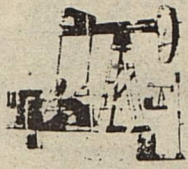

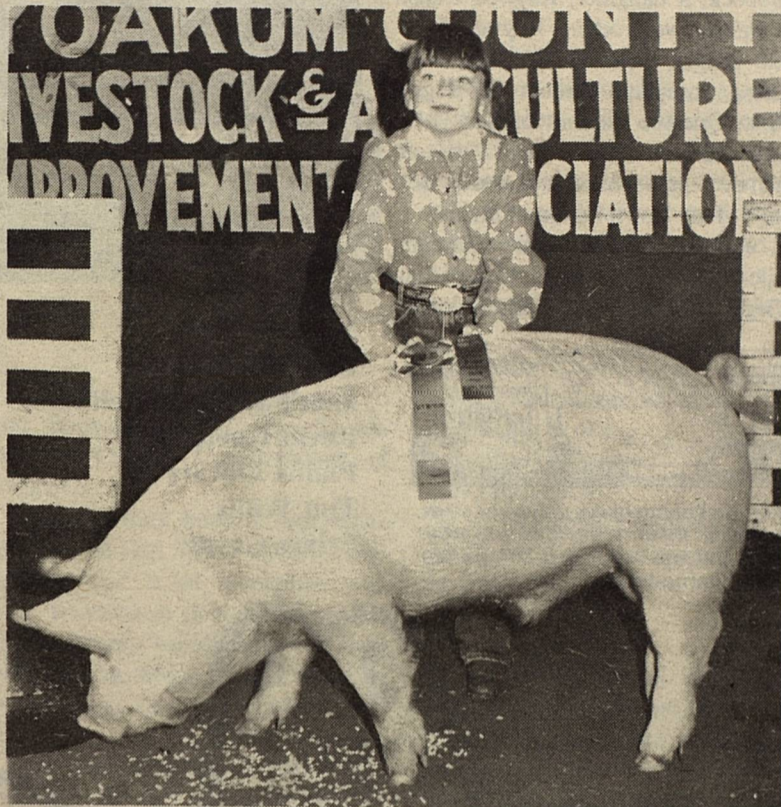

The Plains High School math and science team traveled to Levelland to compete in the South Plains College practice meet Saturday, Feb. 25.

In the Calculator Applications contest, Justin Stowe and David Alexander tied for seventh place in the freshman division. Layne Morrow placed first in the sophomore division and Lance Morrow placed first and Nieves Garcia placed third in the junior division. In the senior division, Chad Guetersloh placed first and Jesse Ramirez was seventh. The team is coached by Eric Banfield.

In the Number Sense contest, coached by Richie Cullins, Lacy McAdams placed ninth in freshman division; Layne Morrow, first and Doug Shelly, third in sophomore division; Lance Morrow, first and Nieves Garcia, third in the junior division; and

Chad Guetersloh, third in senior division.

In the Science contest, Layne Morrow placed ninth in sophomore division; Lance Morrow, fifth and Chad Hudson, ninth in junior division; and Chad Guetersloh, second, Brian Livengood, fourth, John Harris, sixth, and Lebert Powell, ninth in the senior division. Coach is Macky McWhirter.

Funeral services for Ottie Morehouse, 75, were held Thursday, March 2 at 2 p.m. in First Baptist Church with the Rev. Ken Horn, officiating. He was assisted by the Rev. J.L. Bass of Calvary Baptist Church of Brownfield.

Eastern Star graveside rites were conducted by members of Chapter #862 following the services.

Burial was in Terry County Memorial Cemetery under direction of Brownfield Funeral Home.

Mrs. Morehouse died Tuesday, Feb. 28 at 4:20 a.m. in Lubbock's Methodist Hospital after an illness, following an automobile accident in January.

Born March 29, 1913 in Brownfield, she grew up there and married Earl McCutcheon Aug. 18, 1928. He died Nov. 12, 1960 in Terry County.

Mrs. Morehouse served as head cook for the Treadaway-Daniell Hospital from 1949 until 1960 and later worked for Brownfield Nursing Home from its opening until 1965. She worked for the Plains school cafeteria and was a member of the Order of Eastern Star, Plains Dirt Gardeners, Plains 42 Club, and the GFWC Tsa Ma Ga Club. She was also a member of First Baptist Church.

She married Glenn Morehouse in Dumas July 6, 1965. They moved to Plains in 1966. He died Jan. 15, 1989.

Survivors include a daughter, Billie Grace Prestridge of Grand Prairie; two sons, Edward McCutcheon of San Angelo and Earlon McCutcheon of

Kitchen Korner

Recipes are shared this week by Jo Ann Barron, wife of Jim Barron, Yoakum County Commissioner of Precinct 3.

