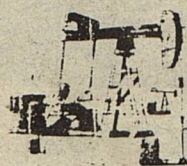

Administrative Personnel Receive Extended Contracts

Plains school board met in regular session Monday, Feb. 13 with members, Melvin Lowrey, Jack Palmer, Stanley Ashburn, Eddie Earnest, Edwin Livengood, Ty Earl Powell and Jack Spears present.

Board entered into executive session to meet with Mr. and Mrs. Joe Martinez Jr. and Joe Martinez III concerning student grievance.

Returning to open session, the board approved the minutes of the last meeting, approved the school calendar for 1989-90, and adopted the resolution declaring intent to join and participate in the T.A.S.B.O. Interlocal Government Purchasing Cooperative.

The board also adopted a resolution commending the UIL for past, present and future efforts and pursuit of excellence in educational competition, and opposing legislation that would transfer funds from the voluntary-member public school organization into the State Treasury.

Accounts for January were approved for payment.

Business manager's report was given by Wanda Ashburn. Larry Devitt presented a transportation cost report, a review of various projects and a comparison of utility costs from January 1985 through January 1989. Principals reported on attendance and enrollment and activities.

The counselor's report concerning

financial aid, was reviewed by the board.

Supt. Dean Andrews presented information concerning future board meetings, enrollment comparisons, 1989 track and tennis schedules and the 1989 annual TASB workshop information.

Board members again entered into executive session to discuss administrative personnel. Upon opening the session, the board extended contracts for Wanda Ashburn, Larry Devitt, J.B. Wilson, Jim Conner, John Nance and Arlon Alexander.

Yoakum County Stock Show Awards To Be Presented

Yoakum County's 37th Annual Junior Livestock Show got underway here Thursday, Feb. 16 and will end Saturday, Feb. 18.

Saturday morning's activities begin with the Parade of Champion and Reserve Champion in the three categories. The Buyers' Lunch will be held at the school cafeteria from 11:30 a.m. until 12:30 p.m.

Presentation of Queen Awards will start the afternoon events at 12:15 p.m., followed by Cowpatty Bingo and the presentation of awards to exhibitors.

Trophies, donated by Eddie's Cowboy Store of Levelland, will be presented for Grand Champion Steer, Lamb and Barrow and Reserve Grand Champion Steer, Lamb and Barrow. The firm also donates the trophy for the weight gain contest.

The Rusty McGinty Award is the "Grand Champion" showmanship award. The highly coveted award is given annual in honor of Rusty McGinty by his immediate family. To be eligible, a member must own at least one of the animals. He will be judged by the three superintendents, a young farmer and another individual by choice of the three superintendents. Participants will be selected on the basis of showmanship, sportsmanship, neatness of individual, grooming of animals, appearance of animal quarters and cooperative attitude.

Senior showmanship awards are provided by Wilma Powell in the steer show, Gary Jones family in the lamb show, Yoakum County Farm Bureau in

the swine show and Danny Sellers in the heifer show.

Junior showmanship awards are provided in the steer division by Kenneth McGinty, lamb division, Donald Bales and swine division, Mike Blount and N.C. Clanahan.

Days events end with the premium sale of animals.

