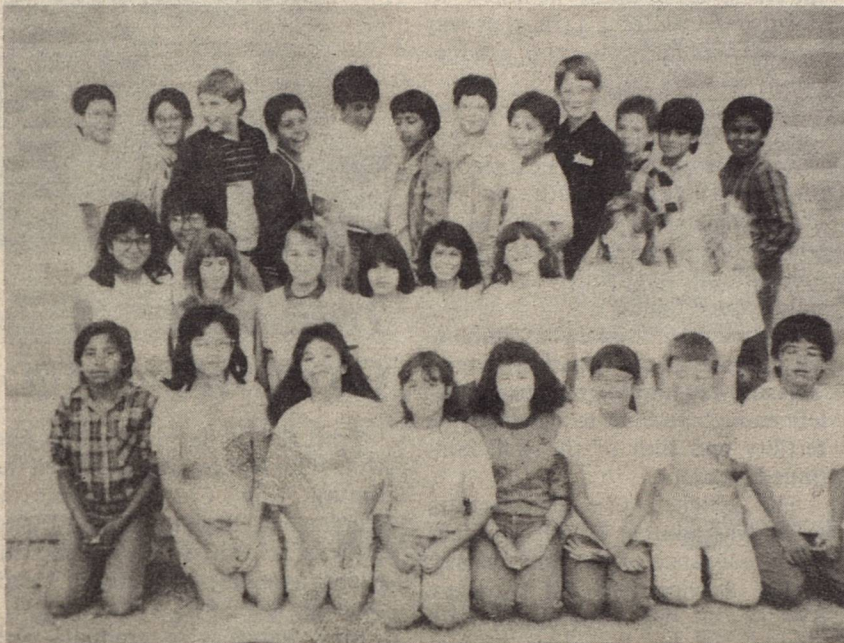

Brad Palmer, 'Farmer Of The Year'

Yoakum Soil and Water Conservation District awarded its Conservation Farmer of the Year Award to Brad Palmer in ceremonies April 21. L.J. Sanders of the Yoakum SWCD Board announced the honor at the annual awards program sponsored by the Yoakum SWCD and the Plains Lions Club.

A plaque was presented to Palmer in recognition of his outstanding accomplishments in conserving soil and water.

Son of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Palmer, the honoree was born and raised in Yoakum County. He graduated from Plains High School in 1977. After graduation he met and married his wife, Charlotte. They have two children, Anne, six and Bradley, three.

"Palmer struck out on his own in the farming business in 1984. In starting, he rented a farm that was eroded and had low crop production," Sanders noted.

He began trying to improve the farm by smoothing the areas that wind had damaged. The next step he took was to stabilize the soil by modifying its texture. This was accomplished by using a disk plow to mix subsoil clay with the surface sand, stated Sanders.

With the soil somewhat stabilized, he installed an irrigation system. This allowed him to grow crops that left enough residue to improve the fertility and tilth of the soil, continued Sanders.

The efficient use of irrigation water was another concern he felt. With assistance of the Soil Conservation Service and the Yoakum SWCD, he ran a complete field analysis of his irrigation system. Armed with the knowledge this gave him, he then was able to adjust his irrigation system to achieve the efficient water application he desired.

"The farm that was once unproductive and eroded is now a picture of excellence," reports Sanders. "This is an example of what can be done when conservation and improvement have high priority in a farming operation."

From The Superintendent's Desk

Our students in grades three, five, and nine have taken the Texas Assessment of Basic Skills test and the results are now in our school.

The 66th Legislature (1979) passed Senate Bill 350 which amended Section 16.176 of the Texas Education Code to provide compensatory instructional services for educationally disadvantaged children. The Texas Education Agency was directed to adopt and administer appropriate criterion-referenced assessment instruments designed to assess basic skills in mathematics, reading, and writing, for all students in Grades 3, 5, and 9. House Bill 723, passed by the 68th Legislature in 1983, further required that students who fail to demonstrate mastery of the exit level competencies in the 9th grade "shall retake the assessment instrument each year the assessment instrument is administered." Students with a physical or mental impairment or a learning disability may be exempt from taking the tests.

To carry out the law, committees of Texas Educators, including teachers, principals, curriculum specialists, education service center staff members, and university professors were convened in Austin to work with the Texas Education Agency in reviewing and refining previously developed essential objectives and measurement specifications for reading and mathematics. A committee of Texas Education Agency and school district specialists from across the state was formed to identify essential objectives for writing and to develop appropriate measurement specifications. Criterion-referenced tests for Grade 5 and exit level were completed in the Fall of 1979 and the first annual cycle of assessment testing was conducted in February and March of 1980. Criterion-referenced tests for Grade 3 were completed in 1980 and administered for the first time in 1981. The ninth assessment cycle was conducted in February 1988.

We invite parents of students in Grades 3, 5, and 9 to contact the student's principal, or Mr. Alexander, to discuss their child's test score. Our overall test scores are the best ever for our school and we congratulate each student for their accomplishments.

Oath of office was administered Monday evening to Melvin Lowrey, place one; Ty Earl Powell, place two and Edwin Livengood, place three. Superintendent Dean Andrews presided over the swearing in of the new board members.

Reorganized for the 1988-89 school year, the board elected Lowrey, president; Jack Palmer, vice president; and Eddie Earnest, secretary.