OAT BRAN MUFFINS
Mix together and set aside:
1 1/2 c oat bran
1/2 c whole wheat flour
2 t baking powder
1/2 t salt
1 T cinnamon

Mix together:
1/4 c skim milk
1 egg
2 T sunflower oil
1/2 c apple juice
1/2 c honey

Combine both mixtures and add:
1 c peeled chopped apples
1/2 c raisins
1/4 to 1/2 c chopped pecans (optional)

Pour into greased muffin tins and bake at 400 degrees until done.

LORD CHARLEY'S CORN CHOWDER
1/2 c chopped onion
1/2 c chopped celery
1/4 c chopped green peppers
1/3 c chopped bacon
1 1/4 qts chicken stock

1 t salt
1/4 t pepper, white ground
1/2 t thyme
1 lb potatoes (4 c)
15 oz frozen cut corn
2 oz butter
2 T flour
1 qt half and half milk
Brown onion, celery, green peppers and bacon and add chicken stock, salt, pepper and thyme. Peel and dice potatoes and add to above mixture. Add corn and simmer half hour. In separate pan, melt butter, add flour and add milk to flour. Whip smooth. Add to soup and cook 10 mins. to blend.

CHICKEN & RICE
1 chicken (cut up)
1 stk butter or oleo
1 chopped bell pepper
1 chopped onion
1/2 sm jar pimentos (optional)
1 or 2 cans sliced mushrooms
3 c water
1 1/2 c rice
5 boullion cubes
Brown chicken in oleo; remove from pan, saute onions and pepper. Dissolve boullion cube in boiling water. Combine all ingredients in a long baking dish. Place chicken on top and bake at 350 degrees for 1 hr. 15 mins.

FRUIT SALAD
CREAM CHEESE DRESSING
1-1 1/2 c red flame seedless grapes
1 sm can pineapple tidbits
6-8 sm bananas
1/2-1 c pecans
1 T fructose
Slice grapes, cover with fructose; add well-drained pineapple tidbits, sliced bananas and pecans. Mix. Layer in serving dish with cream cheese dressing. (Do not stir.)

CREAM CHEESE DRESSING OR DIP
1 pkg softened cream cheese
3 to 5 T milk for dip
5 to 6 T milk for dressing
6 T fructose
1 t white vanilla
Combine all ingredients. Beat at high speed till smooth. Add more milk as needed.

By now, we hope you are acquainted with the Texas Academic Skills Program which is an instructional program designed to ensure that all students attending public institutions of higher education, will be successful in their studies. This program is scheduled to be implemented in March 1989.

The program states that any student not earning three semester hours of college credit prior to the Fall of 1989, MUST take the T.A.S.P. test. At this time we are seeking permission to offer a college course at Plains High School. If permission is granted, we hope to offer a course this summer. However, if a student plans to enter a Texas-approved teacher education program they must take the T.A.S.P. The T.A.S.P., which is a skills test, will replace the P.P.S.T. now being required.

If anyone is interested in taking T.A.S.P., registration materials may be picked up in the Counselor's office, Plains High School.

I finished college when our youngest child, Betty Jay, was two years old and Sherry, the oldest, was a junior in high school.

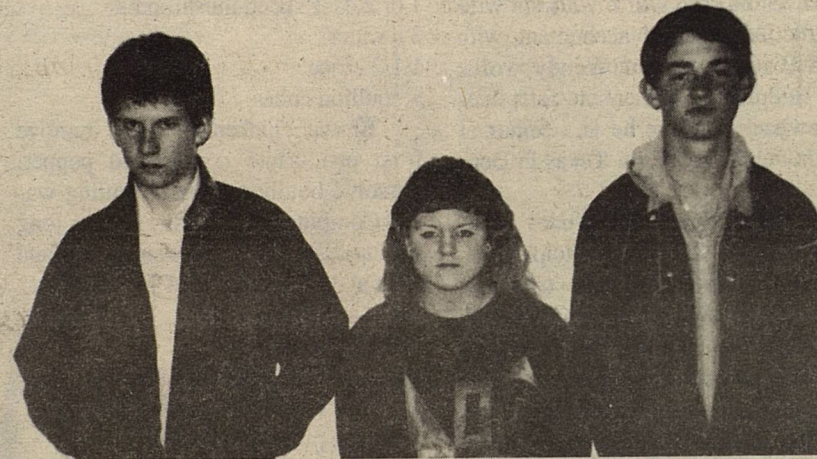

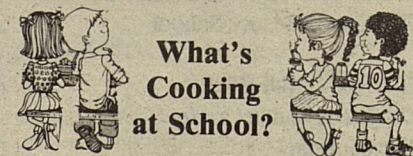

Director of the band is Byron Morgan.