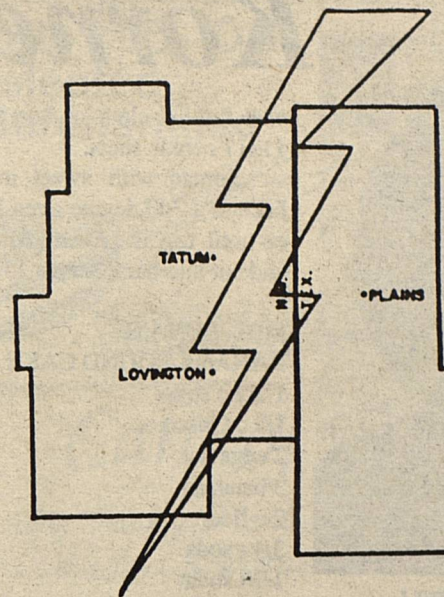

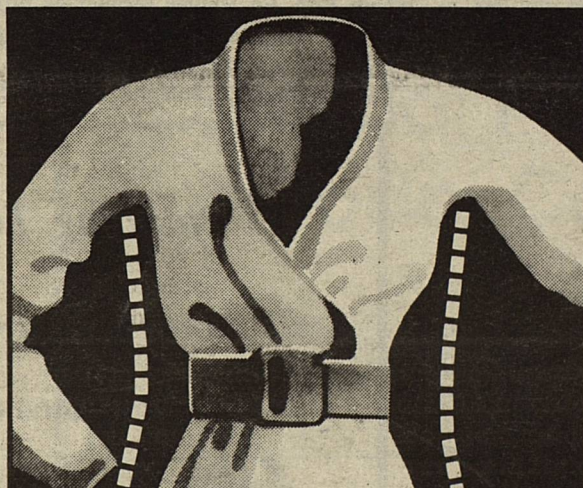

FRUIT PASTRIES

- 1 c flaked coconut
- 18 oz jar of peach or apricot preserves
- 1 c chopped pecans
- 1 8-oz box chopped dates
- 2/3 c softened butter or margarine
- 1 c commercial sour cream
- 1/2 t salt
- 2 c all-purpose flour

Combine coconut, preserves, pecans and dates and heat 5 minns. in microwave or until all ingredients are well-heated. Set aside.

Cream butter of margarine; add sour cream and salt, mixing well. Gradually stir in flour. (Dough will be soft.) Roll to 1/8 inch thickness of

well-floured cloth or board. Place on 11x17 cookie sheet.

Spread with sweet mixture and bake in a 350 degree oven for 30 mins or until top is brown. Allow to cool and cut into bars. Serves 15.

MRS. LUNA'S BANANA POUND CAKE

- 1 1/2 c sugar
- 1/2 c Crisco
- 2 eggs
- 3 bananas
- 2 c flour
- 3/4 t soda
- 1/2 t soda
- 1/2 t salt
- 1 t vanilla
- 1 c pecans

Bake 1 hour and 20 mins at 325 degrees. Grease pan with Crisco, then flour lightly. If cake falls, a little more flour is needed.

UPSIDE DOWN POPOVER PIZZA

- 1/2 lb ground beef
- 5 oz bulk pork sausage
- 1/2 c chopped onion
- 1 can (15 oz) tomato sauce
- 1/4 c chopped green pepper
- 2 T flour
- 1/2 t dried basil leaves
- 1/4 t dried marjoram leaves
- 8 oz Mozzarella cheese, thinly sliced
- 2 eggs
- 1 c milk
- 1 T vegetable oil
- 1 c flour
- 2 t baking powder
- 1/2 t salt
- 1/4 c Parmesan cheese, grated

Cook and stir beef, sausage and onion in 10 inch skillet until sausage and beef are brown and onion is tender; drain. Stir in tomato sauce, green pepper, flour, basil and marjoram. Heat to boiling; boil and stir one minute. Pour into ungreased rectangular pan, 13x9x2. Arrange Mozzarella cheese slices on top. Beat eggs, milk, oil, flour, baking powder and salt with mixer until smooth. Pour over cheese slices. Sprinkle with Parmesan cheese. Bake at 425 degrees until puffy and golden brown (25 to 30 mins). Serves 6.

Conducting the training was Wilma Manning, program director for the rural counties.




