# John W. Odam Visits County

John W. Odam, possible candidate for Attorney General of Texas visited Yoakum County Courthouse at 2 p.m. Friday, Aug. 5. He is the former Executive Assistant Attorney General of Texas and Special Legislative Counsel to Governor Mark White, and former Chair of the Harris County Democratic Party. Following a coffee reception, Mr. Odam was given a tour of the courthouse.

Born in Abilene in 1943, Odam is a sixth generation Texan. He is a graduate of Abilene High School, the University of Texas and received a B.B.A. in personnel management.

He is married to the former Peggy Kurtz, a native of Houston and Pasadena.

In February, 1966, Odam entered the United States Army graduating from Armor Officer Candidate School at Fort Knox, Kentucky. Throughout his tour of duty, he served as an instructor at the Armor School. Returning to Texas, John entered Baylor University School of Law and Peggy began teaching in Waco area public schools.

Odam was associated with a Houston law firm before opening his own private practice. In 1973, he became Special Assistant to then-Attorney General, John L. Hill. Serving in the Attorney General's Office for three years, Odam also held the position of Chief of the Insurance, Banking and Securities Division and ultimately, Executive Assistant Attorney General.

In 1976, Odam joined the law firm of Fulbright & Jaworski in Houston. In 1980, he began his present association with the law firm of Helm, Pletcher, Hogan, Bowen and Saunders.

In 1982, he was elected Chair of the Harris County Democrat Party and served in that position for two



# From The Superintendent's Desk



It is just three weeks until school begins and you as parents are probably looking forward to a semi-vacation from noon meal preparation as students return to school and to eating in our cafeteria. We have eight ladies who work in the school cafeteria. They are: Willie Jones, Marie Tidwell, Manuela Martinez, Elouise StRomain, Pat Curtis, Ruby Bilbrey, Felicita Huerta and Helen Perkins. These ladies realize the challenge they face for the 1988-89 school year.

Their challenge is in preparing 76,146 lunches, and 25,050 breakfasts that are appealing and nutritious. They will prepare 150,000 rolls, 76,000 desserts, main dishes and vegetables, plus they will smile and try to give each person served the feeling that this particular meal was prepared especially for him/her.

Our record keeping for the cafeteria operation is very comprehensive. We keep a daily inventory and cost analysis for each meal served. Our cost per lunch this past year was \$1.66, and cost per breakfast was 63 cents. Our school board has elected to continue to serve meals to students at no cost to the student. All employees are eligible to eat in the cafeteria at a cost of \$2.00 per meal. The cost of operating the school cafeteria this past year was \$149,643.17. This is pretty big business in the total operations of our school. I guarantee that we have the best staff and meals of any school - and that is fact. We are very proud of our cafeteria people.