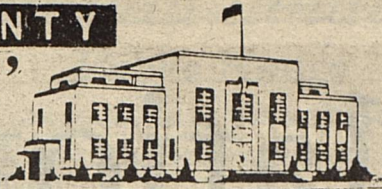

YOAKUM COUNTY Commissioners' Court



Commissioners met Feb. 20 in special session with Dallas Brewer, County Judge; and commissioners John Avara, R.W. Thurston, Jim Barron, Johnnie L. Fitzgerald and county clerk Ruby Bruton present.

The court approved District Clerk Mae Barnett's intent to dispose of public records as approved by Local Records Division, Texas State Library.

Only one bid was received for a self-propelled broom from Bee Equipment Sales, Inc. The bid was accepted with a trade difference of \$16,000.

Commissioners agreed to sell a dump truck to the Denver City Independent School District and include this in the minutes.

Extra hire and disbursements were approved as listed in file, including a transfer of budgeted funds in the amount of \$25,000 to the hospital fund.

A motion to approve Change Order Number 3 on new hospital construction in the total amount of \$40,690 was unanimously okayed.

Contractor's Pay Request No. 10 for period to Feb. 10, 1989 in the amount of \$316,528 was approved for payment. Architectural services through Feb. 1, 1989 in the amount of \$2,567.30 was approved for payment.

Judge Brewer recessed the meeting for an executive session on matters of office personnel of the Criminal District Attorney.

The session reconvened to adjourn at 11:45 a.m.

Meeting in special session Feb. 27, county commissioners accepted a bid for a self-propelled broom for Precincts 1 and 2 from Bee Equipment Co. in the amount of trade in difference of \$7,000.

Only one bid was received on asphalt for calendar year 1989 for Precincts 1 and 2. That bid was accepted. It was submitted by Fina Oil and Chemical Co.

Bids were opened on the lease of a scraper for Precinct 1 from three different companies. Action will be taken at a later meeting, giving the court time to study the bids.

Extra hire and disbursements were approved for payment.

Court passed an order designating Plains State Bank as county depository and voted to execute the pledge contract.

Court agreed to approve a professional services agreement prepared by Criminal District Attorney Linda Lowrey and Hospital Administrator Ed Rodgers to be used as a basis for negotiations with Dr. Eugene Toy, M.D., who will be here in March to discuss the possibility of a practice here.

Notice of Proposed Installation of Buried Cable of General Telephone Co. along the right-of-way from county road p-40 west 3/4 mile on p-39 was presented and approved on condition that it is prepared on the standard form required by Yoakum County and at a depth of 42 inches.

At the request of CDA Linda Lowrey, court voted to approve the return of Judi Addison at second deputy salary effective March 1 with full benefits.

In looking at bids for the lease of a scraper, the lowest bid of West Texas Equipment for the lease of a scraper for Precinct 1 at \$1,670 per week, plus freight and insurance, was accepted by the court.

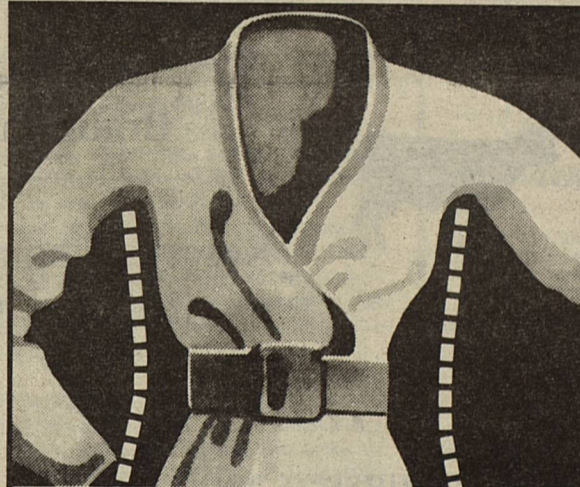

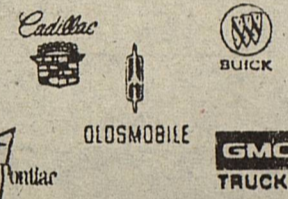

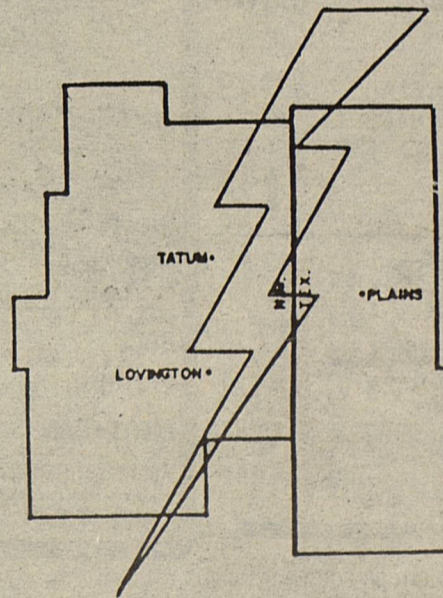
