum and Gaines Counties. He estimated Yoakum County's portion to approximately include salary of \$720 per month; travel, \$145; hospital insurance, \$45; supplies, \$50; for a total of \$910 monthly or approximately \$10,920 annually. The matter was tabled to allow Dr. Black to contact Plains Independent School for help in supplying part of needed funds.

Miscellaneous bills and extra hire were approved for payment.







Cowboys Reach Quarter-Finals, Will Play Wheeler

The battle of the Cowboys took place at Andrews Mustang Bowl Friday night. The Plains Cowboys took on the Grandfalls-Royalty Cowboys in a Bi-District shoot-out with the Plains Cowboys coming

out on top 42-8.

Grandfalls opened the game kicking off to Plains. Plains failed to make a first down and was forced to punt. Grandfalls started from their 45 yard line. On first down, Brian Francisco was caught behind the line for a loss by Blake McWhirter. Raul Dominguez was then stopped behind the line of scrimmage by Doug Green who also caused him to fumble the ball. However, Grandfalls recovered the fumble. Unable to make a first down Grandfalls punts the ball.

Plains started the drive on their own nine yard line. Plains moved the ball well with two runs by Michael Diaz of five and ten yards; one run by McWhirter, one pass to Scott Lowrey of seven yards and one pass to Green of 13 yards. A penalty caused the drive to stall and

Plains punted.

Grandfalls took the ball over on their 24 yard line. On third down they throw a pass that was tipped and intercepted by Alex Barrientes. On the first play Diaz took the ball to the Grandfalls 38. Then he ran 23 yards to the 15 yard line. Green then took a pass from Shane McMinn 15 yards for the first Plains touchdown. The PAT by McMinn was good.

The Plains defense, doing an excellent job, did not allow Grandfalls

a first down.

Plains took the ball on their own 37 yard line. Plains moved to the Grandfalls 21 yard line, but, then had to turn the ball over on downs.

Grandfalls took over. Four plays later Grandfalls fumbled the ball on a bad handoff and Lowrey recovered for Plains on the 43 yard

Diaz ran for eight yards. McMinn passed to Lowrey for ten yards. McWhirter then scored from 20 yards out. The PAT by McMinn was good. The score stood at 14-0.

Grandfalls fumbled to Plains on the second play after the kickoff. Chad Guetersloh recovered for Plains on the Grandfalls 30 yard line. Five plays later on the five yard line Grandfalls intercepted a

McMinn pass. Grandfalls made good on an offsides call against Plains. When the flags flew Plains defense relaxed and Grandfalls Pete Cahill took advantage of Plains momentary confusion to run 80 yards for their only touchdown of the night. After another off-sides call on Plains gave Grandfalls half the distance to the goal, the two point conversion by Joe Rodriguez was good.

Each team had two more possessions before the first half ended at

Plains defense came out the second half ready to play. McWhirter stopped the runner for no gain. Then McMinn and Kevin Lowrey met Pete Cahill as he tried to turn the corner and stopped him for no gain. Grandfalls punts.

Plains took over on its 43 yard line. McWhirter on a good run got to the Grandfalls 44 yard line. Two runs by Barrientes and one by Diaz gain nine yards. A quarterback sneak by McMinn on fourth down made enough for the first down. McMinn then passed to Jeff Ashburn for 23 yards. A nine yard pass from McMinn to Lowrey scored. The two point conversion pass from McMinn to Ashburn was

Plains defense held Grandfalls to two plays for no gain, then Diaz recovered a fumbled pitch-out on the 32 yard line. A ten yard holding penalty moved Plains to the 42. Then Grandfalls intercepted a McMinn pass. Four plays later Chad Wall caused a fumble and McWhirter recovered. On the first play McWhirter ran the ball in from 16 yards out for a touchdown. The PAT by McMinn was good.

Plains defense continued to play an awesome game stopping Grandfalls for big losses the next series of





Plains, after a penalty on Grandfalls, started on Grandfalls 27 yard line. McWhirter ran eight yards. Going into the fourth quarter, Diaz carried twice, the last a 12 yard scoring play. The PAT by McMinn was good. The score stood at 36-8.

Grandfalls had a good series but are unable to overcome an unsportsmanship-like conduct call of 15 yards. Plains took the ball on their 47 yard line. Diaz carried to the 48 and McWhirter ran 16 yards to the 32. Diaz scored, but it was called back on a holding call. Barrientes ran 25 yards to the 17 yard line for a first down. 

PROCLAMATION BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA In The Year Of Our Lord, 1789

-Proclamation of Thanksgiving-

"Whereas it is the duty of all nations to acknowledge the providence of Almighty God, to obey His will, to be grateful for His benefits, and humbly to implore His protection and favor-and Whereas both Houses of Congress have by their joint committee requested me to recommend to the people of the United State a day of public thanksgiving and prayer, to be observed by acknowledging with grateful hearts the many signal favors of Almighty God, especially a form of government for their safety and

"Now, therefore, I do recommend and assign Thursday, the 26th day of November next, to be devoted by the people of these states to the service of that great and glorious Being who is the beneficent Author of all the good that was, that is or that will be-- that we may then all unite in rendering unto Him our sincere and humble thanks-- for His kind care and protection of the people of this country previous to their becoming a nation -- for the signal and manifold mercies and the favorable interposition of His providence, which we experienced in the course and conclusion of the late war -- for the great degree of tranquility, union, and plenty, which we have enjoyed--for the peaceable and rational manner in which we have been enabled to establish constitutions of government for our safety and happiness, and particularly the national one not lately instituted-for the civil and religious liberty with which we are blessed and the means we have of acquiring and diffusing useful knowledge, and in general for all the great and various favors which He hath been pleased to confer upon us.

"And also that we may then unite in most humbly offering our prayers and supplications to the great Lord and Ruler of nations, and beseech Him to pardon our national and other transgressions—to enable us all, whether in public or private stations, to perform our several and relative duties properly and punctually—to render our national Government a blessing to all people by constantly being a government of wise, just, and constitutional laws, discreetly and faithfully executed and obeyed—to protect and guide all sovereigns and nations (especially such as have shown kindnesses to us) and to bless them with good government, peace and concord. To promote the knowledge and practice of true religion and virtue, and the increase of science among them and us—and generally to grant unto all mankind suck a degree of temporal prosperity as He alone knows to be best. "Given under my hand at the City of New York the third day of October in the year of our Lord 1789."