The board approved payment to election officials with Helen Worsham, judge, receiving \$85 and clerks Diane Grey, Gracie Lazos and Shirley Barnes, \$70 each.

Ray Lanier and Eli Douglas presented information to the board concerning the WICAT computer system. The board requested that a presentation be made of the company's total curriculum computer. No action was taken.

Roofing recommendations were presented to the board by Frank Brooks. Andrews was authorized to begin bidding procedures on roof

replacement as per Brooks' recommendation. Andrews presented information concerning the removal of asbestos from school buildings and was given authorization to begin procedures for bids to remove asbestos from the elementary school.

The board also voted to adopt stricter performance guidelines as criteria for Career Ladder Placement for 1987-88. Larry McMinn was employed as summer driver education instructor and driver education fees were set at classroom and driving, \$90 per student; driving only, \$70 per student.

April bills were approved for payment. Superintendent Andrews presented financial reports for general operations, cafeteria, tax and transportation.

Resignations of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Parks were accepted effective at the end of their 1987-88 contracts.

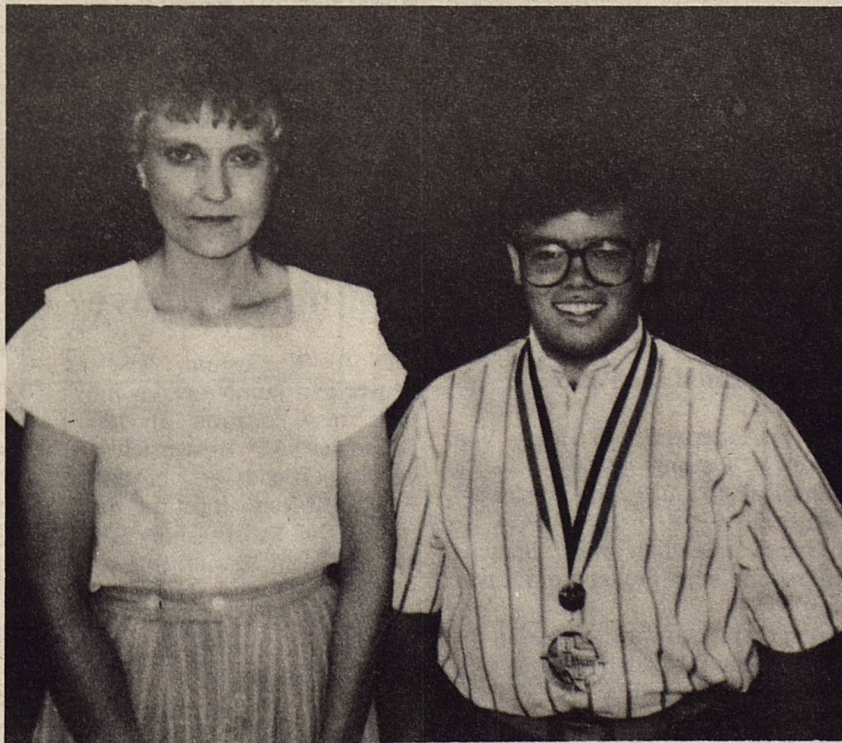

Yoakum County Commissioners Court met Monday in regular session. All members were present.

Extra hire and disbursements were approved including hospital bills totaling \$68,572.70.

A motion was approved to advertise for bids to purchase one large farm-type tractor for precinct two with bids to be received by May 31. Also approved was a motion to advertise for bids for the purchase of a four-wheel drive loader with trade-in of one John Deere wheel loader and a smooth drum vibrator roller with rubber-tired tractor in trade. review May 27 and acted upon May 31.

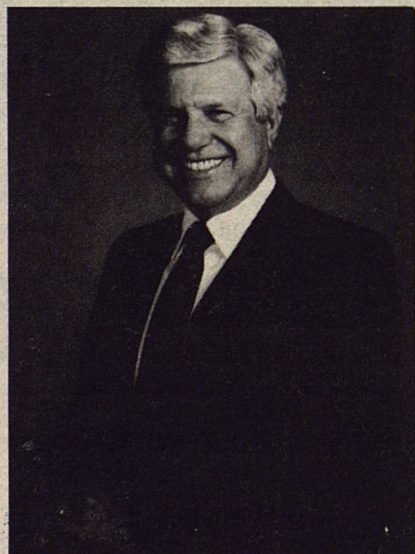

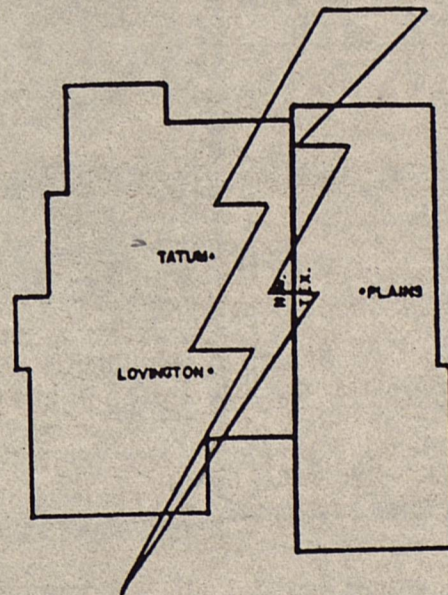