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

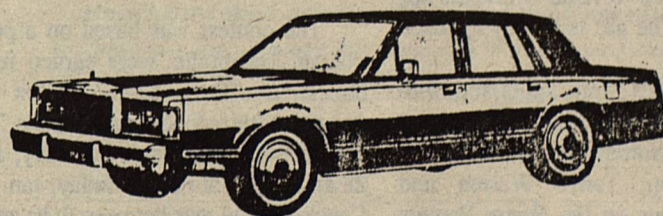
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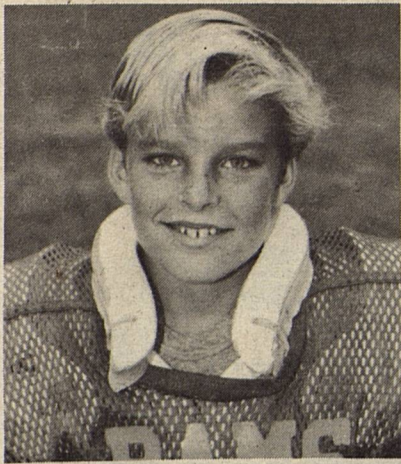

'Introductory Get-Together' To Explain Foster Parenting

Yoakum County Child Welfare Board conducted a regularly scheduled meeting Jan. 17 in the Plains Club Room. Members attending included Carolyn Chambliss, Jenny Coston, Leslie Floyd, Tanya Warren and Mavis Sessions all from Denver City and Peggy Squyres, Debbie Rushing, Janie Crawford, Beth Clanahan and Candi Seaton all from Plains. Guest speaker was Bea Gonzales, foster home unit case worker for this area.

Jim Long donated \$500 to the board. The money was made on a team quail hunt he organized in December. Debbie Rushing presented the board with a 35mm camera to be used by Children's Protective Services office in order to have clearer, sharper pictures of the children's abuse evidence.

The board discussed two possible projects for this year and agreed to investigate starting a local clothes closet for the needy.

Yoakum County Farm Bureau donated a car seat to the Child Welfare Board, with presentation being made by Lanny Smith, president of the organization's board of directors. The case worker uses the car seat when transporting children to visits or doctors appointments. The gift is greatly appreciated.

Committees were appointed with Peggy Squyres and Mavis Sessions on the Public Awareness committee and Jenny Coston, Tanya Warren and Mavis Sessions on the Foster Parents committee, Special Projects committee members are Debbie Rushing and Janie Crawford.

Bea Gonzales, guest speaker, informed the group that the County was in desperate need of foster parents. Fifteen hours of training is required to become foster parents. This is usually in three hour session, one night each week for a period of five weeks. But it is possible to get the training in two all-day sessions, if preferred. Foster parents have a choice of age and race of the child or children they take into their homes. Homes for teenagers and sibling groups are especially needed as are homes for minorities.

With the assistance of Ms. Gonzales, the board planned an introductory get-together for anyone who is interested in more information on foster homes, long term or emergency homes, who keep children less than 30 days. Children are usually housed in emergency foster homes just long enough for other arrangements to be made.

The meeting is scheduled Feb. 28 in Yoakum County Park Party House at 7 p.m. More details will be provided in the paper and posters in local businesses.

Newell Squyres In Hunting Contest

Newell Squyres participated in a Varmint Hunting Contest sponsored by the Gun Shak in Lubbock. He and his partner, Roy Norris of Lubbock, split a second and third place with another team who had the same number of points. Their team also tied with another team for the heaviest coyote brought in, weighing 35 pounds.

The contest was based on a point system. Ten points were earned for a bobcat, five for a coyote or fox and one point for raccoons and skunks. The contest started at noon Saturday, Jan. 28 and ended at noon Sunday, Jan. 29. Check-in time was between 2:30 and 3 p.m. Sunday afternoon on the parking lot of the store at 82nd and Quaker.

First place winners of \$500 were from Garza County. They bagged 28 coyotes, five bobcats and two raccoons.

Squyres and Norris bagged 11 coyotes during the contest period, which called for two-man teams only and every animal had to be shot, not trapped or hunted with dogs. Twenty-three teams entered the contest, the first of its kind. Plans are already being made for another contest earlier next year and possibly one more this season.
